ATTORNEY GENERAL DAUGHERTY RESIGNS

Baptist Laymen Meet in District Convention

TITHING URGED FOR ITS VALUE IN MANY WAYS

Three Counties and 40 Baptist Churches Represented in Meeting at Ranger.

Addressing the Baptist laymen of the Oil Belt, or more properly speaking, of the three counties, Eastland, Stephens and Shackelford, within the Cisco district, the Rev. C. Ross Payne, Baptist evangelist for the district, stated that the first objective of the laymen's organization was more consecrated work.

Pointing to a map of the three counties, he showed where each of the 40 churches within the district was marked by a gold star and each school house by a red star, and the latter were much more numerous than the former. He said it should be the purpose of the laymen to spread the gospel of Christ, supplementing the work of the pastors, by conducting services just as often as possible in the school houses. He insisted that the efficient laymen in the Cisco district, of which there are many, could reach many persons in the school house areas, remote from the churches, much more easily than the preachers and could accomplish a wonderful work. He urged reorganization of the laymen with this definite view, and suggested that this be made the express purpose of the next fifth Sunday meeting, June 29, unless it was preferred to take immediate action.

Rev. A. L. Leake, pastor of the Central Baptist church of Ranger, gave his indorsement to the suggestion of Mr. Payne that action along the proposed line be taken at the next meeting in June, and asked Joe L. Gary of Gorman, president of the laymen, for his views.

Mr. Gary said that he was president of the organization by appointment only, he having been asked by a number of the pastors to take hold of the work, and approved a reorganization insofar as related to an election of the officers, but he said reorganization was necessary only as it might bring about more efficient functioning, that being the prime requisite.

Bankers Urge Tithing.
Two of the laymen who addressed the laymen at their opening session, Thursday night in the Central Baptist church, are bankers, Mr. Larry being a banker at Gorman and Ernest Hittson a banker at Cisco. The former spoke on "Tithing" and the latter on the "Laymen in the Sunday School."

Mr. Larry, who was introduced as one who practiced tithing and could therefore speak from experience, made a powerful plea for tithing, not only because it was God's command and for what it would do to aid work of God's church, but for the blessings it would bring to those who practice it. He is a fluent, entertaining and forceful speaker and adopted a novel method of driving home and clinching his arguments.

Mr. Hittson urged more consecrated work by laymen in the Sunday schools, more conscientious study of the Bible and more earnest devotions to its teachings. He spoke not only for a tithing of the profits from the investment of the talents loaned by God to His followers, but a tithing of the time of each layman, for service and sacrifice is asked by God from each of His followers, just as much as a division of each layman's profits.

Another entertaining speaker at the opening session was Judge George T. Wilson of Breckenridge, who spoke of the necessity for the collection during the coming year of approximately 27 million dollars of the 75-million dollars that was unpaid. He said that if the Baptists in the South would give just one-tenth of their paper man she was going to New profits in one year to God, it would amount to about 125 million dollars, and it was apparent some were not living up to their responsibility. She expected to get away from public stressing the blessings that come to the metropolians.

College Professor Is Named American Minister To Poland

WASHINGTON, March 28.—President Coolidge today nominated Alfred J. Pearson, a professor at Drake University of Des Moines, Iowa, to be American minister to Poland, and sent the nomination to the senate. Pearson is to succeed Hugh S. Gibson, recently named American minister to Switzerland, succeeding Joseph C. Graw, named under secretary of state.

Foremost dog breeders and hunters of the United States have promised that they will be in attendance at the State Fox and Wolf Hunters' meet in Eastland and Stephens counties next week. D. D. Crim, secretary of the state association, has written over 1,000 personal letters inviting hunters to come with their dogs and the responses have been heavy, he said.

S. I. Woodruff of Versailles, Ky., millionaire sportsman and breeder of fine dogs and race horses will come. A. V. Huyler of New York city, owner of the Huyler Candy company and wealthy sportsman, will bring his dogs. Woods and Robert Walkers of Paint Lick, Ky., sons of the original breeder of Walker hounds, are coming.

W. L. Branham of Chicago, president of the National Fox and Wolf Hunters' association; R. L. Breckenridge of Lexington, Ky., publisher of The Chase, official magazine of the National Fox and Wolf Hunters' association; R. L. Hays, Spencer, W. Va., breeder of fox and wolf hounds; V. C. Spalding of Monroe City, Mo., producer of the Spalding strain of fox and wolf hounds; Judge W. M. Wallace of Shreveport, La., millionaire oil man, dog fancier; George Satterwhite of Louisville, Ky., noted judge of dogs. They are coming.

Hundreds of hunters have written to Secretary Crim that they will come with their dogs.

The hunt will open on the first of April and close on the fifth. The Oil Belt Wolf Hunters' association is host to the state association during the meet.

Eugene Dennis Wins Kindly Favor From Sympathetic Court

NEW YORK, March 28.—Eugene Dennis, 18-year-old Atchison, Kan., psychic and her mother, Mrs. Anna Dennis, were fined \$25 each Thursday for having "told a fortune" for money in violation of the penal code. They paid their fines. Frederick Goldsmith, their attorney, declared he would appeal.

The two were found guilty last week of having accepted \$25 from Mrs. Mary Foley, who sought information regarding her son. Eugene said, Mrs. Foley testified, told her the boy was in Los Angeles. The son turned up later and said he had never been farther west than Pittsburg. Magistrate Rytenberg, in passing sentence, said the law enabled him to fine them \$250 each or send them to jail for six months. "I believe the girl is the victim of exploitation after having come to New York for purely scientific purposes," the magistrate declared.

