# Steers Lasso Cowboys, 41-8

An aroused herd of Farwell Steers traveled to Plains and trampled the Cowboys on their home field by the score of 41-8.

Even this score does not reflect the dominance of the game displayed by the fighting Blue and White. The Cowboys, fielding a heavy though inexperienced team, were swamped by the Steer offense and completely stymied by the Farwell defense as the Blue and White racked up a 34-0 lead by halftime, and then coasted with the younger Steers playing most of the last canto.

The game started off shaky as the Steers kicked off to Plains where the Cowboys put the ball in play on their 30. A series of first downs carried the Cowboys to midfield before Dean Stovall intercepted a pass for Farwell. On their first offensive play, Farwell fumbled the ball back and Plains went to the Steer 5 before attempting a field goal. The Cowboy boot went wide and Farwell settled down on their 20-yard line. On their fourth play from scrimmage, Craig Phillips broke loose and rambled 53 yards for the first Blue and White score. Al Phillips added the PAT via the toe and the Steers were off to the races by 7-0 with 6:20 left in the first quarter.

The mighty Steer defense forced the Cowboys to punt without accumulating a first down and the Steers set up shop on their own 41. Craig and Al Phillips again combined to bring the

ball down to the Plains 2 where Craig bulled over the goal line, but lost the ball and an alert recovery in the end zone by Dean Stovall gave the Steers their second touchdown. Al Phillips again booted the PAT for a 14-0 lead with 1:20 left in the quarter.

Again, Plains was unable to budge the Steer defense and were forced to punt from their 38. Dennis Ensor charged through and blocked the boot and the Steers recovered on the Plains 28. A pass to Stovall, a pass to Dan Prince, and a pass to Stovall were all the Steers needed to notch another TD. The PAT went astray and it was 20-0. Plains, forced to play catch-up ball, tried a fourth and 2 from their 36 but did not make the first down.

Relying on the accurate arm of Quarterback Greg Hargrove, the Steers rode the airways to a first and goal, with Craig Phillips again tallying for the touchdown and a PAT by Al Phillips for a commanding 27-0 lead with 8:35 left in the second stanza.

Again, the Steers' dominating defense throttled the Cowboys. Farwell's Robbie Mahaney put a jarring tackle to the Plains quarterback for a nine-yard loss and the Cowboys again punted to the Steer 42. The Steer pin-point passing pricked the Cowboy defense and a final Hargrove to Prince heave added six more to the mounting score. Al Phillips added his PAT and the icing was on the cake at

34-0. The half ended on this note as Coach Toby Booth began to give the younger men some game time, with sophomore quarterback Gene Sheets piloting the team.

The second half opened with the Steers receiving the Cowboy kickoff. Dean Stovall received the ball and scooted to the Plains 27-yard stripe. On the second play, the Blue and White received a 15-yarder and had a second and 25 situation. Two passes from Hargrove to Stovall not only wiped out the deficit but put the Steers on the scoreboard with less than a

minute and a half gone in the second half. Al's PAT was good and the Steers had a 41-0 bulge.

Coach Booth again began to give the younger Steers valuable game experience and the game settled down to a mid-field seesaw battle. With 20 seconds left in the game, the Cowboys managed a touchdown and an extra points run for their only scores of the evening.

The happy Farwell Steers then began the 95-mile trip home savoring a well-played 41-8 victory over the Cowboys from Plains.

Coach Toby Booth stated following the Plains-Farwell game that the entire Steer squad turned in a fine performance in the game. "The recruits taken from the bench did a wonderful job," he said adding that all of the players who went to Plains got into the game.

Stellar performances were turned in by Dean Stovall who caught two touchdown passes, Danny Prince, who caught one TD pass, and Craig Phillips, who scored on two runs, including a 53-yard run and a 12-yard run.

