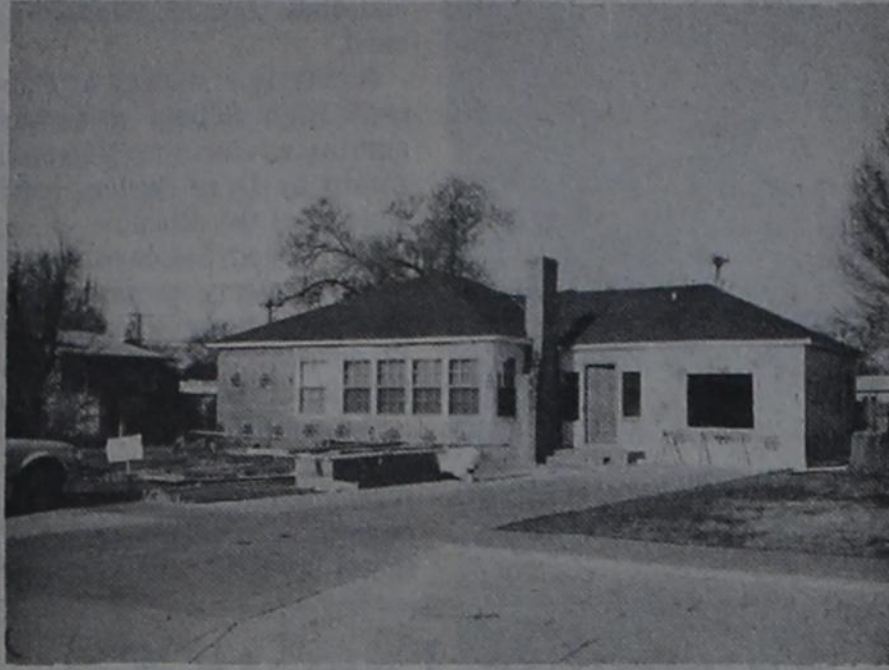


Cleaning Up

Painting Up

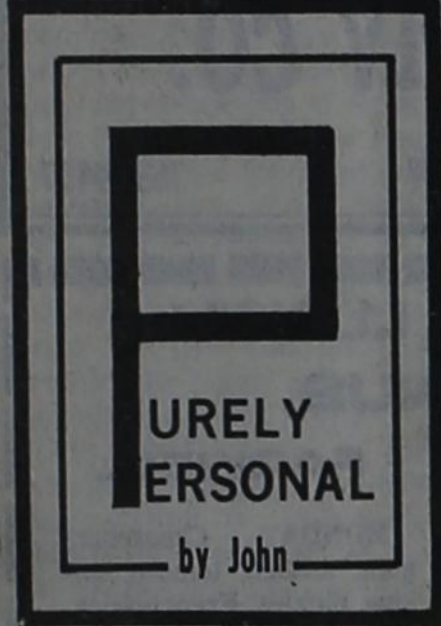

The big spenders of Congress are pulling out all the stops in an attempt to rescind Ronald Reagan's tax indexing law which will work to keep taxpayers in a relatively stable tax bracket. These politico are fixing to jab the pore ole taxpayer as hard as they can.

Although not scheduled to go into effect until January 1, 1985, tax indexing, which would eliminate bracket creep, already is under attack by members of Congress seeking its repeal. The provision is, perhaps, the most important in the Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981, which also provides for three years of tax reductions totalling 25 percent.

The coming debate, if anything, should convince taxpayers that bracket creep has taken a heavy toll - perhaps "skimmed" is not too strong a word - off the top of the public's purchasing power.

Under our graduated system of income taxes, taxpayers pay a larger percentage of their income in taxes as their income goes up and they move into higher income brackets. It is the combination of this tax system with high inflation that has eroded purchasing power of American families since the early 1970s.

