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## Sheran Smallwood Attends Bluebonnet Girls State

Sheran Smallwood, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Barnabas Smallwood, represented Farwell High School at the Bluebonnet Girls State session in Seguin, Tex., June 14-24. Upon her arrival in Seguin, Sheran was appointed to the State Senate as well as being assigned her room. During the first day there, the girls got

acquainted with the rules and regulations of Girls State, and engaged in other activities, including writing home.

Sheran was a citizen of City K, in Tejas County. The 567 girls attending were divided into 12 cities and six counties, with each level of government represented.

During the time spent in learning the functions of government and the procedures for elections, Sheran ran for the position of Tejas County Clerk for the Nationalist Party. She was defeated in the county election after having participated in the preparation and presentation of a speech explaining her concept of the office, and telling about herself.

As a member of the Senate, Sheran took part in debating and voting on such bills as amendments to the child rape laws; the prohibiting of open alcohol containers in vehicles; the requirement of motorcycle riders to wear helmets; the lowering of the legal intoxication level to .05 percent;

Also to raise the standard of the GED; a requirement for all fire escapes to be inspected yearly; a requirement for inspection points for cattle coming into Texas; and a bill to teach sex education in the 5th, 7th, and 10th grades.

As part of their training, the girls carried out the duties of their individual offices in the official state offices in Austin.

As part of their induction to the office and training, each girl was escorted into the rotunda in the state capitol by their official state counterpart. Upon being escorted into the room, the state

officials then swore the girls into office, having spent time explaining the duties, responsibilities, and limitations of each office.

In other activities, the girls sang and made a recording in the rotunda of the capitol. The record will be sent to those who have ordered it within the next few weeks, Sheran said.

Many of the girls also attended mock trials on the district, county, and state levels, with some of the spectators participating in the trials.

Also scheduled during the ten days were several guest speakers, including Marjorie Wilhelm, J.D., Attorney, Super visiting the Council of Litigation, Conoco Inc., Houston, who spoke on the study of the judiciary; and Governor Mark White spoke at the capitol about inauguration.

Also speaking were State Treasurer of Texas, Mrs. Ann Richards; George Strake, former Secretary of State of Texas and now chairman of the Republican Party; and Carole Keeton McClellan, former president of Austin Independent School District, and mayor of the City of Austin.

"I never learned so much in 10 days. I really wouldn't have missed it. It was a good learning experience," says Sheran.

The purpose of the association is to provide a formal structure for the cooperation of pork producers in the area, explained Dr. Robert S. Cohen, swine specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Lubbock.

Its objectives include encouraging efficient pork production, promoting consumption of pork and pork products, improving the quality of pork and pork products, recommending and supporting herd health programs; developing educational programs and methods for producers and consumers, encouraging scientific research, and representing pork producers through the state association in legislative and regulatory matters.



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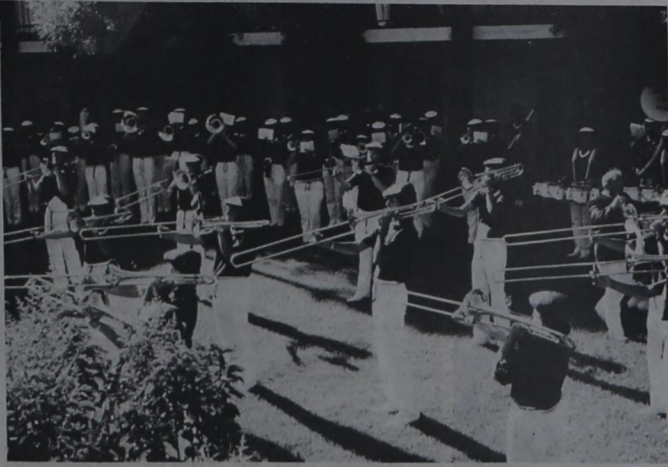
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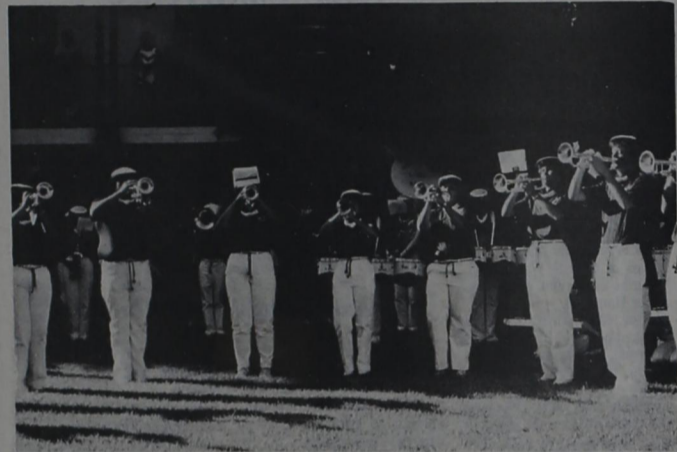

The Texico-Farwell Lions Club again sponsored two students this year, Geretta Hutchins of Farwell and Jesse Garcia of Texico.

