Exchange Student To Arrive In August

The first foreign exchange student to attend classes at Farwell High School is due to arrive in Farwell the first week in August, according to information released this week by Mrs. Gil Patschke, publicity chairman for the local chapter of the American Field Service.

The student is 17-year-old Sten Ake Westerberg from Falkoping, Sweden. He will be enrolled at Farwell School as a senior. Sten has studied English for seven years and has studied in England for five weeks during

one summer. He has traveled extensively in Europe, including vacations spent in Germany, France and Austria. In addition to speaking his native tongue and English, he also speaks German and French.

He lists his favorite sports as golf, football, skiing, and ice hockey. Most of his vacations have been spent on skiing trips,

and Sten indicates that he is a great lover of outdoor life. Reports indicate that he is also an excellent student. He comes from a small town about the size of Farwell. His father is a director in a factory. He has an older sister and no brothers. Representatives of the local

chapter of the American Field Service say that an exceptional job has been done in matching the student to Farwell and that he should be an asset to the community. The young student also lists among his main in-

terests a desire to learn more about American politics. One of his favorite subjects is debate.

Sten will make his home with Mr. and Mrs. Jim Wiman and Bob while living in Farwell.

School Superintendent Tells Immunization Law

A. D. McDonald, superintendent of Texico Schools, indicates that many children have been at-

tending the school who are in need of booster shots or oral polio drops. According to the school nurse who has been reviewing the records for next

year, almost every child in the school needs boosters or the oral drops. This not only applies to first grade students,

the school. Several other mothers are also assisting.

Mrs. Kathryn Lockhart, school nurse, is in charge of the medical program for the school. Children will receive a complete physical and dental

checkup and will also receive immunizations readying them for the beginning of school in the fall. All children in the school are five, six and seven years of age. Final day of classes is July 25.

but to all students who attend the school.

New Mexico Immunization laws state: "No student may attend school longer than one month unless he has been immunized as required." School-age students need boosters in diphtheria, tetanus and smallpox. The oral polio is now re-

quired since the medicine for the booster polio is no longer made.

McDonald says, "Parents should realize that it is their legal responsibility to check their children's records and to get the shots up to date." He adds, "This fall the names of students and parents who have

not had the required immunization shots will be reported after the first month of school to the local health department who will in turn report them to the District Attorney's office for prosecution, as required by law." He urges all parents to check up now and save themselves some trouble.

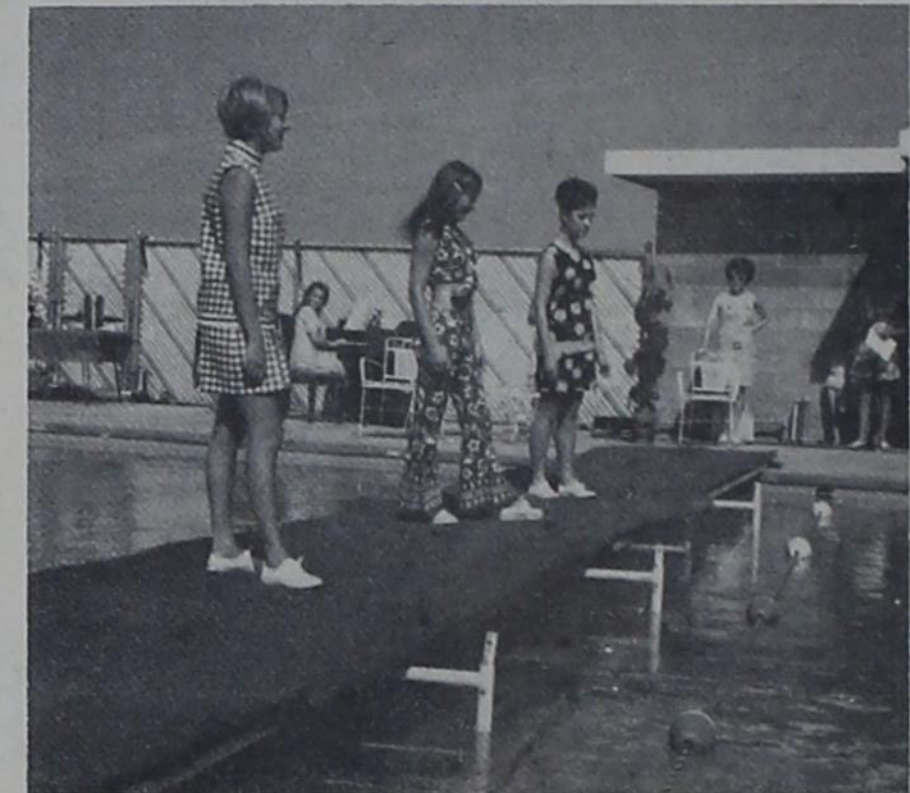

BEEF KABOBS WAIKIKI

- 2 lbs. round steak cut two inches thick;
- 1 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- 3/4 teaspoon ginger
- 1/8 teaspoon black pepper
- 1/8 teaspoon garlic powder
- 6 tablespoons soy sauce
- 3 tablespoons lemon juice
- 3 tablespoons cooking oil
- 8 cherry tomatoes
- 8 wedges green pepper
- 8 whole mushrooms

