

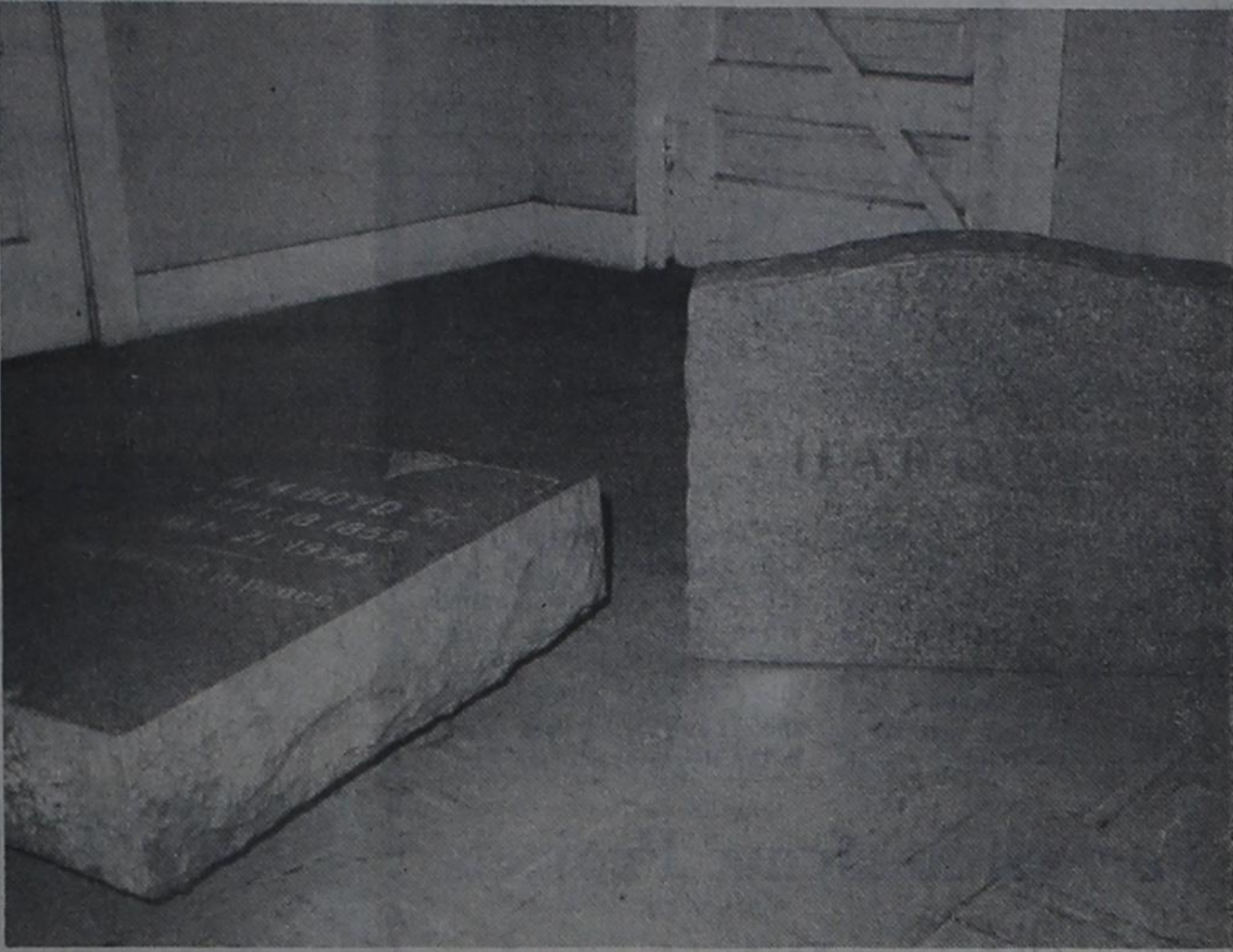

We're Not Lost

The case of the supposedly "missing" tombstones at Texico Cemetery unraveled this week. When Farwellite Joyce Coffman started her block's beautification project last month, she enlisted the aid of Farwell city employees to

move the two tombstones from the backyard of a nearby home and delivered them to the gate of the cemetery. As it turned out, these stones had never been in the cemetery. They were, in fact, part of a lot of "rejects" that had been sold in

an auction. Albert Terry of Clovis obtained two of the stones and used them as steps at a mobile home. Terry was contacted and plans to remove the two tombstones from the Texico city offices.