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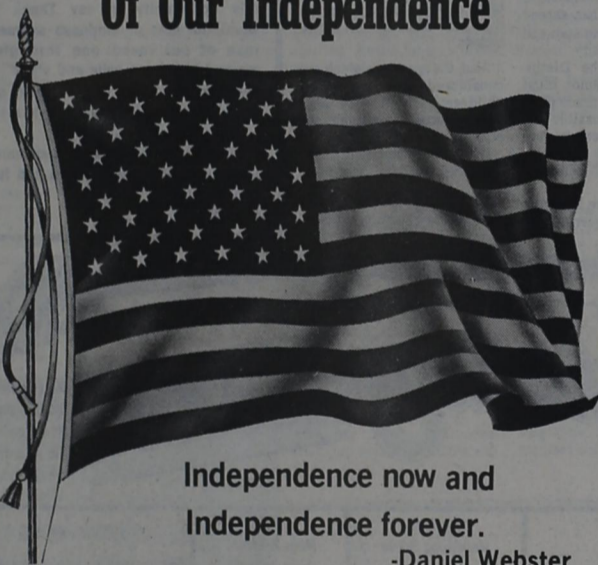

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# Registration Deadline Is July 1 For Ranch Tours

SAN ANGELO - Today (July 1) is the tour registration deadline for four ranch tours that conclude the 3rd Annual International Ranchers Round-up (IRR). The IRR is August 1-5 at the San Angelo Convention Center in this West Texas ranching hub.

Ranchers who participate in the tours will see top-flight beef cattle, sheep and goat, grazing management, and wildlife operations. Air-conditioned, full comfort tour buses will be utilized, but due to seating limitations, only the first 100 persons who register by July 1 can participate in each tour.

Complete details concerning ranch tours, concurrent sessions, and registration forms for the IRR can be obtained from county agricultural Extension agents. A detailed handbook describing each ranching operation visited on each tour will be provided in registration packets.

Three of the tours - beef, range, sheep and goats - leave the Convention Center at 7:30 a.m. on August 5, and return late that afternoon after visiting specialized ranching operations in the San Angelo area. The wildlife tour departs at 3 p.m. on August 4, makes an overnight stop in Kerrville, and returns to San Angelo the following evening.

Rancher practices for herd improvement utilizing performance testing records, palpation, heat synchronization, A.I., and embryo transfer will be seen during the beef cattle tour. Extensive cattle grazing and the Savory Grazing Method in relation to cattle handling, performance, breed-

ing, supplemental feeding, and innovative marketing for improving profit potential will also be explored.

Area sheep and goat producers will explain their total ranch program including procedures for selection and breeding, supplemental feeding and minerals, lamb creep feeding, and grazing programs. Animal husbandry and health programs will be discussed as well as animal handling under the Savory Grazing Method. Superb pen and shed facilities for lambing and early weaning will be visited along with combination grazing with cattle and range practices to improve sheep and goat production.

Participants on the range tour will see short duration, cell grazing and the Savory Method. Holistic ranch management, grazing decisions, double stocking rate, and costs of establishment and returns will provide an on-the-ground view of accomplishments and problems that can occur.

Range improvement methods including root plowing, seeding, spraying, chaining and prescribed burning will be seen along the tour route. The development of necessary facilities including electric fencing and specially designed cell centers to facilitate animal movement and handling are featured.