CANDY BAR COOKIES

Light oven and turn to 325 degrees to heat. Combine 3/4 cup butter with 3/4 cup sifted powdered confectioners sugar, cream well; add 2 tablespoons Pet milk, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/4 teaspoon salt; mix well, then blend in 2 cups sifted flour, mix well and place in refrigerator to chill.

After removing from refrigerator, roll and cut into desired shape, using only half of mixture at a time. Place on ungreased cookie sheet and bake 12-16 minutes. Remove from oven and top with the following mixture: 28 caramels (1/2 lb) mixed with 1/4 cup Pet milk and cooked over low heat until caramels have melted; add 1/4 cup butter, 1 cup powdered sugar and 1 cup pecans; Now frost with the following mixture: 1 cup semi-sweet chocolate morsels melted with 1/3 cup evaporated milk to which 2

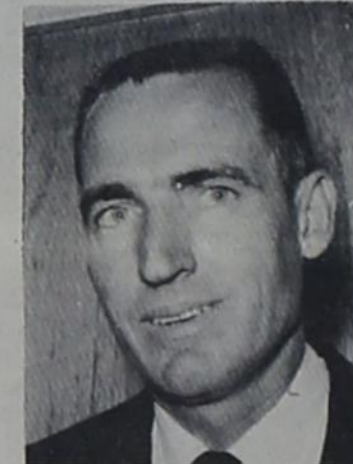

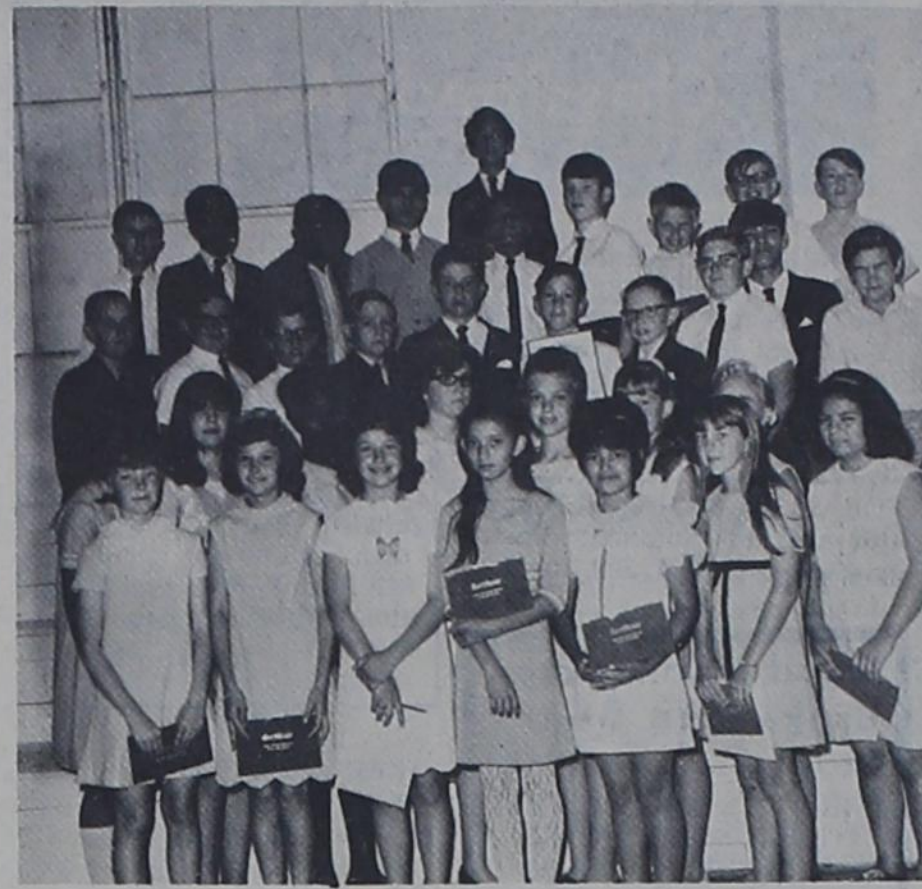
Children of all faiths are invited to participate, according to Rev. Herbert F. Pieman, pastor of the church and superintendent of the school.

