But with added revenues to squander, politicians continue to dream up new social programs and place more and more people under the stifling hand of the bureaucrat.

In an effort to cage this beast, we have all suffered from an economic meltdown. This period of economic recession is waning and better times are building up all around us. The producer price index has just registered its lowest quarterly rise in thirty years.

NOTE: THIRTY YEARS. Consumer prices are up only 4 percent for the first quarter of 1983. Annualized, that's 1.6 percent. Good Grief! It couldn't be any better.

Now is not the time to return to our old ways of spend and spend and tax and tax. Yet both our Federal Government and our Texas State Government are locked in battles to do just that. If these liberal, big spending politicians have their way, we will suddenly return to galloping inflation and complete economic disaster.

NOW IS NOT THE TIME TO RAISE EITHER TAXES OR WAGES. Government and labor must cooperate to prevent this until our economic recovery stabilizes. As workers increase their PRODUCTIVITY, then wages can safely be increased.

We are at a moral crossroad and the wrong answer can lead to economic ruin for all.

Last Sunday was a banner day in the life of a true sports fan. A body could view professional golf, football, basketball, and baseball, all in one afternoon. Is there really that much demand for entertainment?

School is letting out and scores of tads will be roaming the streets for the duration of the summer. This poses a special obligation on vehicle drivers. Care in driving will be the watchword as it will be up to the vehicle operator to prevent a tragic accident.

We all tend to gripe just a little bit about our weather on the High Plains. Yet, in each day's paper is a report from somewhere else that makes any gripe out here seem so trivial. With all the vagaries of nature in mind, these Old Baldies are way ahead of any other place to live.

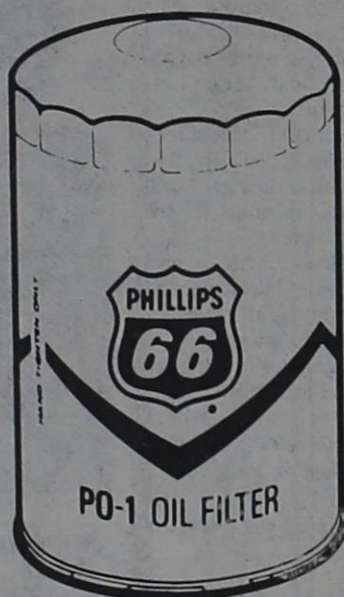

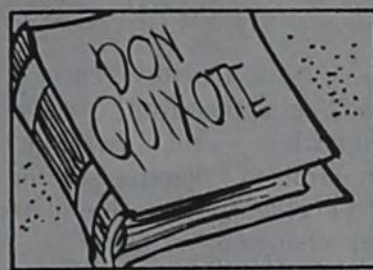

Mixed Thoughts and Reflections on Spring, Goodbyes, and Itinerant Ministry.

I'm not really sure I want to write a column this month. The weather for a change outside is beautiful and the yard beckons. It seems to be always beckoning. Spring—such a beautiful time of the year when the grass begins to turn green and fruit trees begin to bloom out. And the roses begin to bloom. Signs of resurrection all around.

Each spring is a hard time for United Methodist Pastors. There are those anxious days and hours when one wonders if he/she will get a call asking them to move to a new church and community. Some want to be called and others don't. It is a stressful time not only for the pastors, but for their congregations as well.

