In commenting on the Governor's School Committee Report, we have made reference to our rural position of relative political insignificance. We have done this not to belittle the efforts of our one state representative but to emphasize that we have only one for a wide area of these plains. We are afraid that this position will worsen even more in the near future. Our one representative will probably be called upon to represent an even wider area, geographically, than at present.

Very recently the United States Supreme Court overturned the apportioned districts of two states. These states had apportioned to even a closer numerical ratio than currently exists in Texas, and it is only logical that the present Court studying the Texas plan will find us unacceptable and our State Legislature will have to again re-apportion the state.

When this occurs, the rural areas of Texas will again suffer a loss of representation in both our state and national governments. The only salvation for us as an area is to work closer together in more effectively wielding what little political power remains outside of the huge metropolises. This will call for a lot of political give and take between adjacent communities, but if the rural areas are to survive, such must be done.

Lately our national news has been filled with the cries of ersatz sympathy from the liberal left toward the hungry and poverty stricken in various and assorted locales of these United States. One prolific bleeder is the senator from South Dakota, George McGovern. This worthy is planning on feeding these hungry masses from our farm surpluses and thereby attaining two aims at once; eliminating surpluses and eliminating hunger and, we suppose incidentally, sewing up a few more votes for said politicians.

We object to this idea on several counts. To begin with, we think that marrying the farm program to welfare will only aggravate the farmer's plight and unfairly cast the farmer as a relief recipient.

We also object to much of the present relief program and practices. Our objections in this field are almost too numerous to mention. We do want to comment on one facet of the relief program to which it is hard to object without being branded as a hard-hearted scrooge. "We view with alarm" the expansion of the school lunch program into a several-meals-a-day operation. We think this is another example of the nose of the camel under the tent; because ultimately where do you stop providing for children if their parents stop doing the providing?

This is a good question and one for which it is difficult to find an answer; but it suggests to us that we may go ahead and publicly accept responsibility for these children of improvident parents, but demand safeguards against this situation arising in the future.

We think enforced sterilization of one or both individuals is necessary in these cases. We strongly object to our forcefully extracted tax money going to pay for the results of other people's sexual activities. In a nut shell, this is the essence of these welfare schemes -- allowing people to escape the burden of their voluntary actions and then taxing society for the legitimate and illegitimate results.

It is past time for society to demand that people pay the price for their actions and be made to accept responsibility for all their actions--social, economic and political. If our society doesn't, we are afraid that the communist society will.

Kindergarten Classes Set

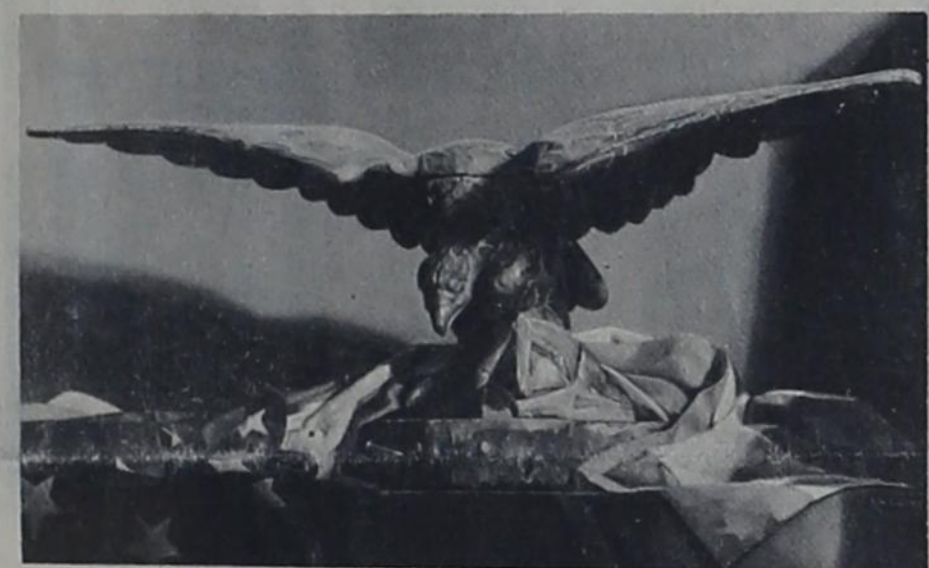
Registration for kindergarten students is set for 9 a.m. today (Friday) at Texico school. Any child who will be eligible to attend school for the first time in the fall is eligible for the classes. When the child is brought to register, he or she should bring a birth certificate. They also should have begun their various shots, since they must have completed the shots before the beginning of school in the fall.

