

Primary Elections Slated Saturday

Primary elections will be conducted over the state of Texas Saturday, May 2. In Farwell and throughout Parmer County both the Democratic and Republican parties will be going to the polls to cast ballots for favorite candidates.

In Farwell, Republicans will cast their ballots at the city hall; while Democratic party members will vote at the courtroom in the county courthouse. In Bovina, Republicans will vote at the high school lobby while Democrats will vote at the Legion Hall. Republican ballots will be cast in Friona at the Legion Hall and Democrats will vote at the high school.

At Oklahoma Lane both parties will cast their ballots at the Community Center. In Lazbuddie, Republicans will vote

at the school cafeteria; while the Democrats will vote at the school. Black and Lakeview Republicans will vote at the polling place in Friona while Republicans at Rhea are asked to vote in Bovina.

In Rhea the Democrats will vote at the Lutheran Parish Hall, in Lakeview at the Otho Whitefield home, and in Black at the elevator.

Democratic elections judges are Albert Smith, Farwell; Wyle Bullock, Lazbuddie; Wendol Christian, Oklahoma Lane; Otho Whitefield, Lakeview; Raymond Schueler, Rhea; Dolph Moten, Bovina; Hurshel Johnson, Friona.

Republican election judges include Farwell, John Getz; Oklahoma Lane, W. G. Harlan;

Lazbuddie, Jimmy Briggs; Bovina, Mrs. Vernon Estes; and Friona, Glenn Reeve.

Polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. for both Republicans and Democrats.

On the county level on the Democratic ticket the office of County Judge and Ex-Officio School Superintendent is the only contested office with incumbent Archie Tartar seeking re-election, opposed by W. L. "Preach" Edlemon.

Other county officials on the Democratic ticket are Mrs. Dorothy Quickel, district clerk; Mrs. Bonnie Warren, county clerk; and Mrs. Mabel Reynolds, county treasurer; all unopposed. J. Roy Thornton is seeking re-election to the office of Justice of Peace, pre-

dict 1 Farwell. At Lazbuddie Raymond Treider, Jr. is seeking return to the office of county commissioner opposed by J. D. Carpenter, Jr.

On the Republican ticket there are no county candidates. However, the names of several state candidates appear, including those of Bob Price for Con-

gressman from the 18th District; U. S. Senator - George Bush and Robert Morris; Governor - Paul Eggers and Roger Martin; Lieutenant Governor - Bryon Fullerton; Attorney General - Edward M. Yturri; Comptroller of Public Accounts - S. L. Abbott; State Treasurer - Robert F. Kaennecke; Com-

missioner of General Land Office - Harry Tripplett; and Commissioner of Agriculture - Daniel C. Heath.

Statewide on the Democratic ticket are Attorney General - David H. Brown and Crawford C. Martin, incumbent; Commissioner of Land Office - Bob Armstrong, Jerry Sadler, in-

cumbent, and Fred Williams; Railroad Commissioner - Connie Lawson and Ben Ramsey, incumbent; Associate Justice place 3 Supreme Court of Texas - Matt Davis, James C. Denton and Hawthorne Phillips; Judge of Court of Criminal Appeals - Truman Roberts and Earl W. Smith.



Two gigantic and interrelated "time bombs" are ticking away at an ever increasing rate. Pollution as a topic is the one that is currently receiving the lion's share of political propaganda. We foresee rather drastic laws in this country in the near future to alleviate the contamination of the air, field and stream. Passing laws against business and industry is rather politically safe and currently politically desirable, therefore, this "bomb" stands a chance of decreasing in vital importance sooner than population control.

The control of population means control of man's reproduction and this is a much more sensitive area. We have massive resistance to birth control by some church groups. The individuals themselves feel deeply that this is a personal decision and not for political exploitation. These bugaboos make cool headed discussion of this subject almost impossible today. However, we think that much of our world's ills are directly related to over population. For example, the U. S. in the past decade has poured billions of our tax dollars into South America in an effort to raise their economic standards, yet today they are worse off than when we began our aid programs. The tremendous increase in births in these countries has more than offset the economic gain.

So it goes around the world. Country after country is falling behind in the race to provide even the barest necessities of life for their ever increasing hungry mouths.

This fatal gap is expressing itself in political discontent, abandonment of morality, and embracing greater uses of drugs, pressure for their neighbor's territory, devaluation of human life and contamination of all the air, soil and water.

So far, many farseeing world leaders have relied on persuasion alone to stem the flow of new babies. We think that eventually governmental force will be necessary to save what is left of a squandered and polluted globe. Already Red China is talking about losing five hundred million people in a nuclear war, yet confident that her remaining two to three hundred million will be able to conquer the world; India is today a cesspool of financial and political rot. How plain does the writing finger have to write?

