

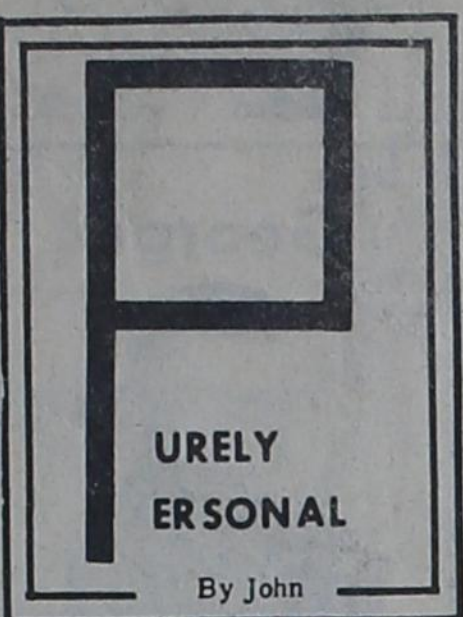

In today's society somebody is always graduating from something. Therefore, the availability of qualified graduation orators falls behind the demand. We surmise this is the reason for the popularity of certain politicians as droppers of pearly words of wisdom to the fledglings.

The graduate at a commencement exercise is under a great strain since this generally is the culmination of many years of toil and effort on his part, and he doesn't want to "blow it." Therefore, this tends to put the graduate at a disadvantage in being very much a captive audience for the exalted speaker.

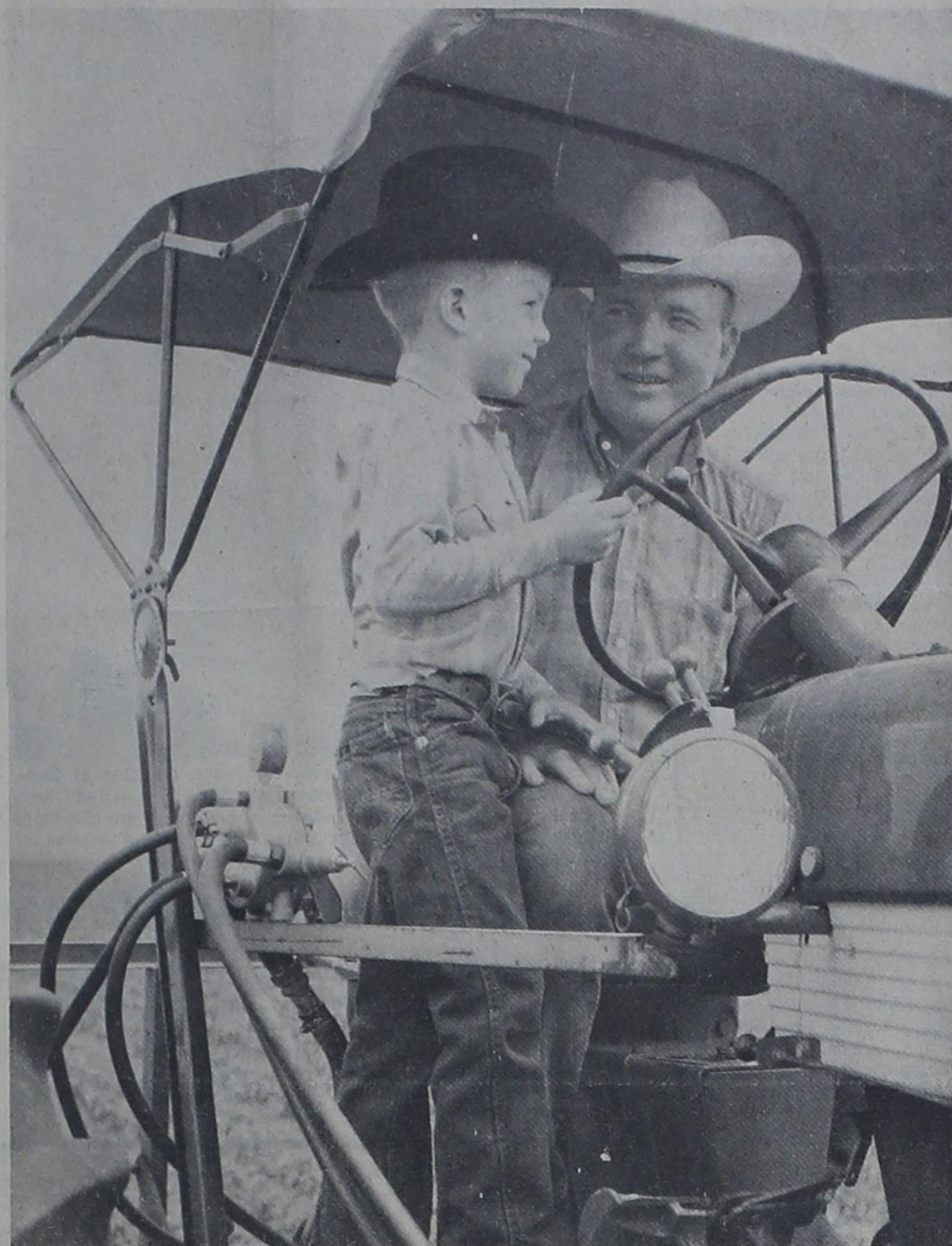
Many all-time legislative records toppled during this session. Certainly, the 61st session passed more legislation than any before it, and it was committed in advance to spending more money.

