All other countries will have to make what terms they can with the Reds because they can no longer believe in the solemn pledges of the government of the United States. Then, sooner or later, we will have to fight the Communist world if we are to escape the chains and shackles of a totalitarian government.

Our mind boggles, our reason stops, at the thinking evidenced by the Fulbrights, Kennedys, McGoverns, Lindseys, Javits, and Muskies as they joyfully embrace the death hug of Communist Russia.

In almost 200 years of our history, uncounted thousands of American men found something themselves and they laid down their lives to protect this liberty. Today a bare handful of craven and misguided persons would sacrifice this heritage in the vain hope of appeasing the masters of Communist Russia.

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

# **1970 Cotton Program**

The Texas State cotton allotment for 1970 will be 7,247,-488 acres. This is 412,354 acres greater than the state's allotment in 1969, Prentice Mills of Parmer County ASCS announces.

This will mean that each eligible individual farm allotment for 1970 should be approximately 6 per cent larger than in 1969. Other cotton program provisions are:

Domestic Acreage Allotment. For the 1970 crop, the farm domestic acreage allotment has been set at 65 per cent of the farm acreage allotment, the minimum authorized by law. Farmers who sign up to par-



ticipate in the program and who plant at least 90 per cent of their farm's domestic acreage

allotment, but not in excess of the permitted acreage for the farm, will be eligible for pricesupport loans and, for pricesupport payments on the farm domestic allotment.

> Skip-Row Rules. The skiprow rules which were in effect for the 1969 crop will be applicable for the 1970 crop. In general, under these rules, only the land actually planted to cotton is counted as cotton land in determining compliance with program provisions.




#### November **Brings** First Season Snow