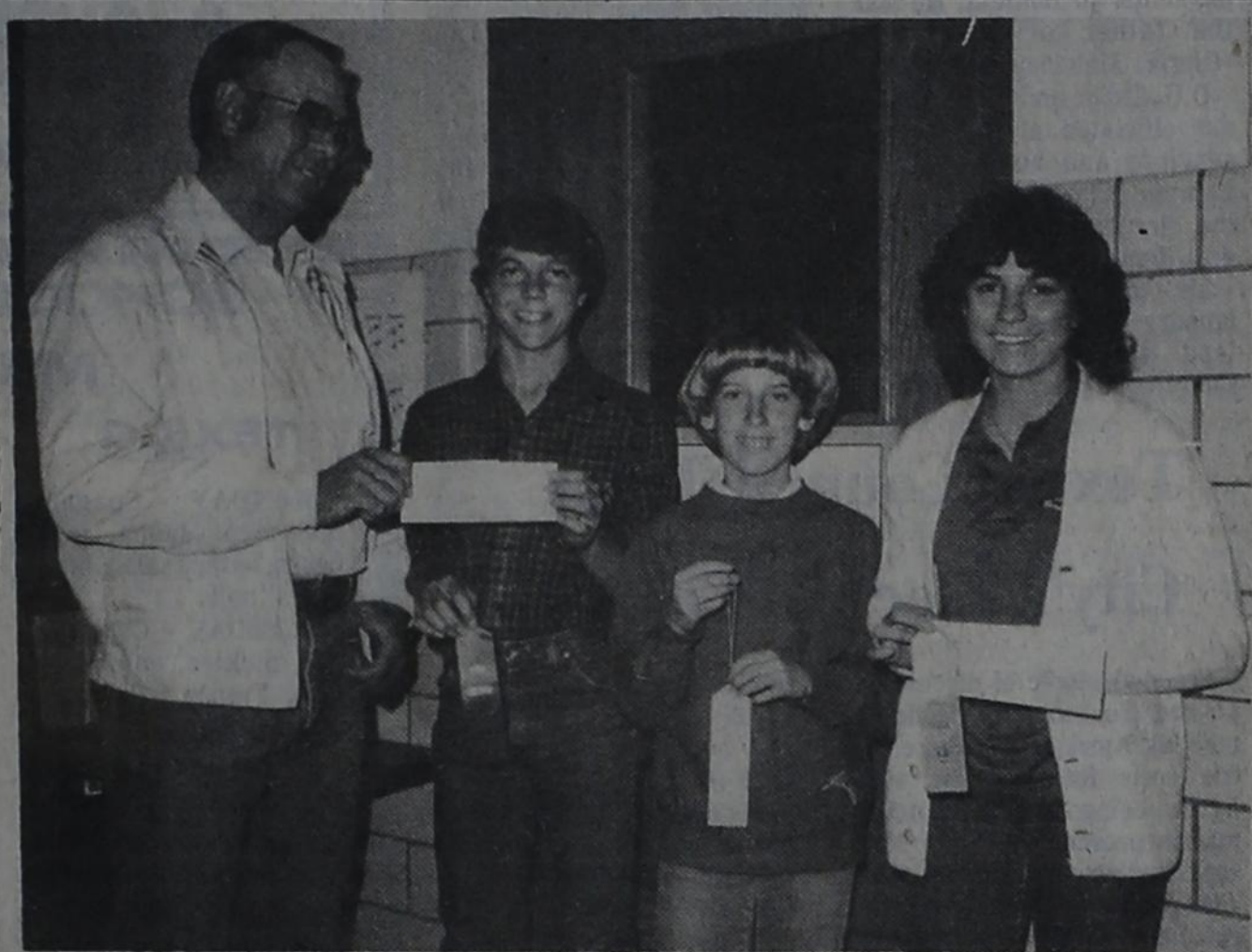
For example, a couple with \$20,000 income in 1984 would be in the \$16,000 - \$20,200 bracket where the tax rate is 18 percent. But if the breadwinner gets a 5 percent raise (\$1,000) to compensate for inflation, the \$21,000 income - still worth only \$20,000 - would push the couple into the next higher bracket where the tax rate is 22 percent. This is how bracket creep works.

Under tax indexing, the \$16,000-\$20,200 bracket figures would be raised by 5 percent for inflation - and the tax rate would remain at 18 percent for a \$21,000 income.

This key point - taxes rise faster than inflation - is made by Dr. Martin Feldstein, chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisers, to rebut claims that indexing increases the size of budget deficits by reducing revenues at a time when government outlays are going up with inflation. "This argument is wrong because it misrepresents what indexing is all about," Dr. Feldstein says. "The indexing of benefits (outlays) means that benefits just keep pace with inflation. The indexing of tax rates means that tax receipts don't rise faster than inflation through bracket creep."