SCOTTISH RITE MASONS GATHER TO MEET GUESTS

Thirty-Third Degree Honorary Masons From Dallas Exemplify Master's Degree.

Scottish Rite Masons from several cities and towns assembled in Ranger last night for the banquet in honor of the thirty-third degree honorary team of Dallas. Sixty Scottish Rite Masons attended the banquet at the Gholson hotel and afterwards the ceremonies at the Masonic building, Rusk and Elm streets, where the Master Mason's degree was conferred on A. J. Darden.

At the dinner, personally supervised by Arthur G. Jury, manager of the Gholson hotel, J. L. Stephens, W. A. Browning of Dallas, Rev. Mr. Morgan, M. M. Pardee of Breckenridge, Rev. H. B. Johnson and E. E. Crawford and District Deputy J. F. Dreinhofner of Ranger, discoursed briefly on Masonry.

One of the largest assemblages of Masons ever in the Masonic hall of Ranger greeted the Scottish Rite men when they came over from the Gholson hotel. 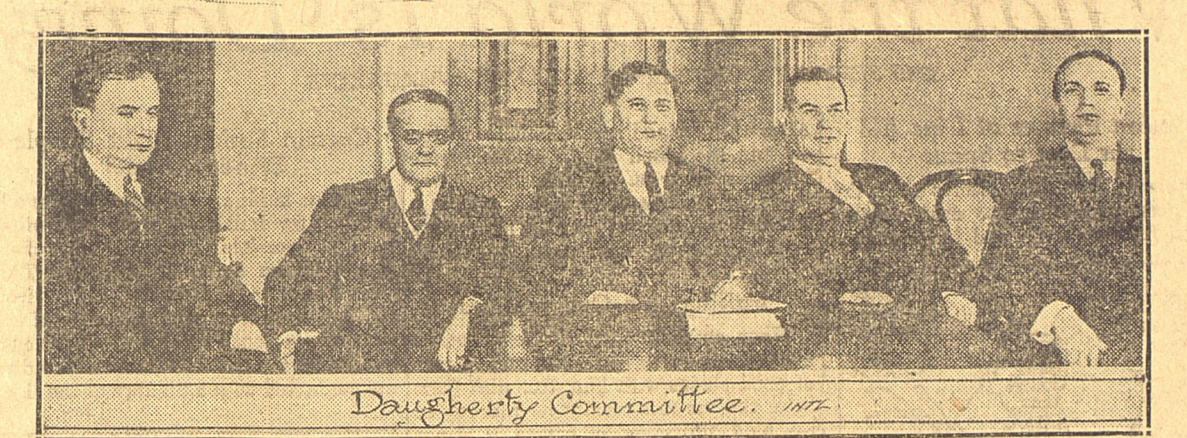

LAND SOLD FOR TAXES PROVES VERY VALUABLE

Brought \$35 to Satisfy Claim for \$2.82. Now Worth Quarter Million Dollars.

Owen & Owen, Eastland lawyers, filed suit in 92nd district court of Stephens county at Breckenridge Thursday for W. E. Russell et al., of Dallas against Jack Black of Breckenridge, in which the plaintiffs seek to collect from the defendant, \$285,000.

Plaintiffs allege in substance that in 1917 a certain one-half block of land in the town of Breckenridge on which \$2.82 was due for delinquent taxes, was sold to the defendant for \$35. Oil wells were drilled on the property which, it is claimed by the plaintiffs, have produced more than \$100,000 worth of oil.

Plaintiffs are claiming that they are the rightful owners and were the rightful owners of the property at the time it was sold for the taxes and the sale was not legal.

TWENTY-FIVE MINERS IN WEST VIRGINIA DIE IN COAL MINE EXPLOSION

WELCH, W. Va., March 28.—The bodies of 13 of the 25 miners, entombed in the mine of the Yukon-Pocahontas at Yukon, McDowell county, near Bluefield, were removed this afternoon. It is believed the remaining 12 have also lost their lives.

TWO DALLAS NEGROES DIE IN THE ELECTRIC CHAIR AT HUNTSVILLE

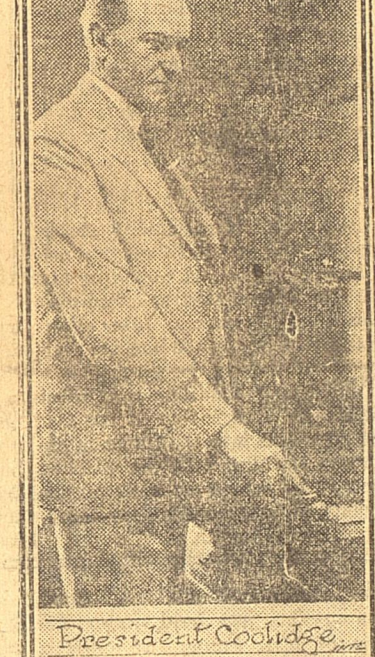
HUNTSVILLE, March 28.—Ernest Lawson and Blaine Dyer, Dallas negroes, were electrocuted today in the state penitentiary for the murder of two policemen. Lawson was the first to die. Before going to the chair he confessed that he killed John R. Crain, Dallas night watchman. Six minutes after the first bolt of the current shot through his body he was pronounced dead.

