Cats Maul Steers

Dimmitt proved to be more than the Farwell Steers could handle Friday night as the revenge-minded Bobcats handed the Steers a 41-20 defeat. The Bobcats dominated the statistics as well as the scoring, having 377 yards total offense to Farwell's 290. Dimmitt's crushing ground game rolled up 297 yards while their formidable defensive unit held the Steers to 38 yards. Finding his ground attack stymied, Greg Hargrove went to the air, connecting on 22 of 43 passes for 252 yards and three touchdowns, 11 of these being to Dean Stovall for 132 yards.

tally. Mark Clevinger added the PAT and the Steers trailed 7-0 with 8:35 remaining in the first period.

Farwell was quick to strike back. Starting from their 38, the Steers drove to the Dimmitt nine in six plays, including a screen pass to Gary Erwin which netted 40 yards. Hargrove found Dean Stovall in the end zone for the TD and scampered in for two himself to give Farwell an 8-7 edge.

The Cats drove nearly to midfield before Danny Prince alertly recovered a Roy Thomas fumble to give the Steers possession. Dimmitt's defensive unit dug in, however; and forced the Steers to punt. Nelson Chavers scampered 65 yards to paydirt on the first play from scrimmage, only to have the effort called back on a backfield in motion penalty. The Cats were not to be denied, as Danny Newton promptly repeated the action, going 70 yards for Dimmitt's second tally. The try for points failed and Dimmitt led 13-8 with 1:23 remaining.

It took the Blue and White only 34 seconds to retaliate, as

they went 67 yards in two plays, a 38 yard pass to Stovall and an interference penalty. Hargrove hit Danny Prince for the remaining yards and after the try for points was blocked, the Steers had regained the lead, 14-13.

The action wasn't finished as Chavers jaunted 68 yards on the second play following the kickoff to the Farwell one. Bill Sanders went in on a QB sneak with 0:25 seconds remaining in the first stanza. Thomas ran for two and the Bobcats again led, 21-14. In a wild and woolly 58 seconds, 20 points had been scored.

The second quarter action calmed down and turned into a defensive battle. Neither squad could maintain a successful drive and they exchanged punts twice. Finally the Steers began to mount a drive with about five minutes remaining in the half. They started on their own 30 and drove to the Dimmitt one in 15 plays, but just couldn't convert the effort into points as a determined Bobcat defense held. The Cats were content to sit on their lead and run out the clock.

The third quarter saw more of the same as the defense continued to dominate the action. In the first nine minutes of hard-hitting action, only one first down was picked up between the two clubs as the ball was punted out seven times. The first break fell to the Bobcats as Nelson Chavers pounced on a fumble on the Steer seven yard stripe. The determined Steers held for three downs, but as time ran out in the third period, Chavers plunged the remaining inches and Clevinger's PAT gave Dimmitt a 28-14 advantage.

Farwell couldn't move the ball after the kickoff and were forced to punt. The Bobcats started from their own 41 and moved to the Steers one in 16 tries. Roy Thomas plowed over with 4:35 remaining in the game. Greg Meeks and Eddie Winegeart broke through to block the PAT attempt.

Lady Luck continued to frown on the Steers as Henry Rivera covered a rolling kick on Farwell's 26 to deny the Steers possession. It took the Cats nine plays to reach the five, but Mark Wohlgenuth found Loy Wylie for the TD. The try for points was successful and Dimmitt remained on top, 41-14. The Steers refused even yet to admit defeat as Stovall took the kick 46 yards and the referees tacked on another 15 for piling on, giving Farwell a first and ten on Dimmitt's 20. Hargrove threw for his third touchdown of the evening, hitting Prince for the tally. After the PAT attempt failed, the scoring was complete with Dimmitt coming out on top, 41-20.

The Steers are 1-1 for the year and will play their first home contest against the Cowboys from Plains tonight (Friday).

Coach Toby Booth stated following the game that the Dimmitt club is a fine club, adding, "this however, takes nothing away from the Steers for they turned in a creditable performance."

Booth continued, "our weakest point was our defense and the loss of linebacker Mike Flowers was keenly felt. Our passing was good throughout the game."

Wolverines Lose First Ball Game

Texico High School opened up a new chapter in athletics, for the first time in 32 years, last Friday, when the Wolverines returned home from Vaughn suffering a 54-0 defeat from the Eagles.

