Of course if New Mexico does exempt itself from DST, we will have the two hour gap six nths out of the year. That's bad enough, but if Congress goes ahead and puts the change over date in March, that would put us out of whack for eight of the twelve months. Urp!

Not too long ago the papers ran some stories on the sad fact that a large number of adults and students could not identify the location of major cities in the country. This is indeed a sorry lapse in the public knowledge of geog-

Sadder by far is the apparent lack of knowledge of geography on the part of the majority of our Congressmen. They do not seem to know that San Salvador is closer to El Paso, Texas, than New York City is to El Paso. The local church has enjoyed a 30-year period of growth in numbers as well as in services and opportunities to missions, in local areas, throughout the United States, and in foreign countries.

A partial progress/history of the church was printed in last week's Tribune, and several items of interest bringing that more up-to-date have been added here:

Bro. Bristow resigned from the church here in June 1982 and moved to First Southern Baptist Church of Mesa, Ariz. Rev. Pat Riley became pastor of First Baptist in October of that year.

In September of 1982, the church purchased a 34 ton 15-passenger Ford van to be used for church-related activities. A trailer hitch was installed, and the Brotherhood had a trailer built so that all of the space in the van can be used for passengers while the trailer can haul luggage and equipment.

In addition to gifts to its own Llanos Altos Association, the Cooperative Program, and special mission offerings three times per year, the church also supports on a monthly basis El

Rancho De Los Ninos, El Peten, Guatemala; Mountain Top Mission, Peoria, Ariz.; Liberty Baptist Mission, Peoria, Ariz.; Trinity Baptist Chapel, Aurora, Colo.; and Estrella Baptist Association, Phoenix, Ariz.

In February 1983, a group from the church participated in building a church in El Peten, Guatemala, at El Rancho De Los Ninos. What was a vision for the Bo Bartleys of Farwell back in

1979 has now become a reality. The church has a total of 434 resident members and as of October 1982 had an average of 177 in Sunday School.

tial, whether the energy is sold to a utility company or used

directly." The station wind charger is generating an average of 108 kilowatt-hours of electricity a day, enough to run four or five households of two and close to the manufacturer's claim to

average daily output of 110 kilowatt-hours. Morin says wind-generated energy could be used to run irrigation pumps or used in a tail water pivot to collect runoff and recycle irrigation water.

Energy Is Blowing In The Wind

"My concern with depending upon wind generated energy in an irrigation program is that in this area there might not be enough wind during critical times of the growing season," the researcher said. "We hope to do irrigation research using the wind charger in the

At first glance, the wind charger at the station looks like a stream-lined, twentieth century version of traditional windmills, but the resemblance fades upon closer inspection.

The wind charger has only two blades that look more like airplane propellers than windmill blades. The blades are strong, flexible fiberglass paddles mounted on a pivot that allows them to respond to wind from all directions.

The blades are held aloft by a single, slender pole tower. An electronic generator at the top of the tower feeds energy to the utility company. The generator uses about 10 or 12 kilowatt-hours a month for excitation energy to the blades.

Despite blade damage from bullet holes and electronic damage from lightning, the charger produced 52,652 kilowatt-hours of electricity after 16 months of operation.





PORK, A NATURAL INGREDIENT IN CHINESE CUISINE

Railroad construction first in 1870. This marked their entry into Texas culture and introduced various types of Chinese food.

Chinese-style food is exciting but different in flavor and takes a minimum of time to prepare. "Stir-frying" is the most popular cooking technique. Slivered or diced vegetables and meat are cooked in hot oil over high heat and stirred constantly. Scarcity of fuel in China dictated this rapid cooking method over high heat.

A large heavy skillet or a wok - a round-bottomed, high sided metal pan - can be used to produce crisp, crunchy vegetables and distinct flavors that typify this technique.

GUIDELINES FOR SELECTING PORK

Pork - fresh or in cured forms - has been a favorite in Chinese dishes. When selecting pork for all types of cookery, use appearance as your guide to quality. Choose fresh or cured pork that has a high proportion of lean to fat and bone. The flesh should be fine textured but firm, and color of the lean in fresh pork should range from grayish pink to red. Lean cured pork, on the other hand, should have a deep pink color.

In stir-frying pork, the meat will lose its pinkness and turn white when cooked. Never add
