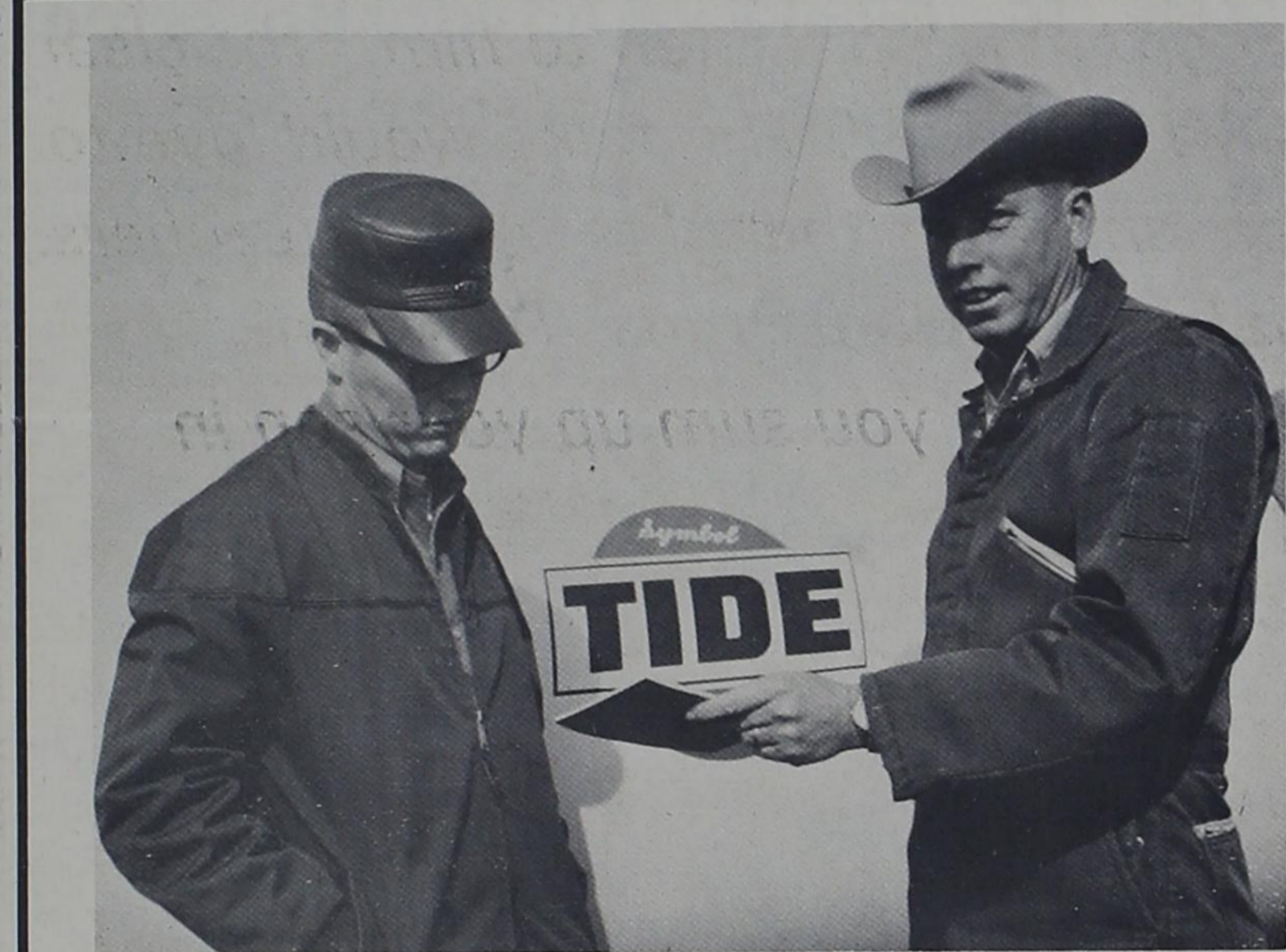
