WHEREAS, our people have a mutual interest in the soil and water and share the responsibility of conserving and managing these resources properly; and

WHEREAS, soil and water conservation districts provide

a practical and democratic organization through which land-owners are taking the initiative to conserve and make proper use of these resources; and

WHEREAS, soil and water conservation districts are carrying forward a conservation program in cooperation with numerous agencies and countless individuals;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Porter Roberts County Judge of Parmer County, in full appreciation of the value of soil to the public welfare, and desiring to honor those who protect it, do hereby designate the week of May 8-15, 1983 as Soil Stewardship Week in Parmer County, Texas.

Junior varsity and varsity athletes and coaches will be the special guests of the Wolverine Booster Club which plans and sponsors the event.

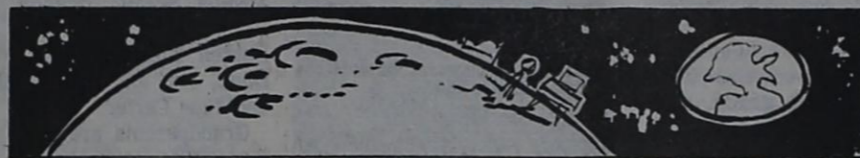

Members of the Texico Volunteer Fire Department will take part in a farm vehicle extrication course this week, hosting volunteer fire departments from Farwell, Grady, and Melrose for the sessions.

The two-day course, taught by Randy Kuykendall of EMS services in Santa Fe, will include films, lectures, and a practical examination.

Bob Spears of Texico will provide the trucks, combines, tractor, and cotton stripper for the class to use in the practical

applications of the techniques they will be taught in the classes.

Members of the FAST group have supplied cotton-stuffed dummies to be placed inside some of the working parts of the equipment, to be rescued by attending firemen.

"The course will give an idea of what to expect at a farm vehicle related accident, especially during harvest, when more accidents occur," said a fire department spokesman.

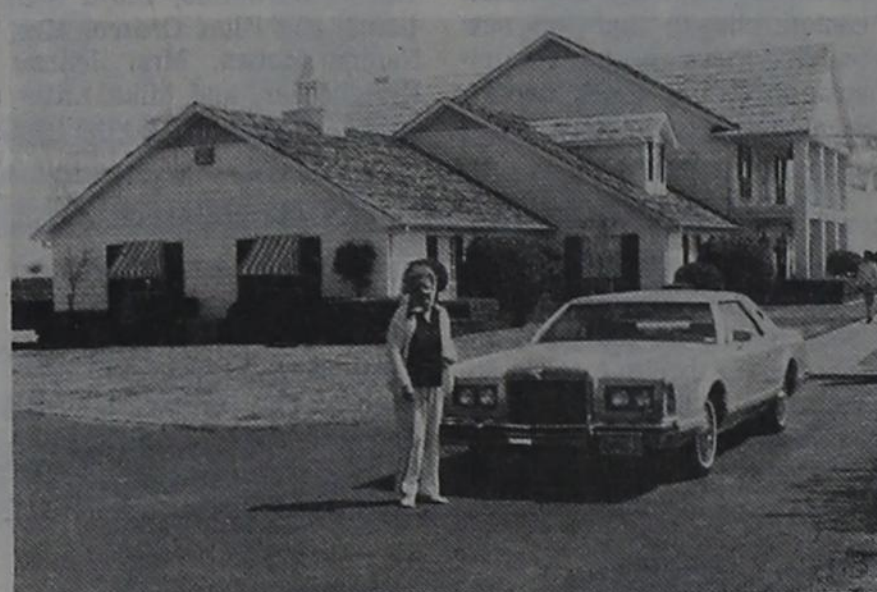

Next meeting will be Tuesday, May 17, at 8 p.m. in the JCCA building.



