Curry Voters To Polls To Decide Hospital Tax

Curry County residents will go to the polls on Tuesday, May 10, to vote in the special election to decide the issue of whether or not to impose a one-quarter percent gross receipts tax to be used to pay for the care of indigent hospital patients.

The issue to be voted on reads: "Shall Curry County, New Mexico, adopt an Ordinance imposing a County sales tax of one-fourth of one percent (1/4%) on gross receipts of all business and services within the County (with certain exemptions as noted in the Curry Ordinance No. 83.3), which shall be deposited by the County to the credit of the County Indigent Hospital

Claims Fund to be used for the support of indigent hospital patients who are residents of Curry County, New Mexico?"

Plains Hospital spokesperson, the hospital writes off over \$830,000 per year for free services and unpaid accounts. "We treat all patients re-

gardless of their ability to pay," says Anita Westbrook, for the hospital.

"As of now, there is no money coming in from the county for the indigent care," she said about the proposed tax which would amount to 1/4 cent per dollar spent in the county.