Dyer also made a complete confession before he died. He said he shot and killed J. C. Gibson, motorcycle officer, when the latter was entering a drug store in search of burglars. Dyer was dead four minutes after the current was turned on. The bodies were forwarded to Dallas for burial.

COMMITTEE NOW EXPECTS TO GET DESIRED RECORDS

Senator Wheeler Says Investigation of Daugherty Will Go Ahead.

WASHINGTON, March 28.—"The senate investigation of the department of justice will go forward with renewed vigor as a result of the resignation of Attorney General Daugherty," Senator Wheeler, Montana, announced, following the committee hearing today said.

"The forced resignation of Daugherty will not halt this investigation," Wheeler said. "On the contrary, it will help it, for we will be able to get department records that Daugherty has denied us."

Daugherty Goes to Atlantic City For Several Days' Rest

WASHINGTON, March 28.—Former Attorney General H. M. Daugherty left Washington for Atlantic City immediately after resigning from the cabinet today. Solicitor General James M. Beck will become acting attorney general, according to an announcement at the White House until a successor to Daugherty is appointed by the president.

Daugherty intends to rest for a few days in Atlantic City before returning here to close up a few personal matters. Beyond that he has formulated no definite plans, his confidential assistant, Warren F. Martin, said this morning.

The father in his complaint said his son drove to Fort Worth in company with Vera Brant, 21 years old, on a joy ride and was married on a dare.

PRESIDENT IS FORCED TO ASK FOR THE OFFICE

Crisis Is Precipitated When Daugherty Advises Against Granting Senate's Request.

WASHINGTON, March 28. Attorney General Daugherty resigned from the cabinet today at the request of President Coolidge. The resignation was announced from the White House, where Daugherty's letter, acceding to the president's demand, was given out. This letter was as follows:

My Dear Mr. President: I hereby acknowledge receipt of your letter of March 27 by the hand of your secretary, requesting my resignation as attorney general of the United States.

Solely out of deference to and in compliance therewith, I hereby tender my resignation. While you do not state when you desire my resignation to become effective, I must respectfully request that it become effective forthwith.

H. M. DAUGHERTY, Attorney General.

The letter, bearing yesterday's date, which was sent by the president to Daugherty, was as follows: My Dear Attorney General: Since my conference with you, I have examined the proposed reply you suggest making to the demand that you furnish the committee investigating the department of justice with the files from that department relating to certain litigation and certain activities of the bureau of investigation. You represent to me and the committee in your letter that it would not be compatible with the public interests demands, and conclude your letter with a statement which you ask that I approve.

Certainly I approve well established principles that departments should not give out information or documents, which such a course would be detrimental to the public interests, and this principle has always been peculiarly applicable to your department which has such intimate relations with the dispensation of justice. You will readily perceive that I am unable to form an independent and satisfactory judgment in this instance without a long and intricate investigation of voluminous papers, which I cannot make, and so should be compelled to follow the usual practice in such cases or rely on your advice as head of the department of justice.

The committee is investigating your personal conduct and hence you have become an interested party. The committee wants these papers because they claim they are needed to disclose your personal administration of the department. Assuming that the request of the committee should not be approved until the request is limited to designated information, still the question will always be the same.

In view of the fact that the inquiry relates to your personal conduct, you are not in position to give me or the committee what would be disinterested advice on this matter, as if it were only of public interest. You have a personal interest in this investigation, which is being made of yours, and the conduct of your office, which may be in conflict with your office as attorney general. I am not questioning your judgment or integrity. I am merely reciting the fact that you are placed in two positions, the one personal and the other official, and that they may be in conflict.

How can I satisfy a request for action in matters of this nature on the ground that you, as attorney general, advise against it, when you, the individual against whom the inquiry is directed, necessarily have a personal interest in it. I do not see how you can be acting for yourself, in your own defense, in this matter, and at the same time and on the same question acting as my adviser in the office of attorney general. These two positions are incompatible and cannot be reconciled.

I am sure you will see that it is necessary for me to have the advice of a disinterested attorney general in order that I may discharge the duties of my office in this and other matters. I feel certain that you will know how deeply I regret that this situation has arisen. It only illustrates the difficulties which are certain to recur with other increasing embarrassments and your inability to perform satisfactorily the duties of attorney general under present conditions. You will readily understand that it is not now my intention to prejudge the issues which remain to be developed in this investigation. I recognize that you are entitled to a full and fair hearing, but as there is no way by which you can divest yourself of the interest you have personally in the investigation, I can see no way but for you to retire as attorney general, and I am, therefore, compelled to request your resignation.

This seems to be reply sufficient to critics who foresee the crumbling of the church before the attacks of modernism.