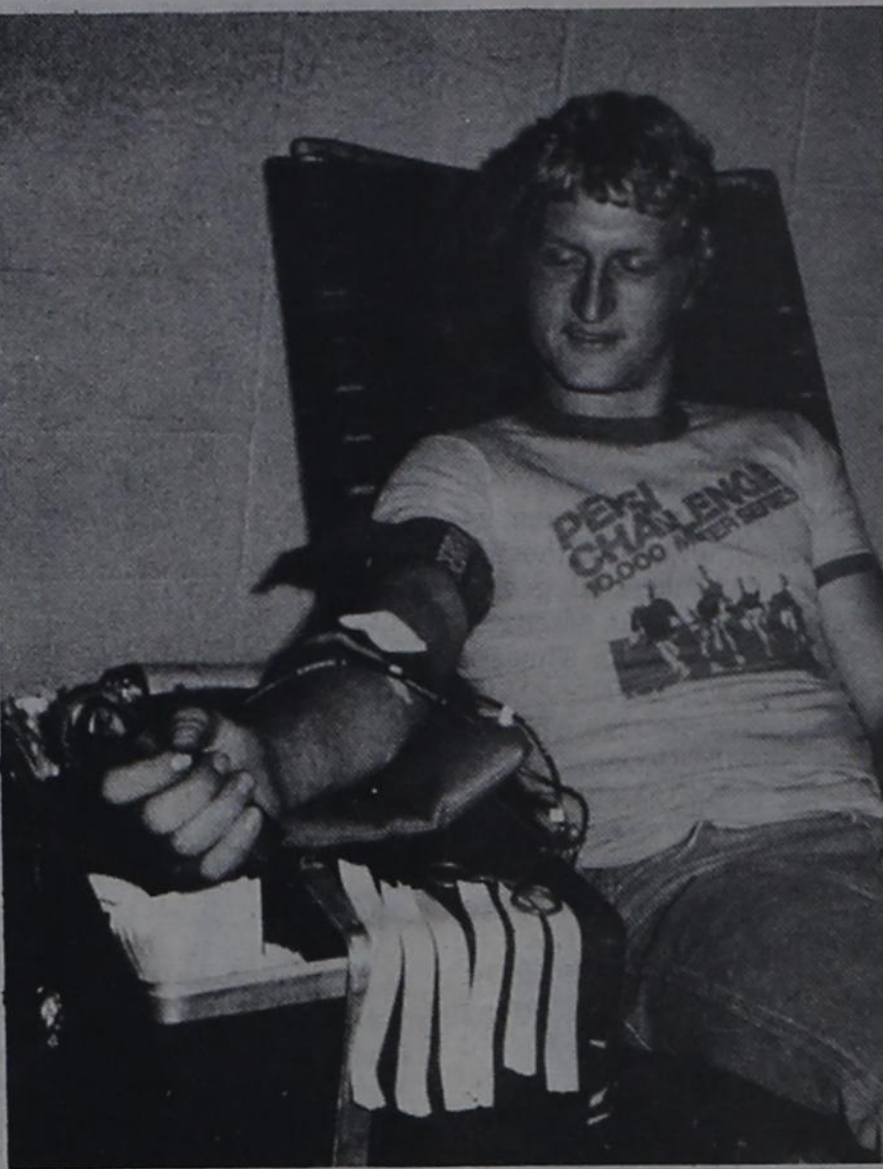
Wildlife tour participants will travel through the heart of the scenic Edwards Plateau deer country visiting native and exotic wildlife management areas. Dinner is provided at Whiskey Canyon Ranch near Kerrville followed by a visit of hunting and fishing lodges.

After an overnight stay in Kerrville, the tour proceeds to Gillespie County to see other progressive Hill Country ranches where white-tail deer is aggressively marketed.

Another stop is scheduled at the Kerr Wildlife Management Area where the different range management practices needed to produce good livestock and wildlife can be observed. Another management perspective on white-tail deer versus exotic game utilization can be obtained before buses depart for San Angelo.

## Mentally Ill Benefit From Family Workshops

"You Are Not Alone" is the title of a workshop for professionals and families working together in treating mental illness, to be held in Clovis July 8 and 9 in the Community Room of First Federal Savings and Loan, 2501 N. Prince Street.

Frequently, families report feelings of isolation and unbearable responsibility for their mentally ill relatives, who in turn feel overwhelmed by their illness. Likewise, professionals lament the enormity of their burden in treating mental illness, unsupported by patients' families, friends, or the mental health system in which they work.

This two-day workshop provides an unusual opportunity for families of the mentally ill and the professional mental health workers who serve them to devise new ways of working together.

The workshop has three goals: provide professionals with insight into the family's experience with mental illness, teaching new family therapy techniques from a culturally relevant perspective; provide families and/or patients with an opportunity to meet one another, share experiences and organize support/advocacy groups in their local communities; and give professionals and families a shared-learning experience, increasing communication and collaboration between them.

