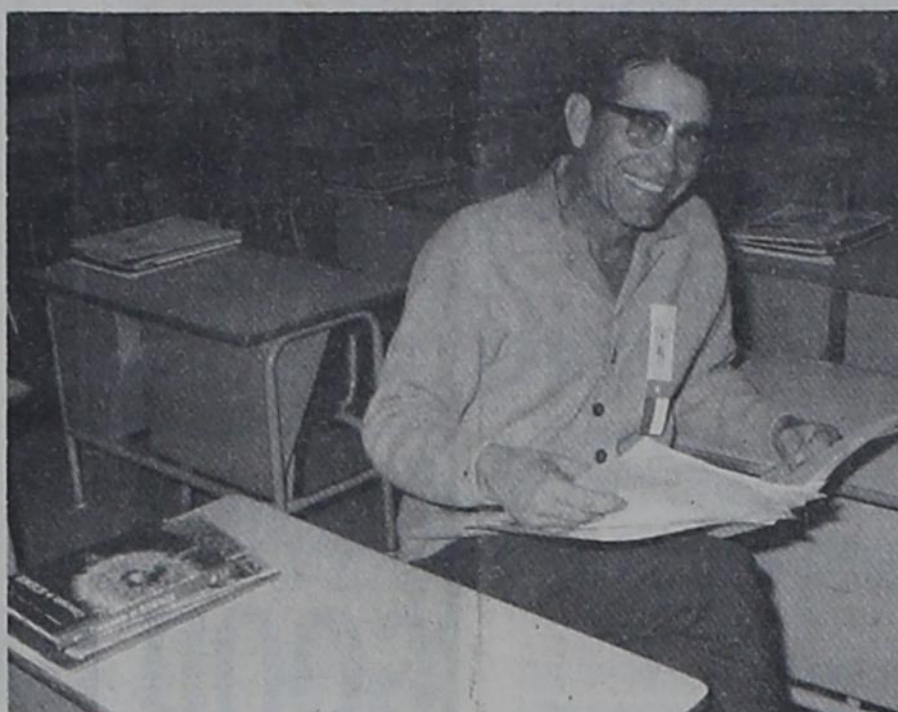
Slate Athletic Banquet

Mayor Explains Project

Only a small number of persons were in attendance at the Farwell City Commissioners meeting on Monday evening when the paving project for the town was discussed.

Mayor Elmer Hargrove explained that the paving project for the immediate future is a seal coat to the streets which have already been paved and which were not seal coated in the last paving project. At the time the seal coat is applied, city residents may also secure curb and gutter at their property. The city will pay for the paving; however, the property owner must pay for his own curb and gutter paving. Cost of the paving is approximately \$2 per running foot.

Property owners will be able to borrow the cost of their paving improvement from the city at a cost of nine per cent interest, with the interest added to the city tax on the property. All persons interested in the paving project should contact the city clerk.

Additional paving can be secured for the town if the owners of property on both sides of the street are in agreement on the project. However, the paving and curb and gutter must be done in blocks on both sides of the street. Curb and gutter may also be obtained on streets which already have paving but no curb and gutter.

Walter Ramm Services Held

Mr. Ramm, who had lived in the Oklahoma Lane, Lariat, Farwell and Muleshoe areas for the past 30 years, was pronounced dead on arrival at Clovis Memorial Hospital last Friday morning. He had lived in Clovis for the past year. His death resulted from an apparent heart attack.

Mr. Ramm's nephews served as pallbearers. Honorary pallbearers were all friends of Mr. Ramm.

Hargrove All-Tournament --

Steers Lose To Broncos In Regional Tournament

The Farwell Steers fell to the State Tournament-bound Clarendon Broncos by a 64-54 count in the first game of the Regional Tourney Saturday morning in Lubbock. The Broncos, 25-2 for the year, went on to defeat Seagraves 64-57 that night to capture the Region 1 title. The Steers closed out the season with a 25-6 slate.

Clarendon jumped to an early lead of as much as ten points in the initial period over the cold-shooting Steers and, though the Blue and White cagers closed to within five in the second stanza, a shooting and rebounding surge by the Broncos left them down 34-19 at half. The difference was in the shooting as the Steers hit 27 per cent from the field as opposed to Clarendon's 42 per cent.

