

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

## Parmer Has 3405 Voters

For the 1970 election year, Parmer County has a total of 3,405 registered voters, according to figures registered by the office of County Tax Assessor-Collector Hugh Moseley with the Secretary of State.

The 3,405 figure gave Parmer a registration percentage of 78.85, according to an announcement from the State Democratic Executive Committee in Austin. Parmer County's percentage of voter registration ranked

it next to last in a group of 41 counties in the state which are similar in population.

The figures were announced as a result of a statewide project, "Operation: Everybody!", to encourage voter registration by setting a quota for each county, based on the estimated number of persons 21 or older. Counties were grouped by size into 10 categories.

Top county in Parmer's group was Burnet, in central Texas, which had a percentage of 148.21.