As has been wisely noted, only politicians love bracket creep. It gives them more money to spend without voting to raise taxes.

Convalescent Center Has New Management

Farwell Convalescent Center is now under the management of the Ev. Lutheran Good Samaritan Society which entered a contract for managerial responsibilities of the Center with the Farwell Hospital District Board effective April 4, 1983.

Reese Greaves of the Good Samaritan Society is the interim administrator of the Center, and it is thought that a permanent administrator will be named in the near future.

The Farwell Hospital District took over management of the Center March 4 and then the Hospital District Board and the national board of the Good Samaritan Society entered into the present contract.

The Hospital Board is in the process of interviewing prospective administrators and hopes to name someone to the post soon. Good Samaritan is to provide an experienced and qualified administrator; how-

ever, that person must be approved by the local Board.

Greaves says that some new systems will be instigated at the Center, and says he is impressed with the fine facilities and staff at the local nursing

home. The Center now houses 59 residents, and the most it has had at one time is 69.

More announcements about plans for the facility and its new management will be forthcoming.

Grain Cleaning Manufacturer Locates Plant In Farwell

This week saw the opening of a manufacturing plant in Farwell that will fabricate the Magik grain cleaner. The unit is designed to operate by gravity and will clean grain before going to market. It will reduce foreign material to meet shipping requirements, will separate mixed grains as corn and milo, and will clean grain damaged from shipping.

West Wind Fabricators, located on the east edge of Farwell at 1301 Avenue A, will be under the management of Gene Carey, president of the Company. Carey says that the Company is in the process of relocating equipment from Corning, Neb., the present manufacturing site.

Carey expects the Company to eventually employ 30 to 35 people in fabricating and sales, and will operate entirely out of the Farwell plant.

Carey lives in Clovis, and also owns and operates Clovis Mill and Elevator Supply,

part of the United States. Carey says that they are looking for fabricators, shear-men, and punch press operators. They will take job applications any day between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Curry Voters To Decide Indigent Hospital Tax

Curry County residents will be going to the polls Tuesday, May 10, to decide the issue of whether or not to impose a ¼ of one percent tax to be used to support indigent hospital patients.

shall be deposited by the County to the credit of the County Indigent Hospital Claims Fund to be used for the support of indigent hospital patients who are residents of Curry County, New Mexico?"

Absentee voting is now in progress at the Curry County Clerk's office in Clovis, and persons may vote absentee until Thursday, May 5.

doing in Austin. Local property taxes in Texas have increased over 26 percent in the past two years and 227 percent in the past ten years. We now have over 4,000 local taxing authorities in Texas.

By the end of 1983, Texas employers will owe \$1 billion to the Federal government for state loans to pay unemployment benefits. This must be paid by an increased tax on employers.

Each session of the state legislature has resulted in disturbing increases in total state spending. In 1974 it went up 21 percent, 1976 - 30 percent, 1978 - 31 percent, 1980 - 29 percent, and 1982, 18 percent.

During the past ten years, the Texas state government has grown faster than 40 other state governments, including New York and California, the only two states having more population than Texas.

Between 1970 and 1978, the Texas Legislature increased its

own operating cost 156 percent. This went to pay the costs of fringe benefits to legislators and increased bureaucracy within the legislature.

State employees now number more than 200,000. And in answer to a legislative questionnaire distributed in the fall of 1981, 64 percent (almost 2/3) of the state employees admitted that they didn't have enough work to keep them busy. Yet the legislature continues to grant across-the-board wage increases and hire more without regard to whether they are busy or not.

In the past decade, the population of Texas has grown 26 percent while the state budget has grown 158 percent, the number of state employees has increased 3 1/2 times the growth in population, and the number of state welfare employees has increased 370 percent.

Clovis Airport Adds New Lighting System

Area residents who travel 21st Street or the "airport road" to Clovis may have noticed the recent construction work and installation of lights along the south end of the runway and on the farmland immediately south of the highway.

Airport Director Gerald Gollge explains the addition as being the new Mals-Rel approach light system which was just completed this week.

The new system is for instrument landings in bad weather, with the lights being automatically switched on by incoming pilots keying their microphones a certain number of times, says Gollge.

