

# City Dads Discuss Paving Project

At the Thursday afternoon meeting of the Farwell City Commissioners two matters of importance were discussed at great length.

First on the agenda was the proposed paving project which the city will have in the next few months. The city will pave the streets but will not be responsible for curb and gutter. However, the city dads state that if property owners are interested in curb and gutter the city will try to work out something whereby the property owner can secure the work done at a reasonable price.

The project will be discussed at length at the next city meeting which has been scheduled for 6 p.m., February 27. All property owners in Farwell are invited to be on hand for the meeting to give their views on the paving project. Streets which will be worked include all of the streets not re-worked in 1969.

The other matter which came up for discussion was the ordinance governing dogs and other pets running loose on the streets.

In recent weeks City Clerk Janie Bowery has been besieged with calls from persons who are being aggravated by the large number of dogs running at random in Farwell. Mrs. Bowery says, "a great many of these dogs are strays, but many are pets of townspeople."

She is reminding dog owners that there is an ordinance which prohibits animal owners to allow their pets to run at random. She also reminds that the animals must have rabies shots; must be penned, kept on a leash, or kept under control at all times.

The ordinance also provides a \$10 impounding fee and \$3 per day charge for an additional pound fee, with the dog being kept for 72 hours. After that time, dogs which have not been rescued from the pound will be destroyed. Beginning immediately the ordinance will be enforced to the letter of the law, say city officials.

On February 20 between the hours of 1:30-5:30 p.m., an animal clinic will be held at the Farwell City Hall, in cooperation with the Texico City Hall. At that time all pets in Farwell and Texico should be brought in for rabies shots and for licensing. Dr. B. L. Russell of Clovis will be in charge of the clinic.

### Politics Picks Up

The final day for filing for one of the city offices in Texico saw two people filing for the mayor's position, one person filing for the two-year term as a commissioner; and six persons filing for the two four-year terms on the city commission. Sam Lewis, incumbent police magistrate, was the only person filing for that position.

Perry Winkles, whose four-year term as city commissioner is expiring this year, is seeking the mayor's position opposing Howard Billingsley, incumbent mayor.

Bill Christian, who was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Bob Dollar on the city commission when the latter moved out of the township some 18 months ago, has filed his intention of seeking a two-year term on the commission.

Persons who are seeking election to the four-year terms on the council are William Wesley Engram, Donald Callouet, Charles A. Bourlon, F. E. Winegeart, Monnie Ann Longo and

LaDonna Cross. B. A. Rogers, whose four-year term on the council is expiring, chose to not be a candidate for re-election to that position.

The municipal election is set for March 3. All persons who are residents of the town of Texico and who are registered voters in the county will be qualified to vote in the election. Persons who have not registered to vote have until February 16 to register at the office of the Curry County Clerk, if they wish to vote in the upcoming municipal election.

### Registered Voters Less Than In 1968 In County

Officials at the Parmer County tax office stated early this week that only approximately 3,438 persons had registered to vote in Parmer County this year by the deadline, January 31.

This figure falls short of persons registering to vote in Parmer County in the last election year, 1968, by an estimated 432. At that time 3870 persons were registered to vote in the county.

Persons who had not registered by the deadline will have to wait until the next election year to be eligible to vote since only qualified registered voters may participate in school board elections, municipal elections, and county and state elections.

### Listed To Tech Honor Roll

Johnny Atkinson, who completed requirements for a degree in business administration with a major in accounting at the end of the fall semester at Texas Tech, has been listed on the dean's honor roll for the fall semester.

# Scouts Travel For Stronger Friendships And Adventures

Ask the average boy in a neighborhood if he is proud to be

a Boy Scout. You will probably receive a reply of "You bet!" or at least a pretty enthusiastic

"Yes." This youngster enjoys Scouting, even though yearly for him it probably consists

of only troop meetings and one or two camp-outs, usually at Running Water Draw or some other nearby spot.