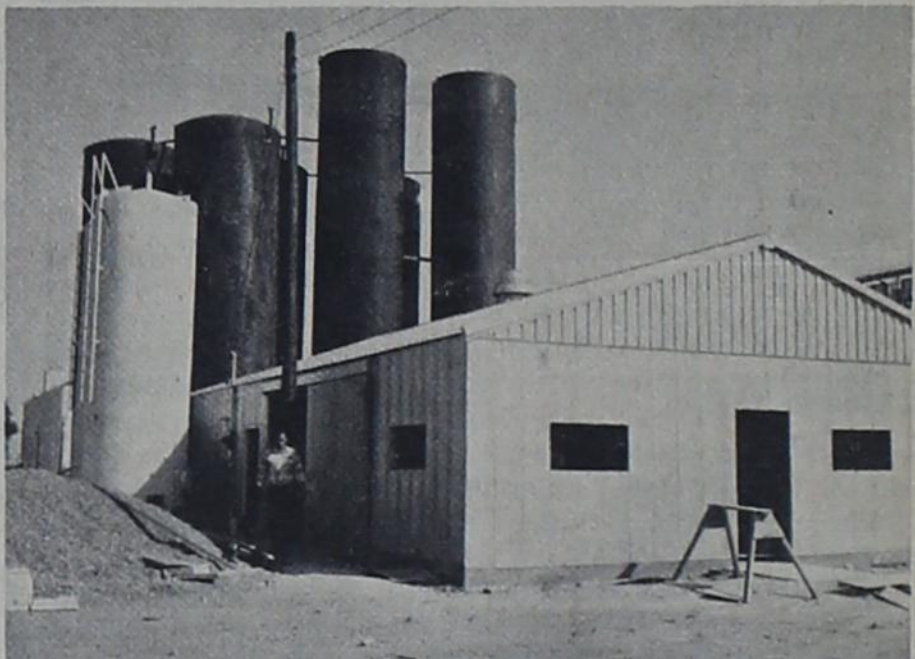
### Steers Meet Indians

I READ that Yippie leaders are planning a big demonstration at the presidential inauguration on Jan. 20, regardless of who is elected. Do you think it will be possible to avoid disruption of the ceremonies?

Easy. All they have to do is hold the inauguration in Chicago. DID YOU know that a French law requires all houses to be constructed to stand for 50 years? That's not a bad idea. At least a fellow could count on having a roof over his head after his mortgage was paid off.

I SEE where a psychiatrist says that if children spend too much time watching television, they lose the benefit of a close association with their parents. He may be right. I'm thinking of limiting television watching at our home, in order to associate more with the kids. This policy will go into effect next Spring, right after the last football bowl game.

WHAT DO you think about the U. of T. professor who is calling for an outright revolution in the U. S.? I understand his contract will not be renewed. I think he deserves a new contract, but at a different institution -- like, say, Leavenworth.

DID YOU read that the AFL-CIO credits Hubert Humphrey with a 100 per cent pro-union voting record while he was a Senator? I'm not against labor unions when they are properly operated, but I don't think they could have been right 100 per cent of the time. If Hubert voted that way, he was either simply after their support, or he didn't understand the issues.

How sweet it is! We noted Monday morning Texas Tech alum Elmer Hargrove giving some of his Tea Sipping friends the old what for. Our local boy Leon Lovelace played a bone-jarring game for the Techsters as they contained the vaunted Texas running-passing attack.

With Farwell beating Plains and Tech drubbing Texas, the local football cup runneth over. Aren't you glad you live in the best football section of the country and in its capitol, the Twin Cities?

Sometime ago, we wrote of the large federal funds being expended each year for the subsidization of waterways traffic. We now have before us a report on some federal outlays of money designed to aid air transportation.

Specific federal outlays this year for facilities used by airlines include: \$922,000,000 for federal airways system and aircraft development, \$87,000,000 for airports, and \$59,000,000 for cash federal subsidies to airlines. This is over \$1,000,000,000 of taxpayer's money going to develop aid to aviation for profit.

This looks like a good place to save some federal money. We believe commercial ventures such as aviation should stand on their own financial feet, the same as railroads. Especially since we cannot get from here to Houston except by a very sketchy air route or a long and tiring bus ride.

There is the standard bureaucratic cry "it's necessary" whenever any proposal is made to cut the Federal Budget. We think that there are many places we could trim the budget over and above our outlandish social schemes. There are literally billions of tax dollars to be saved by prudent budget cutting. Remember these are red ink dollars, dollars that go to feed the fires of inflation that consume the value of your savings and properties.

