Big Field For 250-Mile Auto Race On Board Track

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 4.—Fourteen of the world's fastest speed cars, piloted by championship drivers, lined the board speedway here today for the annual 250-mile championship auto race.

The board oval was pronounced in record shape after several trial circuits by veteran drivers. The track was smoothed out and made lightning fast, as well as safe for record racing, following several preliminary tests.

Tommy Milton, with his H. C. S. special, which he drove to victory at the Indianapolis speedway Memorial day, skirted the oval yesterday averaging well below 40 seconds each round. He predicts he will make better speed today than he did on the brick circuit at Indianapolis.

Jimmy Murphy, in his Durant special, after speeding around the board oval in his last trial circuit, pronounced the track in better condition than a year ago, and predicted a faster time would be made by the winner than was set at Indianapolis.

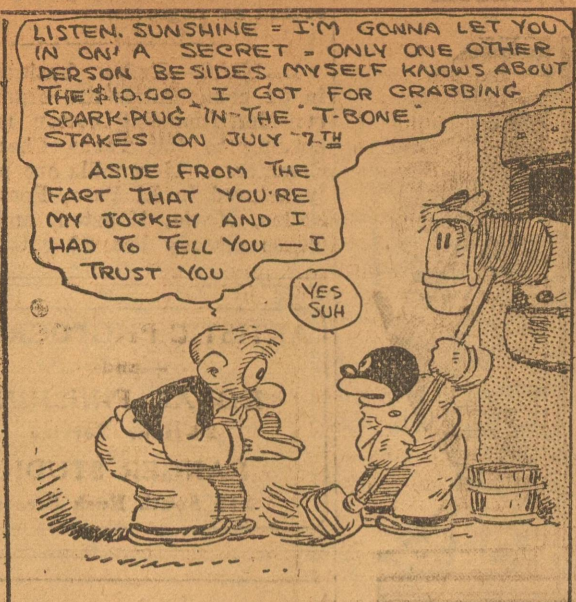

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WILL TRY AGAIN TO MAKE FOUR-DAY FLIGHT



Captain Lowell H. Smith, of the American air forestry patrol, with lieutenant John B. Richter, will seek again, at San Diego, California, to make an uninterrupted flight of four days in an airplane, replenishing their fuel and oil supply in the air from another airplane. Their first attempt failed after six hours because of the burning out of one of the generators on the motor.

Other entries include four more Durant specials, to be driven by Harry Hartz, Eddie Hearne, Jerry Wunderlich, and Harlan Fiegler. Bennett Hill, "Howdy" Wilco, and Dave Lewis will man the three Duesenberg entries. Ralph De Palma will drive a Wade special, local entry. Frank Elliott was entered with his Elliott special.

Speedway officials estimated that at least 50,000 spectators would be in the grandstands at the start-off this afternoon. Purses for the winners will total \$25,000.

TEXAS FACING CRISIS IN ROAD BUILDING PLANS

State Loses All Future Federal Aid Unless Amendment Is Adopted.

AUSTIN, July 4.—The purpose and aim of the proposed constitutional amendment which will be voted on in Texas on July 28 and would authorize the state highway department to take over, construct and maintain a state system of highways, was explained by members of the state highway commission in a statement issued here today.

The commissioners declared that unless an amendment is adopted the state would lose all future federal highway aid which thus far has amounted to approximately \$32,000,000 of which \$15,000,000 actually has been paid to the state.

"Under the present system of highway construction, all initiative rests with the commissioners' courts of the various counties," the statement declared. "If the commissioners' court is unable, neglects or refuses to improve the highways, the highway commission cannot legally build or improve any road even though it be designated highway."

A number of counties in the state have failed to show any interest in the highway program, the members said, with the result that although the state has over 3,000 miles of improved highways, scarcely 100 miles in any continued stretch is improved. "Missing links" are frequent along the highway system, which, they declared, must be filled before Texas will have a connected system of improved highways. The constitutional amendment if adopted, would give the highway commission authority to build such a system.

Commissioners' courts would be relieved of the cost of maintaining highways in the various counties and the burden of this work placed on the highway commission, the statement continued. The legislature has authorized the highway commission to take over maintenance of the highway system after Jan. 1, 1924, but any county may assert its constitutional right to prevent the highway depart-

ment maintaining its roads. The constitutional amendment would give the state commission full authority to maintain the system. State maintenance of highways also would remove the duty of selecting county engineers from political influence, the commissioners said.

No issue of bonds is provided for under the constitutional amendment although this has been reported. Provision of the amendment which would have authorized the legislature to issue such bonds was struck from the

act in the senate and is not included in the amendment as will be voted upon. Election materials have been sent out to county officials by Secretary of State Staples in preparation for the election.

