



WIFE SAYS SHE SHOT HER HUSBAND AFTER HE ATTACKED HER

FORT WORTH, Sept. 17 .-- A charge of murder was filed against Mrs. Lillian Broussard, 28, former manicurist, following the shooting to death of her husband, Louis Broussard, Sunday morning in a rooming house at 920 Cherry street. She waived examining trial.

In a statement to Assistant District Attorney Tolbert, she said she shot her husband after he had struck her on the jaw, knocked her down and cursed her. Two physicians examined her, but found no bruises on her body.

Saturday night, she said, she and her husband retired as usual, and she told him she was not well. Sunday morning, she said her husband accused her of lying to him the night before. Mrs. Broussard then went to a trunk, lifted the lid, got out the pistol and shot her husband, she said.