Only Rejects - -

Tombstones At Cemetery

Gate Not Missing Or Stolen

New information has surfaced regarding the two tombstones which were left outside the gate of the Texico Cemetery the weekend of March 12. The two stones were discovered on Monday, March 14, and the find was reported to Texico Marshal Mickey Fenn, who assumed that these stones were part of the group of ten tombstones which were stolen from the cemetery in 1974.

Such was not the case. The stones were neither stolen nor missing and had never been in the Texico cemetery. They have been laying in the backyard of a Farwell residence for 12 to 15 years, according to Joyce Coffman of Farwell who was responsible for having the stones delivered to the cemetery.

Jim Milsap, Southwestern Public Service Company representative, met with the council and reported that the engineering study for beautifying the company's substation located on Avenue A in Farwell has not been completed at this time. However, he said that he expected to be able to report to the City on that project in the near future.

The Council ended the meeting with a financial report by City Clerk Janie Bowery, and the paying of bills. Present for the session were Walter Kaltwasser, mayor; Fred Chandler and Jerry Monk, councilmen; and Janie Bowery, city clerk. Also present were Albert Smith, Joel White, Jim Milsap, James McDorman, and John Getz.

Texico officials, reportedly, years ago were aware of the two stones in Farwell, but

since they had been there long before the 1974 theft of the ten tombstones, they did not interfere. Marshal Fenn was not aware of the existence of the stones in Farwell.

It turns out that these stones were "rejects" or unsuitable, and never used for their intended purpose. They were part of a lot of 30 to 40 tombstone rejects which were sold in a Kleeman estate auction held south of Texico many years ago. The lot was purchased by a John Harpold

who, reportedly, intended to build a fireplace with them.

The two reject stones were obtained from Harpold by Albert Terry of Clovis, who then lived in Farwell. Terry used them as stepping stones to a trailer house located in the backyard of his Farwell residence.

The stones bear the names of James T. Harding, who died in 1961, and H.M. Boyd Sr., who died in 1934. According to Marshal Fenn, the Harding grave in the Texico Cemetery

has an identical stone on it, only larger, but he says that he walked the cemetery from corner to corner and checked the cemetery map, but could not find the Boyd grave.

The two stones were moved from outside the cemetery gate by the Texico fireboys, and are now resting in the back room of the city offices. City officials are anxious to get rid of the stones, and Marshal Fenn says that he has contacted Terry, who plans to pick them up.

Kindergarten Registration At Farwell

Registration for the 1983-84 term of kindergarten at Farwell Schools will be Wednesday, April 20, from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., in the elementary school library.

All children who will be five years of age by September 1, 1983, are eligible to attend classes next year.

To register, a child must

have immunization records and a birth certificate. Only official copies of birth certificates are accepted and must have been obtained from state offices.

Sarah Owen, school nurse, will be available to review immunization records during the registration.

Parents will register their children by numbers; waiting space will be provided.

Registration will close promptly at 12:30.

Preference of morning or afternoon sessions will be taken as space and balance of classes permits, says James Craig, elementary principal.

Named At Texico High School

Chary Jesko, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roger Jesko; Kevin West, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eddie West; and Tobin Tate, son of Mr. and Mrs. Phillip Tate; have been selected to represent Texico High School at New Mexico Boys State and Girls State this summer. Sponsors of the program are the American Legion and Auxiliary.

Alternates are Terri Fenn, daughter of Mickey Fenn; Ronnie Dunsworth, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Dunsworth; and Steve Miller, son of Rev. and Mrs. David Miller.

Chary will be attending the Girls State sessions at New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology at Socorro, May 28-

June 3. Kevin and Tobin will be attending Boys State June 5-10, also to be held at New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology.

Purpose of Boys State and Girls State is to provide citizenship training for students of high school age; to afford them opportunity to live together as self-governing citizens; to inform them of duties, privileges, rights, and responsibilities of American citizenship, so they may understand and participate in functions of government; and to help them grasp the meaning of responsibilities which they must assume when they become adults.

They will have their own

state and city governments, a Senate, House of Representatives, and city councils, where they will present and argue their own bills.

The entire program is non-partisan. The mythical 51st state will be a pure democracy in that all citizens may vote and all are eligible to hold office.