According to head coach Jimmy Wynne, "Our ball club was inexperienced, our ball handling was not sufficient and they just tore up our single-wing formation."

Texico is playing in no district alignment this season, Mike Navidomskis, assistant coach, said, "I like to feel that our loss was due to two things; one, our lack of experience, and two, it was our first ballgame."

Ken Farmer, a junior defensive linebacker and offensive guard, was the only experienced player for the Wolverines. Wynne said, "Ken did a good job, but he couldn't do it all." Farmer is a former player for the Clovis High School Bobcats.

The Texico team has already suffered the loss of three important players. Martin White, a junior, suffered a knee injury and was taken to Lubbock to undergo surgery. Keith Morris, a senior, also suffered a knee injury. And Butch Chumley, a 180-pound senior, has moved. Chumley was not only outstanding in football but also in basketball and track.

During pre-game warm up, Lenard Abeyta, Vaughn's head coach, indicated to Coach Navidomskis, "You have young, big boys and by looking at them I expect trouble tonight."

"The Wolverines are at a disadvantage in every respect of football performances," said coach Wynne, "but they hold the key that may lift them off the ground; desire! desire to win, to struggle on, no matter how tough the consequences. Desire to exploit that last ounce of strength, to drive on for that last ten yards, or stop that 200-pound linebacker."

August 13, the Wolves' first official practice, Assistant Coach Navidomskis said, "Boys, if you came out here, you'll have to pay the price."

Although Texico took a shellacking from Vaughn, Wolverine Coach Navidomskis, was philosophical. He commented, "Think of it this way, the Wolverines have gone undefeated for 32 years."

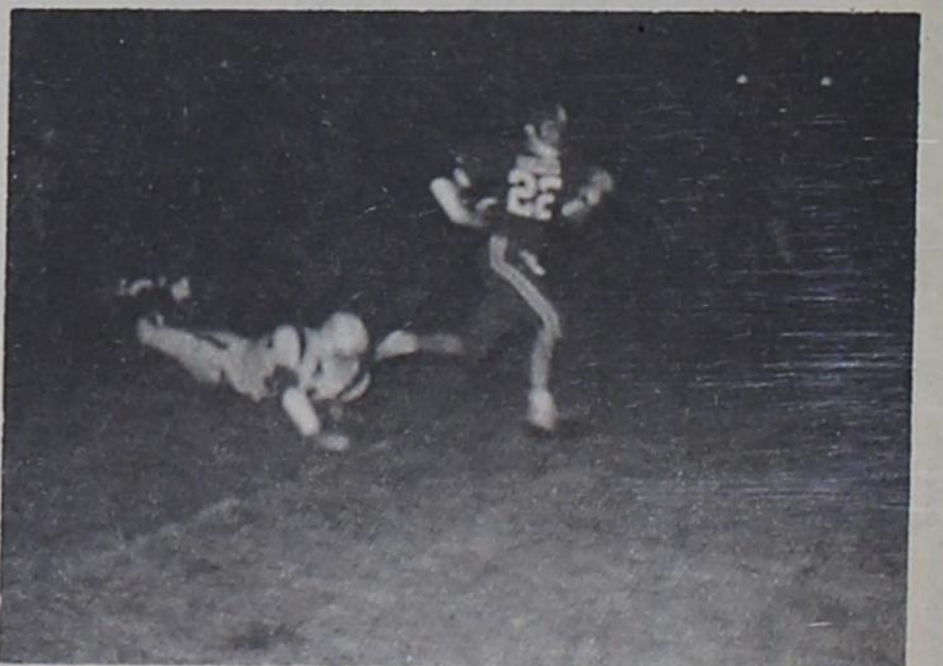

The "liberal" political element of the country professes a great desire to help suffering humanity, and in furtherance of this loudly announced objective, they often coin some very catchy phrases. One of the phrases or catch words recently being used by the liberal left is "tax reform." This has a very appealing ring to it and any hint of tax relief is looked upon rather warmly by the long suffering taxpayer. But as in most of their ballyhoo, this phrase doesn't stand up to reason or judgment.