Children who will be six years of age on or before Jan. 1, 1970, are eligible for the classes. Instruction will begin Monday, April 21, at 9 a.m. with Mrs. Jane McAllister as in-

structor and Mrs. Wilma Nell Whitener as teacher aide.

Children attending the kindergarten classes will be provided with lunch each day and will attend classes from 9 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. Parents must furnish transportation for their children as they are not eligible to be transported on the regular school buses.

Supplies needed by the kindergarten group are one No. 2 pencil, a box of eight crayons, a wide line tablet, blunt scissors, white paste (no liquid), a small box of tissue, and a cigar box in which to keep the supplies.

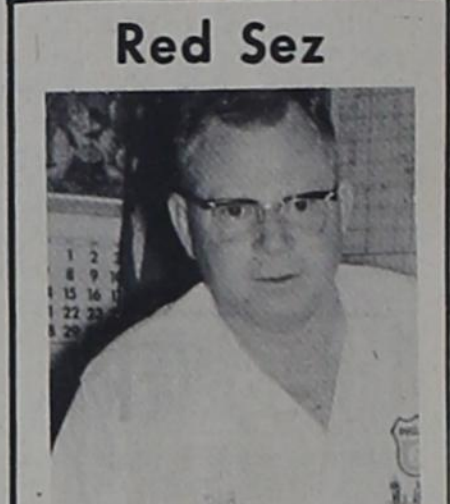

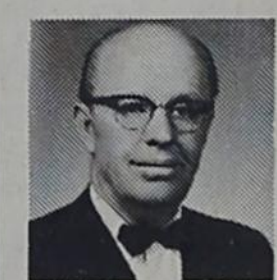

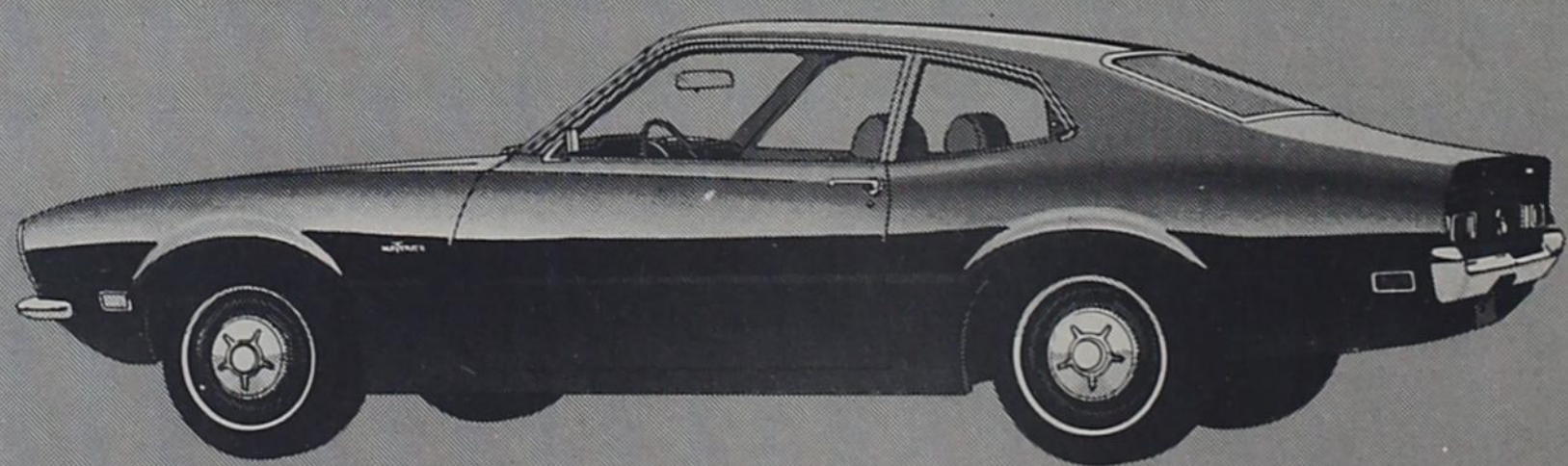

Maverick Introduced By Bob Harper Ford Co. Contract Let On Work At County Courthouse

Bob Harper Ford, 600 Main in Clovis will introduce the long heralded 1970 Maverick, new small car from Ford Division, on Thursday, April 17.