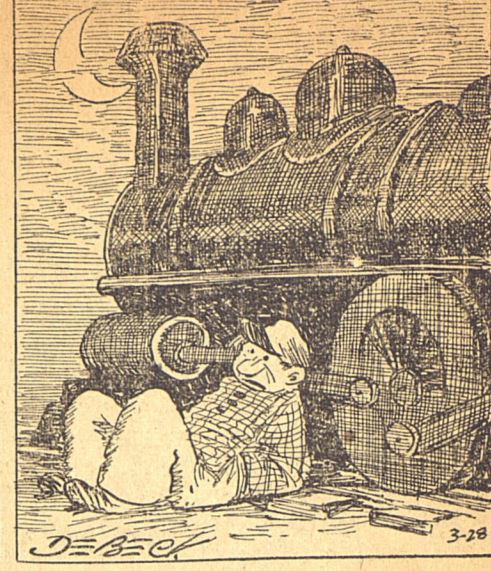
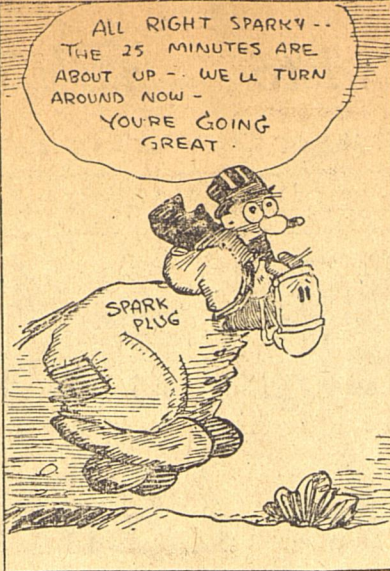
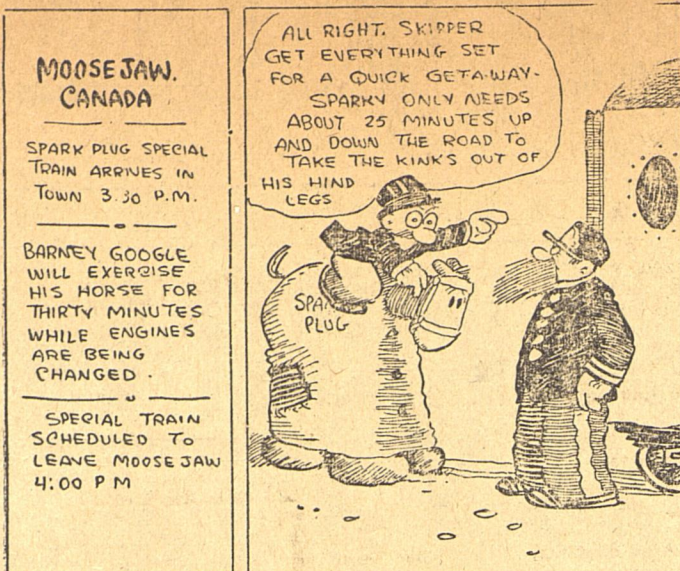

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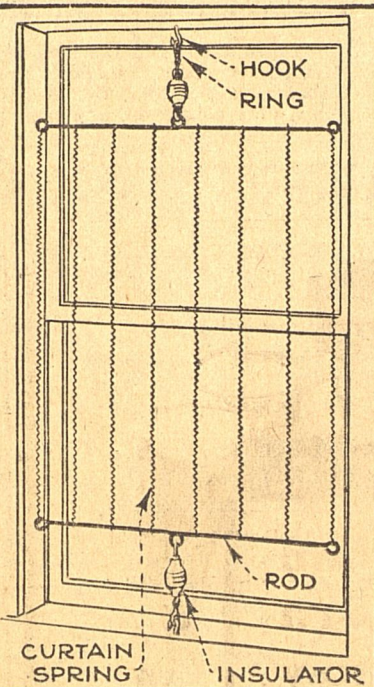

Pulling Car Out of Mud

When stuck in mud the lone auto need not despair as long as he has a pair of good chains with him, for, with their help, the car can usually be run out of the mud, providing, of course, it is not too deep. One end of a chain is fastened around the tire and to the spokes of a rear wheel, while a short, stout iron bar is pushed through the links at the other end of the chain and a tow rope tied to this bar.

Curtain Springs Make Simple Window Aerial

Various kinds of indoor aerials are advocated for buildings where any other type is impossible; one of the most effective is shown in the illustration. Two spreaders of heavy iron wire or light iron rod, a little shorter than the width of the window, are bent with an eye at each end, and one in the center. The two spreaders are connected with a number of the light



curtain springs that are widely used instead of curtain rods. The efficiency of the aerial depends to a great extent upon the number of springs used. The spreaders are suspended between the top and bottom of the window casing, insulators being used as shown.

Cleaning White Woolens and Furs

Garments are often dry cleaned at home, but the result obtained in the case of white woolens or furs is not always satisfactory. However, the simple trick described below can be employed by anyone, and the results will prove a pleasant surprise.

After the woolen or fur has been washed and rinsed in gasoline, it should be wrung or shaken out thoroughly and placed in a deep pan. A pound or two of white flour should then be sifted over and rubbed into the article. After allowing the article to dry on the line, the flour is whipped out, leaving the garment in a cleaner and whiter condition than usual after cleaning.