Some Hail Damage --

Wheat Harvest Approaches

Conditions during the past seven to 10 days have been ideal for rapid maturity of wheat fields over the county, according to Ronny McNutt, Parmer County agricultural agent. Some fields could be ready for harvest by the latter part of the week if weather conditions stay good.

The county agent says from all indications it looks like some

good wheat yields should be expected this year. In some areas of the county; however, where heavy damage has occurred from hail and rain little wheat will be harvested.

McNutt states that on the whole, this year has been a fairly decent wheat year. Most everyone sprayed for greenbugs at one time or another early in the spring. Rains in April and

May fell about the right time and in most cases one irrigation was saved. In some cases, two irrigations were saved as a result of the rains.

If the weather continues to cooperate, a good wheat harvest should be in full swing in the near future. The only blot on the picture is the low price of wheat.

Board Accepts Resignations, Hires Teachers

Resignations were accepted from two teachers at the meeting of the Farwell School Board Monday night and three teachers were hired. Resignations accepted were those of Mrs. Nelle Craig, who will be attending Texas Tech to work on her master's degree in special education; and Mike Billington, junior high school science teacher. M's. Craig recently was granted a fellowship from

Texas Tech to continue her studies. Billington is attending West Texas State University this summer.

John Scott, who has taught in the Olton School system for the past three years, has been hired to teach the new vocational agriculture unit which will begin at the school in the fall. Mrs. Eva Dean (Ivy) Stephens, who is teaching in Muleshoe, will

replace Billington as junior high science teacher, and Mrs. Billy Griggs will teach in the high school English department. Mrs. Griggs will complete degree requirements at Eastern New Mexico University this summer. She is a native of Portales and lives in Clovis.

The school is still in need of a special education teacher, an elementary teacher and a remedial reading teacher for junior high school, according to Supt. W. M. Roberts.

In other business the board made a decision to use Security State Bank as its depository for the next two years; set the tax rate at \$1.85 per \$100 valuation (same as last year); and scheduled the Board of Equalization meeting for July 7.

The Board of Equalization will meet from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. in the office of the school

superintendent on July 7. Members of the board will be announced later.

Local Men Participate In Tourney

Several local men participated in the second annual Texas Cattle Feeder's Association golf tournament in Muleshoe last week. Pike Jordan, playing on the Feeder's team was co-champion of the tourney with Dick Worley of Clovis. Their net score was 70 each.

Jordan and Worley were presented with individual trophies and also won the traveling trophy, donated by First National Bank in Muleshoe, for their team. In addition to Jordan other local men participating in the tourney were Bill Stone, Roy Snodgrass, and Jack Kirkland.