We received a publicity statement from the office of Texas Attorney General Crawford Martin which takes exception to one of the most loudly proclaimed "tax reforms" of our "people loving pinkos." Attorney General Martin takes a potshot at the removing of the tax exempt status of municipal bonds with the following statement: "A 'Tax Reform Bill' which has passed the House and is now being considered by U. S. Senators is not 'tax reform' at all, but a cruel hoax to mislead the American people into believing the legislation will help the 'little man.'

"Provisions in the bill would remove the tax exempt status of municipal and state bonds. This will result in higher interest rates and a shift of the additional cost to local taxpayers in the form of higher property taxes and increased costs for water, hospital rooms and college tuition fees and many other public services.

"Last year, I approved one billion dollars in bonds, and if the same amount of bonds is issued next year, and the proposed legislation is enacted, it will cost the citizens of Texas \$450,000,000 more interest during the life of the bonds. This will be the equivalent of a head tax of \$45 for every man, woman and child in this state. This cost will recur year after year, and the figure will increase as the state grows in population."

We think this is a very valid statement from our Attorney General and a point that the Texas Congressional delegation would do very well to heed.

Somewhat we have the sinking feeling that in its headlong rush to give us tax relief, the Congress will only put more taxes upon us, payable to a different taxing body. This would be par for the usual congressional activity.

Flowers, who plays tailback and defensive tackle for the Farwell Steers, was hospitalized in Dimmitt Friday night. He was transferred to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock Saturday morning where he underwent surgery to repair the breaks to both bones in his right leg. The leg was broken just below the knee.

Following surgery, the leg was placed in a cast. Reports indicate that the leg will remain in the cast for at least four months.

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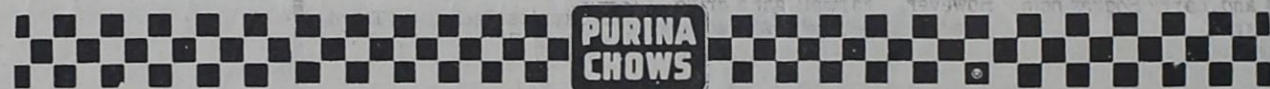

Arthur Graves picked up his second TD of the night in the third quarter on a run from scrimmage. Derrell Mathews ran for the two-point conversion and the score stood 16-0. Again in the third quarter Lazbuddie got another TD as Derrell Mathews dived over from two yards out. The conversion attempt was unsuccessful and as the third quarter drew to a close, the score was 22-0.

In the final period of play the Horns scored twice. Derrell Mathews set sail on an 18-yard run and found the end zone. He kicked the extra point and

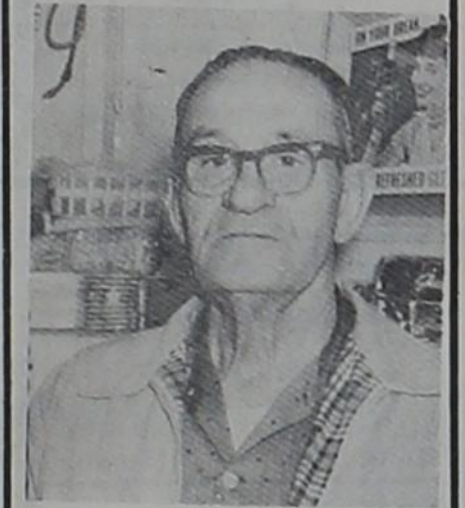
G. A. Coronation Observed Class To Organize At Texico Church