Why then are you likely to see Texico-Farwell Scouts in Capitan, Santa Fe, Albuquerque, or maybe even in Lawton, Okla.? Main answer for that question is that we simply do not live in camping country. Sure, you can pitch a tent in a dry draw, or in some local sandhills -- but what of the big trees, cold streams, blue lakes, scenic mountains, and other similar attractions? It's obvious they're not going to come to you, so you load the Scout bus and find a road map!

Is this a big once-a-year "special" then? Not in Texico-Farwell. Our boys go camping once in each of all but the coldest months -- and many times even during those months when a cabin or other facility is available. In addition to monthly camping, many Sunday or week-night events are scheduled throughout the year -- parties, cook-outs, flying movies, Courts of Honor, family nights, and Camp Wehnhap -- seven full days of mountain living near Sacramento, N. Mex. A Texico-Farwell Scout usually has available from 80 to 90 days of Scouting per year. Scouting in the Twin Cities realizes that not all boys play all the same games and do all the same things. It therefore never takes a "holiday" during peak periods of other activities. Scouting is always there throughout the year.

Scouting -- in those areas of "camping country," we recognized as early as our first year in 1966 that the one big problem would be transportation. There is no feeling in the world quite like planning a big camping trip, having 15 boys packed and ready to go, then finding out that no one is available to drive. It takes only one "cancelled" weekend to obtain courage for buying a bus -- even if it means selling 51 of those 5,280 boxes of candy out in Fort Sumner when the temperature is 108 in the shade. Our boys did just that -- because they are proud to be in a "troop that's going places!"

These boys are your ambassadors away from home. They have strict rules to follow concerning public behavior, leaving an area cleaner than it was found, and always proudly wearing their uniforms when on the road.

Your local Scouting unit is a part of the El Llano Grande District of Conquistador Council, headquartered in Roswell. District headquarters are in nearby Clovis. Chief operation of the council is Camp Wehnhap, probably one of the best week-long summer camps in the country. A former Farwell boy now living in Roswell stays registered with our troop for the same reason. Our attendance at Wehnhap this year will be our fourth in a row.

Can there be too much of a good thing? We will know in 1972 when our Texico-Farwell

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## Edelmon Seeks Judge's Office

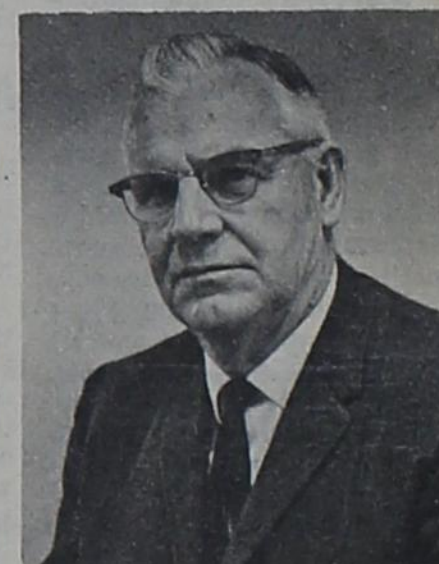
Parmer County will have its first contested political race in several years when voters go to the polls in May to elect county officials. The contested race is that of Parmer County judge where W. L. "Preach" Edelmon of Friona is seeking the office, opposing incumbent judge, Archie Tarter.

Edelmon has been a resident of Parmer County for 32 years during which time he has spent 15 years as a teacher and administrator in the Friona School system. He is a graduate of Texas Tech where he served as a government major and taught parliamentary law for college credit for two years while serving as a student assistant in the department of government.

He is the first president of Parmer County Soil Conservation District, past president of Parmer County School Board, has served as mayor of Friona for the past four years, served six years as producer delegate to the National Cotton Council in Memphis, Tenn., served 12 years as director from Parmer County to Plains Cotton Growers and is presently serving as president of Parmer County Water Association. In addition, Edelmon is past governor of Lions District 27-1, and was named "Man of the Year" by Friona Chamber of Commerce in 1966.