The workshop is presented by the Community Alliance for Mental Health, a family support/advocacy group based in Santa Fe. The group started to meet almost two years ago. That was the beginning of the support group. It still meets at least once a month.

The Community Alliance for Mental Health is an affiliate of the National Alliance for the Mentally Ill, which was founded in 1979 by families and friends of adolescents and adults with severe, chronic, and disabling mental illness.

Severe mental illness devastates the lives of three million Americans and another eight million members of their families are affected. Sixty-seven percent of patients return to live with their families. Nearly 40 percent of all hospital beds

are occupied by the mentally ill. The direct and indirect costs of mental illness amount to \$40 billion annually.

Both the national and local Alliances are committed to strengthening and supporting families as primary care givers to mentally ill family members; improving the quality of services needed by mentally ill, with emphasis on community support programs such as housing, employment, social rehabilitation, and crisis-intervention; changing public attitudes that stereotype and isolate the mentally ill from the mainstream of the community; and increasing neuroscience research and treatment directions that target the biochemical, genetic, and neurologic bases of mental illness.

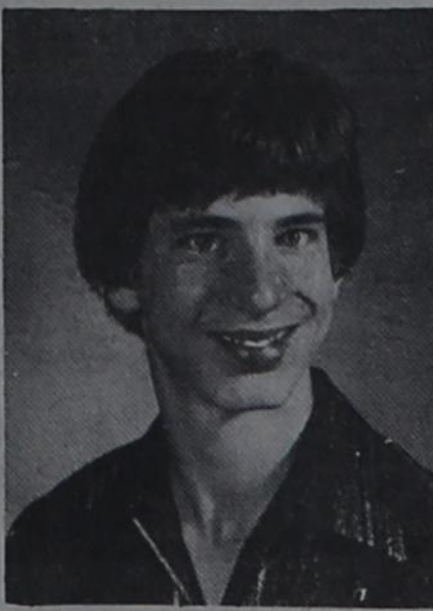
Dottle studied electronic engineering in Washington, D.C., and later attended Texas A&M, where he studied financial management for the telephone industry.

