RANGER HAS CHANCE FOR GLASS FACTORY

LEFT HAND TURN BARRED AT TWO MAIN CORNERS

Intersections at Main and Rusk Streets to Be Properly Placarded.

If an auto driver makes a left-hand turn on Main street at either Rusk or Austin streets, he will be fined \$1 for the first offense. The city commission yesterday evening decided to erect suitable signs at these two intersections at once, prohibiting left-hand turns there at any time. Enforcement of this rule will start with the first appearance of the warning signs.

AMBASSADOR TO JAPAN HAS NARROW ESCAPE FROM DEATH IN TOKIO

OSAKA, Japan, Sept. 12.—Cyrus Woods, the American ambassador, had a narrow escape from injury in the earthquake, according to messages received here. He was seated in the embassy when the first tremors were felt and Lieutenant Colonel Burnett, military attache, noticed the ceiling directly over his chair was cracking and was about to fall.

COTTON GIN AND STORAGE WAREHOUSE ARE BURNED

TERRELL, Tex., Sept. 12.—Fire early today destroyed the cotton gin and cotton warehouse at Lawrence, Kaufman county, belonging to the Forney and Terrell Cotton Oil companies. The loss was estimated at about \$25,000.

RANGER TO REMAIN LIGHTED AND ALL STATIONS TO FUNCTION BY APPROVED MONEY SAVING PLAN

Elimination of 10 street lights to cut city expenses has been definitely tabled in favor of a plan to reduce the candlepower of each light. This was decided upon yesterday evening when J. E. Lewis, vice president and general manager of the Oil Cities Electric company and Oil Belt Power companies, distributing and producing current in the oil belt region, presented a plan to the city commissioners, which will result in a saving of \$2.60 per light a month or for the 34 lights for the year, of \$1,060.80.

CURFEW LAW TO BE ENFORCED IN RANGER AT ONCE

Children Found on Street After 9 p. m. Will Be Detained. "Advise your men to keep children off of the streets after 9 o'clock," Mayor Hodges yesterday instructed Chief of Police O. V. Davenport. Statements by certain citizens that the curfew law was not being enforced was brought before the city commission several months ago by Commissioner Colonel Brashier.

RANGER SCHOOLS ENROLLMENT IS LEADING COUNTY

Ranger's public and private schools showed a larger enrollment on the opening day than any of the other cities of Eastland county. The enrollment at Cisco is 1,498, according to S. J. Vaughn, business secretary of the Cisco public schools. The Eastland high school had an enrollment of 220 up to noon Monday. The enrollment is larger this year than last, it is said. The grade enrollment was not known Monday.

WHO'S WHO IN TEXAS WOMEN'S CLUBS, TO BE PUBLISHED THIS FALL

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 12.—"Who's who" in Texas' women's club life will become known this fall when the Texas Federation of Women's clubs will publish a memorial to the womanhood of the state. The book will be entitled "Who's Who of the Womanhood of Texas" and will contain biographical sketches and photographs of outstanding women in contemporary life as well as the illustrious dead.

Elks Obtain Use Of Ball Grounds To Stage Circus

Use of the city athletic park without charge was granted the Ranger lodge of Elks, No. 1373, yesterday afternoon by the city commission, at the request of Commissioner Raymond Teal. The Elks, Commissioner Teal said, find it necessary to devise some means of raising money for their work this winter, and are planning to bring a three-ring circus here in October.

SCRAPPY TRIO MAY COMBINE AGAINST ITALY

LONDON, Sept. 12.—Italy having forced her will on Greece now is preparing to take steps to defend what she claims to be her rights in Fiume. A new Adriatic crisis, with Corfu and Fiume pawns in the new conflicts is possible.

Stephens County Particular About Her Closed Roads

A warrant was received at the office of the chief of police today to be served on Deputy Sheriff Haden Neal and Constable P. P. Palmer, in which they are charged with driving over a road that was closed to the public in Stephens county. The warrant was sworn out by Constable Smith of Caddo.

ONLY ABOUT TWENTY DAILY EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS AT TOKIO NOW

TOKIO, Sept. 12.—Deaths from earthquake, fires and tidal wave in and about Tokio are now estimated at about 150,000. Groups of 100 or more bodies were found in various spots.

TEXAS RANGERS FAIL TO FIND WHEREABOUTS OF MISSING MINISTER

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 12.—The mystery surrounding the disappearance of the Rev. J. W. Renfro, pastor of the First Baptist church of Sinton and national Ku-Klux Klan lecturer, is as great as ever. The Rev. Mr. Renfro was reported to have been located by Texas rangers in Philadelphia and then it was declared he was in Washington.