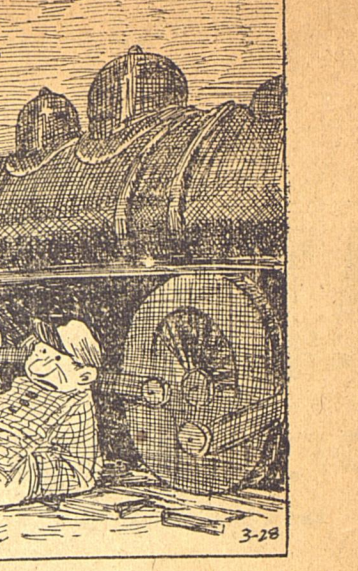

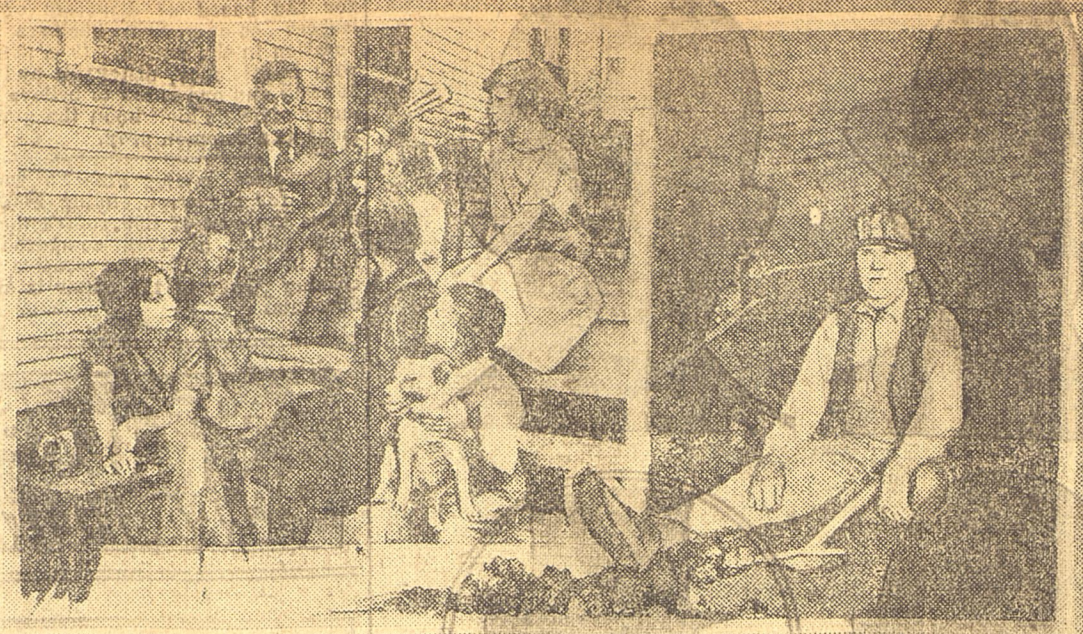

Oldest Miner Advocates Work In Soft Coal Fields As Aid to Health



If you ask John Harrison, of Williamson, West Virginia, the secret of how to have health, strength and happiness when the allotted three score and ten years have been reached and passed, the answer would be: "Become a soft coal miner!"

Sixty-two years ago John, then nine years old, had the courage to enter what was commonly thought to be a difficult, dangerous and disagreeable trade. He went to work in the mines at his native town—Washington, England. John wasn't one of these fly-by-night people. He stuck at this job for forty-one years. His daily wage, when

he started in as a boy, was one shilling a day, and a long day it was he worked, too.

When he was fifty, John Harrison was seized with the ambition to better his lot. Accordingly, he came to America, and headed straight for West Virginia, a natural goal for a coal miner. He settled there. Today, at seventy-one, he is more than able to do his "daily dozen," and milk his cow morning and evening.

Harrison, whose job is that of a loader, today is able to put his twelve or fifteen tons of coal on the mine cars. For this he is paid by the ton, and well paid. John has a strong prejudice in favor of the

work to which he has devoted his life. Naturally, he considers it safe, pleasant, and profitable.

Harrison, possibly the oldest miner in West Virginia in point of mining service, started in his career in coal mines long before the day of labor unions, and has never belonged to one. He works for a company which makes its agreements directly with the miners, and because of that he has only one boss—the man who pays him his wages every two weeks.

John is a great favorite with his neighbors' kids, and in his leisure hours they cluster around him to make him tell them tales or amuse them playing his guitar.

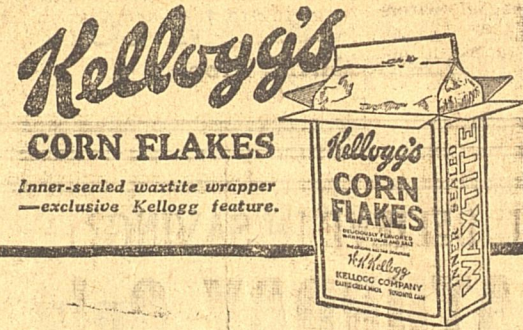

Gross crude oil production decreased 4,900 barrels for the week ending March 22, according to the daily average reports of the weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute. Production totaled 1,906,850 barrels.

California production showed a daily average production of 645,500 barrels, a decrease of 8,500.

Oklahoma showed a daily average production of 406,850 barrels, increase of 6,700; Kansas 68,900, decrease of 400; North Texas, Wichita Falls district 67,600, decrease of 3,100; East and West Central Texas 224,750, decrease of 850; North Louisiana 50,000, decrease of 550; Arkansas 127,300, increase of 5,200; Gulf Coast 95,900, increase of 1,250; Eastern 96,500, decrease of 500; Wyoming and Montana 123,550, decrease of 4,150.