### NEW YORK WOMAN FACES ELECTRIC CHAIR

Mrs. Anna Buzzi, a New York City woman, is the first murderess to be convicted there of first degree murder for several years. There was no recommendation to mercy, and she will be formally sentenced on July 9 to die in the electric chair. She was convicted of murdering Frederick Schneider, wealthy contractor, with whom she had lived for eight years, but who, the state alleged, was preparing to leave her and return to his wife.

## MONSTER AIRPLANE, SOON TO BE TESTED, DESIGNED FOR USE AS BOMBER, WILL BE POWERFUL.

DAYTON, July 4.—The largest airplane the world has known, with a wing-spread of 120 feet—half again as wide as the great Martin bombers of the army air service—will take to the air for the first time here some time this month.

The new monster of the skies, intended solely for use as a bomber, and said to be capable of carrying a quantity of explosives sufficient to destroy a large portion of a modern city, is being assembled at McCook field, the army air station, under the direction of Walter H. Barling, its designer.

### Dwarfs Other Ships

With its great width and other measurements in proportion, the plane will dwarf the largest ships now used. The height of the new plane will be 28 feet, while its length from nose to tail will be 65 feet.

Driven by six Liberty motors, the new ship will require a minimum crew of four men and contain provisions for a working force of eight men to be used when the occasion requires. Exclusive of the crew, it will weigh more than 40,000 pounds.

With the idea of obtaining a maximum lifting power, stability and safety, Mr. Barling designed the ship as a tri-plane of modified type. The upper and nether wings will be of practically the same dimensions while the center will be narrower. Along its length will run the control devices giving them protection and adding a feature of safety.

### Potential Power.

Describing the value of the new plane as a machine of war, Mr. Barling, who during the war did much experimental work for the British royal flying corps, says that its maximum load of several tons of explosives could do untold damage. One bomb of the size which the ship can carry would be capable of sinking the largest and newest type of naval vessel, he believes.

Likewise, a single bomb from the machine, he declares, could demolish an entire community. Should such a projectile be dropped in the center of a city, he says, a fifty-foot crater would be dug, all buildings in the vicinity completely destroyed and structures for a half mile or more around would be greatly damaged.

## NERVE EXHAUSTION, PARALYZING PILOT, MAY LET AIRPLANE FALL

LONDON, July 4.—Fear is never responsible for airplane accidents, in the opinion of Major H. Greame Anderson, consulting surgeon of the British Royal Air force. From the confessions of pupils and his own experiences, Dr. Anderson said, he found that fear never asserted itself in the first few flights because the pupils were too occupied.

The chief causes of accidents to pilots, he explained were due to nerve exhaustion, which might develop within even an hour after the beginning of a flight. The pilot then found himself unable to use his mental faculties and frequently came to grief on landing through inability to judge his speed and nearness to the ground.

Dr. Anderson said that since the British medical service reduced the first practice flights from an hour to ten minutes, accidents from exhaustion had been considerably lessened. They also insisted upon young pupils having a good meal before flying, even at three or four in the morning.

People who fly in commercial machines, the British expert advised, should choose the back seat as being considerably safer than the front, where there is danger of being crushed by the engine in case of trouble. He also suggested that some method should be devised whereby in case of fire the pilot could liberate the cabin, to which a parachute of sufficient strength should be attached to carry it and the passengers safely to earth.

### PUBLIC BUYS CLEAN BOOKS.

CHICAGO.—Ninety-eight per cent of the reading public buys clean books. Modern questionable literature is of inferior artistic quality and is not a public menace, declared M. J. Kinsella of Buffalo, at a meeting of publishers here. "Practically none of these modern books that get a flicker of notoriety by being attacked as immoral have any artistic value," said Kinsella.

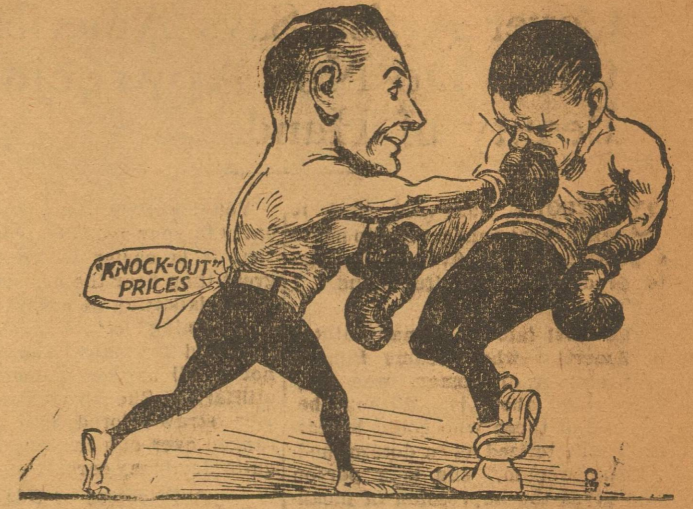
