In many instances actions by governing boards, commissioners courts, city commissions and other governmental bodies seem to be at variance with the wishes of the general electorate. Thus, court action is very fundamental in directing our daily lives. And, that to correct many things that we as a whole disagree with we must first correct the federal and state courts. This is much

easier said than done. Probably a new height in legal injustice is occurring in Iowa. An elderly couple owned a house on a farm. There had been some theft and vandalism in the locality; so the owner rigged a shotgun booby trap in the house. Sure enough a burglar did break in the house and did trip the booby trap and did get shot in the legs. He was apprehended, did plead guilty and was fined \$50.00 and put on probation. THEN he proceeded to sue the property owner for disability due to the shooting and WON a \$35,000.00 judgement against the poor property owner. The property owner has sold the house for \$10,000 and still owes the self-confessed burglar \$25,000. This on the basis that human rights are paramount to property rights. This unjust state of affairs could eventually lead to the abandonment of a person's right to defend his property. Then the greedy, avaricious, unprincipled element would rule us in place of order and proper rules of society governing us. This is a shining example of current legal and judicial fat-headedness that can destroy us as a capitalistic, property-owning society. Maybe that's the plot.





Dear Sir, I was greeted upon arriv-ing in your town this evening by a surprising flash of red lights from an official vehicle. Upon stopping, I was asked for the first time in many years for evidence of my legal qualification to operate an automobile. According to the officer, I entered your town at approxi-

mately forty-four miles per hour. The official speed limit was stated to be thirty miles per hour. Because of the position in which my automobile was brought to a stop, and the fact of having released the automatic speed control on my car from the posted highway speed, I made further inquiry as to the

nature of my delay. There was agreement in the fact of: My travel being a reasonable speed for the circumstances; my automobile obviously in the process of reducing speed; there being no danger in the speed of the automobile at the point checked; and the apparent nearness of the checking device to the posted speed sign.

The fuller explanation for my delay was made more explicit when I was assured that your city had its municipal court open at 9:00 p.m. to receive payment for fines. It was more than obvious that a small town had taken advantage of its legal position to enhance its financial needs. I will be the first to defend the need for law enforcement and the first to assume And Loan whatever responsibility I personally owe for the violation of our laws. But, when a group of citizens disregard the pur-pose of the law (in this case, safety) and use those laws for a purpose so clearly secondary to the intent of the law (in this case, financial) I will be the first to protest.

It would seem to me that one of the major dangers facing our nation in this hour is the twisting of our laws to meet personal needs of special interest groups. I would suggest that when citizens of a small town such as yours allow their officials to utilize their rights to satisfy personal needs. those citizens forfeit any right interest groups utilize other laws to accomplish their personal goals. If our laws are allowed to become mere tools with which to satisfy secondary needs of those responsible for an orderly society, we have little hope of seeing respect for laws which were originally de-

signed to protect us all.

Please forgive if I leave any impression of either anger or resentment. I was personally accorded every courtesy. Yet, I cannot escape the implication of this experience nor the conviction expressed. Name on File

In the heart of Pennsylvania members of the order don their tall silk hats and white robes over their usual apparel and begin early in the morning on February 2 to search for Mr. Groundhog. A shout is given when the groundhog is spotted and everyone gathers around to await the observations of the hibernat-

The groundhog is quite harmless and often friendly to other animals. He is extremely fat and is brownish gray in color with a short tail and strong claws for digging. The groundhog lives in fields and on the sides of hills or under rocks.

He digs a slanting tunnel, upward at first to keep out water. He may move as much as 700 pounds of earth in the process of digging his five to 40 foot tunnel. The tunnel contains more than one compartment and has more than one entrance.
