EXPERTS' PLAN

Declares Germany Cannot Afford to Reject Proposals, Which Will Help Her.

PARIS, April 10.—A devout wish that the experts' plans for stabiliz-ing Germany's currency and announc-ing her budget may be successfully consummated was expressed by General Charles G. Dawes in a covering letter transmitted to Louis Barthou, chairman of the reparations commit-tee, together with the report of com-mittee No. 1. Dawes declared the entire world has "a vital and endur-ing cencern" in what the experts pro-pose. He explained the open mind-edness with which they had attacked their problems, and paid high tribute to his colleagues. to his colleagues.

Two outstanding features of the report which Dawes stressed in his covering letter were that the committee has endeavored to so arrange matters that Germany pays taxes as high as those in any creditor country, but no higher, and that her reparations payments are to be gauged by her increasing prosperity.

"The plan submitted is fair and reasonable in its nature, and, if accepted, is likely to lead to ultimate and lasting peace," General Dawes wrote. "The rejection of these proposals by the German government means the deliberate choice of a continuous of security development. tinuance of economic demoralization, eventually involving her people in hopeless misery." "Since, as a result of the war, the creditors of Germany are paying taxes to the limit of their capacity. so also must Germany be encouraged to pay taxes from year to year to the limit of her capacity. This is in accord with the just and underlying principle of the treaty of Versailles, reaffirmed by Germany in its note of May 29, 1919, that the German scheme of taxation must be fully as heavy proportionally as that of any of the powers represented in the commission.' More than this limit could not be expected. And less than this would relieve Germany from the common hardship and give her an unfair advantage in the industrial competition of the future. In solemnly deposing King George II the deputies demanded the expatriation of all members of the royal family, but Alexander Papanastasiou, the premier, refused, declaring the republic should treat them generously and thus give proof of its magnani

The lectrion of the "ssembly has to be confirmed by popular verdict when more trouble is anticipated, be cause the royalists are determined to miss no chance to strangle the republican move.

Difficulties began with King Constantine, who, as a result of his pro-German sympathies, kept Greece neutral during the first half of the war. Fleutherios Venizelos, who bitterly opposed his pro-German king, fled to Saloniki and set up a provisional government there under the protection of the allies. This, in 1917, led to the flight of Constantine—a flight which was expedited by the British navy taking possession of the army and navy stores and equipment and funds. Mr. Venizelos immediately returned to Athens at the head of the government. Greece was promised much by the allies, but received practically nothing. The old government has been wrecked and now the people propose to follow the example of other nations of the world and do a litgoverning themselves.



Nature has provided that the development of the young animal, or The young human, shall be by physical exercise. With children, as with all young animals, this exercise is best and most naturally secured through the influence of

Culture

It is interesting to note that some of the most profound of our philosphers, as Prof. Max Muller, have shown that many of the games inaulged in by children are well-nigh universal, and have their origin in remote antiquity.

It is not at all improbable that

the child of the cave-man, a half a million years ago, played "tag,"
"ring around rosy," "leap frog and
"blind man's buffs." The same is true of his modern descendants in India, in Alaska, in New York City, or in any hamlet in the country. It is interesting to note that

"tag," and various games which involve wrestling and mimic combat are a part of the natural education of young animals, as well as of young humans.
Old-fashioned, homey "romps"

are excellent exercise for children and parents. Games of "bear," pussy wants a corner," "hide and seek," etc., are both play and exercise, and are valuable for all ages, if grown-ups can lose their "dignity" sufficently to take part in them.

For-out-of-door exercise there should be, if possible, a sand pile for the younger children. Swinge are also good for exercise, and can be put in the outside doorway, or on the porch if necessary. A few sticks, or boxes, spools and wheels, or a cart, wheelbarrow wagon, a kiddle car, velocipede, roller skates, ice skates, sleds-any of these will give the children of various ages the right kind of play exercise.

Or a child will derive a vast amount of amusement, and healthy exercise, too, from a bow and arrow a wooden gun, or a hammer and saw Marbles and tops get a child out of doors, and are valuable toys.

It can readily be seen that these exercises are of a wholesome, de-veloping character, calculated not only to ensure bodily perfection, so far as muscular development is concerned, but to cultivate the admirable traits of quickness, dexterity and courage.