The second half showed a marked difference in the Steers as they hit 45 per cent of their shots and outscored the Broncos 35-30, but the gap was too large to bridge and the final score read 64-54. Overall, the Steers hit on 19 of 51 field goal attempts for a 37 per cent average and 16 of 20 free throws, an 80 per cent mark.

D. Stovall, G. Hargrove --

Named To All South Plains Basketball Squad

Farwell, Seagraves, Paducah and Ralls each have two representatives on the 11-member Class A All South Plains basketball team with Coahoma, Petersburg and Shallowater providing the other three players.

Named to the team from Farwell are Dean Stovall and Greg Hargrove, who have been spark-plugs for the Steer squad throughout the season. Both Stovall and Hargrove had earlier been listed on the All-District basketball team. This is Stovall's fourth trip on the All South Plains teams.

Farwell's duo combined for 170 steals, 102 assists and 876 points prior to their bi-district encounter with Ralls. Stovall had hit 170 of 340 field goal attempts, 93 of 127 charity tosses, had 378 rebounds, 31

Dear Editor:

This past Friday afternoon, I received a telephone call from one of our family friends, who informed me that my dog was in her garage acting very strangely. I immediately went to their house and found my dog foaming at the mouth, convulsing and grasping for air. When I tried to pick up the dog and revive him, he died immediately.

Because there had been no indication that the dog was hit by a vehicle and because he had been seen moments before by our friends' children acting normally, I asked an area veterinarian to do an autopsy on the dog. The veterinarian called me yesterday with his report, the results of which showed that the dog had been poisoned with strychnine. Since that time, I have been informed by citizens of Farwell that at least three other dogs died of poisoning here in town within the past week. To my knowledge, not one of the four dogs killed were in any way damaging persons or property, or at least none of the owners of the dogs were notified that their dogs were causing trouble.

There is no question that my dog should have been impounded for running loose in violation of our city ordinance even though he was penned and

had jumped our fence on this particular afternoon. Nor do I question the shooting of dogs when they are destroying someone's property or killing their animals, which, by the way, our law justifies. However, in my opinion, the poisoning of dogs is in no way justifiable. Not only does the putting out of poison violate a Texas criminal statute and subject the person to a \$10 to \$200 fine, but also creates a possible danger to many of the children of our community. It seems to me that it would be extremely easy for a small child to become poisoned by placing something in his or her mouth which contained poison.

Perhaps my thinking in this regard is wrong, but I do feel that those citizens who intentionally put out poison should be prosecuted within the full extent of the law. Also, I am sure that the first time some child is poisoned, some action will be taken to remedy these unlawful acts.

Hopefully, those persons who are putting out poison in good faith will be extremely careful with it in the future. Perhaps, too, their neighbors will caution them and be less sympathetic when they observe an intentional poisoning.

FERTILIZER RESEARCH BOOKLET NOW AVAILABLE

A booklet which summarizes fertilizer research and demonstration work on the Texas High Plains over a 10-year period is now available from the county agricultural agent's office.

Title of the report is "Fertilizer Research and Demonstration Summary for the Texas High Plains, 1958-67." It was prepared by James H. Valentine, area soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and Dr. Arthur B. Onken, assistant professor of soil and fertilizer at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock.

Information on a large number of the more than 200 research tests directly pertaining to fertilizer use and response on the High Plains is contained in the booklet. The publication summarized fertility research conducted with cotton, grain sorghum, wheat, alfalfa and sugar beets. Also, a general description of area soils and their fertility status, fertilizer use history and a soil test explanation is included.

In addition to this research

information, fertilizer demonstrations are also conducted in the county each year with cooperating farmers. This information is published at the beginning of each year in a result demonstration handbook that is also available at the county agent's office.

As yield potentials increase due to improved management and production practices, fertilizer use can be increased profitably. All farmers and fertilizer dealers in the county are urged to come by the office to pick up a copy of the booklet described above as it contains valuable information that may be helpful in planning a fertility program for this year's crops.