This \$1,995 car is a two-door sedan of modified fastback design with a hint of an air spoiler or "ducktail" at the rear. Designed to carry a family of four with adequate luggage, it is powered by a six-cylinder engine in either of two sizes, 170 or 200 cubic inch displacement. In normal city - suburban driving, Maverick can be expected to deliver 22 1/2 miles per gallon of gasoline.

Planned to be economical in purchase parts, operating cost and maintenance, Maverick offers a longer, lower, wider body than the principal import, yet turns in a tighter radius for easy handling and parking.

Transmission choice includes the fully synchronized three-

speed-manual, the three-speed automatic with an optional shift-for-yourself feature, and, for the first time, a new semi-automatic transmission. Cheaper than the automatic and clutchless, it permits a change of gears with a single movement of the hand lever.

"Maverick will live up to its name in being a unique, independent kind of car," said Bob Harper.

Manufacturer's suggested retail price for Maverick is \$1,995.

NURSERY NEWS

By Alvin Woodburn Garden Center Nursery Clovis, N.M.

"I see that you have tomato plants; isn't it a little early to plant them in the garden?" This is the question we are asked several times each day and it might well be a little early. But the idea of getting plants and getting them started now is because the average frost free date is April 15. Of course, it doesn't involve any risk to say the average is the 15th; it could be some earlier or some later than that date. The risk of having a freeze damage early plantings should be weighed against the gain achieved if they can survive one or two cool nights and make tomatoes some two to three weeks ahead. If the gardener looses, let us say some dozen plants due to some freak late cold spell, then he would have lost his work in setting them out and around \$1.65, the cost of the plants.

Nurseries are getting several types of bedding plants in now because some people are willing to take the chance of a late cold snap while they are working toward the early beautification of their yard and perhaps a better yielding garden.

Speaking of bedding plants brings to light several aspects of the nursery business. Very few retail nurseries are equipped to raise all the plants they will need. Trees, shrubs, roses and a variety of other plants we choose to plant in our yards call for considerable effort, expense, and experience before they are ready for us to plant them "over there by the window." Bedding plants we plant now were started in a greenhouse during the winter months in order for them to be ready for us to plant and expect them to bloom without waiting until the season is more than half gone. Thus, lots of work is eliminated, and also the selection of plants is widened so we can choose just the plants we want.

Bedding plants come in such a variety that it is confusing to even look at the list of plants available. Plants that are planted in this manner can go right ahead and bloom, or what else they were intended to do, without setback, wilt, or some of the other things that plague gardeners.

Even with all of these advantages, good practices still pay.