Two Injured --

Explosion Kills One, Damage Extensive

Extensive damage resulted and one life was lost in an explosion at Sherley-Anderson Elevator in Lazbuddie Friday afternoon. Two men were also injured in the accident and two others received physical checkups and then returned to work clearing away grain and debris to assist in locating the body of Cloys Stanberry, 31, who was killed in the explosion.

The hands of the clock stopped at 1:55 p.m. at the elevator as the explosion ripped the quiet of the little farming community. It was not until some five hours later that the body of Stanberry was found beneath some 20 feet of grain.

Injured were Jess Martinez, 41, with first and second degree burns, and Ascension Barjas, 50, who also suffered burns and a fractured leg. Barjas was transferred to Lubbock Methodist Hospital after receiving treatment in Muleshoe. The two men were cleaning out a grain tank when the explosion occurred, sending Stanberry to his death. The two men were in satisfactory condition Monday.

Stanberry, the elevator superintendent, was inside on the workroom floor at the time of the explosion.

Jarrell Pruitt and Frank McCamish, employees of the Bailey County Electric Co-op, were on the premises at the time of the explosion. Pruitt was seven or eight feet from the workroom floor when the explosion occurred. He was knocked to the floor and the hair around his face was singed by the resulting fire. Both men were given a physical checkup and then returned to assist in the recovery of the body of Stanberry.

A helicopter was summoned from Cannon Air Force Base at Clovis after it became apparent that smoke was coming out of the top of the elevator. The helicopter landed twice on top of the elevator after taking up firefighting equipment and the fire was extinguished.

Officers investigating the accident theorized that the explosion was touched off when Stanberry flipped a switch in the workroom of the elevator. The air was filled with highly combustible grain dust and a spark from the switch is believed to have triggered the explosion.

The force of the explosion ripped one side out of the 300-foot elevator and also scattered debris, piercing the side of a house some 200 feet away. It also demolished a cinder block