This nearing Presidential election will have a very important bearing on the next federal budget and how much red ink dollars will be spent in the future. The economic stability of this country will depend on the economic philosophy of the party that occupies the White House for the next four years.

It will be the people's responsibility to determine whose economic philosophy will prevail.

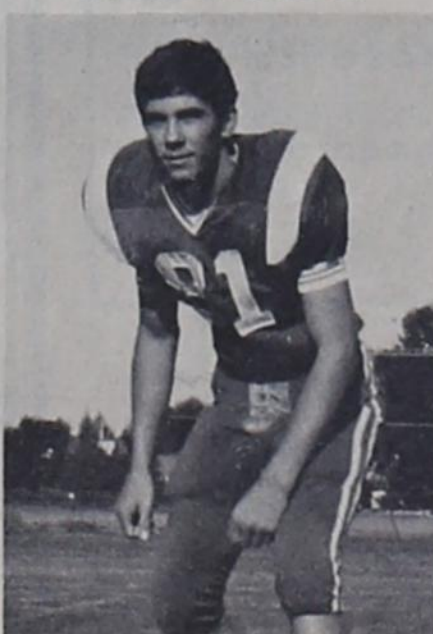

### New Assignment To Bill Clayton

AUSTIN -- State Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake, has been named to a special committee to study Texas liquor laws pertaining to the financial involvement between establishments that serve alcoholic beverages and their suppliers.

Clayton was a member of the State Affairs Committee panel that recommended reforms to the State Liquor Control Act to the special session of the Legislature in June. The measures were approved in the House of Representatives, but failed to pass in the Senate.

Clayton's appointment was announced in Austin by House Speaker Ben Barnes and Representative Dick Cory of Victoria, chairman of the House State Affairs Committee.

After his appointment to the committee, Clayton said it was his hope that the study would result in recommendations to the 61st Legislature, which meets in January, of liquor control laws that would provide much stronger controls on the consumption of alcoholic beverages, particularly pertaining to sales to minors, and that would prohibit organized crime from entering the liquor and beer industry in Texas.

### Lose To Hart

Farwell Yearlings B team were defeated by the Hart B team in a game at Steer Stadium Saturday morning, 33-0. Hart scored its first touchdown in the first quarter of the game and added two additional TD's before the buzzer sounded ending the first half.

Coach Larry Taylor stated that the Yearlings played pretty good ball and that Cecil Bowery was probably the outstanding player in the game. Bowery plays offensive guard and also is a defensive player.

In a previous game Hereford B team had defeated the Yearlings by a score of 33-6. In the Hereford game the lone Farwell TD came on a pass play from Larry Erwin to Lonnie McFarland in the final stanza.

## Ford Talks About Several Issues

Campaigning for State Representative through the 72nd District this week, Frank Ford stressed "The immediate need for strengthening our rural economy."

"All over this district," stated Ford, "There are fine young farmers being forced out of farming by high costs and low income, new school facilities in the rural areas faced with dropping enrollment, and towns and businesses faced with the greatest challenges we have known in this generation."

"It is going to take a lot of hard work on the part of a lot of people, but I am convinced we have the desire and the ability to reverse this trend," Ford said. "There was enough grain sorghum raised in this six-county district last year to feed over one million additional cattle. This alone could mean over six hundred new jobs, plus the jobs which would be created in servicing industries. It would create a better market for our grain, and provide enough feed cattle for two of the largest and most modern packing facilities in the world which will be operating in this district."

"With proper water conservation, we have much potential in vegetable processing in addition to what we are doing now. In addition, there are dozens of light industries which need to be told about the benefits of locating in this area. We have people who are willing to work, and towns which are willing to grow, and I intend to work with local people in each county and the Texas Industrial Commission to help see that we realize

our full potential. The cities are already over-crowded, and it is up to us to see that there are opportunities for our young people to raise their families in our own towns." Ford is the Republican candidate in the 72nd District.

