
Some time ago, we wrote of the large federal funds being expended each year for the subsidization of waterways traffic. We now have before us a report on some federal outlays of money designed to aid air transportation.

> Specific federal outlays this year for facilities used by airlines include: \$922,000,000.00 for federal airways system and aircraft development, \$87,000,-000,00 for airports, and \$59,-000,000.00 for cash federal subsidies to airlines. This is over \$1,000,000,000.00 of taxpayer's money going to develop aid to aviation for profit.

> This looks like a good place to save some federal money. We believe commercial ventures such as aviation should stand on their own financial feet, the same as railroads. Especially since we cannot get from here to Houston except by a very sketchy air route or a long and tiring bus ride.

> There is the standard bureaucratic cry "it's necessary" whenever any proposal is made to cut the Federal Budget. We think that there are many places we could trim the budget over and above our outlandish social schemes. There are literally billions of tax dollars to be saved by prudent budget cutting. Remember these are red ink dollars, dollars that go to feed the fires of inflation that consume the value of your savings and properties.

> This nearing Presidentialelection will have a very important bearing on the next federal budget and how much red ink dollars will be spent in the future. The economic stability of this country will depend on the economic philosophy of the party that occupies the White House for the next four years. It will be the people's responsibility to determine whose economic philosophy will prevail.