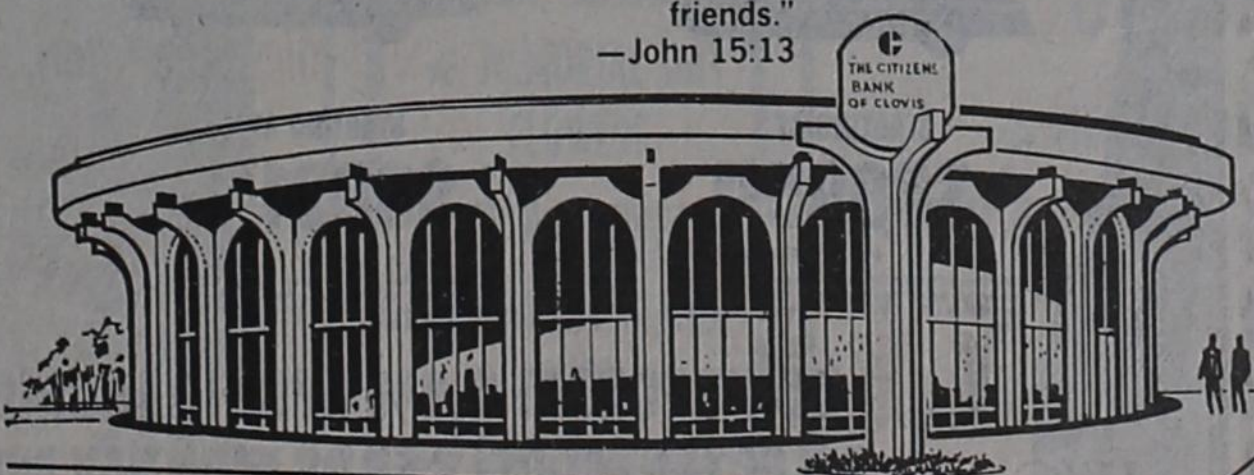

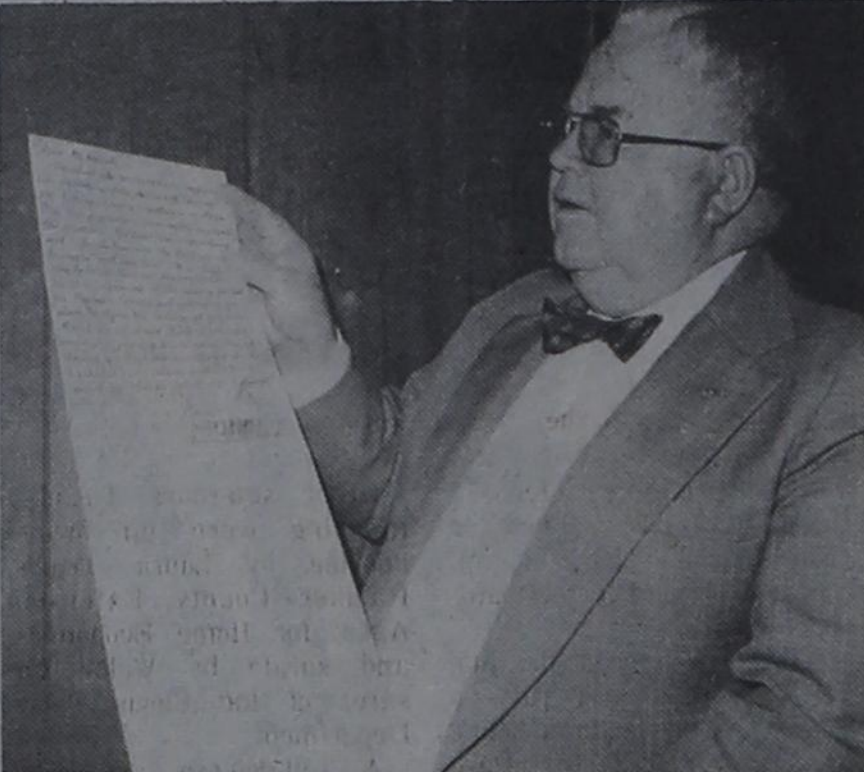

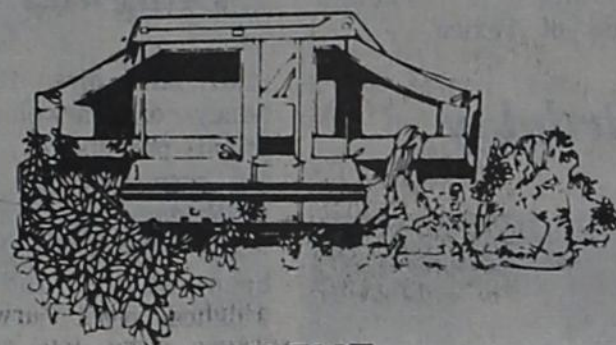

### KNOWING CHRIST

AS HE SHOULD BE KNOWN

John the Baptist introduced our Lord with the proclamation: "Repent, for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand" (Matt. 3:2). All during His earthly ministry Christ was known as "the Son of David," the king with whom God had made a covenant to establish His kingdom forever.