Campaigning in the Rhea Community this week, Frank Ford proposed an "Action plan for total development of water resources in this area."

"Beginning with each of us at the local level," said Ford, "continuing efforts must be made to capture and utilize every drop from the rainfall that we receive. This means maximum use of lake pumps to use the water in playa lakes when available to conserve underground water, and more conservation dams to prevent runoff from this area in our creeks."

"Additional research is needed to determine ways of getting this maximum use from rainfall water, which is the cheapest water we have. Irrigation from playa lakes and the percolation value of conservation lakes on our streams will greatly extend the economic life of our irrigated land while importation efforts are pushed forward."

Ford pointed out that the funding for feasibility studies on various importation plans must come from congress, and the necessity for maximum cooperation and coordination between the state and federal levels of government. He also warned of the danger of injecting partisan politics into water importation efforts.

"Whether our grandchildren can raise their families in this area depends to a large degree upon all of us working together in the field of water resources," Ford concluded, "and I pledge my total efforts in this direction."

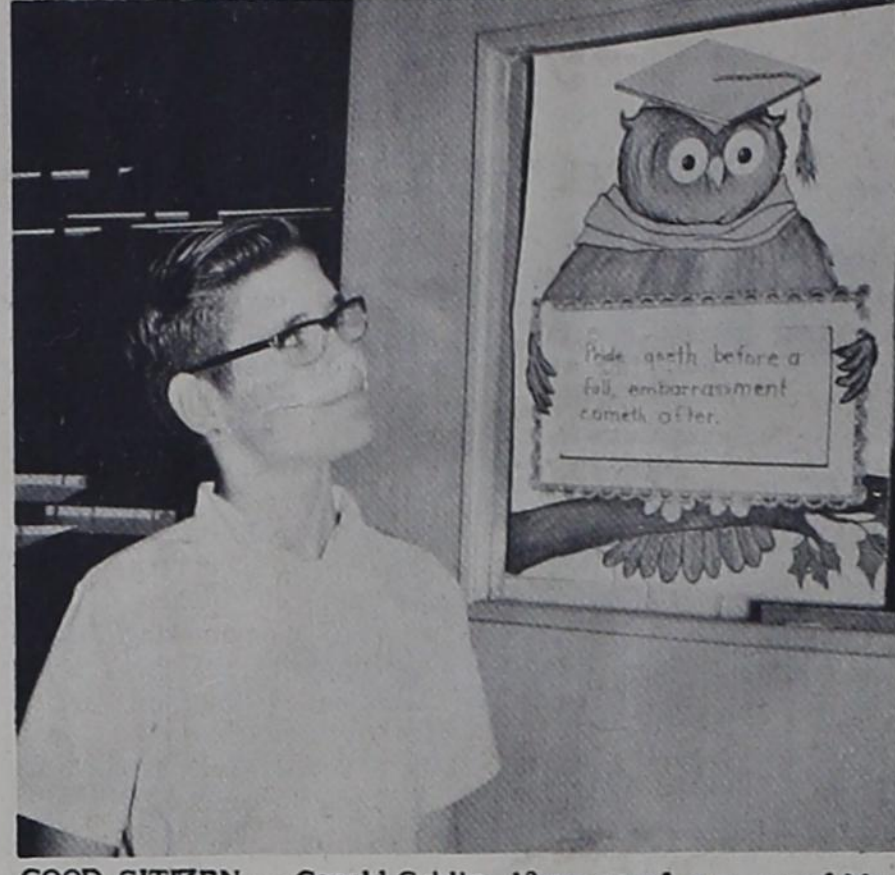
Ford is the Republican candidate for State Representative in Cochran, Lamb, Bailey, Castro, Parmer, and Deaf Smith Counties.

