Now, there, by virtue of my office as mayor of the city of Ranger, and by authority of the same, I do hereby proclaim two hours cessation of all business activities within the city of Ranger during the hours of 2:30 and 4:30 p. m., Friday, being the hour of the funeral services and one-half hour before and onehalf hour afterwards, and I further request all people of the city and all other citizens who may be in Ranger at that time to join in memorial exercises to be held in the Liberty Theatre, Friday afternoon between the hours of 3 and 4 o'clock, while the funeral of the late chief is being conducted in his home city. Taken From White House Through Lane of Humanity to Big Rotunda.

By Associated Press.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—Such honor as only the great dead of a nation may call for, were bestowed today on the memory of President Warren G. Harding as his body was carried from the White House to lie for a brief time under the dome of the capitol before being taken back to his native state to stay forever

The escort was composed of marching legions with General Pershing at the head. Soldiers and sailors were in procession. Behind the military came President Coolidge and following him the first of American citi-

Leaving White House.

It was a few minutes after 10 o'clock that the funeral procession left the gates of the White House and moved up historic Pennslyvania avenue through a lane of humanity. Former President Woodrew Wilson himself broken by the cares of the chief executiveship, came to the White House gates just before the procession, to take his place in the cortege. Chief Justice Taft of the supreme court, the only other living ex-president, was also in waiting there when the casket, in a shroud of stars and stripes, was lifted from its setting of flowers to be borne to the rotunda of the capitol. Services were conducted by the Rev. Dr Freeman Anderson, pastor of Mr Harding's church in Washington, and the Rev. Dr. James Montgomery, chaplin of the house of representatives. 



Simple tests to find the degree of poisonng from a gas known as carbon monoxide are now possible with the invention of an nstrument that shows how much a person has been affected within three minutes, where formerly it took from 24 to 48 hours efore this could be accurately determined. The apparatus may be carried in the ocket and is expected to prove of particılar value in mines, where this gas is a much-dreaded menace. Because of the compactness of the new instrument and the fact that it can be applied to a patient ov one who has had no special training, it will be of broad general service, it is predicted. Government experts, who tried it on a young girl, assert that it is the quickest method known to detect the gas.

NEW YORK, Aug. 8 .- When the baseball season opened, the Giants and the Yanks were picked by practically all the experts to repeat as pennant winners.

The Giants were rated good almost to the point of a cinch for the National league pennant, while the Yanks were selected as just about good enough to win the American league honors.

It followed as a surprise when in mid-season the Yanks had taken unto Fort Worth65 45 themselves the role of a cinch and Dallas . had galloped to a lead of 13 games, Wichita Falls60 50 while the Giants were tossed into a San Antonio57 55 fight for their lives with the Cincin- Galveston53 54 nati Reds and the Pittsburgh Pirates. It follows that there were reasons for the rather sudden and long delayed desire of the American league champions to develop harmony and get the best out of what has been for three years a very fine ball club. There are many theories advanced

as those reasons.

First quoted as the biggest factor in the improvement of the team is the reform of the great Babe Ruth The swat king, although he is not within striking distance of new slugging marks, is, without doubt, the outstanding figure of baseball today. When the jury meets in the fall to vote for the most valuable player in the American league, there is little doubt that Babe Ruth will be elected

Safety-first methods of the American league pitchers, which caused Ruth to be passed more than 100 times in half a season, prevented him from setting new marks as a home run hitter, but it seems certain that he will be the champion slugger of the big league even under that handi-

While his opportunities to knock balls off the yard were restricted by the refusal of the pitchers to put them in his alley, Ruth switched his batting style and he developed into a likely candidate for the batting championship of the league. It seems almost certain that he will lead the league in runs batted in and runs

With his general improvement at the bat, his fielding also became better. Without the handicap of the surplus weight that he carried last season he developed into a longrange fielder and his arm is second only to that of Bob Meusel, the fin-

est outfielding-pegger in baseball. Ruth has been "going straight" and the influence of his example no doubt was of benefit to the whole team. At one time, the less illustrious members of the team felt that they were being discriminated against when they were punished for infractions of the training rules while Ruth was able to "get away with murder."

FIRST CITY MANAGER MUCH IN DEMAND AND HIS SALARY ADVANCES

By Associated Press.

LAWRENCE, Kan., Aug. 8.— When Charles Edward Ashburner, city manager of Norfolk, Va., assumes his new job as city manager of Stockton, Cal., Sept. 1, at a salary of \$20,000 a year, he will continue to be the highest paid city manager in the United States, according to John G. Stutz of this city, executive secretary of the National City Manager's association. His salary at Norfolk is \$16,000 a year.

"An interesting thing about Ashburner is that he not only is the highest paid city manager in the United States, but he was the pioneer in the profession—he was the first city manager," said Secretary Stutz. "When he accepted the job of manager of the city of Staunton, Va., in 1908, he received only a nominal salary. It was largely through the successful demonstration he gave there that other cities accepted the idea. When Ashburner was asked by the city of Stockton to fix his salary, he put the figure so high he did not imagine a city of but 50,000 population would accept. Although Norfolk, a city of 150,000, later met the rise in the effort to hold Ashburner, of course he could not annul Stockton's acceptance of his offer."