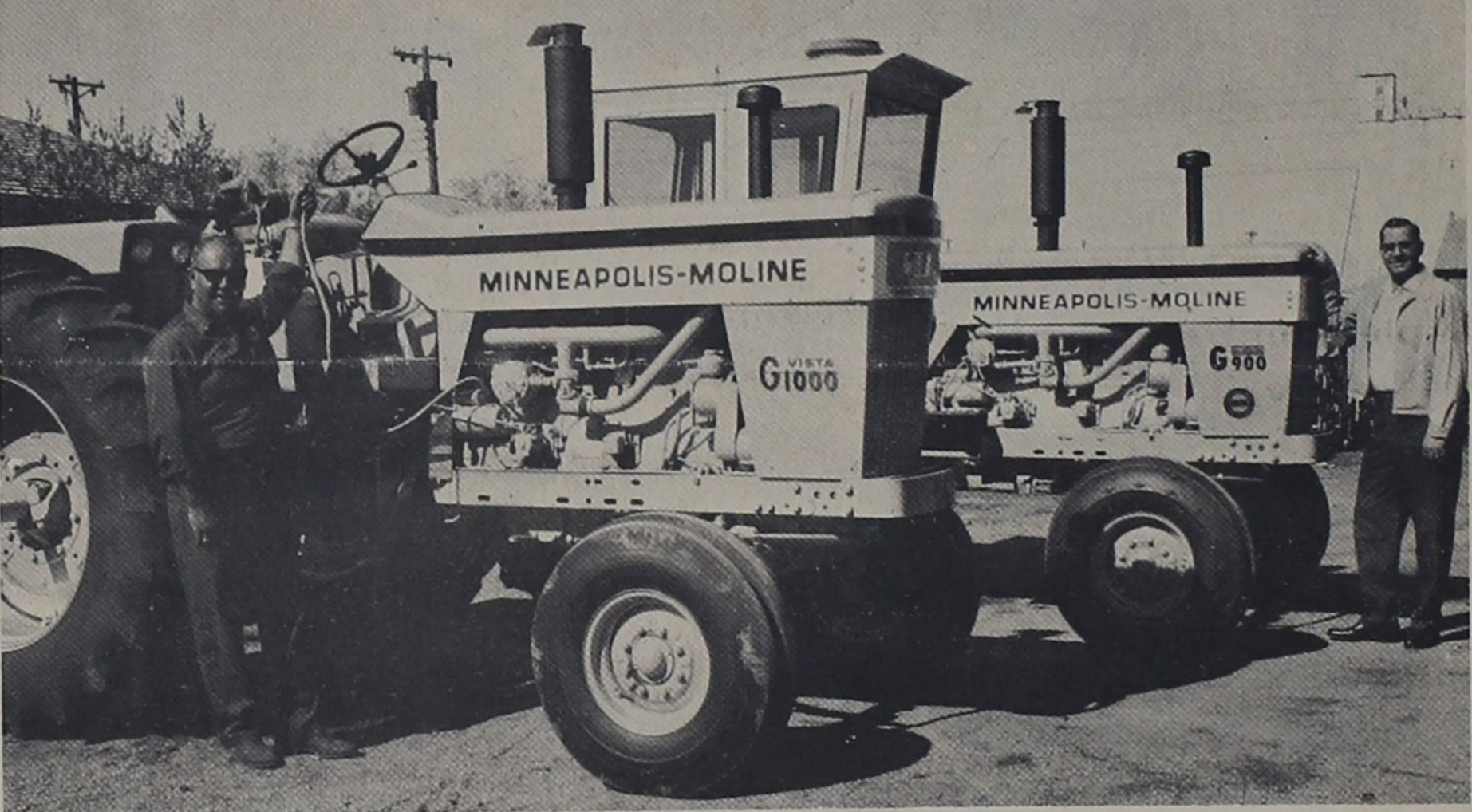

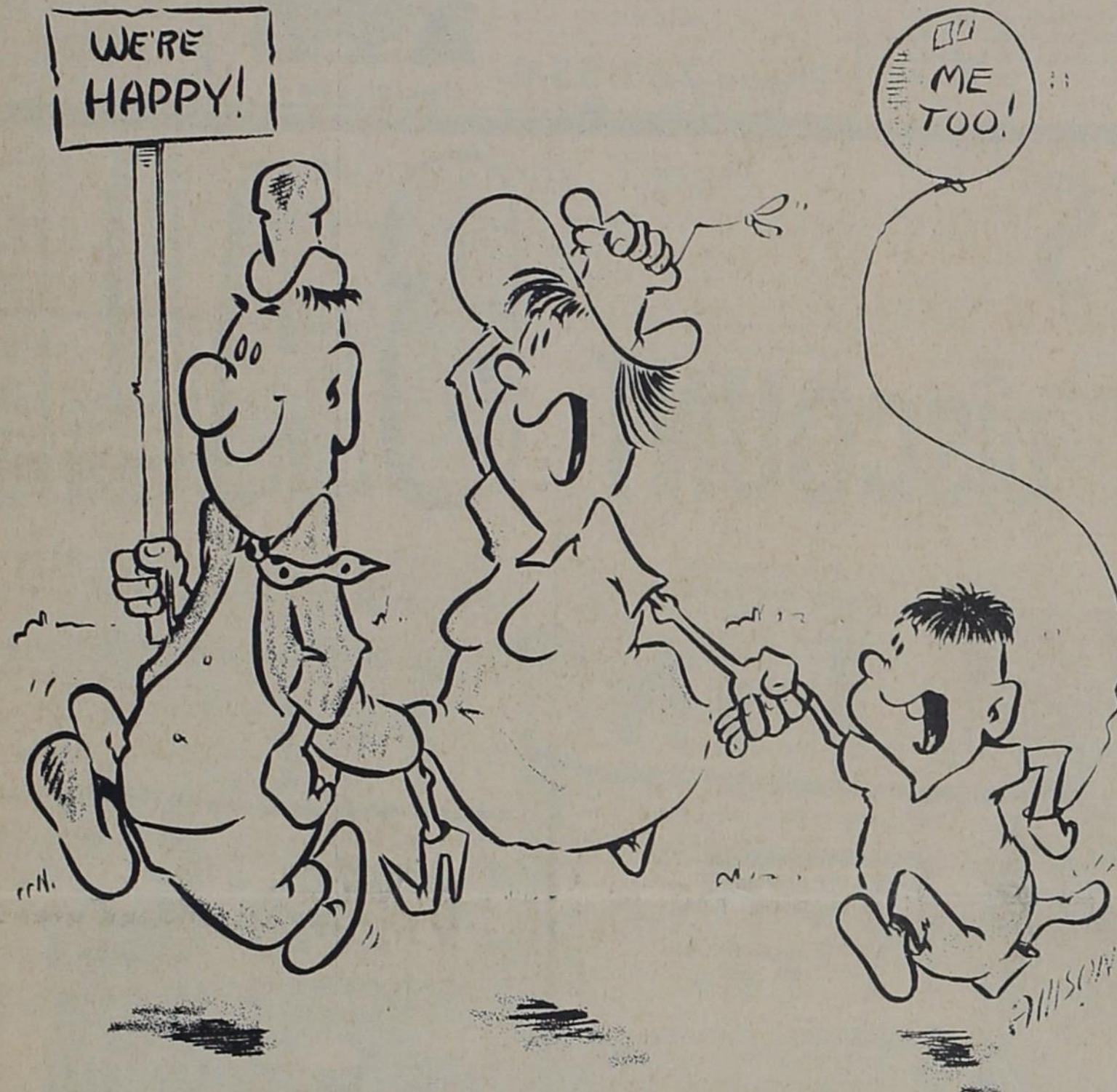