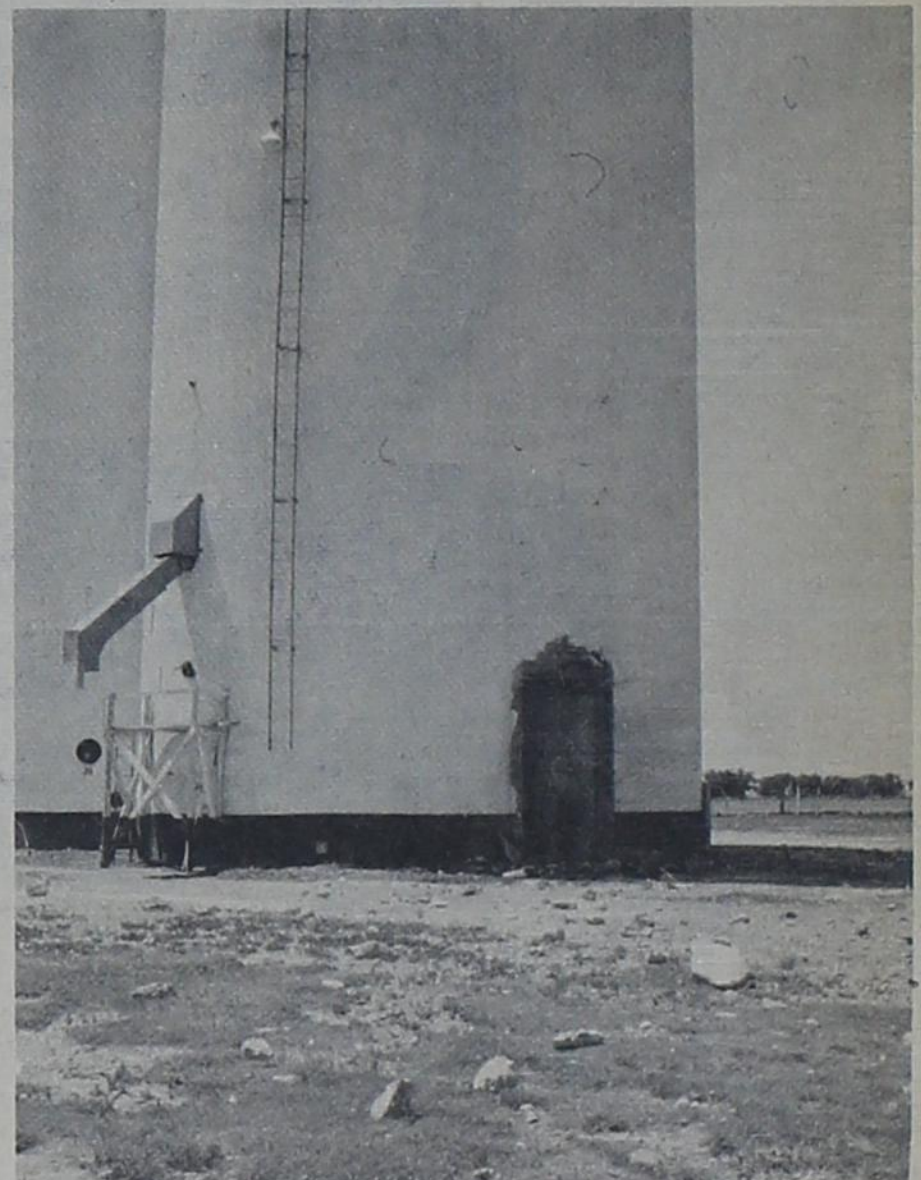

fence at the house, occupied by Joe Moore, elevator manager, who was absent at time of the explosion. The house was unoccupied at the time.

As late as Monday morning no damage estimate was available, according to G. D. Anderson, co-owner of the elevator. He stated that it would be several days before an accurate estimate of the damage could be ascertained.

Stanberry was a native of Danville, Ark., and had lived in the Lazbuddie area for the past seven years and had been employed at the elevator during that time. He had previously lived in Bovina and worked at Sherley Grain Co.

Survivors include his wife, Carolyn; two daughters, Deborah and Kay; two sons, Terry and Robbie, all of the home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thogal Stanberry, Bovina; four brothers, Buford, Dean Harold and Danny, all of Bovina; a sister, Brenda Stanberry, also of Bovina; and his grandfather, W. A. McCormick, also of Bovina. Funeral services were conducted Sunday from the Lazbuddie Baptist Church for the accident victim.

At Home In Parmer County

WHAT'S IN STORE FOR JUNE? Foodwise, there will be lots of milk and dairy products. According to the USDA, June is when milk production reaches its peak. So there will be lots of butter, cream, cheese and yogurt. Other plentiful foods you may want to watch for are canned tomatoes, canned and frozen sweet corn, rice and turkeys.

TIPS ON SERVING ICED TEA Refrigerating tea may cause it to cloud. So keep it at room temperature until you are ready to serve. If the tea does cloud, add a little boiling water. This will restore the clear amber color.

off the surface growth of mildew. A stain may remain on the clothing. If this happens, launder the washable clothes at once. It is also important to rinse the clothing well and dry in the sun. Sometimes stains will remain after washing. If this happens, dip white cotton, rayon or linen in a diluted solution of chlorine bleach. Then rinse the garments thoroughly and dry in the sun. Before using the diluted bleach solution on colored fabrics, it is a good idea to test it on a sample of the cloth.

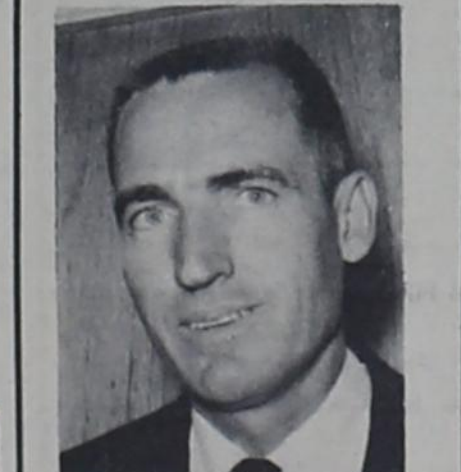