Sponsors for this year's Boys State delegates are Texico Volunteer Fire Department, Theta Rho ESA, Texico-Farwell Rotary Club, Texico-Farwell Lions Club, and Texico Chamber of Commerce.

Texico Women's Club will be sponsoring the Girls State delegate.

To Enforce Ordinances - -

Farwell City Council Hires Municipal Judge

Farwell City Council meeting in regular session Monday afternoon hired a municipal judge to hear cases of violations of the city ordinances. Albert Smith, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, accepted the position.

A legal opinion stating that any duly elected justice of the peace could serve as a municipal judge without having to live within the city limits opened the door to hiring Smith. Smith will begin his duties as soon as a contract between him and the city can be agreed upon and signed.

The position of municipal judge has been vacant for some time, but the Commissioners felt that a judge would be necessary to hear the cases brought against those in violation of city ordinances.

The Council has had numerous complaints about violations of the city ordinances re-

garding loose dogs and cats as well as the keeping of other prohibited animals within the city limits. Douglas Landrum, city pound keeper, is authorized to write citations to those in violation of the animal laws of the city. The municipal judge can now hear the cases of those so charged with violations.

In other business at the meeting, Joel White, fire chief, reported that he was still looking into the costs of remodeling the apartment at the fire station into an equipment bay to house additional fire and rescue equipment. Since the volunteer firemen has individual papers, it is not necessary for anyone to live in the fire station to receive emergency calls, and the space can be better used for necessary equipment.

Jack Diehl, paving contractor, was awarded the bid to give

approximately 30 blocks within the city a seal coat of tar and gravel this summer. His bid of \$25,938 was low for the project.

Jim Milsap, Southwestern Public Service Company representative, met with the council and reported that the engineering study for beautifying the company's substation located on Avenue A in Farwell has not been completed at this time. However, he said that he expected to be able to report to the City on that project in the near future.

board president, was selected to serve as vice-president with Edward Corn to serve as board secretary. Other holdover members of the board include Floyd Coates and Maxine Williams.

In other business, the list of transfers into the Farwell Independent School District for the coming year were approved as was the supplementary report by the Textbook Selection Committee.

The following University Interscholastic League activities were approved: boys football, boys and girls basketball, boys and girls track, boys and girls golf, boys and girls tennis, the one-act play contest, and all of the literary and academic contests.

A committee composed of Edward Corn, Steve Pierson, and Wilbert Kalbas was appointed to check on lease of an ag pickup or other vehicle to

suit the school's needs.

The bid of Farwell Insurance Agency in the amount of \$7,143.00 was accepted for the insurance on the school buildings.

Reports of activities in their respective buildings were given by principals Don Malone, Jerry Owen, and James Craig. The board tabled finalization of the 1983-84 school activity calendar until the May meeting.

Attending the meeting were members Wilbert Kalbas, Joe Hughes, Maxine Williams, Floyd Coates, Steve Pierson and Edward Corn. Board member Richard Haseloff was not present.

Also attending were W.M. Roberts, superintendent; Bruce Dollar, Richard Montgomery, and principals Malone, Owen and Craig.

Mining and Technology at Socorro. The students will learn about the government process, and will operate their own city and state governments during the week of their stay.

It boggled our mind. We were treated to a guided tour through the new Northwest Texas Hospital facility last Friday morning, and came away with our mind reeling with this exposure to the newest technology in treating human ills.

Last weekend we attended the annual meeting of the Panhandle Press Association in Amarillo. The NWTW arranged a breakfast and tour of the entire facility for interested publishers. We were presented with an elaborate full color, slick paper brochure which we could read at our leisure. We were also given a list of the counties in the Panhandle whose indigent patients have not paid their bills.

For the past year, the hospital is holding markers to the tune of almost \$2 million. We suspect that might have been a partial reason for the tour. We noted that patients from Farmer County still owed the Amarillo hospital a shade over \$52 thousand.

The NWTW is owned by the citizens of the Amarillo Hospital District, that is as we understand it, congruent with the city limits of Amarillo. The administrator of the hospital told us that the hospital operates on a budget of approximately \$50 million of which \$7 million is a direct tax subsidy from the Hospital District. It then receives almost \$14 million in other government payments such as direct payments by counties, Medicare-Medicaid, veterans benefits, and assorted relief programs. The balance of \$29 million is paid by the patients who pay their bills.