The Old Testament prophets predicted that Christ would—and He will—reign on earth upon the throne of His father David. While His Kingdom was being proclaimed "at hand," He walked and talked and ate with men as "the Son of Man." Weighed with traveling, He sat at Jacob's well and asked for a drink of water. Pressed by the throng, He got into a fishing boat and addressed the multitudes from the sea. Hated by His adversaries, He was tied, scourged, spit upon, and nailed to a tree. With regard to His humiliation, however, the A-

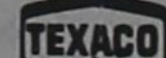

"Lots of people have expressed an interest in cooking in the event, and businesses are working to get teams together; so it should be a really big celebration this year. Last year's turnout was larger than the year before, and we're expecting an even larger turnout for this one," Sandoval said.

Persons planning to enter

chili in the contest are reminded that entry forms may be picked up at any of the three sponsors' locations: JJ's Mobile Homes in Texico, or at Hair Emporium or Barbara Ann's Bar B Q in Clovis.

A meeting of all head cooks will be at 11 a.m. MDT on the day of the cookoff, and that will be the final time a person may register to cook.

This year's cookoff site is the area in back of the American Legion Post 25 at 2410 West 7th Street. On top in addition to the chili cooking will be a country music talent search sponsored by Wrangler jeans and a Clovis radio station, games, an art show, and other

fun activities. The chili cookoff tradition was first started in 1967 in Texas as a publicity stunt. Frank X. Tolbert started the contest to promote the sale of his book, "A Bowl of Red: The Natural History of Chili Recipes."

This first cookoff was held in the old mining ghost town of Terlingua, Tex., and has since become an international subculture involving "Chili Heads" who compete in local tournaments from Manila to Connecticut.

Winners trek to Terlingua on the first Saturday in November for the annual World Championship Chili Cookoff.

The Clovis Chili Cookoff was first started in 1981 by local businessmen Chris Sandoval, Dennis Cross, Rudy Garcia, and Mike Cross.

Every year the proceeds go to local non-profit organizations. This year the proceeds

will go toward the restoration of the old Lyceum Theater.

When restoration is completed the theater will be a public auditorium featuring concerts, plays, convention activities, a museum, plus a host of other functions.

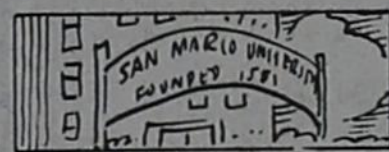

this tradition by attending or participating on Saturday, May 28.