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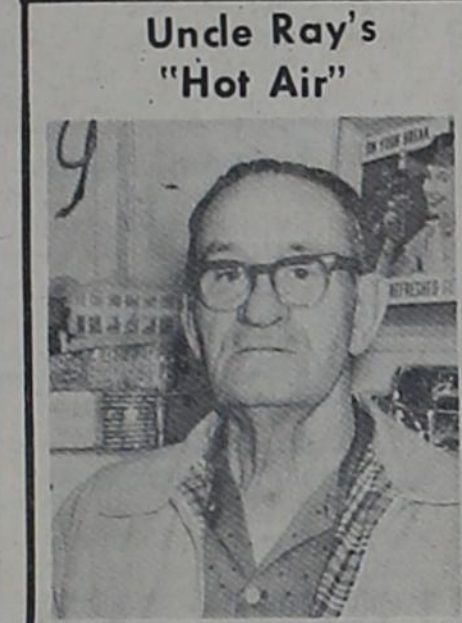

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Farmers Home Administration News

About 56,000 rural families in the United States benefited during 1968 by the Rural Housing program administered by Farmers Home Administration, according to Billy R. Boling, County Supervisor. Funds may be advanced to build, improve, or repair existing dwellings and related facilities, or to buy an existing house and lot. Farmers may borrow to build a house for their own use or for farm laborers or tenants.

Farmers Home Administration loans are made to families who for various reasons are

unable to obtain credit from private sources. Under the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968, low income families who do not have adequate income to meet payments at the usual rate of interest may qualify for interest credit. The amount of interest these families would pay depends on the family income, and the size of the family; however, it would never be less than 1%.

"The rural housing program creates the type rural community that encourages people to live in rural areas. It is essential in helping to check the flow of rural residents to urban areas. Rural housing loans stimulate the economy of rural communities through the sale of building materials, home furnishings, and increased employment opportunities," Boling said.

