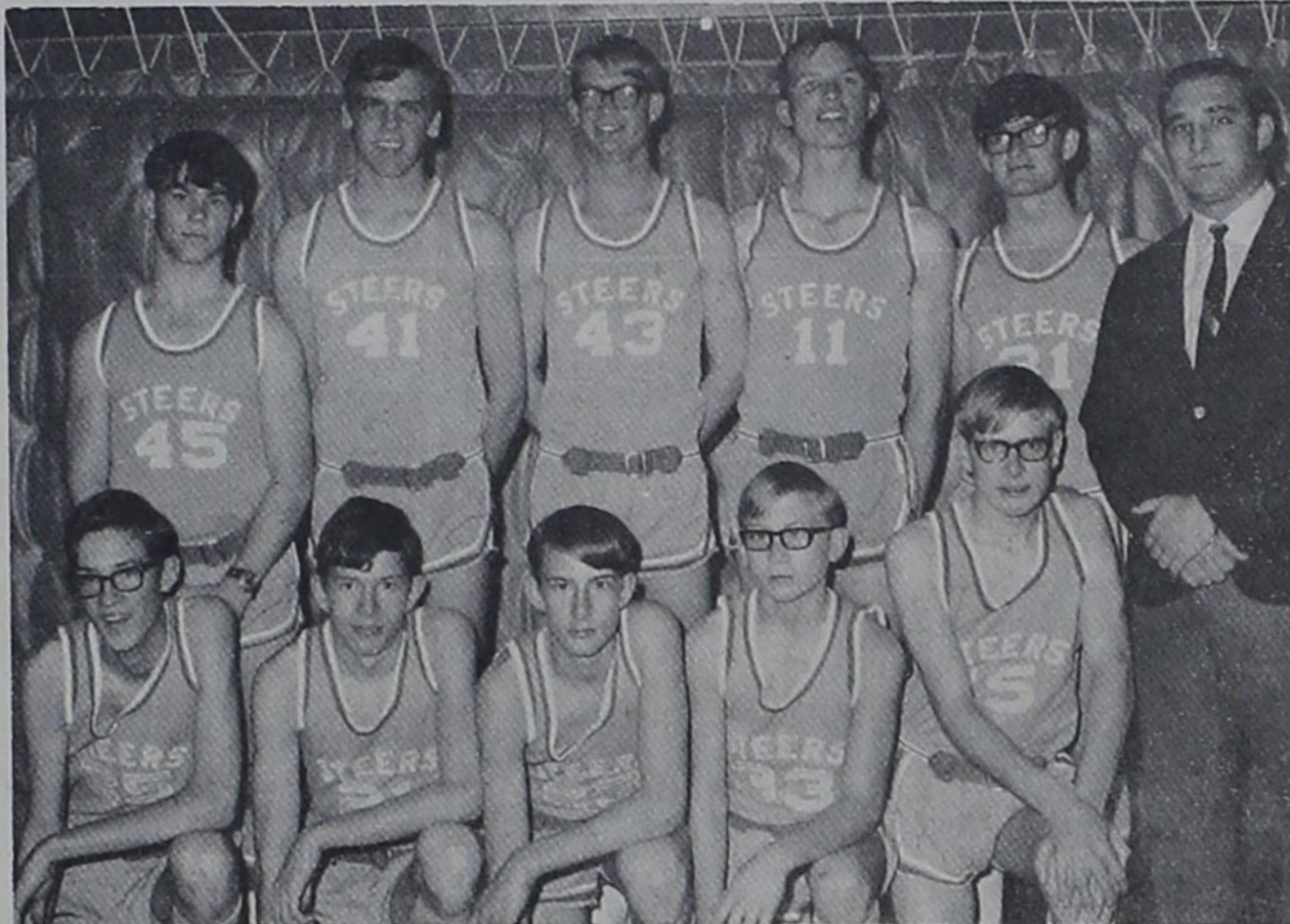

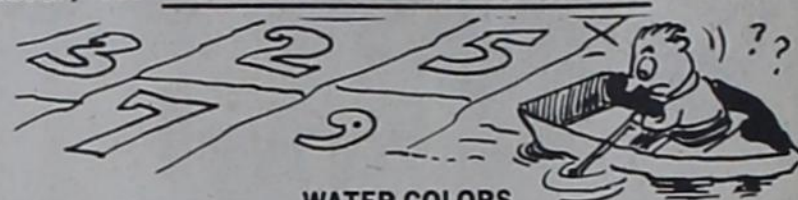
Conda Jones gave a report on the El Paso Stock Show and Mark Haseloff told members about the Farwell Stock Show. The treasurer's report was approved.

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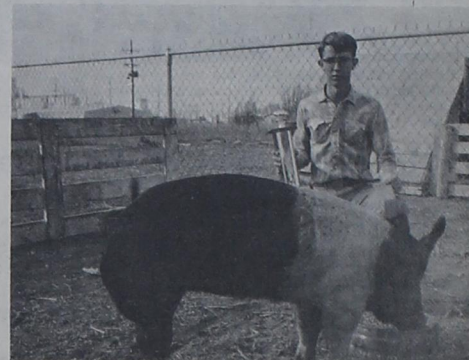

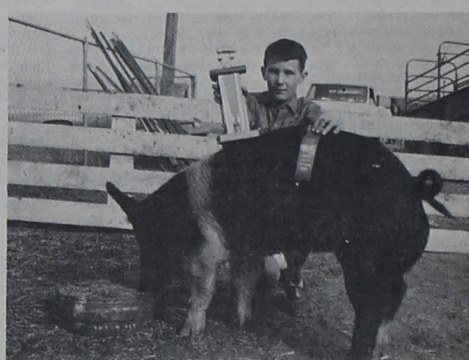

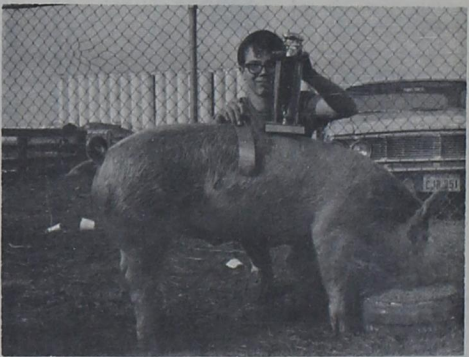

City Cracks Down On Violators

Texico town fathers met in a lengthy session last Tuesday in the final meeting for this group of commissioners. A town election is slated for March 3, at which time two commissioners will be chosen for four year terms and a mayor will be elected. Bill Christian, serving a two year term as a councilman, is running unopposed to succeed himself.

At the Tuesday meeting paving bonds numbers 66-70 were retired, a full six months before they were due. These were

the final paving bonds voted in 1959 for street improvement in Texico.

A building permit was issued to Contractor Bill Nance for an addition at Clara's Spur Restaurant. The police magistrate report in the amount of \$875 for the period January 13-February 9 was approved. The fines had been collected from livestock offenses, persons failing to comply with ordinance #151 (dogs running loose in the township) and for traffic violations. A lengthy discussion was held

on ways and means of getting several old buildings moved or destroyed. Attorney Harry Patton was instructed to find the proper ways of going about such a project and report back to the council at a future meeting. The swimming pool and its future operation were also discussed at great length.