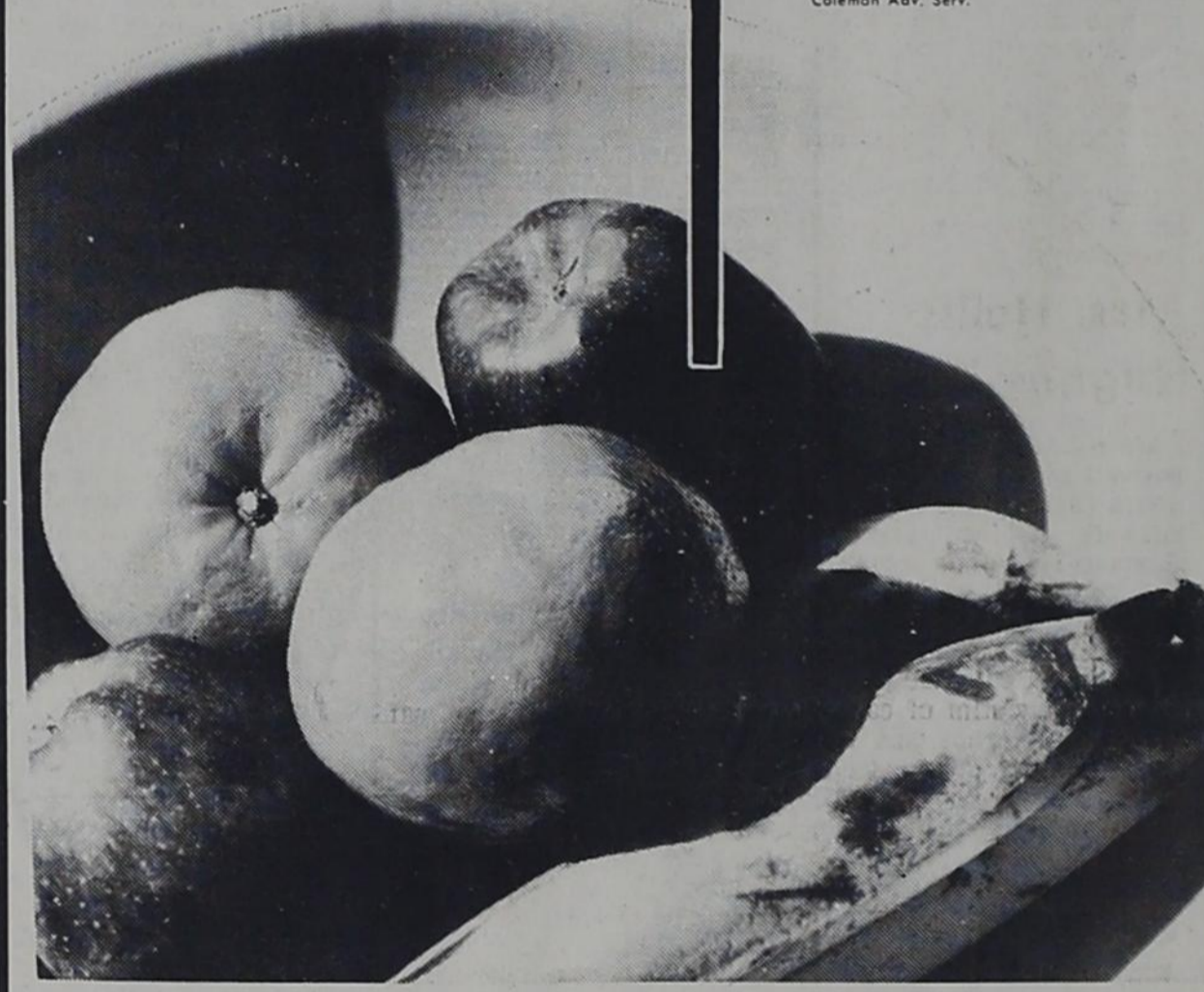

