semble, directed by Lynn Burton, will play patriotic selections. Charles Turner will play appropriate themes at the organ while students and guests are assembling.

All local persons are invited to the program, says Mrs. Phillips, who stresses that the event is a joint affair between school and community to show our patriotism and to pause and remember those who have served our country in this Veteran's Day salute.

# Steers Take Third District Win

The Farwell Steers continued to roll as they racked up a 27-14 win over a persistent but outclassed herd of Vega Longhorns. Farwell dominated the statistics as well as the scoring as they amassed 396 yards and 24 first downs to 195 yards and 10 first downs for the Longhorns. Barry Williams averaged seven yards per carry while ripping Vega's defense

for 141 yards, followed by Gary Erwin who carried 21 times for 110 yards. Doug Harriman and Dean Stovall hauled in three Hargrove tosses apiece for 30 and 21 yards, respectively, and Mark Williams netted 28 yards on two receptions. The rugged Steer defense held Vega to an average of less than three yards per carry and gave up only 94 yards on the ground. The win extended the Steers record to 3-0 in district play and set the stage for a November 14 showdown with Sudan for the district title.

Dickie Robinson returned the opening kickoff to the Vega 18 and the Longhorns went to the offense from there. Bronc May directed the Longhorn attack and moved his club to midfield before the Steers defense bottled them up. Jackie Richardson got off a beautiful 45-yard punt which put the Steers with their backs to the wall on their own three. They couldn't move out of the hole and a short punt gave Vega excellent field position on the Steer 26. Five plays later, Ronnie Fangman powered over from a yard out to put the Longhorns on the scoreboard. Richardson found daylight and scrambled in for two more, putting Vega out in front 8-0 with 4:22 remaining in the initial period.

Following the kick, neither club could move the ball and they

exchanged punts going into the second quarter. The Steers then began to move as they drove to the Vega 25, but Kenny Donathan pounced on a fumble to end the threat. Both clubs were again stymied as the ball was punted out five times. Farwell broke the stalemate as they took over on their own 35 with 2 1/2 minutes remaining in the half. Two pass completions to Stovall and a 30-yard scamper by Erwin moved the ball to Vega's 20, and a pass interference penalty set up a first and goal from the nine. Danny Prince got the call and ran for paydirt with 1:11 remaining. The pass for two was broken up by Richardson and the Steers had narrowed the gap to two points.

On the second play from scrimmage following the kick, Larry Erwin fell on a loose football on the Longhorn 29 with 27 seconds left showing on the clock. Gary Erwin carried to the 17 and Hargrove hit Williams on the nine and then found Doug Harriman on the two. With one second left in the half, Hargrove struggled into the end zone to put Farwell out in front. He then passed complete to Mark Williams for two and the Steers carried a 14-8 lead to the dressing room. The Steers hadn't lost their momentum following the half

# 1970 Cotton Program

The Texas State cotton allotment for 1970 will be 7,247,488 acres. This is 412,354 acres greater than the state's allotment in 1969, Prentice Mills of Farmer County ASCS announces.

This will mean that each eligible individual farm allotment for 1970 should be approximately 6 per cent larger than in 1969. Other cotton program provisions are:

**Domestic Acreage Allotment.** For the 1970 crop, the farm domestic acreage allotment has been set at 65 per cent of the farm acreage allotment, the minimum authorized by law. Farmers who sign up to participate in the program and who plant at least 90 per cent of their farm's domestic acreage allotment, but not in excess of the permitted acreage for the farm, will be eligible for price-support loans and, for price-support payments on the farm domestic allotment.

**Skip-Row Rules.** The skip-row rules which were in effect for the 1969 crop will be applicable for the 1970 crop. In general, under these rules, only the land actually planted to cotton is counted as cotton land in determining compliance with program provisions.

**Lease and Sale of Allotments.** The final date for filing applications for the transfer of cotton allotments is December 31, 1969. Producers in 381 cotton-producing counties in the U. S. have approved for 1970 the transfer of allotments to farms outside the county. Allotments, however, cannot be transferred from one State to another.

**Projected Yields.** A projected national yield of 500 pounds per acre has been established for the 1970 crop, a reduction of 45 pounds per acre from that set for the last three crop years. The reduction announced on October 15 reflects the failure of cotton yields to realize the levels expected on the basis of trends a few years ago.