In these United States we are projected to go over 300,000,000 citizens by the year 2000 A.D. If this doesn't chill you, you do not have any foresight or conscience or both. In the distant future some history scholar may be writing on the collapse of the 20th century civilization and instead of finding the blinding sunburst of a hydrogen bomb as the symbol of civilization's demise may find that the bent beer can and the tumescent phallus as more accurately depicting this civilization's degeneration to a new "Dark Ages."

John Getz, editor and publisher of the State Line Tribune, was named vice-president of the Panhandle Press Association at its annual spring convention held in Amarillo last weekend. Other officers of the Association are Don Nelson of Castro County News, Dimmitt, president; and Dave McReynolds of the Stratford Star returned as secretary-treasurer for a second year.

Getz, a member of the PPA Board of Directors, presided over the Saturday afternoon session of the convention, where a program on "Rates vs Costs...A Hard Look at Rate Structures with Rising Costs," was presented by George Hawkes of Arlington, president of the Texas Press Association.

The local newspaper also brought home three awards from the convention, receiving a first place plaque for the "Best Woman's Feature" column written by Mrs. Chris Moss; and a third place certificate for the "Purely Personal" column written by John Getz. These entries were in competition with other weeklies and dailies in the overall general excellence category for newspapers with less than 1500 circulation.

Following behind Mrs. Moss in the woman's feature category were Mrs. Violeta Mahood of

the Perryton Herald, and Mrs. Peggy Medley of the Floyd County Hesperian.

First in the column writing event was H. M. Baggerly of the Tullia Herald; and second, Nelson Lewis of the Friona Star.

In the general excellence category the State Line Tribune followed behind the Olton Enterprise and the Earth News-Sun.

Accepting the awards for the State Line Tribune were Mr. and Mrs. John Getz.

Second In Regional --

Sharon Williams To State Contest

Sharon Williams, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Williams, and a senior at Farwell High School, was named second place winner in the regional shorthand contest on Saturday. Sharon was in competition with 23 other shorthand students from over the region.

The previous week Miss Williams had won second place at the district shorthand contest in competition with seven other students. In both the regional and district contests Miss Williams had 98 per cent accuracy on her paper. She will be competing on the state level in Austin on May 9.

At the regional contest, students participating were graded on transcription of a paper dictated for five minutes at 90 words per minute. The district contest was given at 80 words per minute and state contestants will be taking the dictation at 100 words per minute for five minutes.

The regional winner, a student from Ralls, had a score of 98.22, only .22 ahead of Miss Williams. However, the student who had finished first at the district contests was

ranked fourth at the regional contest and did not qualify for competition at the state level. Miss Williams will be accompanied to the state contests by Miss Donna Clapp, business instructor in Farwell High School.

To Dedicate Historical Marker

The Official Texas Historical Marker for near route of Coronado Expedition was erected on April 1, announces Charles Woodburn of Amarillo, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee. This is a "State Matching Fund" marker.

Hugh Moseley of Farwell, chairman of the Parmer County Historical Survey Committee, said the marker was erected at the roadside park on U. S. 84, southeast of Farwell.

The inscription on the 18 by 28 inch marker reads: Near Route of Coronado Expedition One of the first explorations of North America by Spain, began in Mexico, crossing into Texas at or near present Parmer County.

The party led by Francisco Vasquez De Coronado, was sent to investigate reports of great

wealth among the Indians. In one city, Quivira the ruler, reputedly ate from gold plates. After entering Texas, Coronado and 36 men separated from the main group and continued north.

In August, 1541, on the present Kansas-Nebraska line, he found Quivira--an ordinary Indian village. After the winter of 1541-42 he returned to Mexico.

This is the second official Texas Historical Marker to be erected in Parmer County. It will be officially dedicated in ceremonies on Sunday, May 3, at 3 p.m. The public is invited to attend the dedication ceremony.

The marker will provide tourist interest in this area and will also serve to acquaint the people of Parmer County with their own unique historical past.

With the census being taken now, I found some information that you might be interested in reading. The Census Bureau in Washington can graphically present what's happening to our population by seconds. This "Census Clock" recently showed some interesting figures:

- 1 birth every 9 seconds
- 1 death every 16 1/2 seconds
- 1 immigrant arrives every 60 seconds
- 1 immigrant leaves every 23 seconds

The net going in all this coming and going is:

- 1 person every 15 1/2 seconds
- 5,574 persons every day
- 2,035,510 persons every year

Some of you have asked about a Baked Deviled Egg Recipe. I found this one to share with you.