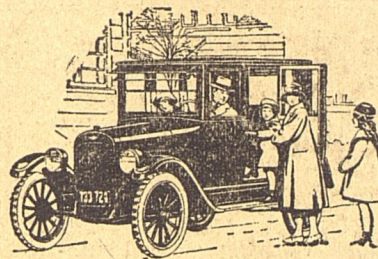

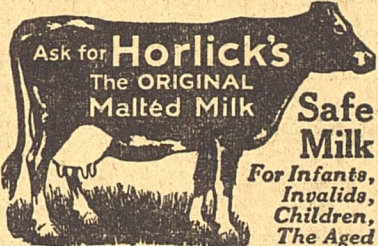

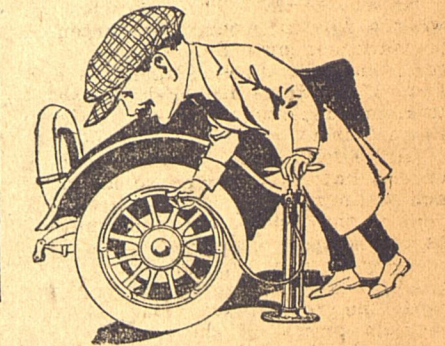

EASTER GOWNS DESCRIBED BY FASHION EDITOR

Hedda Hoyt Writes Especially for Those Who Intend to Make Them at Home.

By HEDDA HOYT, Fashion Editor of the United Press. (Written for the United Press.) NEW YORK.—This article is written for the woman who intends to make her own Easter frock and for those who depend upon the efforts of the home dressmaker, rather than the department store for their "Paster" chic.

In the first place, let me say that dresses have never been so alluring and so inexpensive as they are this year in the ready-made departments of our shops. Unless one attempts to copy a very unusual and costly frock, it is foolish to try to compete with the ready-made garment of medium price. I should therefore advise the home dressmaker to confine her attempts to copying costly imports or high-priced American models, which she could not otherwise afford.

I might also suggest that it is often disastrous to try to copy gowns of eccentric cut and unusual fabric unless one can find similar patterns in the shops and similar fabrics. Therefore I shall confine my attempts at describing imports to those which have simple lines and materials which can be duplicated in American department stores.

Chance to Save Money. In looking over the imports of several New York shops with the home dressmaker in view, I discovered numerous models which could be reproduced at the cost of an inexpensive, ready-made frock. One particularly effective model, costing \$250, was made of black triple crepe. It was designed on straight, beltless lines. Above the knees three scalloped bands of the material were placed, one above the other, to form the flounce. These were cut on the straight of the material and acted as a trimming, rather than a flare. They were lined in deep blue georgette and picoted about the scalloped edges. The neckline of this frock was rounding and there were no sleeves.

Attached at the top of the armhole a circular panel of self-material began in a narrow point and broadened out until it was about three-quarters of a yard wide at the bottom. This panel was cut V-shaped with the point of the V attached at

the shoulder and its straight selvaged edge attached from shoulder to hem in a straight line at the back of the frock. Three blue georgette bands with wide-scalloped edges were applied onto this winged panel. As the arms were lifted the winged panel spread outwards giving a butterfly effect with its blue scalloped bands outlined on the black crepe.

This frock, though simple, is out of the ordinary run of spring models and would be lovely for the woman whose lines are a bit too mature to wear the beltless frock without a means of diverting from its plainness.

A Simple Frock.

Another simple frock would be suitable for the young miss is made of black crepe de chine. Its straight lines are broken at the knees by a flounce effect formed by five alternating rows of red and black chiffon ruffles. These ruffles are mere-

ly straight, double folds of the material, shirred very full. The first ruffle is black and this overlaps a ruffle of red, then black, etc., with a black ruffle terminating at the bottom. A narrow band of red chiffon attached at the shoulder hangs loose, forming a sleeve effect. A girde of black crepe de chine lined in red chiffon ties in a huge bow at the side front. This girde is placed low on the hips and is set on so loosely that it does not take away from the straight-line effect. This is a very youthful frock and can be easily made.

Another extremely beautiful gown on a more dressy order, is made of heavy brown satin. The bodice is tight-fitting and long-waisted, and has tiny puffed sleeves which extend just over the shoulders. The skirt is cut very full and circular and has deep scallops about the hem which are edged with a narrow band of brown-dyed ermine.

This is one of the loveliest frocks I have seen among the imports and would make an adorable afternoon frock for spring. Dyed rabbit fur or some of the inexpensive substitutes for summer ermine could be

used to outline the scallops instead of real ermine.

Beige colored lace posed over a black foundation has a crushed girde of black satin lined in burnt orange satin, which terminates in a two-tone pom-pom at one side. Brown, tan and beige laces are prevalent among the dressy imports and these are all very simply made with long-waisted bodices and slender skirts which flare in ruffled fashion at the hem or used godes of pleated chiffon or lace to give fullness at the hem.

Where sleeves are used on lace frocks they are long and flaring. Black and brown foundations are somewhat smarter under light-toned laces than pastel or self-shades.

Another mistake in judgment accounted for the second run. Alsbrook laid down a nice bunt. Moore started home but Althausen picked up the ball and headed him off.

