





Strawberry Ice Cream Is All-American As July 4

This year, serve an all-American treat on the fourth of July - strawberry ice cream, says Mae Martha Johnson, Extension food and nutrition specialist at New Mexico State University. Strawberries and ice cream are both "native Americans."

Regardless of how many wild strawberries the English may claim, there was not a single strawberry plant in all of Great Britian before the discovery of America. In fact, England didn't get strawturies all over the world, ice cream as we know it today is American, says the specialist. Ice cream was made in the homes of George Washington, Thomas Jefferson and Alexander Hamilton.

After 1846, when the hand cranked-portable freezer was invented, Americans were enjoying ice cream regularly. Commercial ice cream was available five years later and ice cream sodas were invented in Philadelphia in 1874. The early 1900s brought the ice Morris family as an exchange

July 1 For Ranch Tours

SAN ANGELO - Today (July 1) is the tour registration deadline for four ranch tours that conclude the 3rd Annual International Ranchers Roundup (IRR). The IRR is August 1-5 at the San Angelo Convention Center in this West Texas ranching hub.

Ranchers who participate in the tours will see top-flight beef cattle, sheep and goat, grazing management, and wildlife operations. Air-conditioned, full comfort tour buses will be utilized, but due to seating limitations, only the first 100 persons who register by July 1 can participate in each tour.

Complete details concerning ranch tours, concurrent sessions, and registration forms. for the IRR can be obtained from county agricultural Extension agents. A detailed handbook describing each ranching operation visited on each tour will be provided in registration packets.

Three of the tours - beef, range, sheep and goats - leave the Convention Center at 7:30 a.m. on August 5, and return late that afternoon after visiting specialized ranching operations in the San Angelo area. The wildlife tour departs at 3 p.m. on August 4, makes an overnight stop in Kerrville, and returns to San Angelo the following evening.

Rancher practices for herd improvement utilizing performance testing records, palpation, heat synchronization, A.I., and embryo transfer will be seen during the beef cattle tour. Extensive cattle grazing and the Savory Grazing Method in relation to cattle

ing, supplemental feeding, and innovative marketing for improving profit potential will also be explored.

> Area sheep and goat producers will explain their total ranch program including procedures for selection and breeding, supplemental feeding and minerals, lamb creep feeding, and grazing programs. Animal husbandry and health programs will be discussed as well as animal handling under the Savory

Grazing Method. Superb pen and shed facilities for lambing and early weaning will be visited along with combination grazing with cattle and range practices to improve sheep and

goat production. Participants on the range tour will see short duration, cell grazing and the Savory Method. Holistic ranch management, grazing decisions, double stocking rate, and costs of establishment and returns will provide an on-the-ground view of accomplishments and problems that can occur.

Range improvement methods including root plowing, seeding, spraying, chaining and prescribed burning will be seen along the tour route. The development of necessary facilities including electric fencing and specially designed cell centers to facilitate animal movement and handling are featured.

Wildlife tour participants will travel through the heart of the scenic Edwards Plateau deer country visiting native and exotic wildlife management areas. Dinner is provided at Whiskey Canyon Ranch near Kerrville followed by a visit of

After an overnight stay in Kerrville, the tour proceeds to Gillespie County to see other progressive Hill Country ranches where white-tail deer

is aggressively marketed.

Another stop is scheduled at the Kerr Wildlife Management Area where the different range management practices needed to produce good livestock and wildlife can be observed. Another management perspective on white-tail deer versus exotic game utilization can be obtained before buses depart for San Angelo.







HEALTH ALERT - DON'T BE A HEAT-STROKE VICTIM

Don't become a heat stroke victim during Texas' hot summer months. Know the warning signs -- and take action!

People most likely affected are older persons, the obese, the very young, alcoholics, and people suffering from chronic diseases.

First, know the WARNING SIGNS.

When it's too hot, people can suffer heat exhaustion or heat stroke. Heat stroke will kill, if you don't take immediate action. Heat exhaustion, on the other hand, usually is not life threatening.

*HEAT STROKE - Warning signs are reddened skin, fiery hot to the touch and DRY. The victim is obviously feverish but NO LONGER PERSPIRING. The victim might be disoriented - or possibly unconscious. Most heat stroke victims collapse. Heat stroke victims can be suffering body temperatures up to and over 108 degrees F., because in cases of heat stroke, the body's normal cooling mechanisms have quit functioning.

*HEAT EXHAUSTION --Warning signs are pale skin that is cool and moist to the touch, and the body temperature is about normal. The victim might be disoriented. A few heat-exhaustion victims do become unconscious and col-

to the necessary rapid cooling of the body, the victim may go into shock, and that can affect

breathing. Heat-stroke victims should be hospitalized and observed for several days -- in case there might be kidney or nerve

damage. Early treatment of heat exhaustion involves moving the victim to a cool spot and trying to get him to drink cool fluids, such as water of lemonade.

Also, loosen or remove clothing, and cool him off by bathing with cool water. Usually the person will feel better promptly, but if he seems tired, or if he is elderly or has a chronic disease, make

sure he sees a doctor. Preventing heat exhaustion and heat stroke usually can be achieved by following some simple, common-sense precautions.