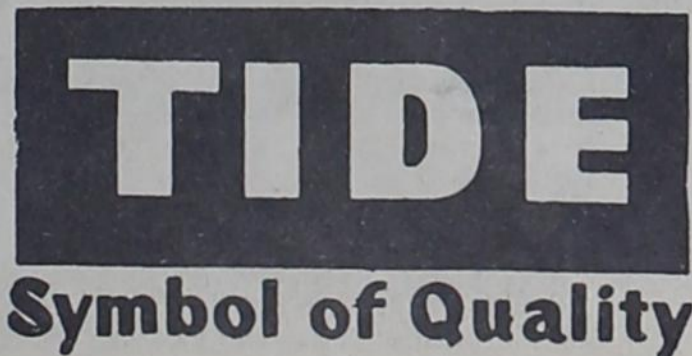

Contracts Renewed, School Calendar Set

At a recent meeting of the Farwell School board the contracts of principals James Craig, junior high school; Jack Williams, elementary; and Amos Tatum, high school; were renewed for another year. In addition, the contracts of athletic director and head football coach Toby Booth; basketball coach Vernon Scott; and girls coach Gayle Nicholas, were also renewed.

The board issued an order calling for the election of two school trustees at an election on April 5, with Albert Smith as election judge. Smith is to select his clerks for the election.

All persons who wish to have their names appear on the ballot as candidates for the trustee spots have until March 4 to file. Blanks for

this purpose may be picked up at the superintendent's office or from the school secretary. Persons whose names were selected for the two trustee positions by the nominating committee are Harry Sheets, incumbent, and Donald Watkins. Smokey Gast, the other person with an expiring term, did not choose to seek re-election.

The board also set the school calendar for 1969-70. School will begin on August 25 and be out on May 22. First holiday of the year will be the Thanksgiving vacation on Nov. 27-28. Christmas holidays will be Dec. 19-Jan. 5. School will be out on March 7 for the district teachers meeting and will be dismissed March 26-31 for the Easter holidays.

