

WASHINGTON March 28. Attorney General Daugherty resigned from the cabinet today at the request of President Coolidge. The resignation was announced from the White House, where Daugherty's letter, acceding to the president's demand, was given out. This letter was as follows:

My Dear Mr. President: I hereby acknowledge receipt of your letter of March 27 by the hand of your secretary, requesting my res-ignation as attorney general of the

ignation as attorney general of the United States. Solely out of deference to and in compliance therewith, I hereby ten-der my resignation. While you do not state when you desire my resig-nation to become effective, I must respectfully request that it become effective forthwith. H. M. Is not the fact that \$20,000,000 will be spent in building indicative that church dissension is confined almost exclusively to a small proportion of the clergy and that the great army of church-goers has not yet had its faith shaken in the doctrines of that pa ticular church to which they belong?

This seems to be reply sufficent to critics who foresee the crumbling of the church before the attacks of modernism.

Nine out of ten merchants believe "their town is different" and that advertising does not produce results as is done in some other town. All bunk --pure simple bunk! The greatert and most successful advertisers in the world are circus people. Step into a big show print house and you will find their paper and posters prepared months before the season opens-and its all alike. They see no difference between towns in Georgie and towns in Vermont; they use the same advertising in New York that is used in California-all towns and all people are very much aliks. What's the lesson?

From reports received for 1923 it will have to be admitted that "war profits" will not only be duplicated but exceeded in times of peace. Besides the great profits declared by 90 per cent of business concerns, two things stand out as prominent promises: One is the fact that the du Pont company sold more high explosives in 1923 than in any war year; the other is that the earnings of the Steel corporation are close to and will soon surpass the war record. There seems to be but little uncertainty as to the business future of this nation.

The shipping board has advertised for bids on 1,315 government vessels, big passenger steamers, little ones, cargo boats, tugs, etc. The board's last annual report showed a deficit of \$19,000,000 and the board asserts that private operation is so superior to government operation that it may be difficult to give the ships away. Yet they ask the people to assume the losses as a contribution toward a national marine.

and Laredo. The special object of his trip is to acquaint himself with the general condition of the highway and also to organize local units, through cham-bers of commerce, along the route.