In announcing his candidacy for the office, Edelmon said, "In becoming a candidate for the democratic nomination for county judge, I pledge to the voters of Parmer County dedicated service for the advancement of the economic, social and educational standards of our rapidly developing county." 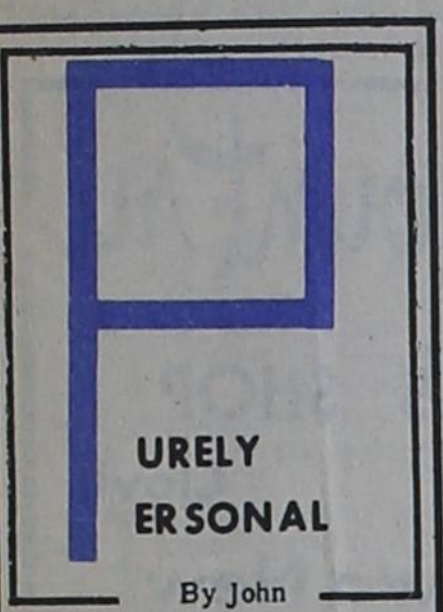

Last weekend we indicated that our understanding of ice hockey was practically nil, and for this reason we did not enjoy watching the game. This week we can say that our knowledge of the game has increased and also our appreciation of the game when we have the opportunity to see it on TV. We wish to thank Gerald Curtis for his capsule explanation of the rules and regulations that govern ice hockey. It turns out that the rules and the markings on the rink are not so incomprehensible when you have had just a little enlightenment on the subject.

Speaking of watching TV, we were exposed to a basketball doubleheader of Southwest Conference teams Saturday afternoon. It looked like a poor brand of roundball for major colleges to be playing. It is obvious that the Southwest Conference gets a berth in the NCAA playoffs only by virtue of being a conference, not because of any outstanding teams. The four teams on display Saturday looked ragged enough to be swallowed up by some of our better area high school quintets. It is too bad that more emphasis is not placed on the game by the members of this prestigious football conference. We do have lots of good talent in Texas in the high school ranks among boys who play basketball. Sorry to say, most good basketball prospects are snapped up with football scholarships and the roundballers apparently go begging. We vote for increased emphasis on basketball in the Southwest Conference and maybe they would not have to play a grueling 11-game football schedule to balance the athletic budget. This shift of emphasis appears to us to be better for the students -- that's what people in school are. It would also be better for the spectators and better for the image of the conference.

In many instances actions by governing boards, commissioners courts, city commissions and other governmental bodies seem to beat variance with the wishes of the general electorate. Deeper research into the matter usually turns up the fact that these decisions are in line with some court decision rather than reflecting the actual attitudes of the concerned body. Thus, court action is very fundamental in directing our daily lives. And, that to correct many things that we as a whole disagree with, we must first correct the federal and state courts. This is much easier said than done.

Probably a new height in legal injustice is occurring in Iowa. An elderly couple owned a house on a farm. There had been some theft and vandalism in the locality; so the owner rigged a shotgun booby trap in the house. Sure enough a burglar did break in the house and did trip the booby trap and did get shot in the legs. He was apprehended, did plead guilty and was fined \$50,000 and put on probation. THEN he proceeded to sue the property owner for disability due to the shooting and WON a \$35,000.00 judgment against the poor property owner. The property owner has sold the house for \$10,000 and still owes the self-confessed burglar \$25,000. This on the basis that human rights are paramount to property rights. This unjust state of affairs could eventually lead to the abandonment of a person's right to defend his property. Then the greedy, avaricious, unprincipled element would rule us in place of order and proper rules of society governing us. This is a shining example of current legal and judicial fat-headedness that can destroy us as a capitalistic, property-owning society. Maybe that's the plot.

