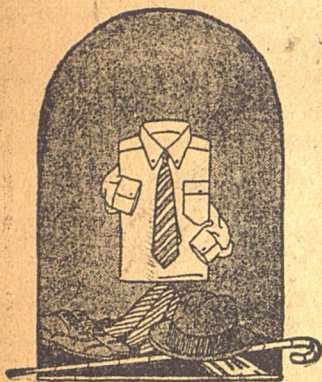

EXHIBITION TILTS IN SOUTH PROVE GOOD BUSINESS

 NEW YORK, March 29.—With the exception of the Cincinnati Reds, all of the major league teams scheduled exhibition games in the South this spring against teams in their own league.

Southern exhibition games that bring major league teams in competition against each other are not unusual. They have come to a part of the training of the team and an important part. They also help to pay the bills.

Up until this season however teams generally selected their opponents from the other league, but this year National league teams were playing National league teams, and American league teams played American league clubs along with their inter-league games.

The management of the Cincinnati club did not arrange any games with National league clubs, because it is opposed to the idea, but it is so heavily outvoted that it probably will make its plans next spring with an open mind.

In just a few years the idea of the early spring exhibition games has grown so much and proved to be such a good business venture that some thing bigger and better organized than the present arrangement is almost sure to be the result.

It is quite possible that in a few years the season may be extended to take in officially a certain number of games down South and that a regular circuit might be formed.

With just a few exceptions, all of the major league teams are now training in Florida. It is possible that all of the teams with the exception of the Chicago Cubs will train in Florida next spring. Most of the club owners picked cities in the same part of the state and they are all located within a few miles of each other.

Baseball men say the idea of an early start with the games played down South until May, when the teams would move north, is not practical now, but they admit that such a plan might be worked out in the future.

FOUR PROBABLY DROWNED WHEN TRAIN BRIDGE FALLS

NEWARK, Ohio, March 29.—Four men, comprising the entire crew of a B. & O. freight train, are believed to have been killed when the train crashed through a bridge into the Hog Run at Locust Grove, near here today. The creek was swollen by heavy rains which had weakened the supports of the bridge. Engineer Louis Hastle and Fireman P. F. Gardner, both of Newark, are two of the men missing.

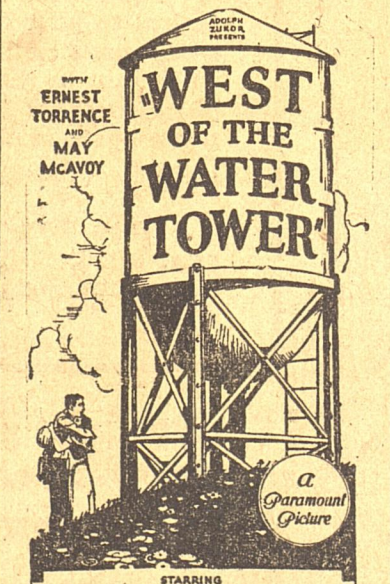

The small victim was scalped while large pieces of flesh were torn from his arms and body. He is being treated at a local hospital and will recover, physicians said.

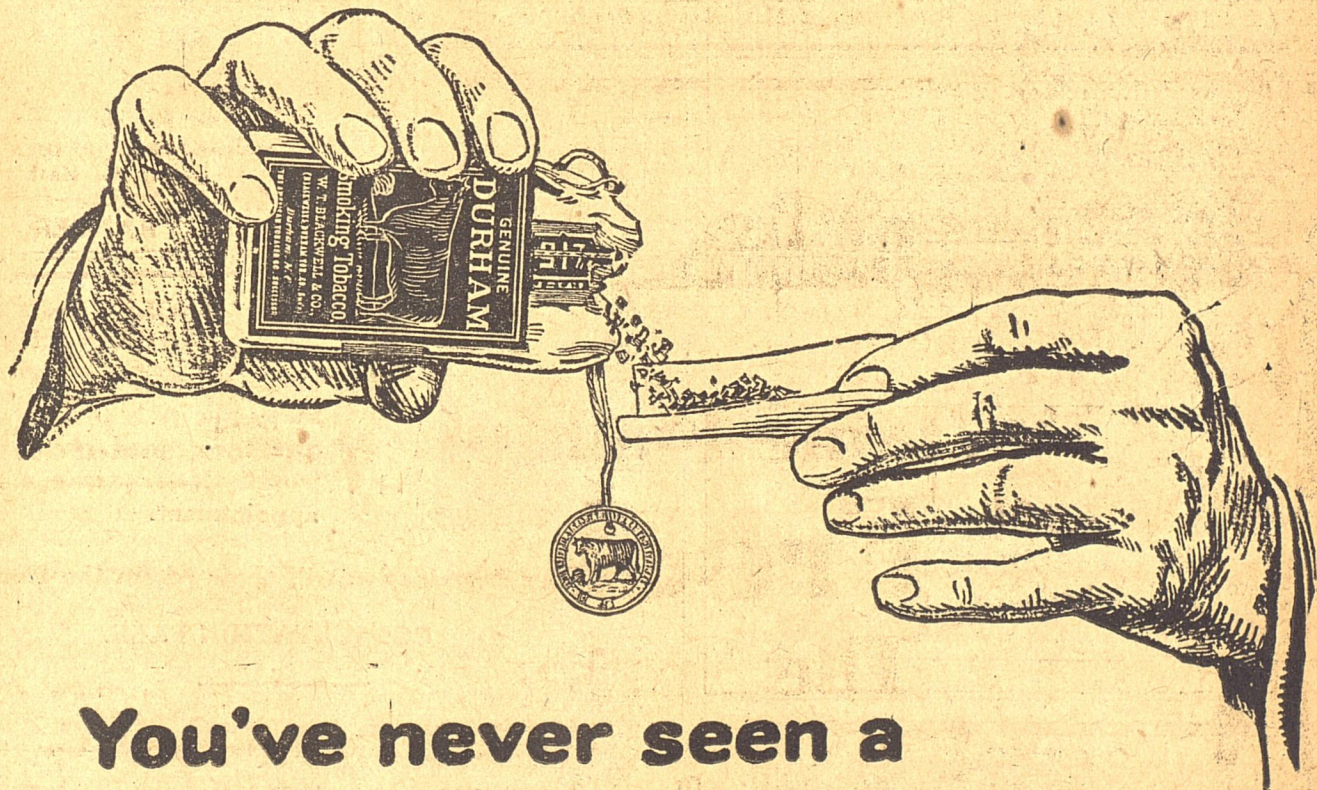
THREE CHILDREN DROWNED WHILE PLAYING IN CREEK