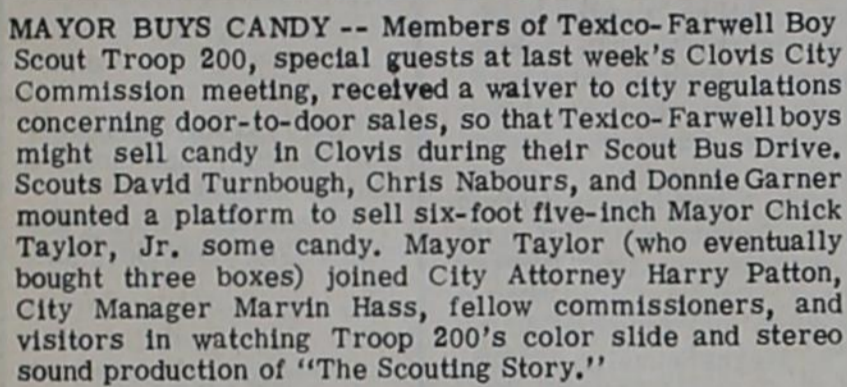

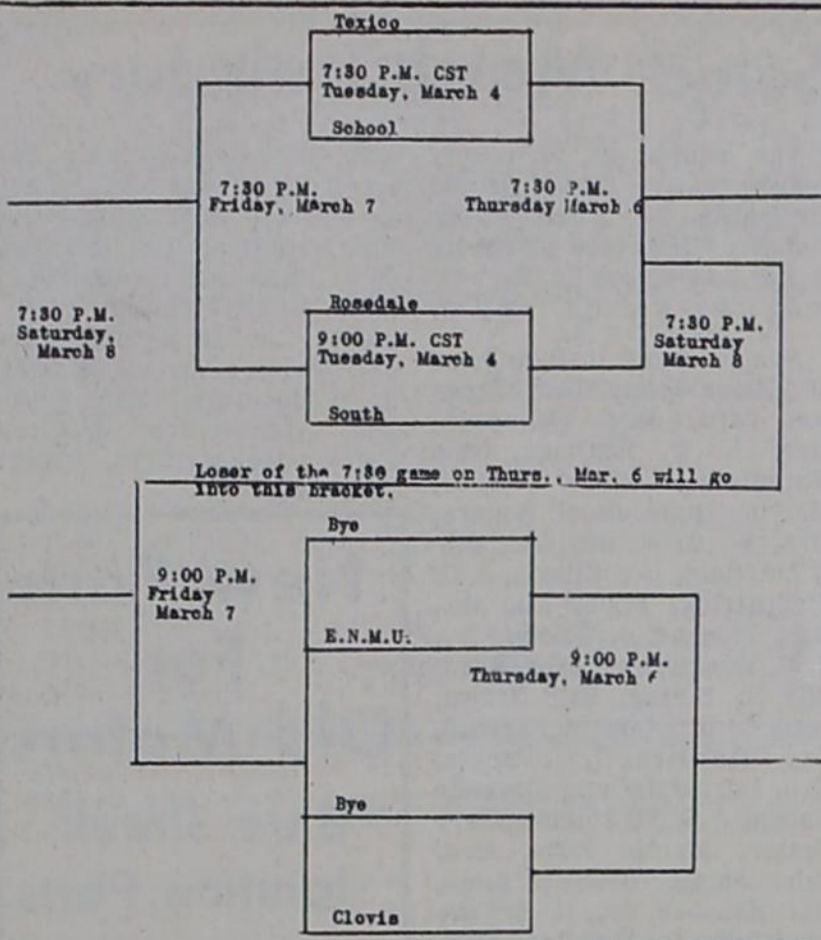

Bookmobile Brings Good Reading To Many

A total of 65,992 books have been checked out by Parmer County readers since the bookmobile (traveling library) first began servicing the area in April 1964. In the Farwell area alone 12,098 books have been checked out, according to Lorene Sooter, librarian.

Miss Sooter states that many persons who might be using the library are not doing so since they do not realize that it is available for schools and other groups to check out large numbers of books for their use, as well as for individual readers.

The bookmobile makes one stop in Farwell each month and in November it made two stops in Farwell. During October, 97 books were checked out by local persons while in November, 205 books were checked out locally. In December, 94 books were checked out by local readers.

In addition to Farwell, the bookmobile stops at Friona twice each month, and at Lazbuddie, White Elevator, Clays Corner, Hub, Black, Rhea, Oklahoma Lane, Bovina and Lariat, one time monthly.

Largest number of books checked out at a single stop has been #2 at Friona where 12,987 books have been checked out in the five-year period. Bovina has checked out 11,191 books; Rhea, 2117; Black, 2817; Lazbuddie, 9165; Hub, 1662; Whites Elevator, 1156; Friona #1, 9117; Lariat, 1473; and Oklahoma Lane, 968.

Texico Fire Marshal Don Caillouet stated early this week that the town of Texico is in the No. 8 class in the fire insurance rate due to its present grading by inspectors from the Santa Fe office. The town lacks only a minimum of 192 points to be in the No. 7 class which would lower insurance rates by an additional five per cent.

"One of the ways this can be done," says Caillouet, "is for all residents to pay their 25¢ fee for fire protection each month." In the near future the department is to receive a new fire truck for use in the town, bringing their equipment up to a higher standard.

Points of deficiency on which the town is graded are water supply, fire department, fire alarm, fire prevention, building department, structural conditions, divergencies, and climatic conditions.