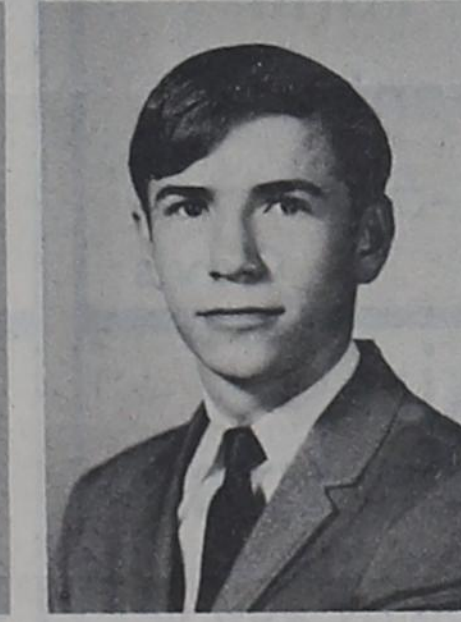

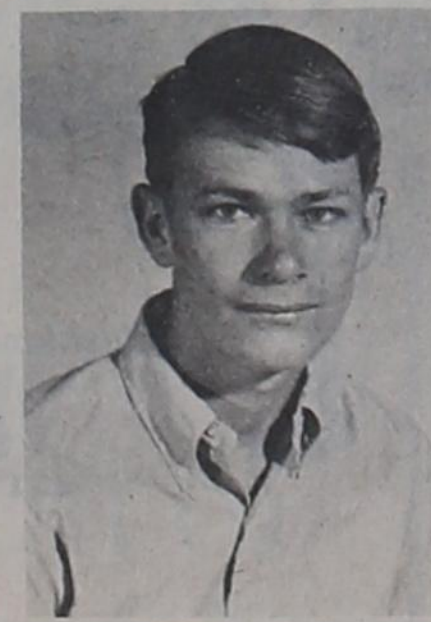

# Reach Halfway Mark --

# Steers Hold Perfect District Record

Farwell continued to roll through district play unscathed as they opened the downhill-half of their scheduled conference games by downing Sudan 70-51. The hot-handed Steers set the pace from the outset, hitting 48% from the field and 61% from the line.

## Did He Come Out

Did Mr. Groundhog stick his head out of the burrow on Monday? If he did there is no doubt according to an old legend that this area will have six more weeks of winter weather before spring arrives.  
 Groundhog Day originated in Europe as Hedgehog Day. It seems that the Pilgrims found no hedgehogs in New England and thus made the groundhog or woodchuck the winter weather predictor.

Similar to Groundhog Day is the chant of an ancient festival observed in Scotland and England called Candlemas. According to the Scottish saying, "If Candlemas is fair and clear, there'll be two winters this year," and an old English song reads, "If Candlemas bring clouds and rain, go winter and come not again."

The festival is observed by the Eastern Orthodox church and some other Eastern Christian churches in observance of the presentation of the Christ child at the temple in Jerusalem, the meeting of the infant Jesus with Simeon and Anna. Candlemas is observed as the festival of the Virgin Mother in some Western churches.

In some of the New England states the Ancient Order of the Groundhog depends upon a famous groundhog named Punxsutawney Phil to predict the weather for the next six weeks. In the heart of Pennsylvania members of the order don their tall silk hats and white robes over their usual apparel and begin early in the morning on February 2 to search for Mr. Groundhog. A shout is given when the groundhog is spotted and everyone gathers around to await the observations of the hibernating creature.

The groundhog is quite harmless and often friendly to other animals. He is extremely fat and is brownish gray in color with a short tail and strong claws for digging. The groundhog lives in fields and on the sides of hills or under rocks. He digs a slanting tunnel, upward at first to keep out water. He may move as much as 700 pounds of earth in the process of digging his five to 40 foot tunnel. The tunnel contains more than one compartment and has more than one entrance.

The 18-24 inch animal feeds in the early morning or late afternoon and spends the rest of his time lying in the sun or sleeping in his nest, an enlarged chamber at the bottom of his burrow. At the first sign of winter "Mr. Ground-
