

A lot of the "silent majority" in Parmer County have apparently chosen to remain silent. The most effective way for a citizen to properly register his protest against bureaucratic officials is to take an active part in politics. This also includes voting. BUT, in order to vote, one must register periodically as the rules require. In Parmer County, only 3,405 voters registered this year.

This puts us in one of the lowest brackets as far as percentage of registration goes. A poor, poor showing on the part of the county residents. This is even more calamitous because Statewide there were registered almost 80,000 more voters than in the 1968 presidential election year.

Metropolitan area county registration rose dramatically accounted for 650,612 of the votes. Dallas had 466,925 and Bexar 260,225.

This means that Parmer County draws LESS political weight than a minor precinct in Houston. This means that the traditionally block liberal votes of the big cities will elect their candidates and thereby assure themselves of programs for their benefit and most probably to our detriment. Politics is a game of groups and pressures. The conservative voters of our county have lost the race without even getting out of the starting gate.

We will admit that even another 2,000 or more votes from Parmer County would be very insignificant compared to Houston, but as a matter of political survival, every eligible voter in the county should have busted a hamestring to register. Tut, tut, don't say you did not know. The Assessor's office ran big ads in all three county newspapers, and each paper editorially supported registration; therefore, we can only assume that many of the High Plains residents are like Rhett Butler: frankly, they just didn't give a da--.




TourneyNets\$150 For Booster Club

History of Future Homemakers of America

This year marks the 25th anniversary of the founding of Future Homemakers of America as a national youth organization in vocational education, co-related with the home economics education program.

The signing of the first National Vocational Education Act by President Woodrow Wilson brought into being federally-supported, state-conducted programs of vocational education which included home economics. Through home economics education the foundation was laid for the development of Future Homemakers of America as an integral part of the program.

An outgrowth of various state and local high school home economics clubs known by different names, Future Homemakers of America was founded June 11, 1945 as an incorporated, non-profit national organization for home economics students in junior and senior high schools, both public and private.

Members of The American Home Economics Association and the Home Economics Education Staff of the U.S. Office of Education took the lead in forming this national organization to provide an opportunity for all home economics clubs to combine efforts in working together on improved home and family living on a national scale.

Kentucky was the first State Association to affiliate with the national organization. By the end of the first year, membership had almost doubled and national offices had been moved into the U.S. Office of Education.

Future Homemakers of America begin their twenty-fifth year with 604,000 members in 12,000 local high school chapters. The record shows affiliated associations in all 50 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and The Virgin Islands-and affiliated chapters in American Schools located in Germany, Japan, Iran, and The Canal Zone.

In its twenty-five years of existence Future Homemakers of America has served more than fifteen million high school youth.