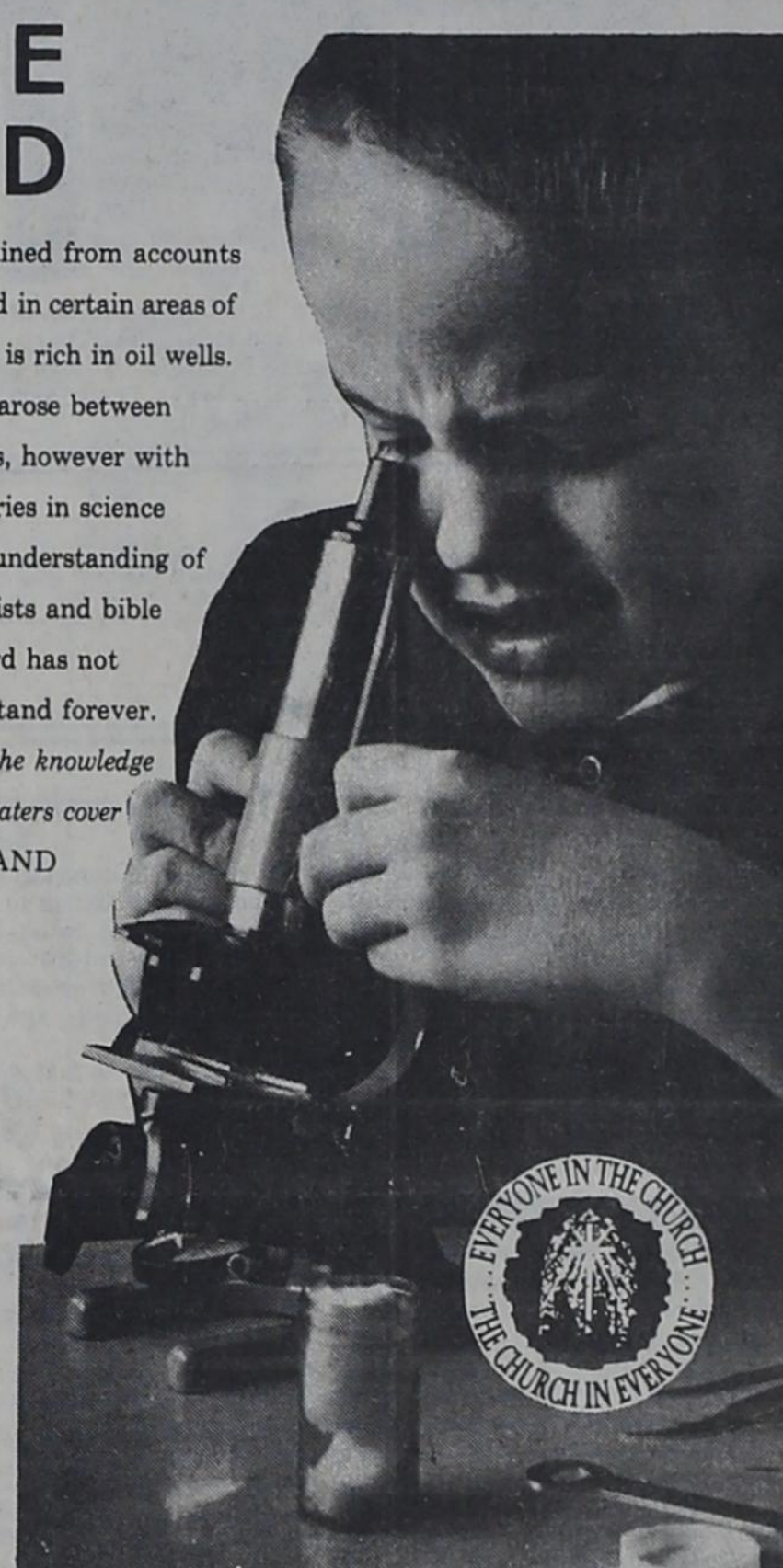
SCIENCE and GOD

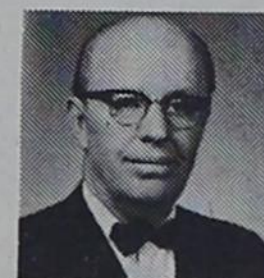

the Missionary Baptist Churches of America.