The administrator was frank to state that the divers hospital charges are inflated to attempt to recoup from the paying patients the losses incurred by those unable, or unwilling, to pay. Under the law, NWTW must provide services, without limit, to all who show up and need hospital care.

This is the crux of all hospital problems; the entitlement of all peoples to the best of care without regard for payment. The government mandates this policy. We cannot quarrel with the concept that all human life is infinitely precious and that all souls are entitled to the best care and most advanced treatment that society can provide.

Given this basic premise and now being more aware of the almost staggering amounts of money involved in providing that care, and believing that as scientific knowledge advances, the cost of the technology to deliver the benefits of that knowledge will continue to increase, we see no alternative in the future except socialized medical care delivery.

Under today's prevailing system, we have the rich who probably can afford a major medical crisis. We have the great middle class who cannot afford it and will face bankruptcy should such occur in their lives. Finally, we have the poor who cannot and do not pay.

This Sword of Damocles hanging over the head of middle America will come ever closer to the average man's jugular until it is intolerable, and the socialized system of complete government health care becomes the only equitable answer.

In the above analysis, we are not advocating socialized medicine. We are only prophesying that such will come to pass. One other reason that we think this will happen is the constant growth in government.

For example, in the past ten years the population of Texas has increased 26 percent while the State budget has grown 158 percent, the number of state employees has increased 3 1/2 times the growth in population and the number of state welfare employees has increased 370 percent.

If tidbits of statistics like this don't scare you - they should.

Kevin Owen and Jesse Anzaldua were awarded the Department of the Army Award of Merit in the botany category.

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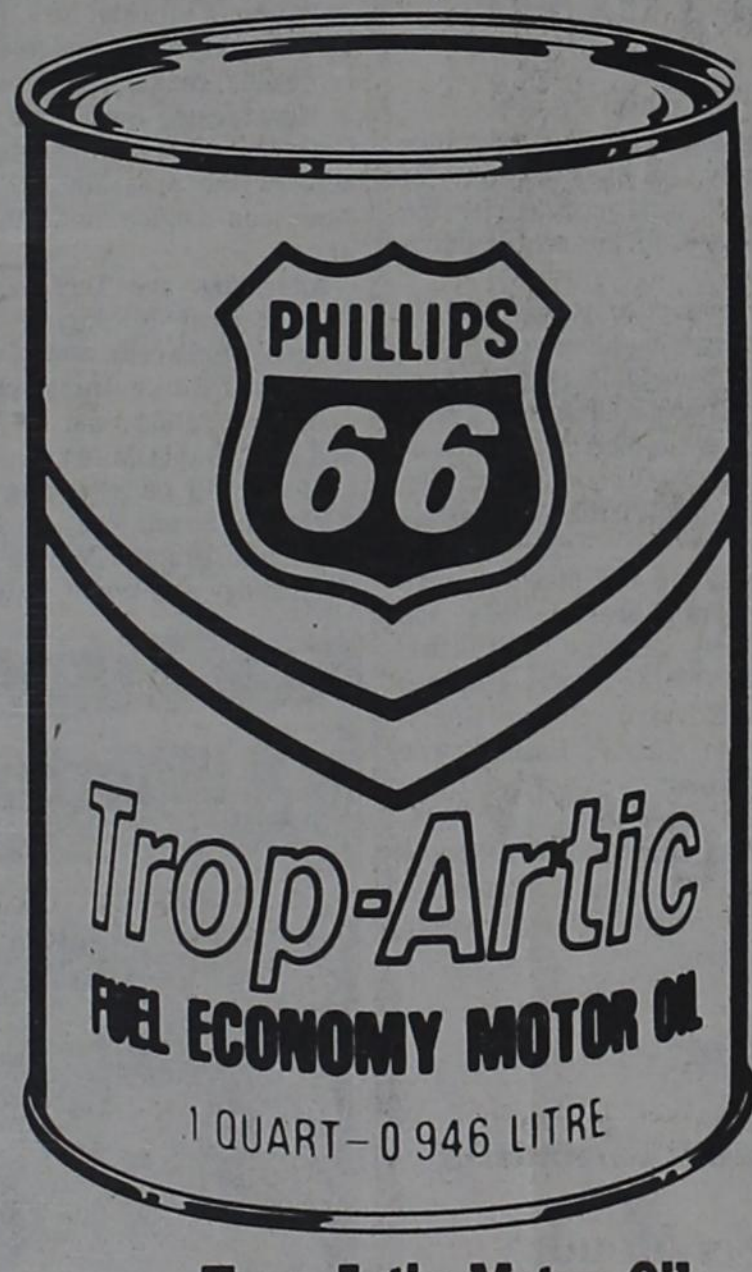

dairy judging events, and for being named to two all-tournament basketball teams this season. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Eddie West.

