Urban Growth Cuts Into AgriculturalLands

Urban growth in Texas is steadily cutting into the state's agricultural lands, a new USDA study indicates.

The conservation needs and land use inventory shows that during the decade of 1958-1967, agricultural land in Texas dropped by some 780,000 acres. This represents an area bigger than an average Texas coun-

The report shows that 500,-000 acres of this land went into urban and built-up areas; some went to federal uses; and a lesser amount went under water in ponds and reservoirs. For the nation, the ten-year

shift from agricultural lands totaled almost 15 million acres. The inventory also reveals that two out of three acres in Texas still need some form of soil and water conservation treatment. The figures came from county data prepared by state and federal agencies, then summarized by a state committee chaired by the Soil Con-