Funding for the approach lights was given by the Federal government, and the entire system was installed at no cost to the city. The additional 6.7 acre triangle of land just south of the airport was purchased with the help of the government for the project, the director said.

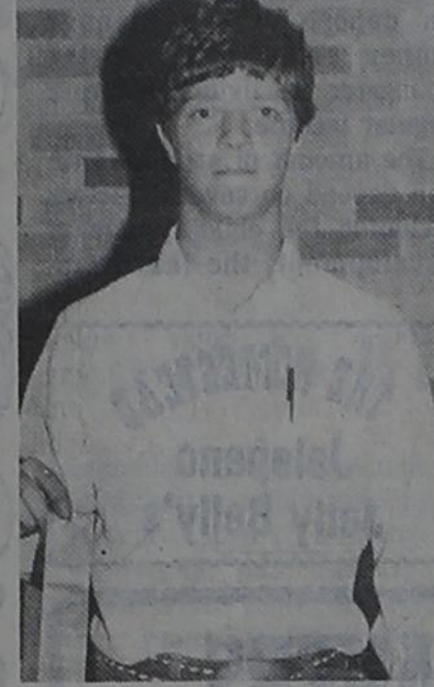
The lights on the south side of the highway are strobe

lights, while those lights on the north side are constant lights giving the location of the end of the runway. Also, the system will be using red, green, and white lights to indicate several different need-to-know factors to the pilot.

"This new system will be able to help the pilots find the runway for a safe landing in bad weather at least 75-90 percent of the time. It will really be of a lot of service to the airport and the surrounding community," says Gollge.

Also, the municipal airport has added a gate on the south side of the airport land. This was originally added to allow FAA inspectors to check the landing lights, but it will also be an aid to local and area fire departments in answering calls to the runway or the surrounding field.

Final test for the new lights was performed Monday, April 25, when the lights were turned on for 16 hours to ensure the proper working order of the system.

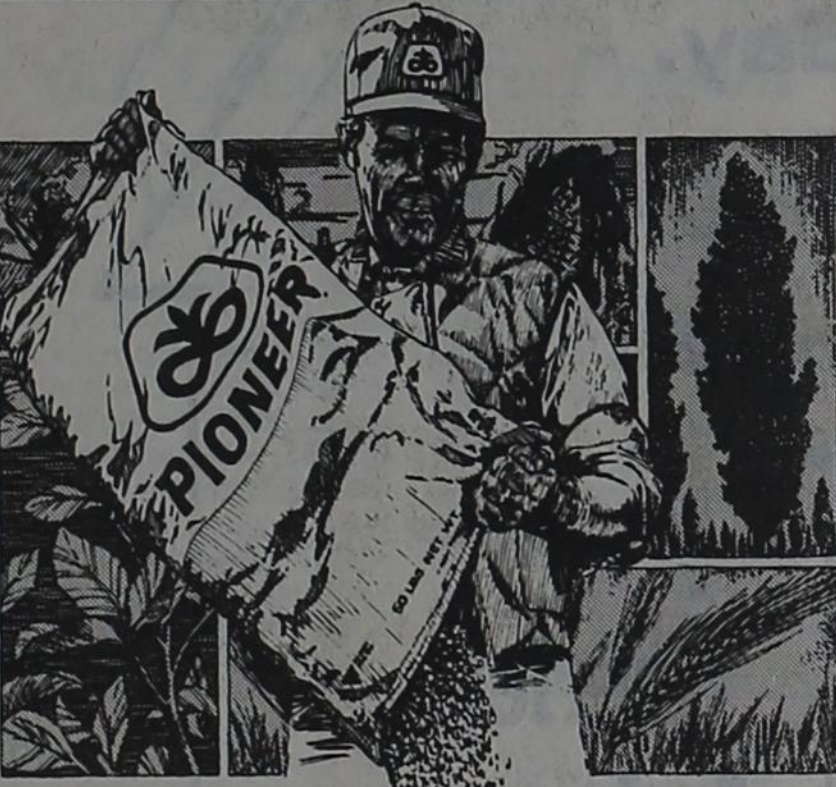



CONSUMER EDUCATION FOR CHILDREN TOO

Consumer education begins at home. As with many other things, children learn how to be consumers by watching their parents. In fact, some studies show that consumption patterns are developed by about sixth grade and follow a person into adulthood.