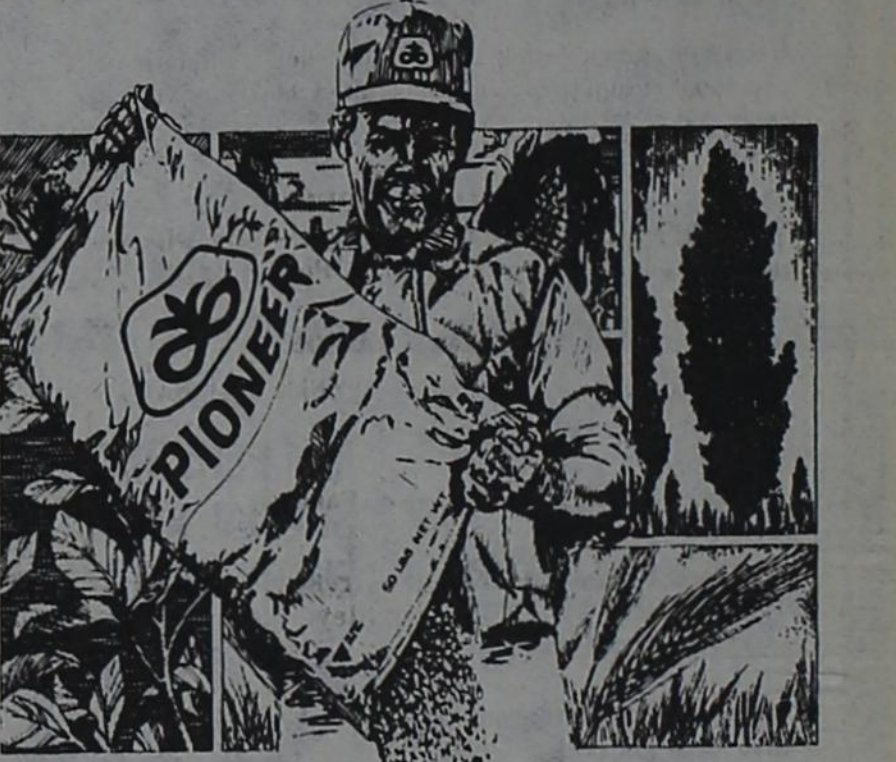