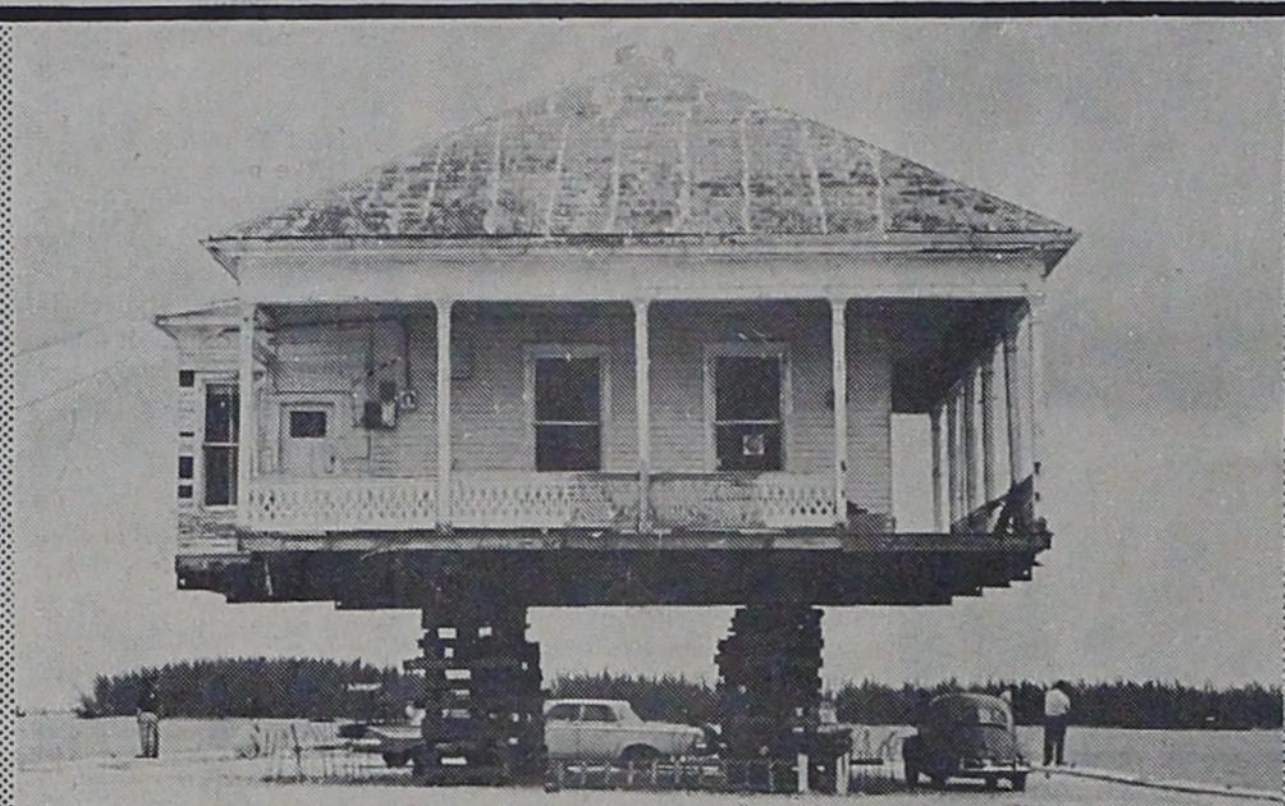