BAKED DEVILED EGGS

Shell and cut 6 hard-cooked eggs lengthwise. Remove the yolks and set aside whites. Mash yolks and blend in 3 tablespoons sour cream, 2 teaspoons prepared mustard and 1/4 teaspoon salt.

Fill whites with this yolk mixture. (You may want to use your own special recipe for fixing deviled eggs.)

To prepare the sauce saute 1/2 cup chopped green pepper and 1/3 cup chopped onion in 2 tablespoons margarine. Remove from heat and stir in 1/4 cup chopped pimento, 1 can cream of mushroom soup and 1 cup sour cream.

Place half of the sauce in a shallow, 1 1/2 quart casserole. Add eggs, cut-side up, in a single layer. Pour the remaining sauce over the eggs. Sprinkle 1/2 cup grated cheddar cheese over the top.

Bake in a preheated 350 degree F. oven for 20 minutes or until the dish is thoroughly heated. Remove from the oven and allow to stand 5 minutes before serving. This recipe makes 6 servings.

Town Pays Final Water Bonds

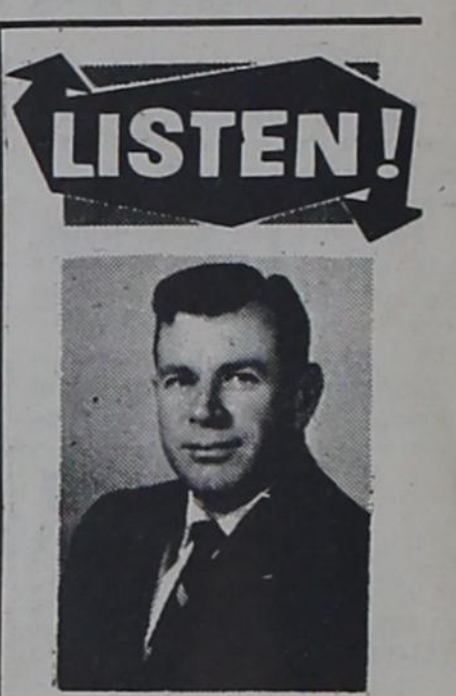

CHERRY CREAM PIE
One baked pie shell or one graham cracker crust; Beat one 8 oz. package of cream cheese until fluffy, add one can Eagle Brand milk, mix well; stir in 1/3 cup lemon juice, 1 teaspoon vanilla and blend well. 1/2 teaspoon sugar
1/2 cup lukewarm water
1 cup scalded milk
1/3 cup Crisco
3/8 cup sugar
2 teaspoons salt
1 beaten egg
5 to 5 1/2 cups flour
Dissolve yeast and 1/2 teaspoon sugar in lukewarm water; Scald milk and add sugar, salt and shortening, making sure the shortening is melted; add yeast mixture to the milk mixture, add egg and beat well. Add enough flour to make soft dough and let stand ten minutes. Knead lightly on floured board until smooth and elastic; place in greased bowl and lightly grease top of dough. Cover and store in refrigerator. Shape rolls about two hours before serving, let rise until double, place in 400 degree oven and bake 15-20 minutes or until golden brown. Punch down remaining dough and return to refrigerator until ready for use.

HEAVENLY HASH
1 1/2 cups hot water
1 box strawberry gelatin
1 jar Royal Anne Cherries
1 small can crushed pineapple
3 medium bananas
1 cup chopped nuts
1 cup heavy whipped cream

Dissolve gelatin in water; when it begins to set, whip it, add fruit, nuts and fold in whipped cream. Place in refrigerator to chill. Equally good as a dessert or to serve with ham chicken or other meats.

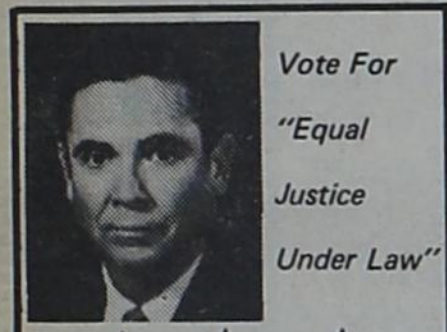

CORN IRRIGATION STUDY EMPHASIZES TIMING

Timing of irrigations is the key factor for top corn yields. "Irrigating at the proper time will increase corn yields more than either the number or amount of applications," says Leon New, area irrigation specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

During the past growing season, the Extension Service and the Texas Sesame Division of Paris Milling Co. teamed up with seven corn producers in the Muleshoe area to pinpoint irrigation procedures that are most effective in growing high corn yields.

"Plant moisture stress occurring after the 10-leaf stage and through the milk stage of kernel development will limit yields severely," points out New. "In the study, highest yields were produced in fields where three rather than two irrigations were applied during this 30-35 day critical moisture period. Yields were as much as 36 bushels per acre more and averaged 21 bushels more where three irrigations were applied."