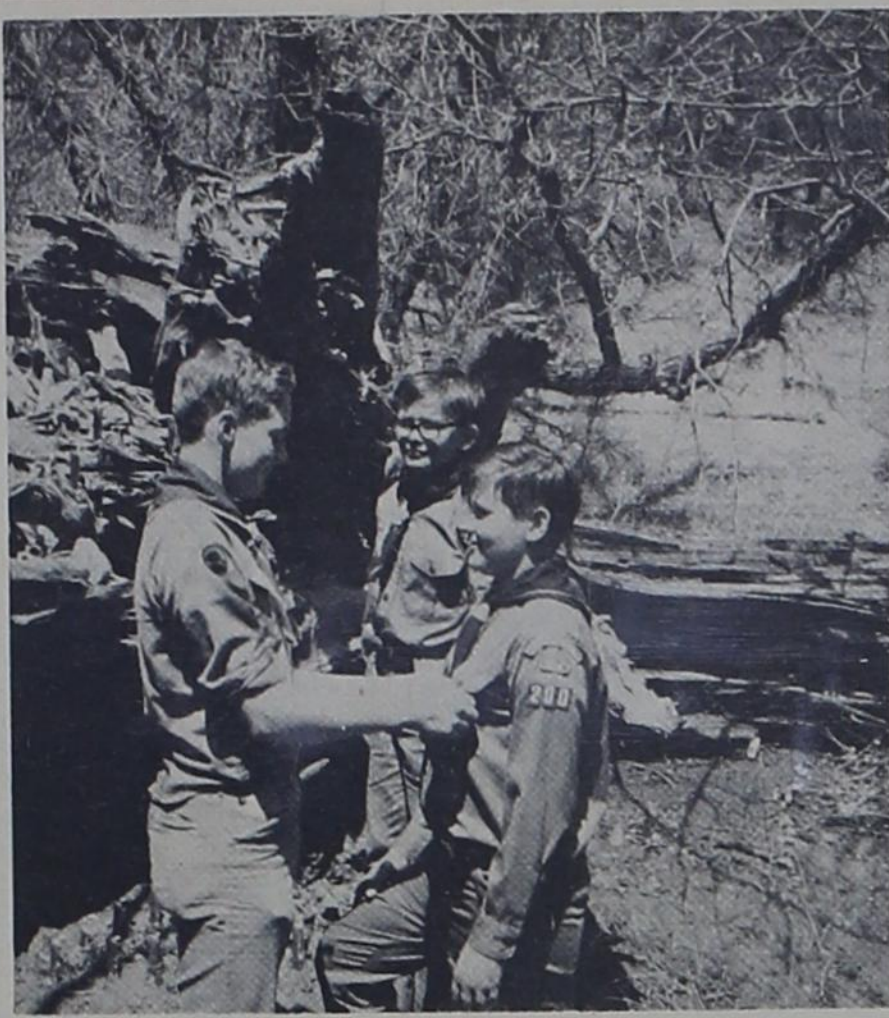
City Dads Reject Applications