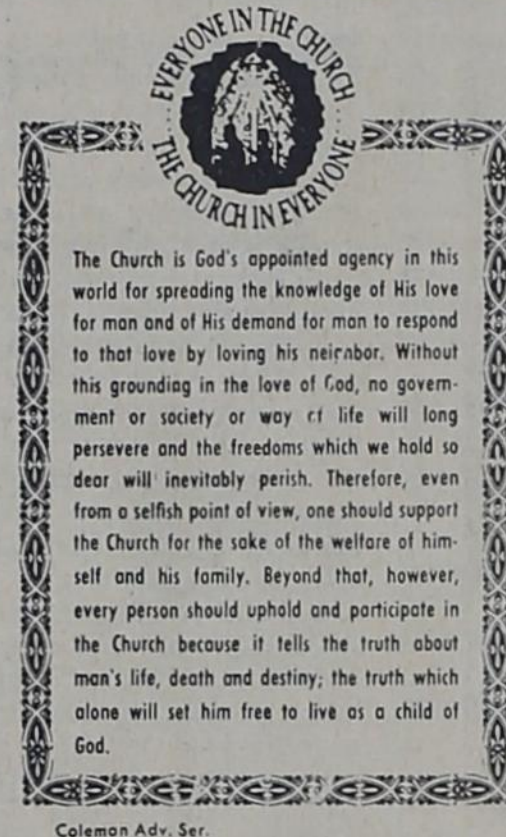

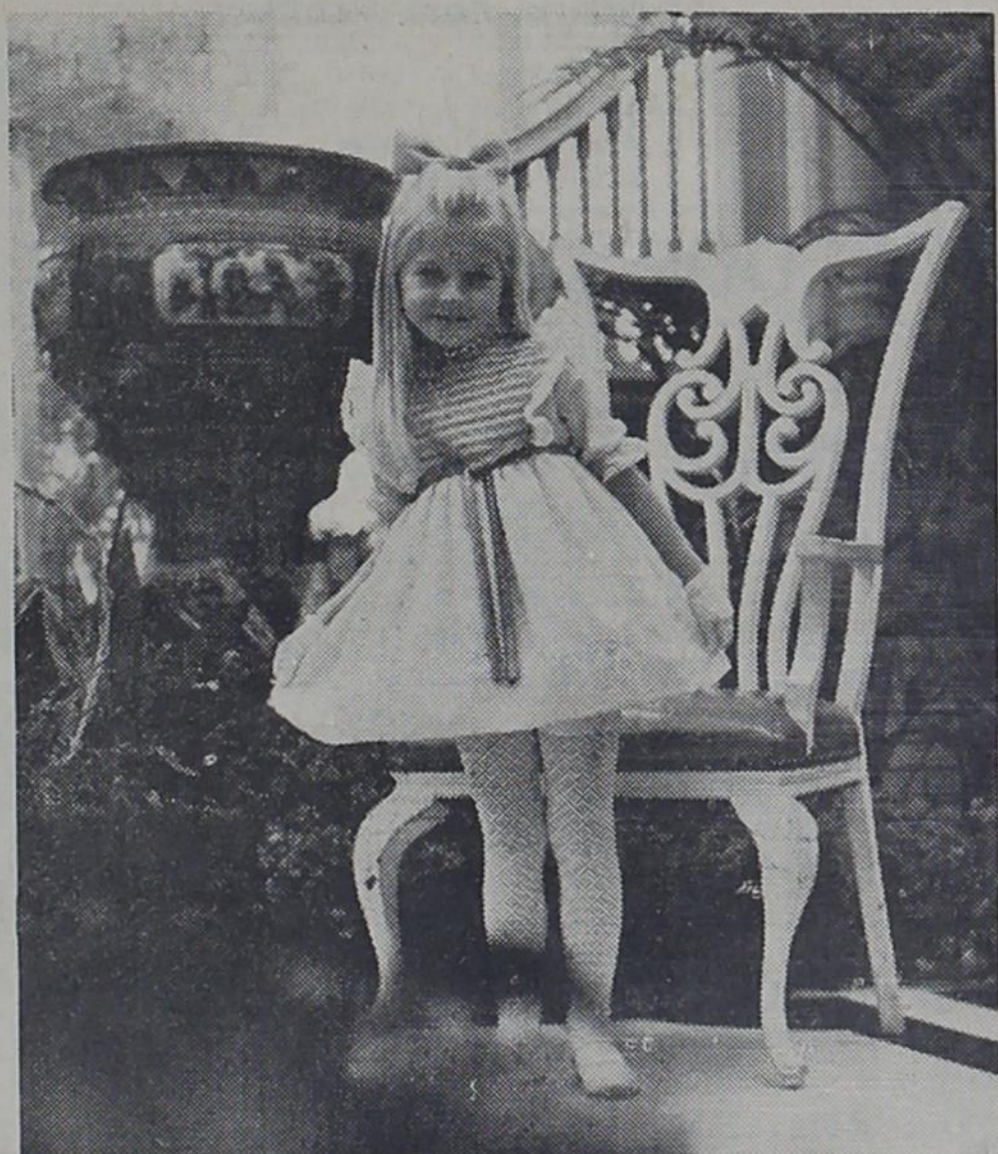