The projected yield for 1967-68-69 crops was established at 545 pounds because of previous upward trend. During the past four years, yields have been leveling off and have trended down since 1965. The 1970 national projected yield is based on 1964-68 harvested yields (497 pounds average per acre), adjusted for abnormal weather, for trends, and for changes in production practices.

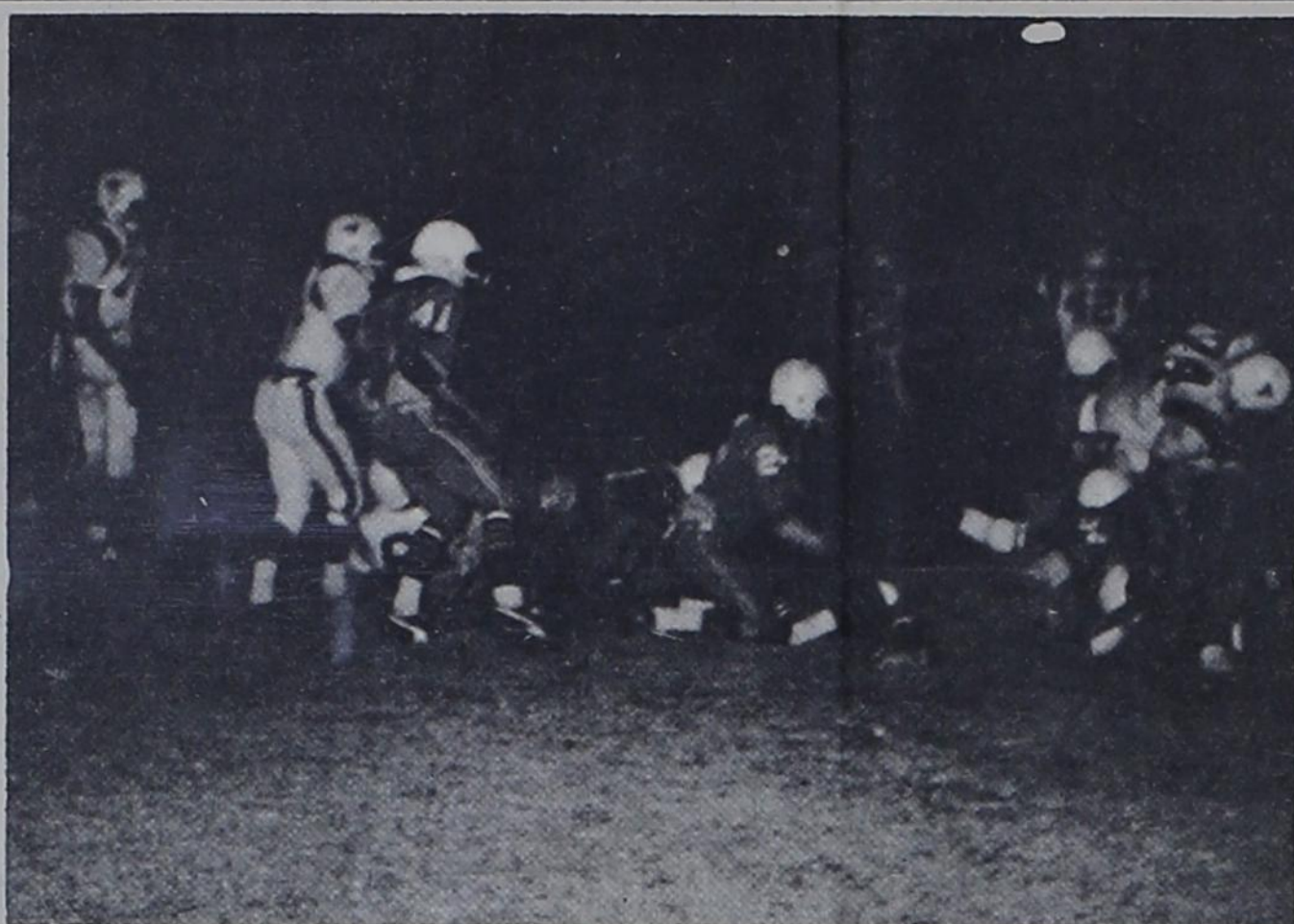
Projected State yields will be announced within a few days, Mills said.

as they moved from their 34 to the Vega 14 in eight plays. The effort was in vain as Donathan recovered his second fumble of the evening.