PUNISHMENT TO FIT CRIME

PORT ARTHUR, Sept. 12.—Juan Garcia couldn't curb his appetite and now he is in jail. Juan was arrested for stealing a loaf of bread from in front of a local grocery store. He got \$10 and 10 days.

RANGER GETS LOWER RATE FOR WATER HYDRANTS BUT CONSUMERS WILL CONTINUE AT THE OLD RATE

M. H. Hagaman, owner of the Ranger Waterworks system, partially acceded yesterday to the request of the city commission that the rate of \$4 per fire hydrant a month be cut one-half, when, after much discussion, he agreed to a rate of \$2.50, suggested by Commissioner Raymond Teal, as a compromise. This will save the city approximately \$1,170 a year.

KLAN BARRED FROM PARADING IN SAN ANTONIO

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 12.—The city commissioners have replied to an advertisement that the Ku Klux Klan would parade through the streets of this city in full regalia the night of Sept. 23 on the way to their first public initiation in full regalia by passing an anti-klan ordinance. It is an emergency ordinance and provides for fines ranging from \$5 to \$25 for violation.

FORTY-FIVE NEW LAWS BECOME EFFECTIVE TODAY

AUSTIN, Sept. 12.—The Quinn sulphur tax bill, the Baldwin occupational tax law and 43 other acts, passed by the third called session of the thirty-eighth legislature, became effective today.

FARMER-LABOR PARTY LEADER VOICES VIEWS

CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—"The democratic and republican parties have deserted the principles of Jefferson and Lincoln, which makes these parties of no interest to the northwest," Senator Shipstead declared in an interview today. "Our people in Minnesota stand for the things Lincoln and Jefferson stood for, but you can't find any one of these parties standing for their principles," he said.

HOUSTON KLAN TO HAVE INITIATION IN PUBLIC

HOUSTON, Sept. 12.—Sam Houston klan, No. 191, Ku Klux Klan, which will initiate over 300 candidates Thursday night, will be conducted in the open. An official of the klan said that so many stories of the klan oath had been circulated that it will be taken in the open.

GLASS BOTTLE MANUFACTURER VISITS RANGER

H. H. Howard, of Cedar Grove, La., who is interested in locating a glass bottle works in Texas, was in Ranger yesterday afternoon and this morning, viewing possible sites, and talking to Ranger business men. He left early this afternoon for Chickasha, Okla.

YOUTH PREFERS DEATH RATHER THAN ARREST

MARSHALL, Sept. 12.—A youth believed by officers to be the lone bandit who held up yesterday and robbed the bank at Mooringsport, La., and escaped with about 4,000, shot and killed himself here today while in the custody of Sheriff Sanders, who had arrested him for questioning in connection with the hold-up. A money order payable to Frank Erwin was found on his clothes. He had light complexion and dark red hair, being apparently about 24 years of age.

HOLINESS REVIVAL MEETING CLOSES, BUT SERVICES TO CONTINUE

The Holiness meeting of the Church of God, conducted in a big tent on West Pine street for the last several weeks by the Rev. M. E. Drake and family of Thurber, closed last Sunday night. Several hundred persons attended, the Lord's supper was celebrated, followed by the washing of feet and the song "God is With You." Mr. Drake said: "Good work was done in this revival, several persons having been saved and one received the baptism of the Holy Ghost. Six persons joined the church and seven were baptized."

The Church of God, with headquarters at Cleveland, Tenn., has been established in Ranger more than three years and its membership has grown. The church has purchased a lot on the Bankhead highway near the Hamon-Kell railway station and the members are now canvassing the city in an effort to raise a building fund. It is planned to start construction as soon as sufficient money is in hand to buy the frame work. J. Ernest Hall is chairman of the building campaign and will receive contributions. Mr. Hall said:

"On behalf of the church, I wish to thank all for their kindness during the recent revival. We wish to thank Mayor Hodges especially for the lot where the tent was placed during the revival. The tent is to be taken down and will be sold to anyone wishing to buy it in whole or in part."

It is announced that services will be conducted Tuesday, Friday and Sunday nights at the west end of Shamrock lake under a brush arbor.

STEPHENS COUNTY CONSTABLE SEEKING ROADHOG IN RANGER

Famine Stalks In Ruhr While Passive Resistance Rules

By CARL D. GROAT. (United Press Staff Correspondent) BERLIN, Sept. 12.—The Ruhr battle will be won or lost at the German fireside.

The situation in the Ruhr is just like the situation on the German front in 1918. Not the men folk for themselves collapsed and threw up their hands under the cramping drives of American, French and British. They quit because their women folk and their children at home were suffering and starving.