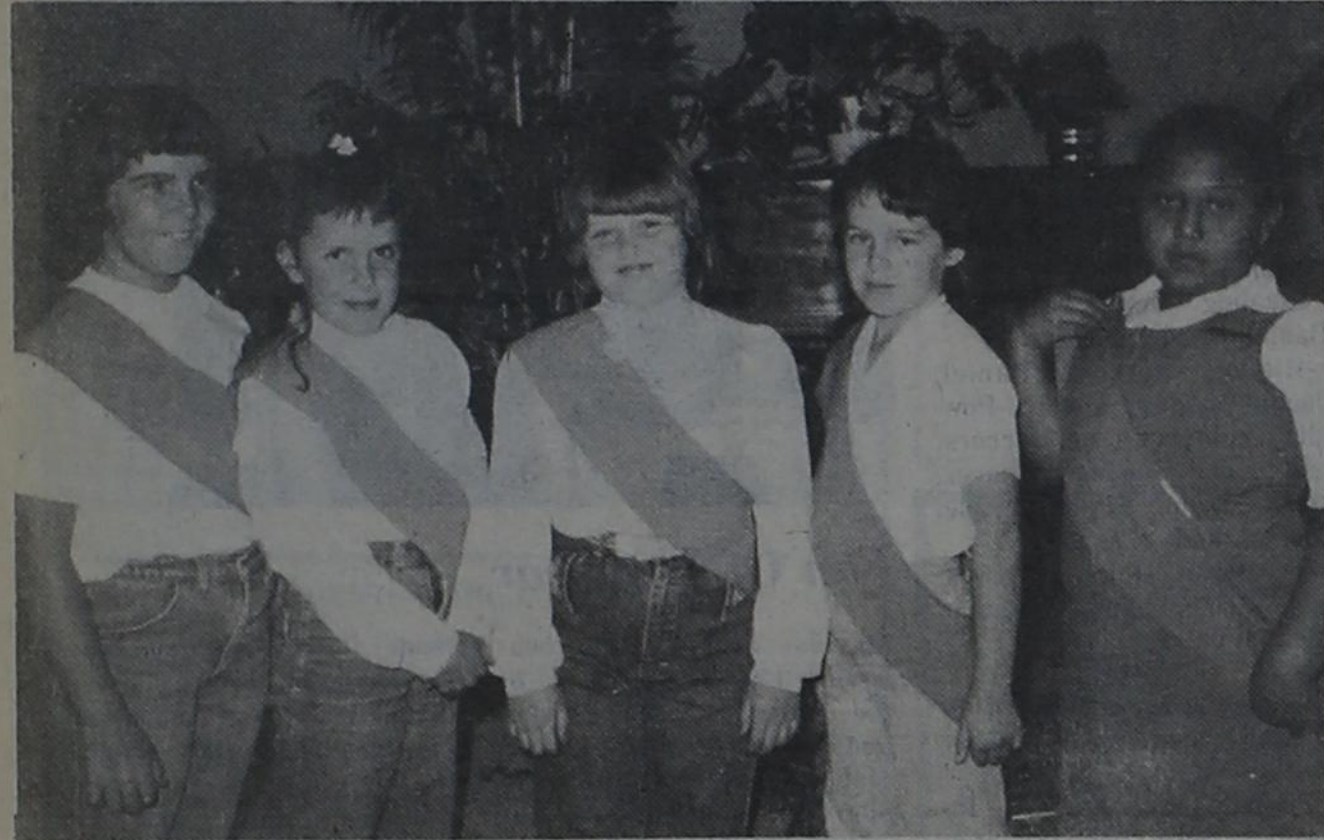

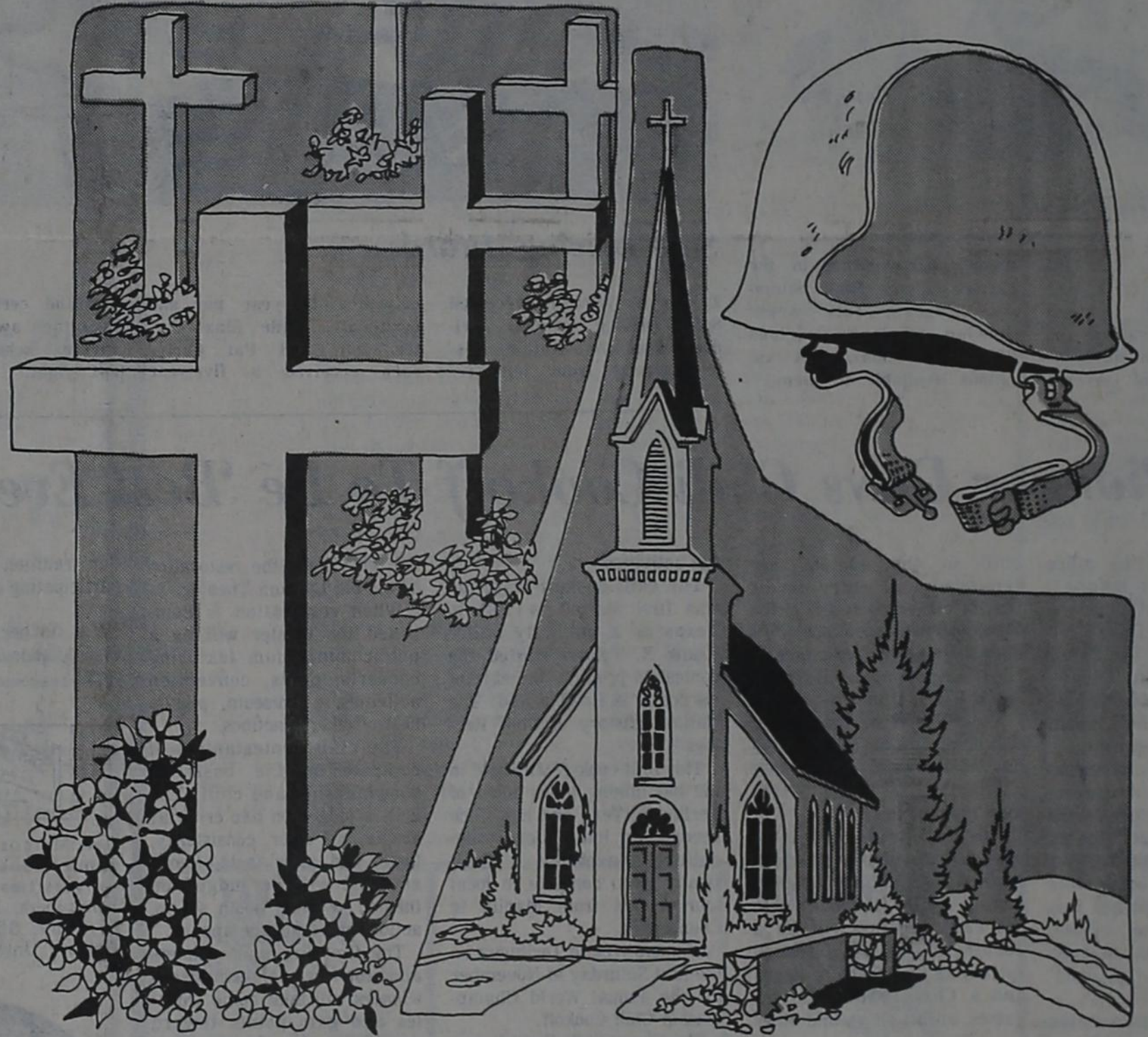