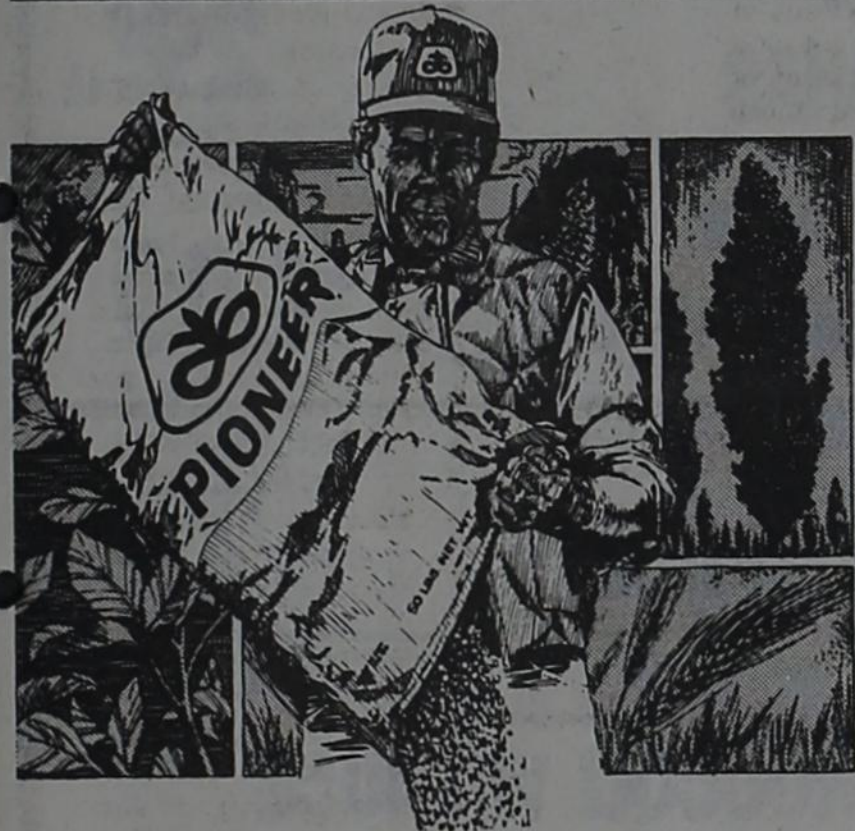

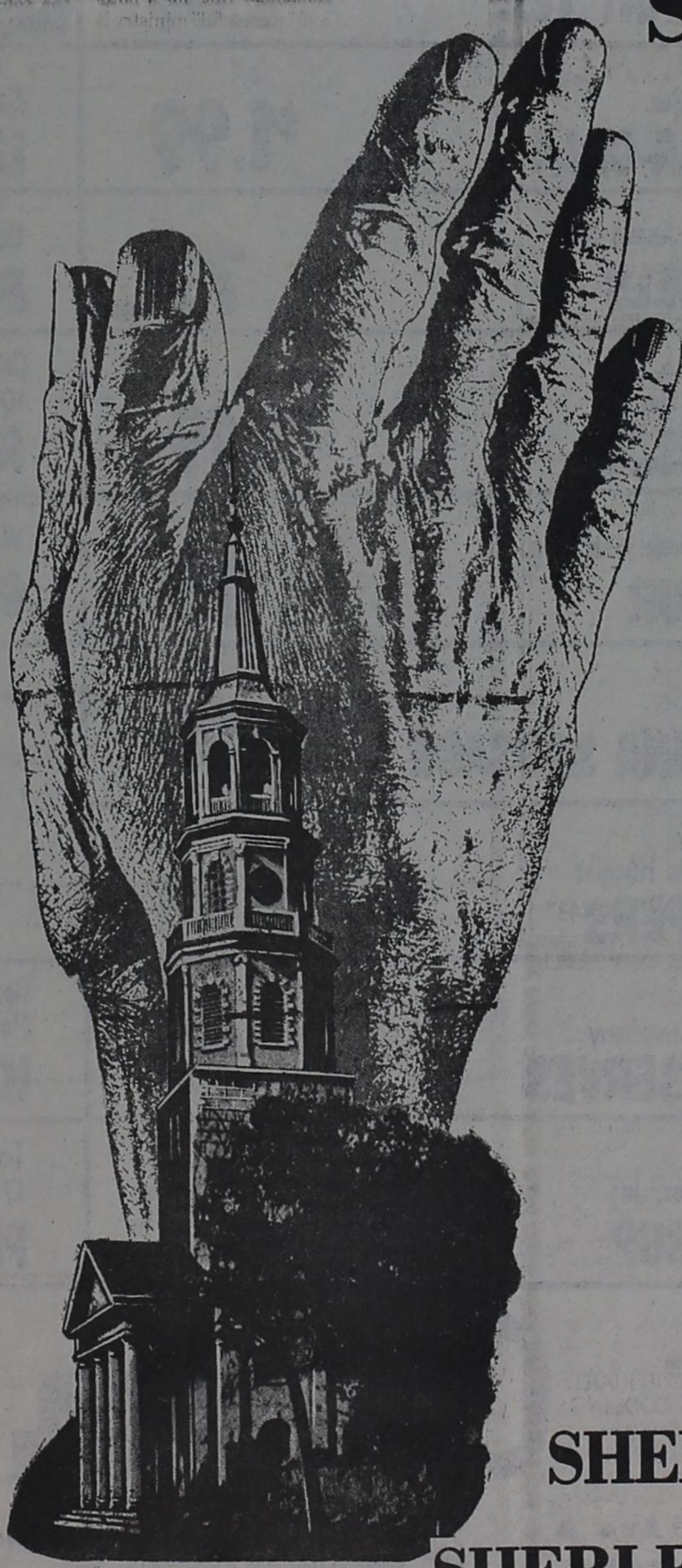

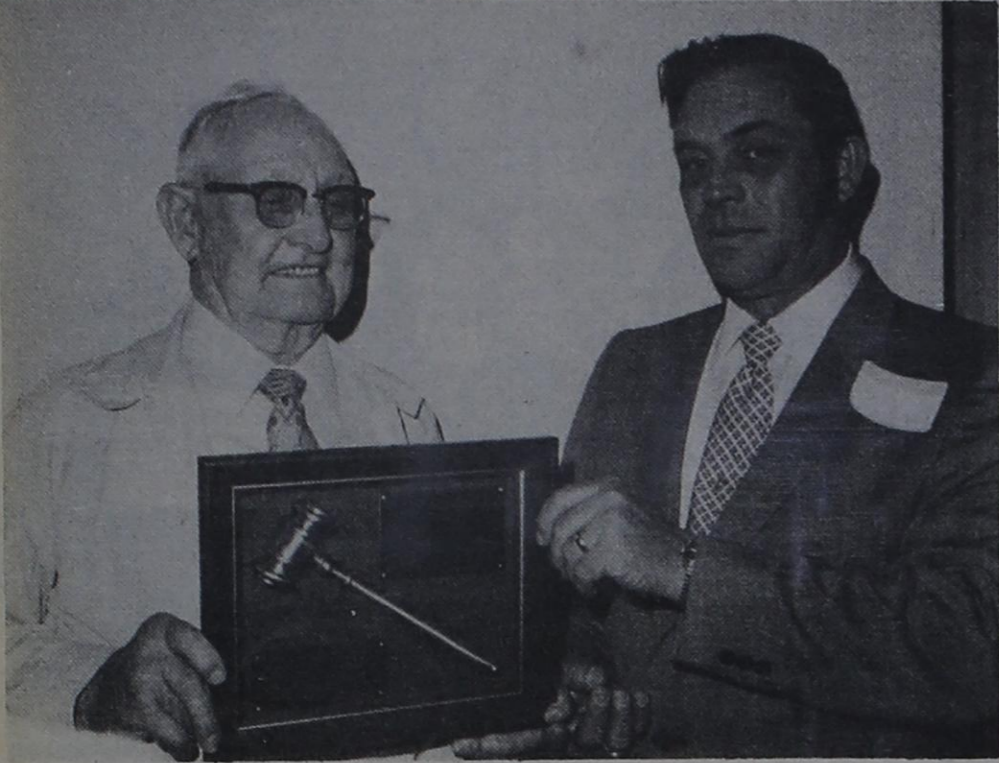

This year marks the 75th Anniversary of 4-H in Texas.

Since 1908 when County Agent Tom Marks organized the original Boys Corn Club in Jack County, 4-H has grown into a dynamic organization of some 125,000 youth in Texas and more than five million throughout the nation.

Out of the land-grant college system begun in 1862, a need evolved to educate young people who might be interested in following agriculture for a career. Thus the corn clubs of early 1900's became the foundation for 4-H. These clubs were designed to teach the latest principles of agricultural production to youth who would, in turn, demonstrate their new-found knowledge and skills on their family farms.

With its roots in agriculture, 4-H has since expanded and broadened its scope and now offers more than 60 different project opportunities for boys and girls between the ages of nine and 19.

The mission of 4-H today is to help youth acquire knowledge, develop life skills and form attitudes that will make

them self-directing, productive and contributing members of society.