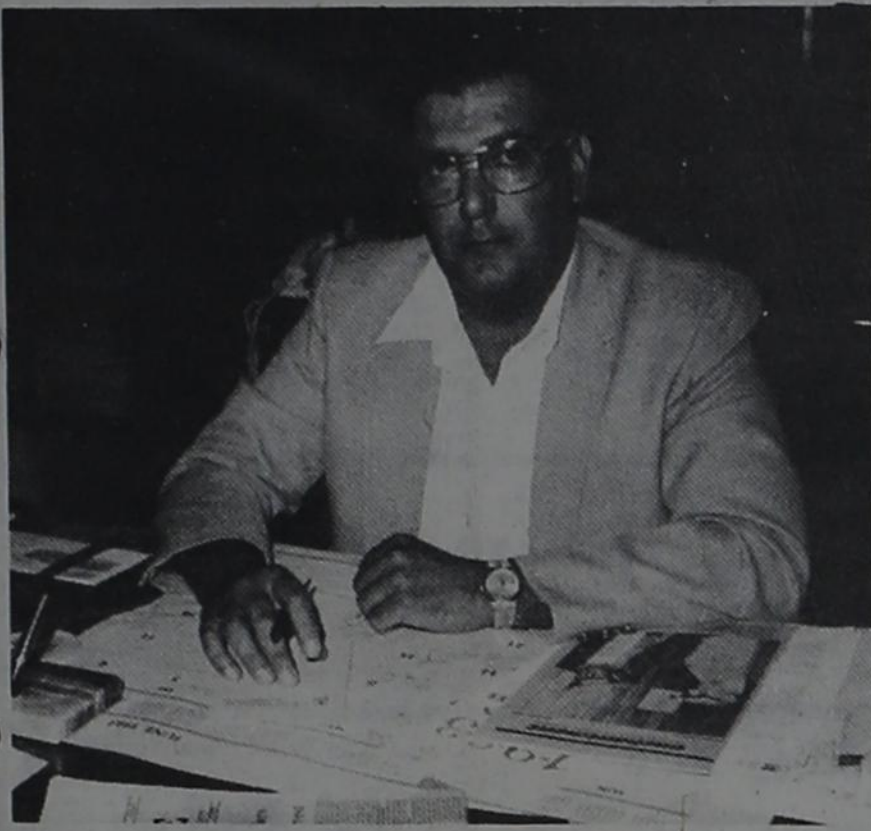

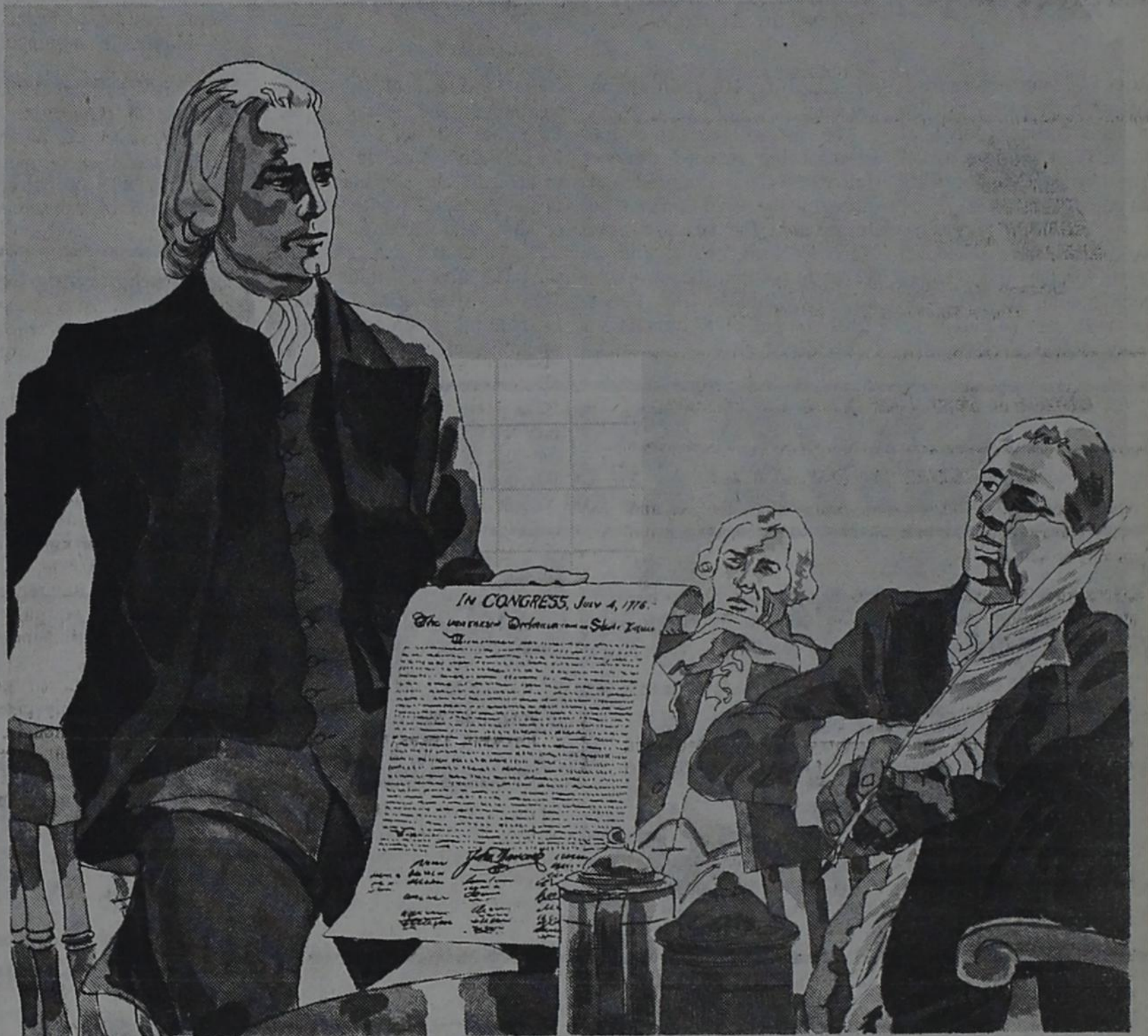

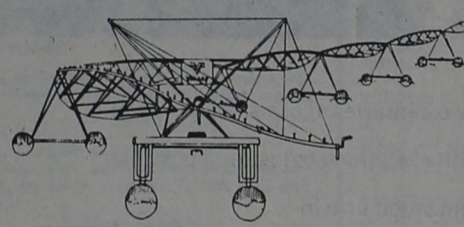