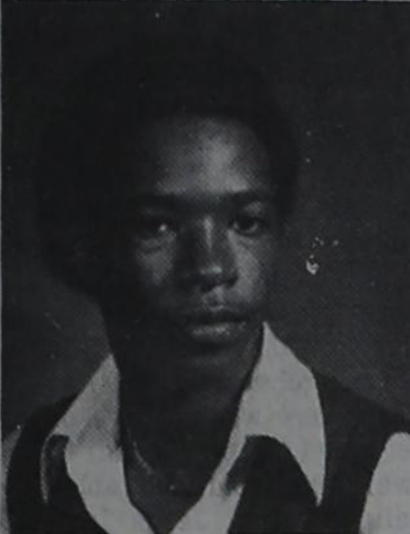

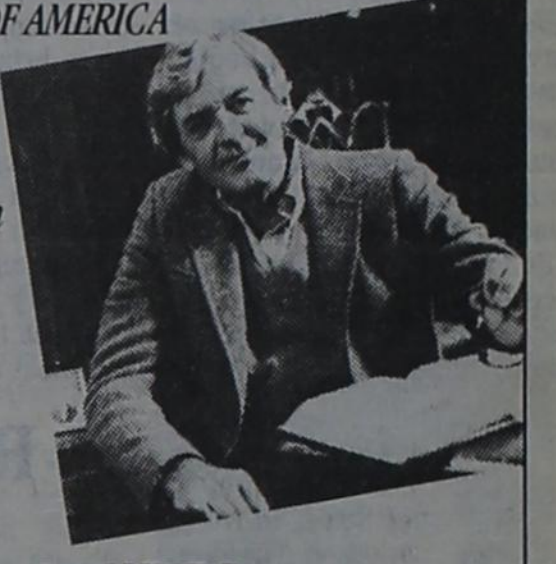

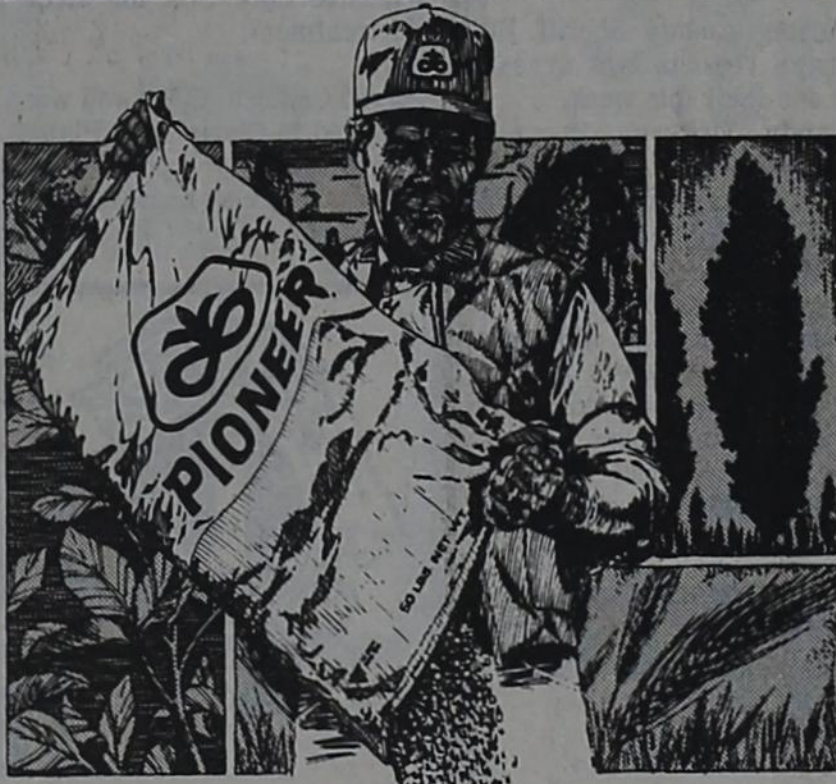

The Christ of the Cross lives and He desires to reign in your heart and life ... Won't you make room for Him today? And witness for the RISEN LORD where you are.