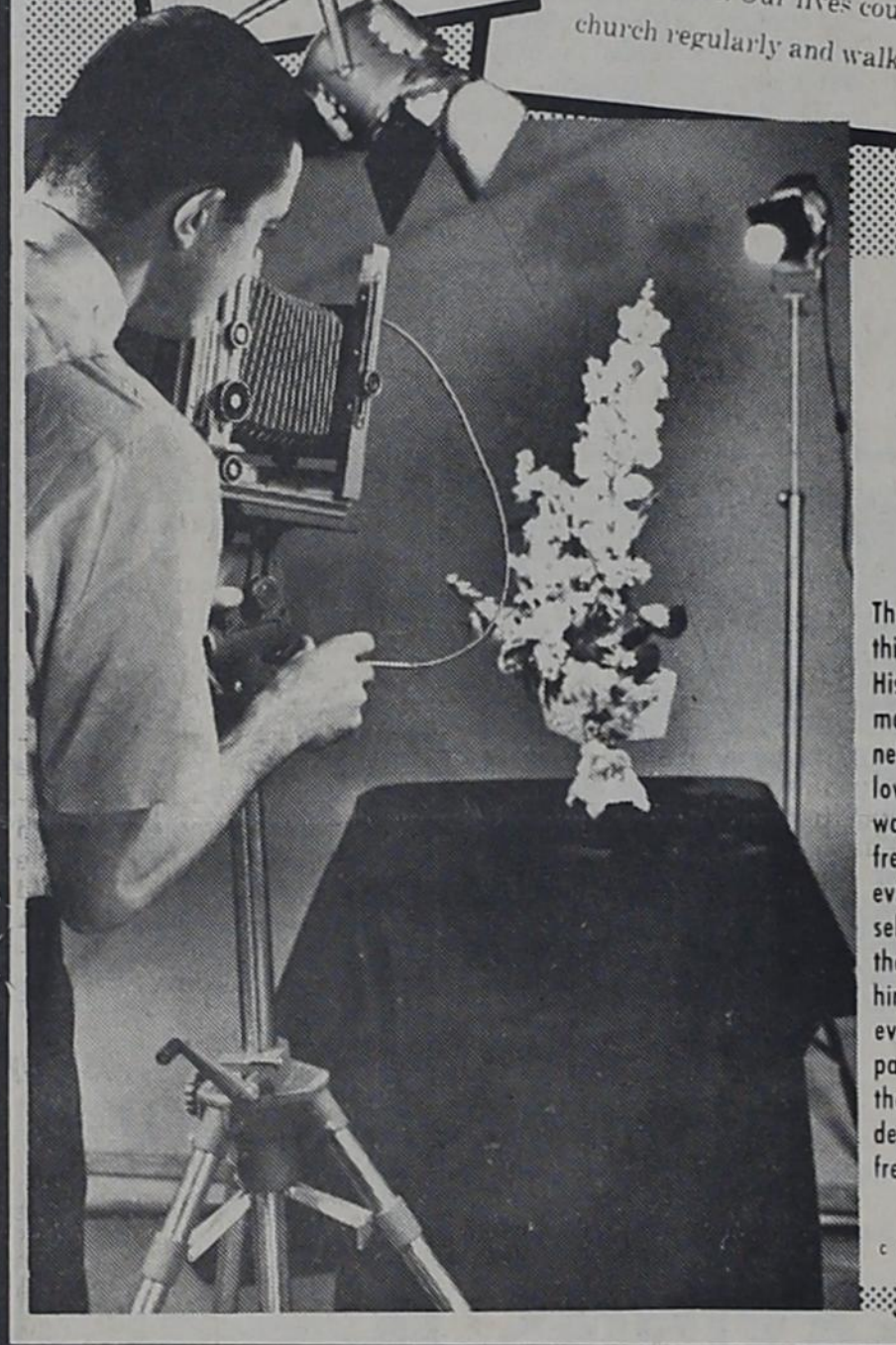

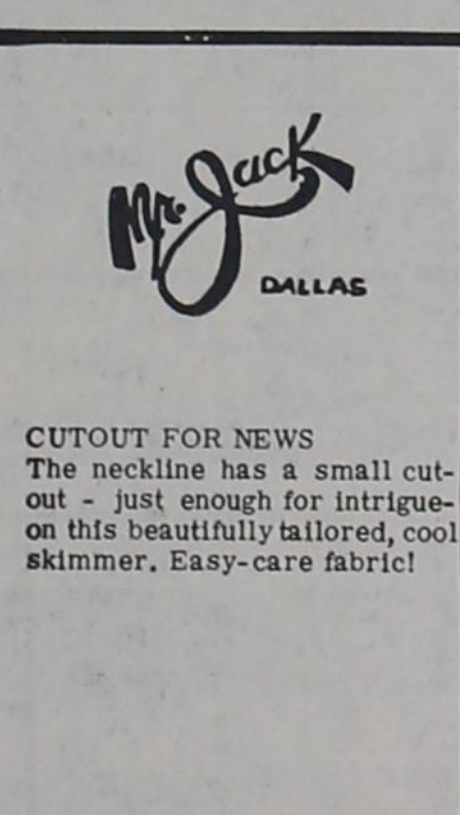

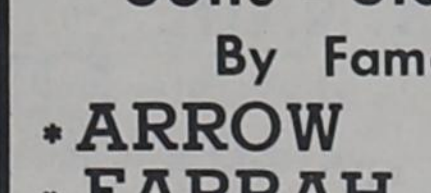

On The Farm In Parmer County

After last years round with greenbugs in grain sorghum everyone will be on the lookout for them in 1969. As a result of last years experience and research it is hoped that the information gathered will be beneficial in 1969.

A recent Texas Cooperative Economic Insect Report has reported greenbugs attacking grain sorghum in Denton, Grayson, Cook and Collins Counties.

Although damage was not serious in these areas, farmers in Parmer County should be on the alert to possible greenbug infestations. Recent rains received in the county the past few weeks have helped to reduce greenbug numbers on wheat, Johnsongrass and volunteer grain sorghum.

CONTROL OF GREENBUGS

The extent of greenbug damage in grain sorghum is dependent upon greenbug numbers, plant size and stage growth, moisture conditions, presence or absence of parasites and predators and plant vigor. Producers are cautioned to observe plant conditions closely and the development of greenbug numbers and damage. Damage from the seedling stage up to early

pre-boot often results in stand loss and plant death.

Plants from emergence up to about 6 inches in height, showing visible damage with colonies of greenbugs on the under leaf surface, should be treated. Research data from 1968 indicates that larger plants, up to the pre-boot stage, may tolerate more greenbugs. Large numbers of greenbug on this size plant should be controlled before any entire plant leaves are killed.

sized leaves, should be controlled.

The above general guides are based on the assumption that the greenbug buildup is occurring more rapidly than effective control by beneficial insects. Also, if a plant is undergoing stress, plants cannot support as many greenbugs without suffering yield reductions.