If the collapse of passive resistance comes, it will be a repetition of 1918 war history. It will be because the wife and the kids are pinched by the strangling pressure of French occupation with its attendant economic collapse in the Ruhr and the rest of Germany.

The wife, with the market basket and pay envelope, is fighting a battle as desperate as ever armed men fought.

She stands outside the "butter store" for her half-pound of margarine, waiting patiently two or three hours, while "green police" hover about. She finds the margarine finally at some hundreds of thousands per pound and the pay envelope far from keeping pace with the devaluation of a once proud currency. She comes forth weeping.

She tells it at the fireside that night, at a fireside which this winter is destined to know little or no coal.

That is what is gnawing at the passive resistance in the Ruhr, though the "hard-headed Westphalian" gets madder the more he is prodded. He doesn't want to quit. That is a certainty. He wants to quit only when he gets what he regards as a fair deal, which will leave him free to work without bayonets at his breast.

The government and the industrialist wish to hold on; so does the worker.

Whether the government can supply sufficient fats and potatoes, however, will tell the story. The fireside will be the decisive battleground.

MURDERED COUPLE NOW SAID TO HAVE BEEN SHOT

Rial, whose mutilated bodies were found last Wednesday, were shot to death, it was asserted today by the authorities. Officers searching the spot where the bodies were found, unsearched a soft bullet and a tooth, believed to have been knocked from Miss Carl's mouth.

The investigation so far was going on the theory that the couple were clubbed to death by a blunt instrument.

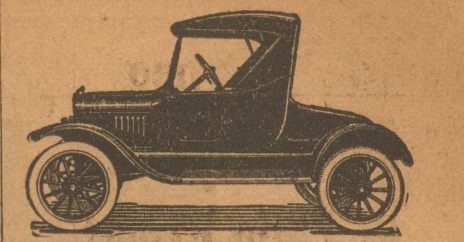

Dempsey's Strong Points Analysed By Fight Expert

By HENRY L. FARRELL, United Press Sports Editor. NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—In asking for analysis of the form and general class of Jack Dempsey, it is usual for those who do not follow boxing closely or those who have never seen the world's heavyweight champion in action, to inquire: "What is his weakness?"

Discussing Dempsey, experts invariably confine themselves to his strong points, his ability to hit with both hands, his skill as a boxer and his great fighting temperament.

The world's champion has few faults that have been brought out since he won the title and if he has any weakness it is that he can be hit.

That in itself is not a weakness, because Dempsey has been hit hard in every one of his big fights and he stood up under it. However, it is an opening and it will be his weakness if he is hit by an opponent with enough power in his punch to put him down.

The Dempsey who fought Willard was a perfect fighting machine. The Dempsey who knocked out Carpenter was too good a machine for the task imposed upon it. The Dempsey who fought Tom Gibbons was only an ordinary fighter, who won only because he was stronger.

Since he was unable to knock out Tom Gibbons in 15 rounds at Shelby on the Fourth of July, it will be necessary to figure how good Dempsey is right now, rather than how good he was before.

Made Bad Showing. Dempsey made a very bad showing against Gibbons. The only thing he showed was that he had not slipped physically and that he could go 15 rounds at top speed. His hitting was bad. He missed time after time. He was short in his judgment of distance and his timing was very bad. He also seemed to lack steam in his punches.

Most everyone who saw that fight believed that the long absence from the ring had caused the champion to grow rusty. It is a known fact among boxers that constant practice is the only thing that will keep a fighter technically on edge, and Dempsey was not on edge that hot July afternoon.

It must be figured, also, when looking at that fight, that Dempsey missed a lot because he was boxing against the fastest and most clever heavyweight in the ring. It was only natural that he should miss. Firpo couldn't touch a glove on Gibbons in 10 rounds and few other slow heavyweights could reach him.

There was some reason for concern, however, when Dempsey failed even to put Gibbons on the floor. It is admitted that Gibbons was clever enough to present very few openings, but Dempsey hit him solidly enough times to put him down if he had the punch he had against Willard, Brennan and Carpenter.

Has He Lost His Punch? The big question now is: Has Dempsey lost his punch? In training for the Firpo fight, the champion was hitting hard, boxing well and he seemed to be in much better spirits. There is no doubt that he was worried at Great Falls with the question whether he had not gone way back, and from his actions at Saratoga he feels satisfied with himself now.

Dempsey is the best hitting fighter in the world. Perhaps his punch may not have as much power behind it as Firpo's but it has enough to accomplish the result.

He hits with both hands. His left hook to the jaw is as dangerous and as potent a blow as there is in the ring. His high hand is just as powerful. He can box, his footwork is fine and his style is very hard to penetrate. He weaves around the ring, fights always on his toes and holds his arms so that he can shoot a left or a right from any position.