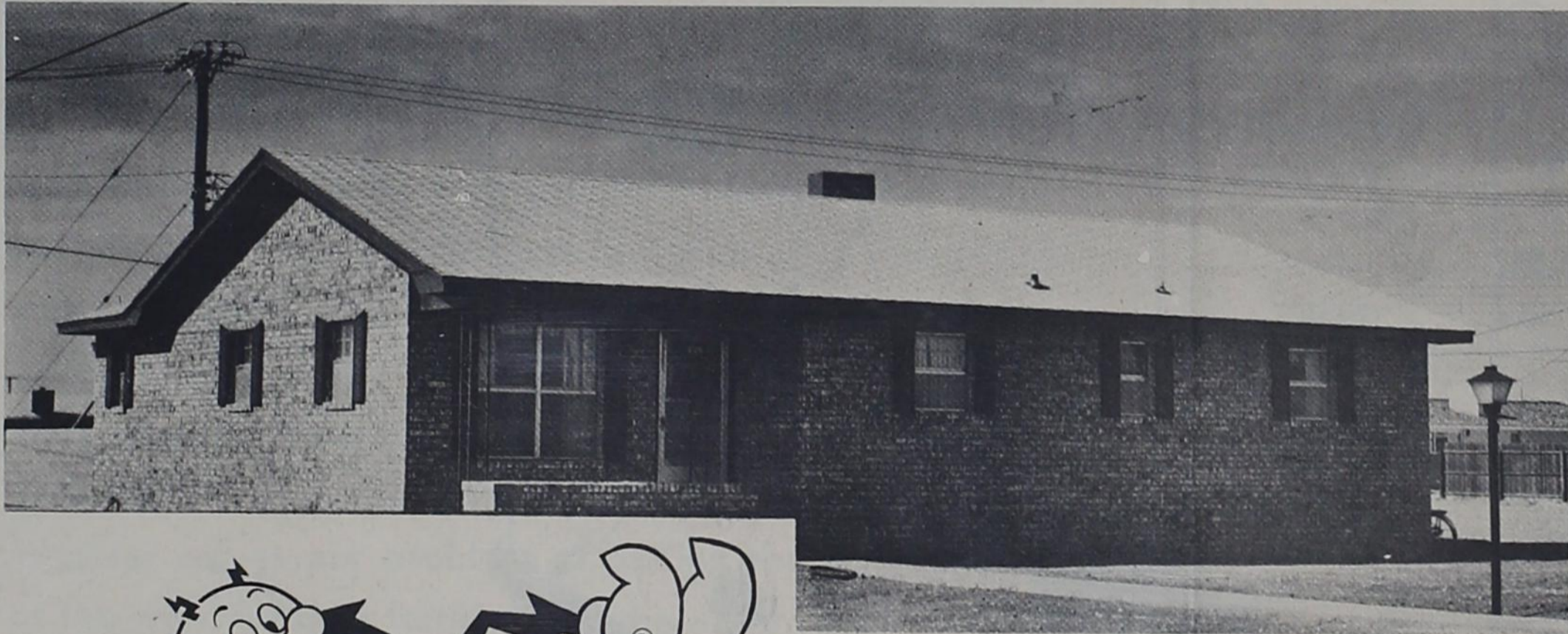

Accident Injuries A. L. Tandy

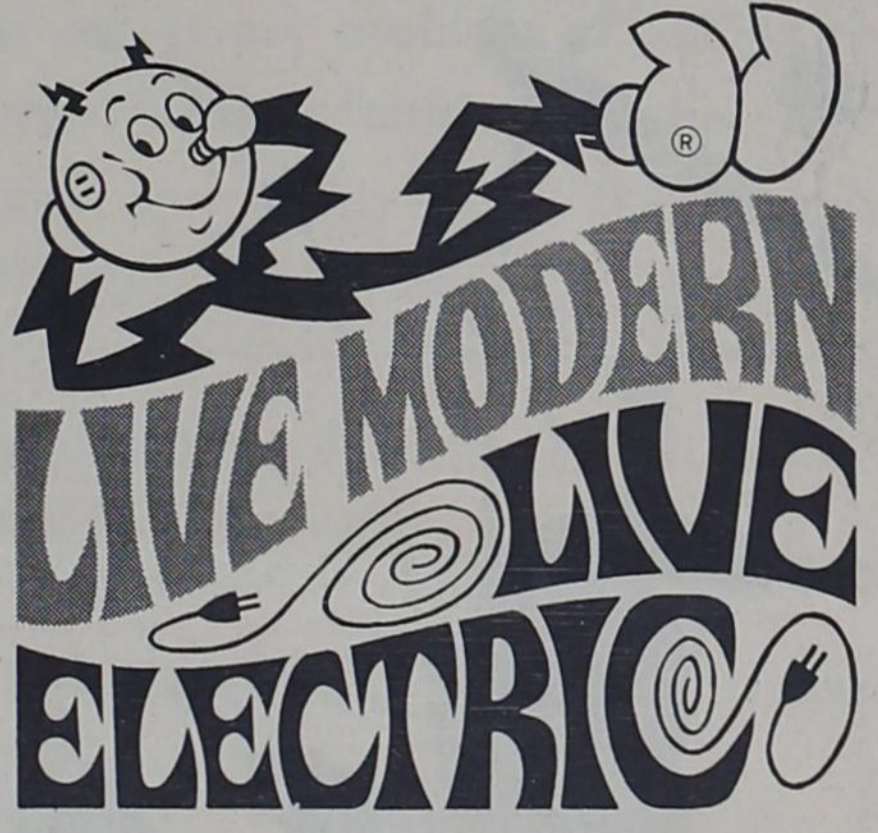

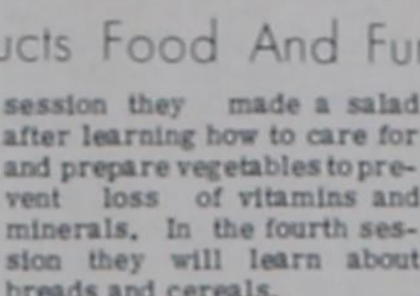
ALMOND WAFFLES WITH PEACHES AND SOUR CREAM