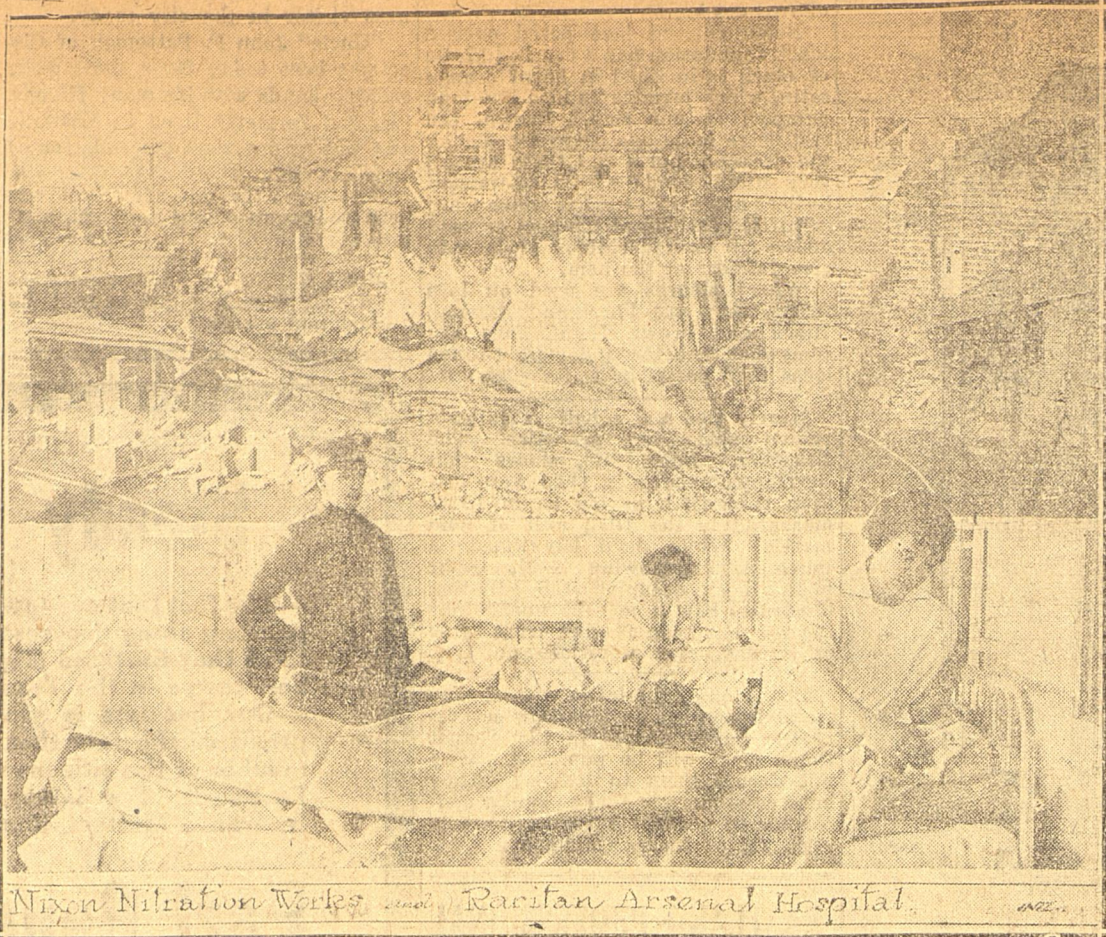

The Street Lights Committee—V. T. Seaberry, chairman; E. G. Schrock, Mrs. J. B. McLaughlin, Mrs. E. T. Murray.

Public Health Committee—Mrs. Horace Butler chairman; other members to be named by the chairman. The chairman of each sub-committee was called on by Mr. Ferguson to tell what each group is planning.

Mr. Owens, in discussing the work planned by the City Beautiful committee, spoke of a spring clean-up at which time weeds will be cut and the citizens will be asked to clear their premises of unsightly debris. The committee will encourage the planting of flowers, the beautifying of lawns and re-painting of residences. Merchants have signified their willingness to grant a liberal discount for Paint-Up week, where it is to be used for painting homes. The committee will especially seek to beautify in every way possible the streets through which the highways pass.

Dr. J. H. Caton, speaking for the parks committee, said that his "hobby" for the year was going to be a tourists' park. He commended the Civic league for their enterprise in providing the present tourists' park, which is used by from one to a dozen groups of tourists nightly, but it was Dr. Caton's idea that additional improvements were desirable. He told of a friend who drove 75 miles more one day last summer than he planned so he could camp that night at the

Paris tourists' park. George W. Briggs, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, told of an ideal site for a tourists' park, about two blocks south of the Bankhead highway in the vicinity of Hillcrest. From the top of this elevation, a view of Ranger can be glimpsed, according to Mr. Briggs, and the eye can take in a great sweep of territory.

It seemed to be the consensus of opinion that the park not be entirely free but that for some conveniences a nominal charge be made. In this way, the park would not become a haven for gypsies or "auto tramps", as Mr. Briggs called them. The average tourist is quite willing to pay for accommodations, particularly when they are out of the ordinary, as showers, baths, snacks in which one may camp instead of using a tent in inclement weather, and other such features.

In the absence of Judge W. H. Sewell, chairman of the street and sidewalks committee, L. D. Hillyer sketched plans for the year. He advanced having the sidewalks of a uniform level, referring to the block on South Seaman where the walk is very much "up and down." By getting enough property owners to agree to the work at one time, cement could be bought in carload lots, one lumber man having offered to sell it for only a little above cost under that condition.

It was suggested by Dr. Caton in the interest of public safety that sidewalks should be built along West Commerce where so many school children now walk on the Bankhead highway on their way to and from the West ward school.

On discussing the street lights situation, several committee members stressed the importance of more lights. The need becomes painfully great when one has just returned from Port Worth or Dallas, one member declared.

Mrs. Horace Butler suggested that a district nurse be employed to give health suggestions and home nursing for families not in position to secure such service in any other way. Mr. Ferguson appointed Mrs. Butler as chairman of a new sub-committee to take up this question. From the discussion, it was thought likely that the community chest could help and as it has been the custom where such a nurse was employed in other cities for her to make a nominal charge in the various cases the work could be made partly self-supporting.