He fights with great courage and daring. He will risk a punch to get an opening for a counter, and it is at this game that he is a most deadly fighter. Tommy Gibbons figured that every time he missed Dempsey he was flirting with a knockout and he saw to it that he didn't miss. When he wasn't sure of an opening, he would not lead.

Dempsey, it must be remembered also, has always shown himself to be much better against a bigger man. His greatest fight was won against the biggest man in the ring. It is only natural, of course, that his speed would be more effective against a slow moving, awkward opponent.

There are some experts who will whisper in your ear: "Dempsey is not game. When he's hurt he'll show it." They say that against every great fighter when they have nothing else about which they can pan him.

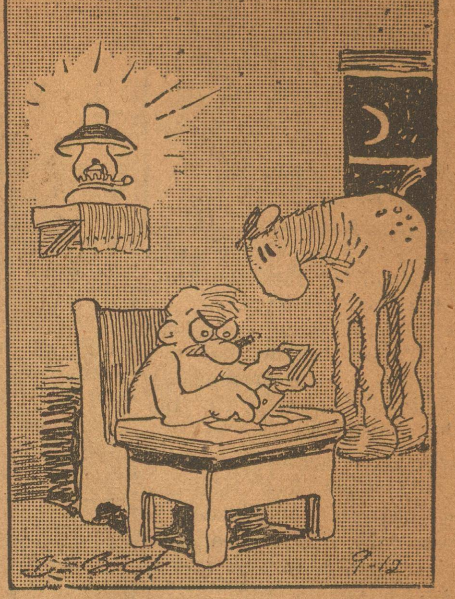
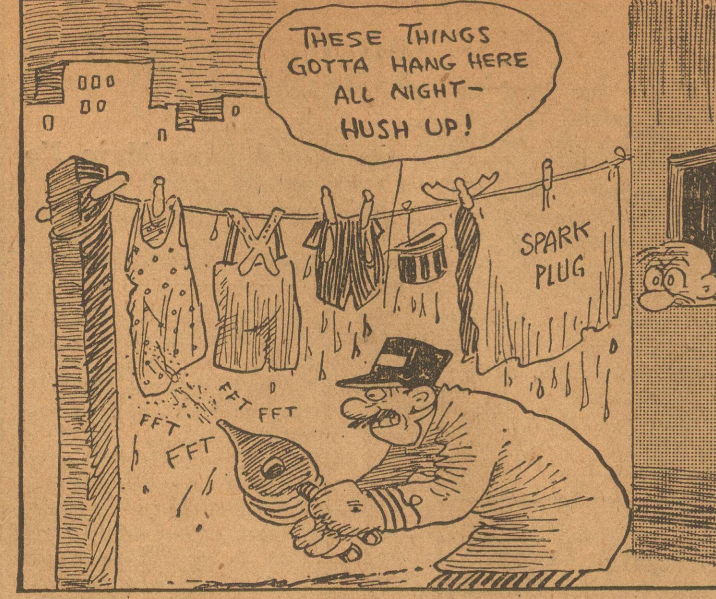
You may hear also: "Dempsey is a dope fiend. They shoot him full of op before he goes into the ring."

Ernest Vach, Dallas, center field; Ike Boone, San Antonio, right field; Red Ostergard, utility.

BOBBED HAIR IS NO CAUSE FOR 'FIRING' TEACHER

Texas School Laws Have No Provisions Which Prohibit Bobbing, Official Says.

AUSTIN, Sept. 12.—Bobbed hair is no cause for discharging a school teacher in Texas. This is the statement of L. W. Rogers, first assistant state superintendent of instruction, in answer to several inquiries from school teachers and school boards over the state.

The bobbed hair question has come up in a number of schools, according to information coming to the state department. One school board is reported to have attempted to revoke a teacher's contract because she bobbed her hair. Other more cautious teachers, before adopting the popular mode of hair dress, have written the state department for an expression on their problem.

But after a thorough examination of Texas school laws, Assistant Superintendent Rogers has been able to find no provision which prohibits the bobbing of hair.

"Hair bobbing is no cause for discharging a teacher or revoking a contract unless it can be shown that such an act will prevent the teacher from performing her duties satisfactorily," Rogers said today. "The Texas laws are silent on the question, since they were framed before hair bobbing became an issue."

Some school boards have taken the position that because a teacher bobs her hair, she will not be asked to resign her position. Others oppose the fad, while still others are expected to give expression to their views before the 1923 school term gets well under way. With the opening of schools this month, reports are that numerous teachers are appearing with their hair shorn.