MELCROFT, Pa., March 29.—Searching parties today were working on both banks of the flood swollen Indian creek in a futile effort to locate the bodies of three children who were drowned here today while playing "ferry boat."

The children conceived the idea of "ferrying" and launched a wooden trough in rushing waters and then climbed aboard. A fourth child became frightened and leaped ashore.

The other youngsters paddled to midstream. Becoming frightened when the current caught the trough and twisted it down stream the three children jumped into the stream and were drowned.

REGENTS OF TEXAS TECH MEETING IN FORT WORTH

FORT WORTH, March 29.—Regents of the Texas Technological college met here yesterday to complete plans for laying out the campus and to discuss the erection of an administration building and a residence for the president.

The meeting was called last Thursday by A. G. Garter, Fort Worth, chairman of the board.

Architects are here to aid the regents in making plans for the proposed buildings. Campus beautifications and landscape gardening plans will also be considered.

The regents have \$100,850 available for the construction of the building. The cornerstone of the school will be laid July 4.

Gorman Field Looks Promising and Many New Wells Started

John Knox and J. E. Lewis of Eastland have a 100-barrel well in their Wright & Eison No. 3 in the Gorman field in the southern part of the county. Kirk & Brewer's Shugart No. 3 has not been put on the pump, but is looking good for an 80-barrel producer. McLester's No. 2 Chapman should be a moderate producer but completion is hindered because of numerous caveins.

Five new wells have been started in the Gorman field—Knox & Lewis' No. 4 Wright & Eison, Kirk & Brewer's No. 4 Shugart, Tom Harrell's No. 1 Shugart, Gholson's No. 3 Shugart and the Magnolia company's No. 5 Ross.

One-half mile north of the new 500-barrel well of the Mook-Texas on the J. C. Harrell tract, the States Oil corporation is drilling at 2,500 feet on the I. C. Harrell No. 13, eight and one-half miles north of Eastland. The States' Radford, five miles north of Eastland, is due in within a few days. The Panhandle Refining company's No. 14 Gray-Hightower, is due to be completed within the next few days.

PHILLIPS DRUG COMPANY HELPED TO ERECT ROAD SIGNS

'Human Ostrich' Is Forced To Disgorge Quantity Of Junk

CHICAGO, March 29.—Three pounds of junk, ranging from nails and safety pins to beer checks and bolts were removed today from the stomach of William Bartell, 24, "human ostrich." Dr. Max Thorer, who removed the collection, said that Bartell had a fair chance to recover.

Bartell is a professional swallower. A big spike proved too much for him. It punctured the walls of his stomach and an operation was necessary to save his life.

Dr. Thorer removed 110 nails, 77 safety pins or parts of safety pins, 22 paper clips, four bolts, 12 tacks, 33 thumb tacks, two beer checks and a miscellaneous collection of washers, screws, cartridges. A can opener was also in the collection.

QUICK INDICTMENT IN NACOGDOCHES COUNTY AFTER FATAL BATTLE

NACOGDOCHES, March 29.—Four indictments charging murder, assault to murder, transportation and carrying concealed weapons were returned by the Nacogoches grand jury today against I. G. Hanks, 28.

Hanks was arrested early today following a gun battle between rum runners and sheriff's forces in which Deputy Johnny Martin was killed. Sheriff T. V. Vaught was wounded and Bud Dickinson, a negro, was fatally shot.

Hanks is alleged to have admitted taking part in the shooting, but claimed he fired in self defense when Sheriff Vaught and Martin attacked him when they sought to search his car.