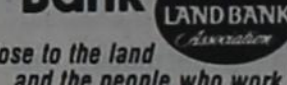

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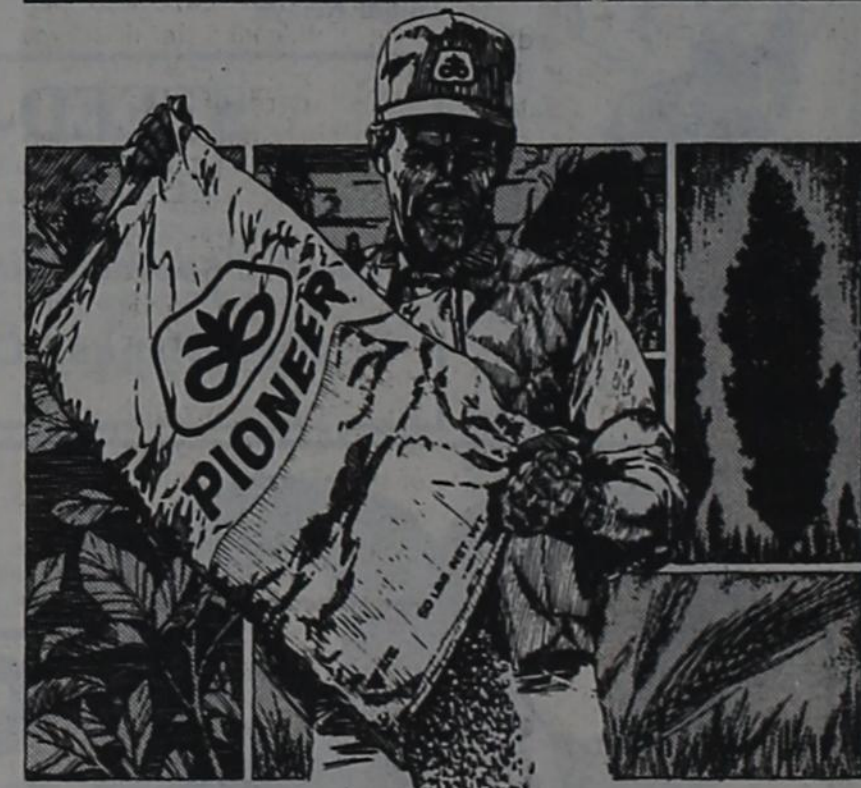

This week, let's take a look at a mixed bag of health information.

HEALTH QUACKERY - ALIVE & WELL!

Health quackery is alive and well!

Health fraud is a multibillion dollar business in America today.

Victims suffer medically as well as financially. They are often persuaded to abandon reliable, safe therapies for the dangers of unscientific treatment.

Modern health fraud includes the promotion of laetrile and the billion dollar-a-year business of arthritis quackery.

Mistreatment of the overweight with scientifically unsound diets, drugs and devices is another common practice in health frauds.

ALCOHOL, DRUG ABUSE & TEXAS YOUTH

Alcohol and drug abuse are two of the most serious problems facing young people growing up in Texas today.

The Texas Commission on Alcoholism reports that six children under age 10 were arrested for drunk driving in Texas in 1980. In all, the report shows that 18,122 Texans aged 17 and under were arrested for alcohol-related offenses in 1980. Of these, 1,697 were for driving while intoxicated; 4,623 for liquor law violations, and 11,802 for drunkenness.

Five of the liquor law violation arrests were of children under 10, as were 41 of the drunkenness arrests.

Mixing alcohol and driving contribute to more than half the traffic fatality cases involving youth, the Commission says.

In addition, alcohol use among adolescents is linked to problem behaviors, such as poor academic performance in school, delinquent behavior in the classroom, and withdrawal from normal youth activities.

FOOTNOTES

Proper foot care can pay "big dividends" in how you feel.

Good care of the feet is particularly important for persons with special problems - such as being overweight. And by conservative estimate, more than 30 percent of the adult population is overweight.

While we hear about numerous health problems associated with being overweight, few of us consider the consequences of those "extra pounds" to our feet.

Some ways that feet show

the "abuses of obesity" include swelling, calluses, corns, ingrown toenails, heel pain, and arthritis joints.