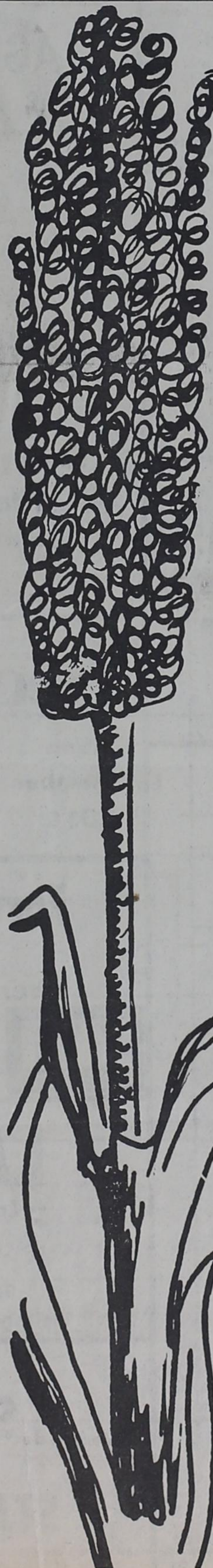

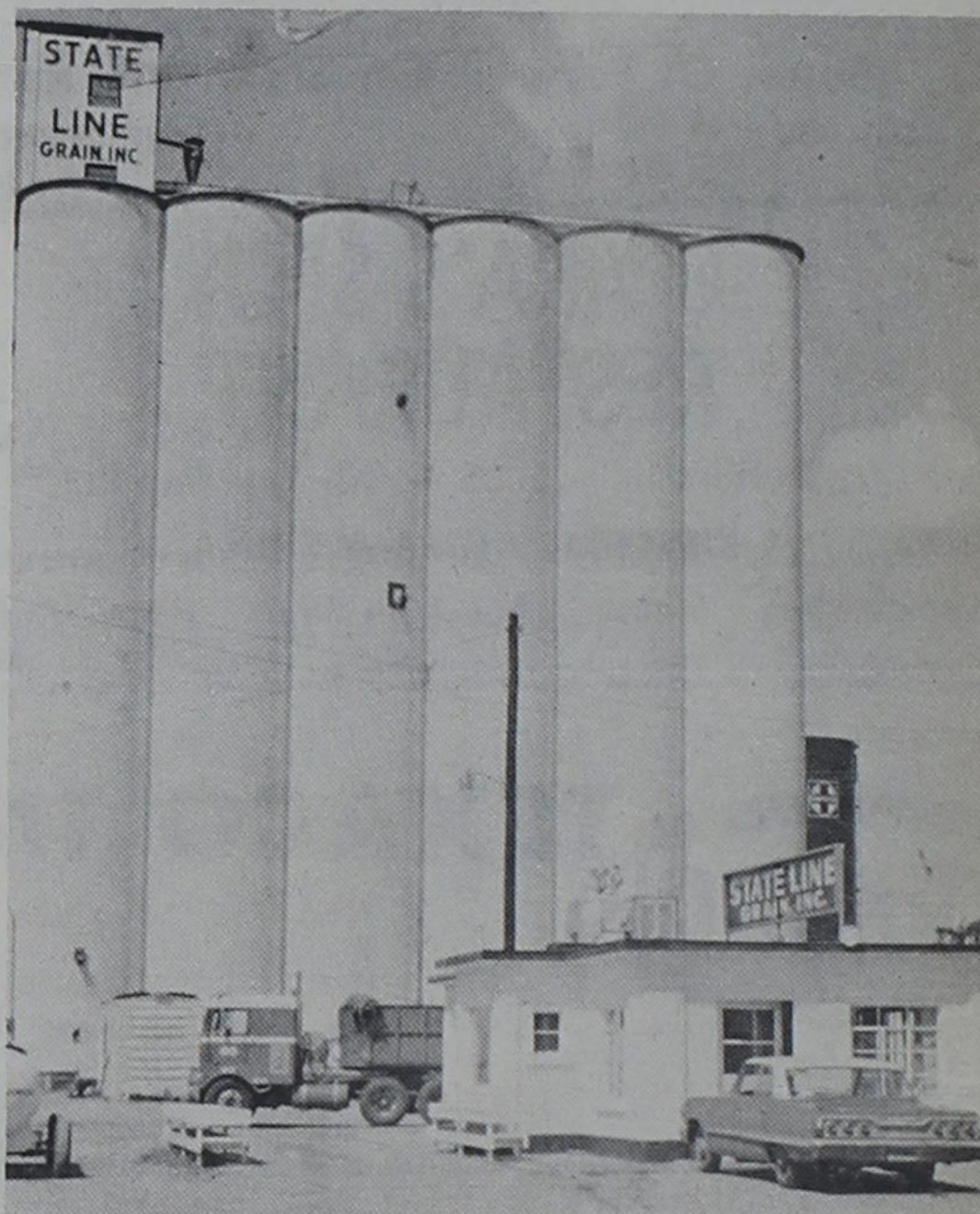