Children soon learn that candy costs, and coins will start the Pac Man machine. As children discover the uses of money, parents can play an important role in helping them develop attitudes and values about being consumers through the use of an allowance.

An allowance gives the child an opportunity to manage money and introduces the youngster to living within a regular income.

The amount of an allowance can depend on several factors including the child's stage of development, the family in-

come, and the number of kinds of expenses the allowance is expected to cover. More money to spend does not lead to greater learning.

The amount finally decided upon should be large enough to cover expenses for which the youngster is responsible, and include some money to spend as he wishes. The amount also should be small enough to require that the child make choices.

As the child makes choices about how to spend his allowance, parents have a chance to serve as consumer

educators. For example, television advertisers continually try to attract a child's attention and promote brand consciousness. But parents can talk with a child about his specific needs and wants, product quality, and the trade-offs involved in buying one product over another.

Giving a child an allowance will not necessarily teach him or her to be an effective consumer, however. As parents, we must set a good example and then supervise and communicate with our children concerning money management.

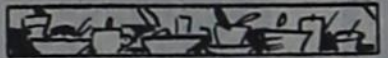

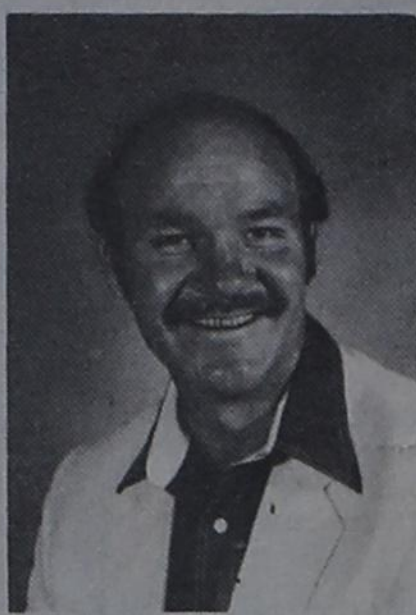

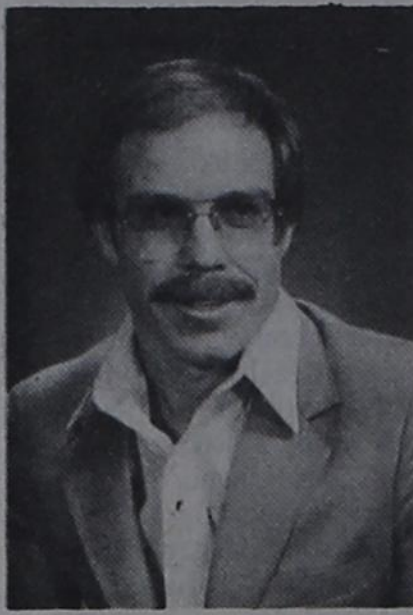
His previous coaching experience was as a basketball assistant graduate coach. He is a member of the co-ed volleyball league, fast pitch softball team, and outsiders basketball team.

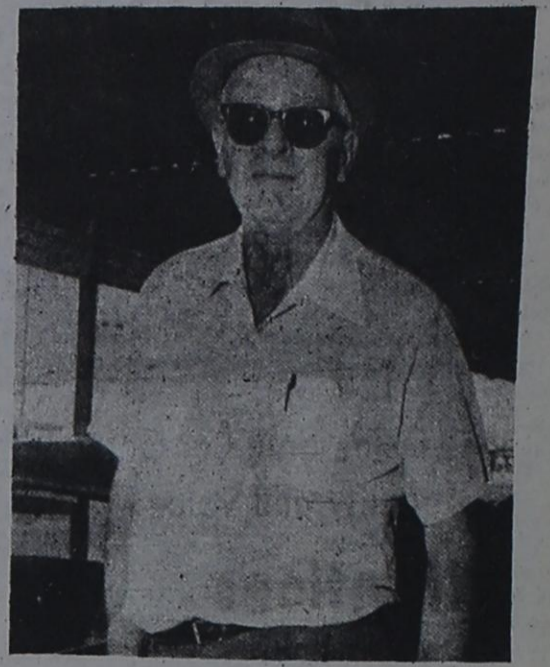