The first of the three irrigations in the study was applied by the 10 to 12-leaf stage, the second, during the tasseling and silking and the third, during the blister to milk stage of early grain development. Yields were 150 bushels per acre in four fields that received three irrigations during these periods of plant growth.

"Plant moisture stress prior to the 10-leaf stage and later during dough stages of grain de-

velopment will also cut yields," according to New, "but normally not as much as during these peak moisture requirement periods." "In years of light early rainfall, an irrigation by the eight-leaf stage has been profitable. An irrigation during the dough stage has generally always been a profitable application as in this test."

The highest yield of the bushels per acre was produced with five irrigations. Number of irrigations varied from four to seven and yields ranged from 120 to 156 bushels per acre. Both the highest and lowest yields were produced from five irrigations. Time of application was one of the main reasons for the yield difference. One hundred thirty-two bushels were produced using four timely irrigations. This practice produced the highest average yield per irrigation with 33 bushels. Highest yield with seven irrigations was 150 bushels. This averaged 22 bushels per irrigation.

"Using four irrigations, the best yield response was obtained from application at 8 to 10 leaves, tasseling, blister to milk stage and dough stage. With five irrigations, application intervals were a little less, beginning by the eight-leaf stage and following at 12 to 14 leaves, tasseling, blister to milk stage and dough stage. Best response was received when the irrigation interval between the tassel and blister to milk irrigation was 12 to 14 days," reports New.

Individual irrigation amounts ranged from two to seven inches. Lighter, more frequent applications such as the alternate row method stood out as efficient water management procedures. There was no evident benefit from the larger applications.

The specialist contends that good corn yields can be produced using smaller amounts of irrigation water. Twelve inches of summer irrigation were applied using six alternate furrow applications with a 150-bushel yield. Irrigation intervals were 15 to 20 days between the first and second and fifth and sixth irrigations but only 10 to 12 days between the 10-leaf to milk stage. The irrigation at pollination followed in only seven days. The test's top yields of 156 bushels was produced using a total of 16 inches of sum-

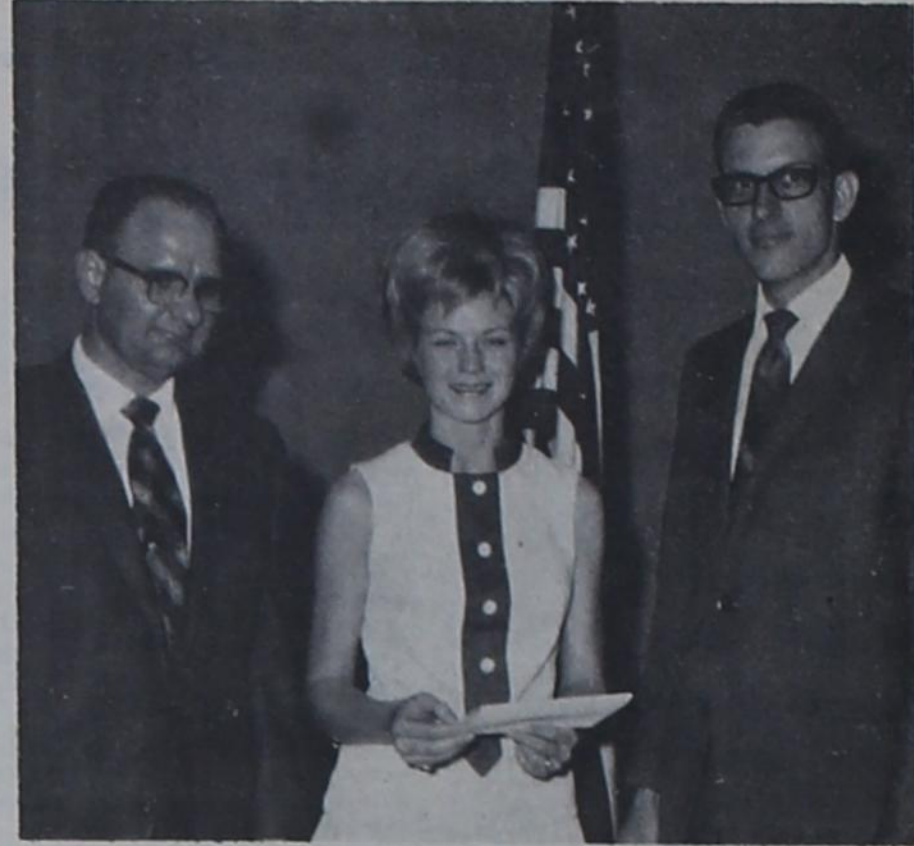