Overweight people often tend to perspire more readily, and bacteria can thrive on this excess foot moisture trapped between the toes. This situation increases the risk of infection.

So, take a load off your feet! Keep them and yourself fit - not fat. You can ward off a lot of foot frustrations by "holding the line" on extra pounds.

If you already have serious foot problems, ask your doctor about special treatment for these situations. Diabetes is a major cause of foot troubles and requires special attention.

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TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE
BY CORNELIUS R. STAM, PRES. SERAFIN BIBLE SOCIETY, CHICAGO, ILLINOIS 60635

WHAT'S HAPPENED SINCE 1909?
In 1909 Dr. C. I. Scofield wrote the following passage in the Introduction to the Scofield Reference Bible:
"The last fifty years have witnessed an intensity and breadth of interest in Bible study, unprecedented in the history of the Christian Church. Never before have so many reverent, learned and spiritual men brought to the study of the Scriptures minds so free from merely controversial motive. A new and vast exegetical and expository literature has been created..."
Even the years that followed the writing of this passage produced many great Bible expositors, but their number has since dwindled fast, until today evangelistic-revival campaigns have all but replaced the great, thrilling Bible conferences of a few decades ago.
Regardless of the popularity of such campaigns, however, the Church will not make true progress, either in spiritual power or in the number of genuine converts, until it once again places due emphasis on the Word of God, both in private study and in public ministry.
Unpopular but vital Bible doctrines have stopped many preachers and Bible teachers short and hindered them from bringing to the Scriptures "minds free from merely controversial motive," largely because the price of standing for these truths has seemed too great. *Until it is the sole passion of men of God to know THE TRUTH and make it known, revival will not come, for the Church has never made one step of progress apart from progress in the study of the Word.*

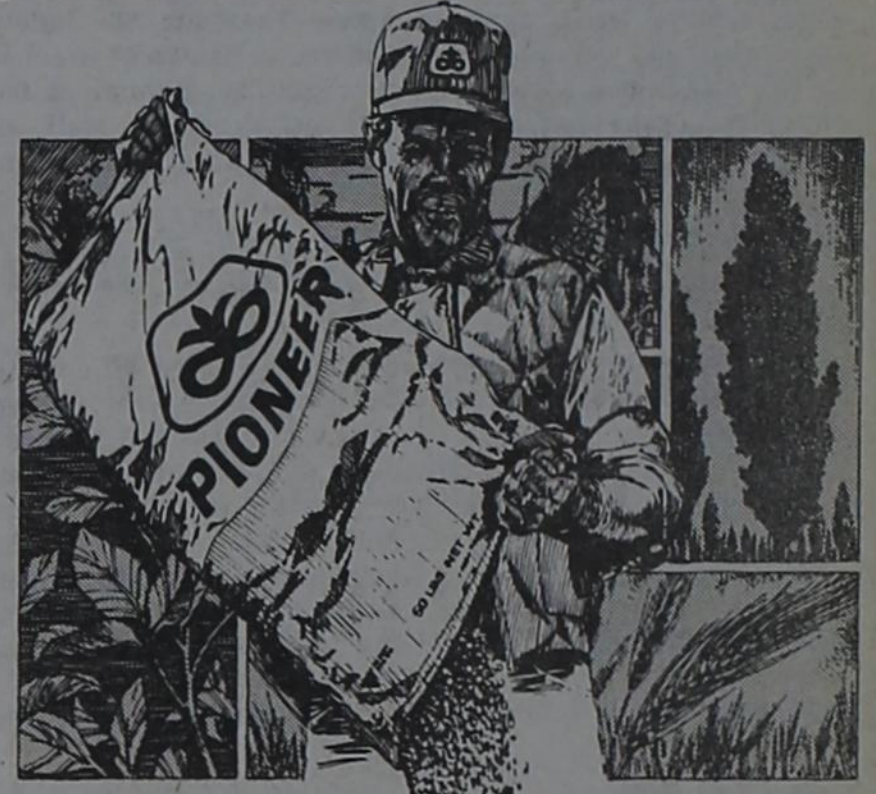

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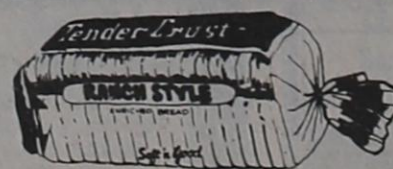