MOGUL PREPARING TO DRILL IN SHALLOW FIELD

With the No. 1 H. C. Earnest showing up favorably at 1,560 feet, the Mogul Oil corporation is moving in machinery for another shallow well on the same lease. The No. 1 is reported making considerable gas and with a showing of oil.

The Mogul is planning a steady, conservative development of its holdings in this county, consisting of about 1,000 acres of desirable leases. About 700 acres of this is near Staff, about two and a half miles southwest of the Gray-Hightower shallow field whose excellent wells at 1,200 feet have drawn much attention. The Mogul holdings have another good shot for production as the land is only a few miles northwest of the Gorman field which has gradually been extended in that general direction.

TEXAS TRYING TO COLLECT FROM U. S. GOVERNMENT

AUSTIN, March 29.—Texas has renewed its efforts to collect more than \$90,000 from the federal government for the payment for state quarantine stations sold the United States in 1917.

The government raised the question as to whether the titles to the Galveston and Sabine quarantine stations were good and refused to pay until the deeds were cleared up.

State Health Officer Duggan has asked Attorney General Keeling to assist in perfecting the titles to the satisfaction of federal authorities. Payment is expected to be made when the titles are cleared.



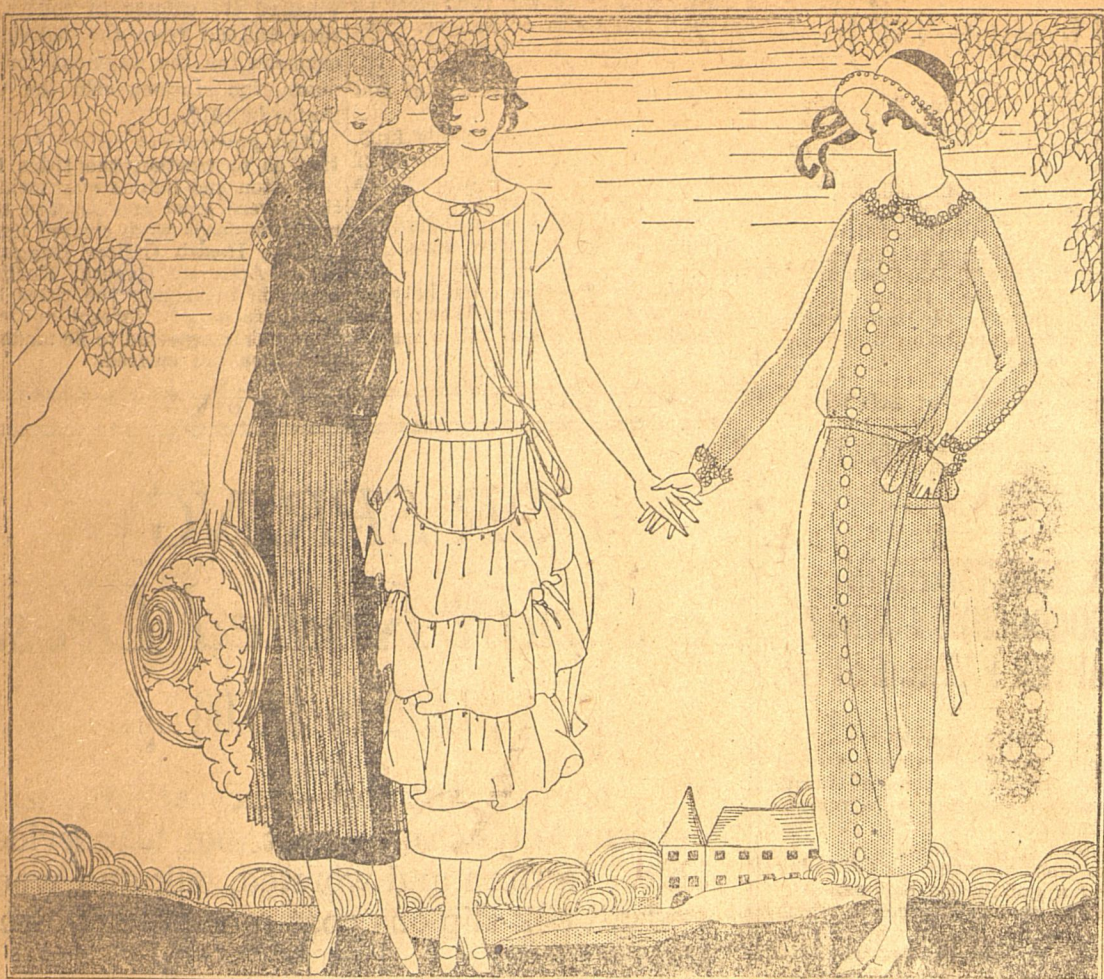

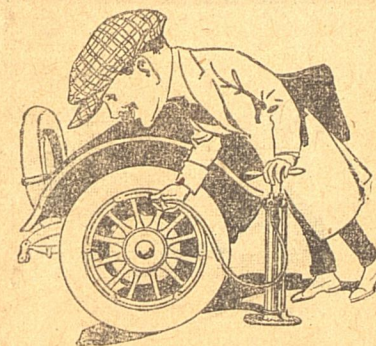