The Chamber of Commerce is offering a cash prize to the Eastland high school or ward school pupil who sends in the best slogan for Eastland. This contest is open to all school children here. Slogans may be sent to G. W. Briggs, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, and the suggestion considered the best will get the prize.

TODD ADJUDGED GUILTY, GETS 21 MONTHS' SENTENCE

After being out several hours the jury in the R. M. Todd whisky selling case, returned a verdict of guilty and assessed punishment at 21 months in the state penitentiary. The defense gave notice that a motion would be filed asking a new trial. If this is overruled the case is to be carried to the appeal courts.

RANGER BAKER PLEADS GUILTY TO LAW VIOLATION

Pleading guilty to a violation of the city's sanitary laws, a Ranger baker paid a fine of \$15.70 today in city court. Wade Swift, city sanitary inspector, made the arrest.

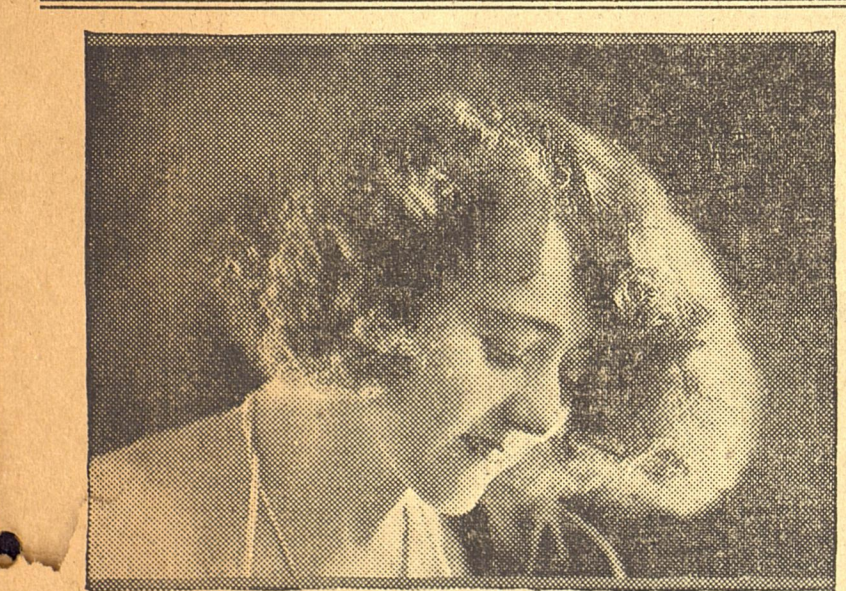

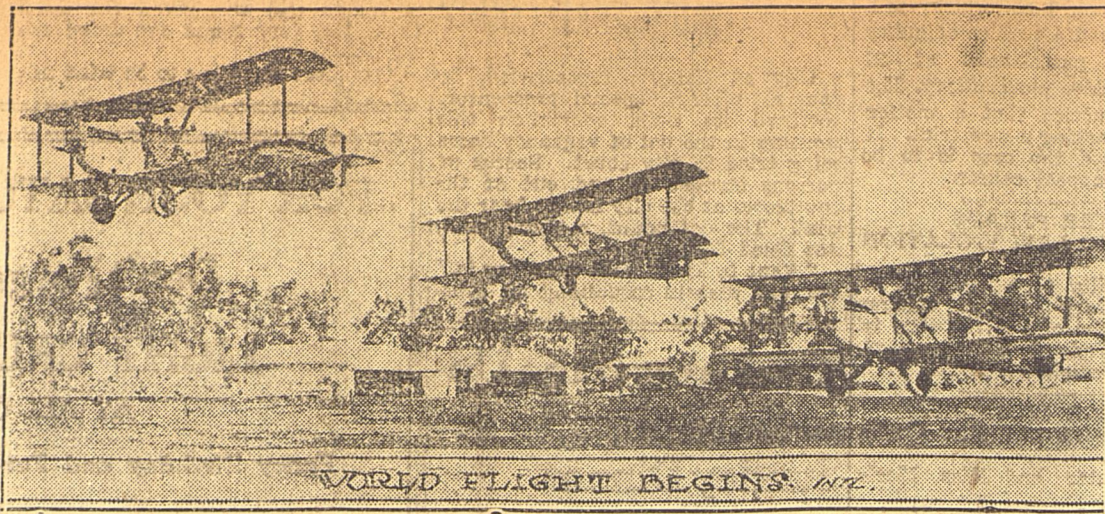

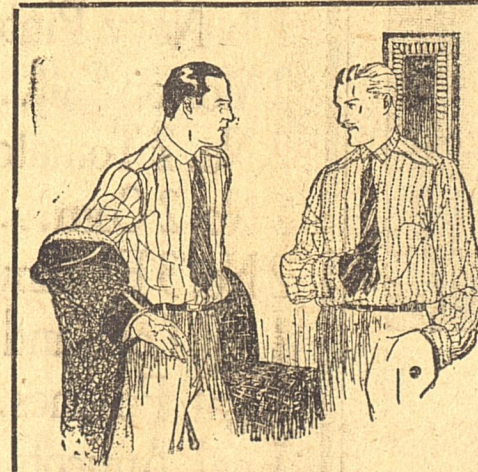