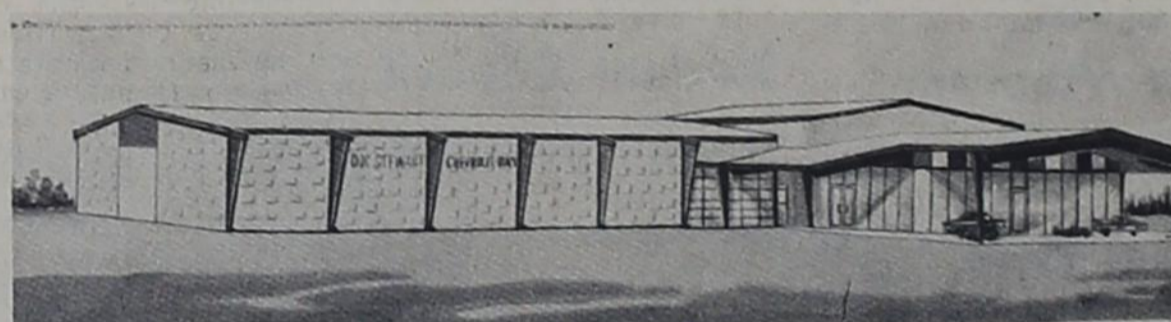

from the ground or a short ladder. The basic principles needed to produce fruit can be achieved by both methods. Peach, for example, can be trimmed to make a tree that branches out six feet above the ground, one which then has its top pruned to produce fruit. Another method can be employed--at the start--and the peach is branched near the ground and thus the fruit is easily picked while standing on the ground or on a short ladder.

Another basic fact that we must pay close attention to is the wood that produces fruit. Some plants bloom on second year wood where others bloom on first wood. Trees that are trimmed to establish a good skeleton or support have very little trouble supporting their fruit. Trimmed to produce weak forks and improper scapolds, the tree will tend to break, split or otherwise suffer damage.

We have, for years, selected trees for the most production that we can obtain. Then, to trim out some of the productions seems silly, but actually, it is another way of adapting plants to do what we want them to.

On The Farm In Palmer County

BE ON LOOKOUT FOR LICE

It costs money to feed cattle lice. These parasites are among the most damaging to beef cattle.

Cattle infested with lice spend a lot of time rubbing against fences, posts or other objects due to the annoyance caused by the insects. Cattle on feed do not gain as they should and require more feed.

Infested cows lose weight and their calves become prime targets for the pests. Reduced weaning weights of calves is another spot that hits the pocketbook.

Cattle lice are common over the entire state and include both the biting and sucking types. Their populations build up rapidly during cool weather and when cattle are kept in close quarters.

Sucking lice, short and long nosed, pierce the animal's skin and feed by sucking blood. They are usually found on the sides of the animal's neck, on the brisket, back, inner surface of the thighs, tail, and around the nose, eyes and ears. Chewing lice are smaller and are usually found on top of the animal's body.

Many chemicals are available for controlling lice as well as other external parasites of farm livestock. Because of restrictions and safety suggestions which apply to the use of chemicals, the county agent invites stockmen to come by the office and pick up a copy of MP-691, "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry."

SOME UP, SOME DOWN

There were more cattle, hogs and turkeys on Texas farms and ranches January 1, 1969, than a year ago but fewer sheep, goats and chickens, reported the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Cattle numbers were up 5%; turkeys 6%; while sheep numbers were down 7%; goats 18% and chickens 10%. Total value of livestock and poultry on January 1 was placed at \$1,696.8 million, 12% above a year ago.

PREDATOR CONTROL MEETING

As a result of an increasing number of requests for assistance and information on controlling some of the major predatory animals in the county a county-wide meeting has been set for Thursday, Feb. 27.

This meeting will begin at 2 p.m. in the Hub Community Center. A representative from the Fish & Wildlife Department from Lubbock will explain and demonstrate the proper material and equipment needed to control these predators. This representative will also have a supply of poison grain for individuals interested in purchasing for predator control.

The major emphasis will be put on the control of prairie dogs, coyotes, and rats.

Anyone interested in controlling predatory animals is invited to attend the meeting.