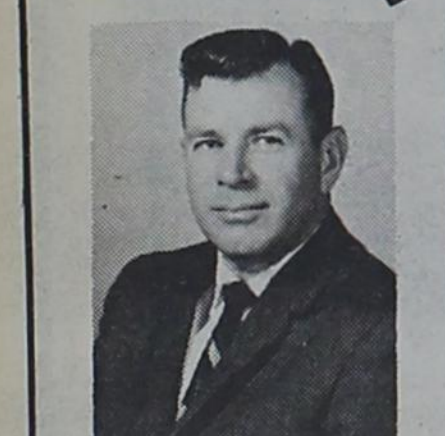

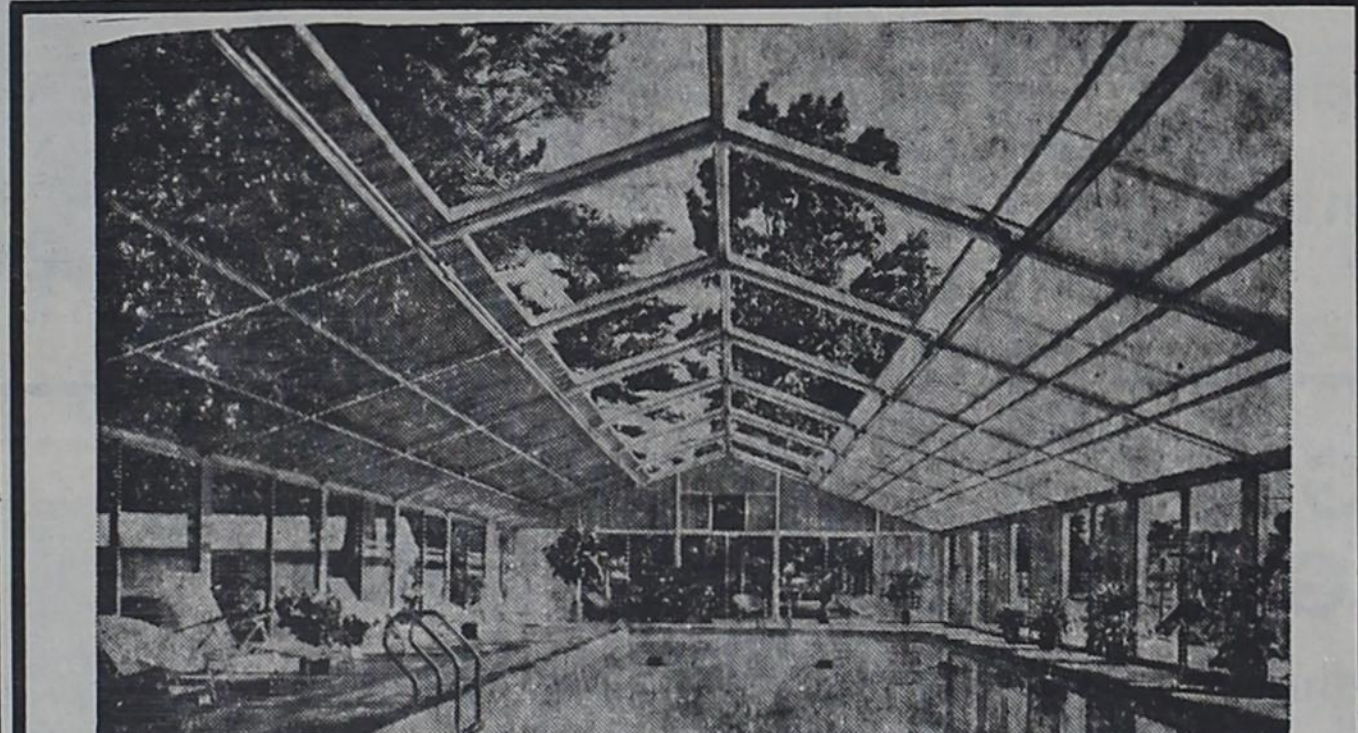

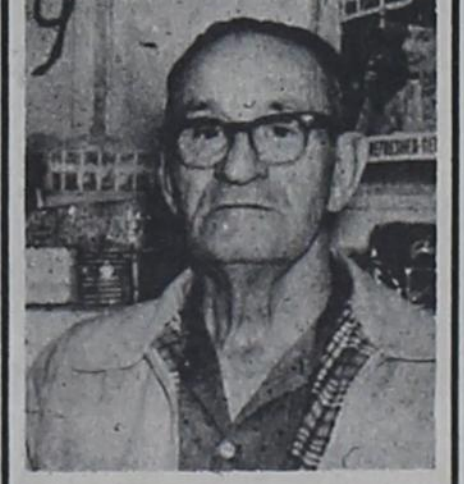