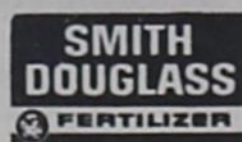

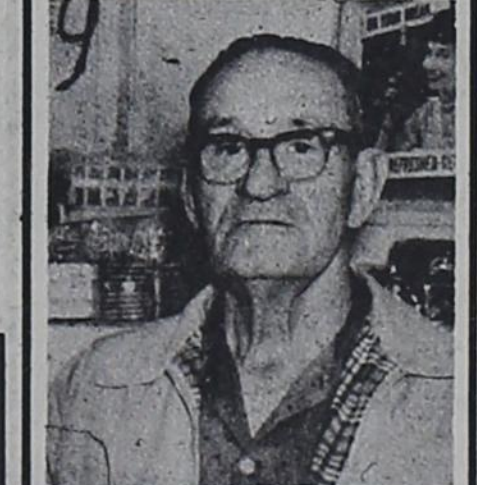

Della Read, James Symcox Married In Borger Ceremony

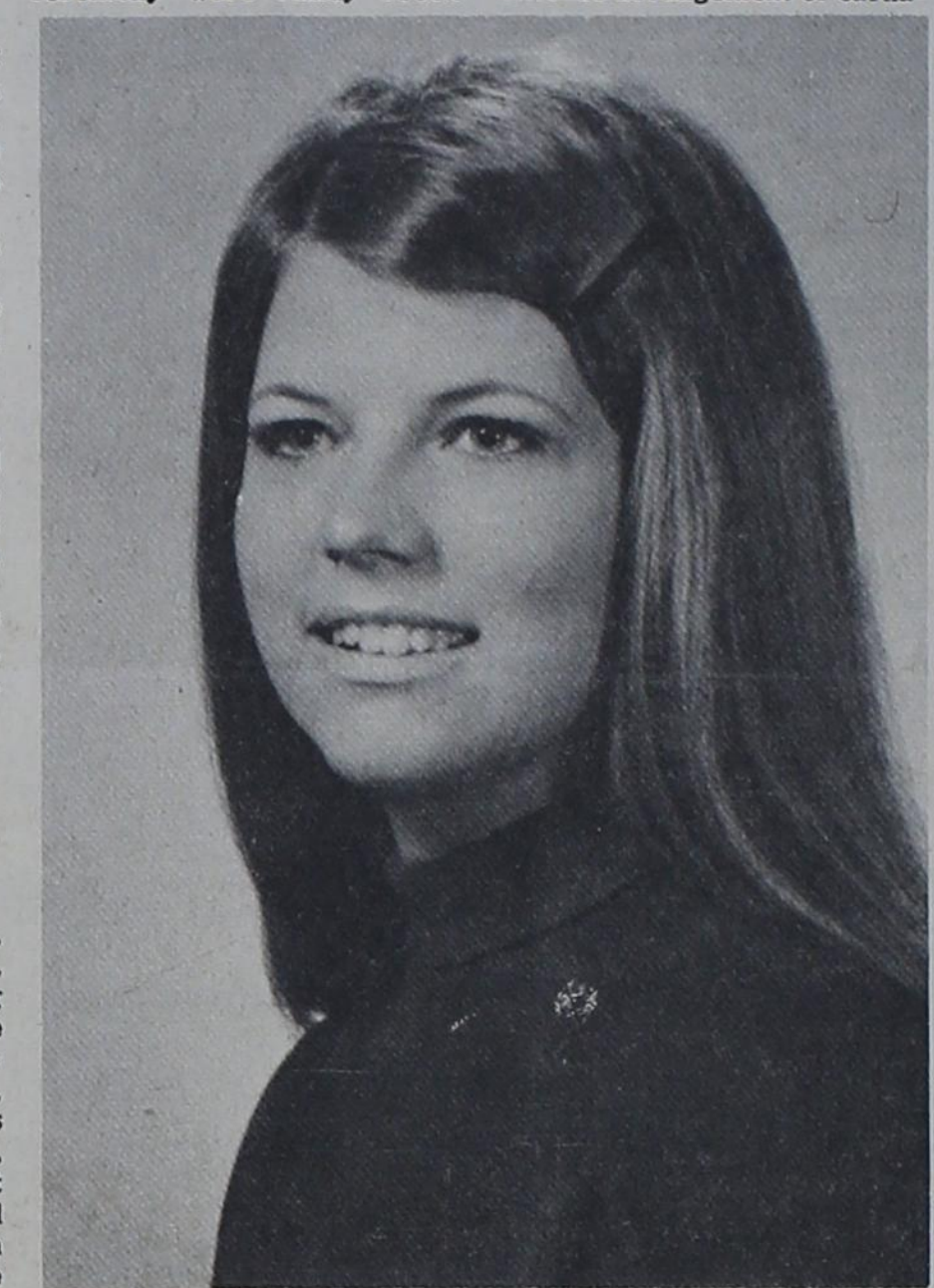