Vega moved to their 35, but on third and nine, May went to the air and was intercepted by Mark Williams. Farwell capitalized on the break as they moved 38 yards in eight tries with Gary Erwin carrying the final nine for the TD. The pass attempt failed and the Steers had widened the margin to 20-8.

The game then settled down to a defensive contest as neither side could sustain a drive going into the final period of play. With about seven minutes left, the Longhorns were faced with a fourth and long yardage situation from their own 16. Richardson's punt was short and was fielded by Gene Sheets on the 34, who exhibited some fancy running as he returned it to the ten. Barry Williams carried for five and then bulled his way into the end zone. Bob Wiman added the extra to bring the score to 27-8.

The Longhorns again suffered a bad break following the kick as Dean Stovall intercepted a Bronc May aerial on the 43 and returned it to the 17. A penalty moved the ball back to the 32 and the Steers stalled there. A broken field goal attempt resulted in Hargrove's having to dump the ball and a penalty for intentional grounding, giving Vega possession on the Farwell 47-yard line. May went to the air, moving to the 32 on three completions and then passing to Richardson for the final touchdown. Fangman was stopped short of the goal line on the PAT attempt and the score stood at 27-14.

# Texico Drops Final Game To Roy

The Texico Wolverines played the final game of their abbreviated season last Friday night at Texico before a capacity crowd of excited local fans. The Green and White won the battle of the statistics, but lost to the Roy Longhorns by the final score of 8-6.

The field was muddy and slippery following record-setting rains which reduced the game to a defensive battle. The Wolverines opened the game by kicking off to Roy. The Longhorns took the ball on their own 10-yard line and returned it to their 28. They reeled off one first down before the stout Texico defense prevailed. Roy punted to Texico's Johnny Dane who returned to the Wolverine 35.

Wolverines fumbled the kick and Roy recovered. In three plays, Roy reciprocated and fumbled back to Texico on the Texico 37. The Wolverines ran three plays getting out to the Texico 48-yard marker before a backfield fumble gave possession to Roy on the Wolverine 36. Roy ran eight plays before going over for their touchdown from six yards out. A two-point run by the Longhorns gave them the lead at 8-6.

The slippery field made passing preferable and the remainder of the game saw a lot of passing and interceptions with neither team mounting a serious scoring threat.

In their initial possession of the ball, Texico was unable to acquire a first down. Doug Harrison attempted to punt from his 41 but the ball was blocked and was recovered by the Roy Longhorns on the Texico 39. Six plays by Roy lost four yards. They then attempted a fake punt but did not gain enough for the first down.

The Wolverines took over on their own 39-yard marker. Albert Steward reeled off 29 yards to the Roy 32. In three plays, Monty Lambert, Ricky Ketchersides, and Dane brought the ball down to the Roy 10. Steward reeled off the last ten yards on a run and scored a touchdown for Texico. The PAT failed and the score stood at 6-0, Texico.

The second quarter featured a long drive by Texico that penetrated to the Roy 10-yard stripe before losing steam. The half ended with Roy in possession of the ball deep in their own territory on their four-yard line.

In the fourth quarter the scoring for Lazbuddie ended with Monte Barnes completing a 21-yard pass to Mike Casey.

**FALL CONTROL OF CORN BORER ADVISED**  
Corn has become an increasingly important cash crop on the Texas High Plains and with it has come a menacing insect, the southwestern corn borer. However, certain cultural

practices this fall can be effective in reducing overwintering populations of this insect pest.

Shredding stalks can destroy large numbers of the corn borers as they spend some time in the base of old stalks before moving down into the tap roots where they spend the winter. This, combined with a thorough job of plowing under refuse, can greatly reduce the number of overwintering larvae.

Looking at next season, a combination of early planting and use of early maturing hybrids will aid in reducing damaging populations of the insect later in the year.

The southwestern corn borer begins damaging young corn plants in late spring by feeding on the leaves. Later the insect bores into the stalk and begins tunnelling up and down the pith. This action causes the stalk to weaken and lodge or fall, thereby inflicting substantial grain losses.

There are from one to three generations of the corn borer each year. The adult female moth emerges from the pupal stage in mid-spring and lays from 300 to 400 eggs on the underside of corn leaves. The young larvae go through their destructive cycle in the following months and then overwinter in the full-grown larval stage.

Entomologists advise in-season control where the corn borer is present in damaging numbers. Timing of spray applications is critical since satisfactory control can only be obtained early in the season before the larvae bore into the stalk.
