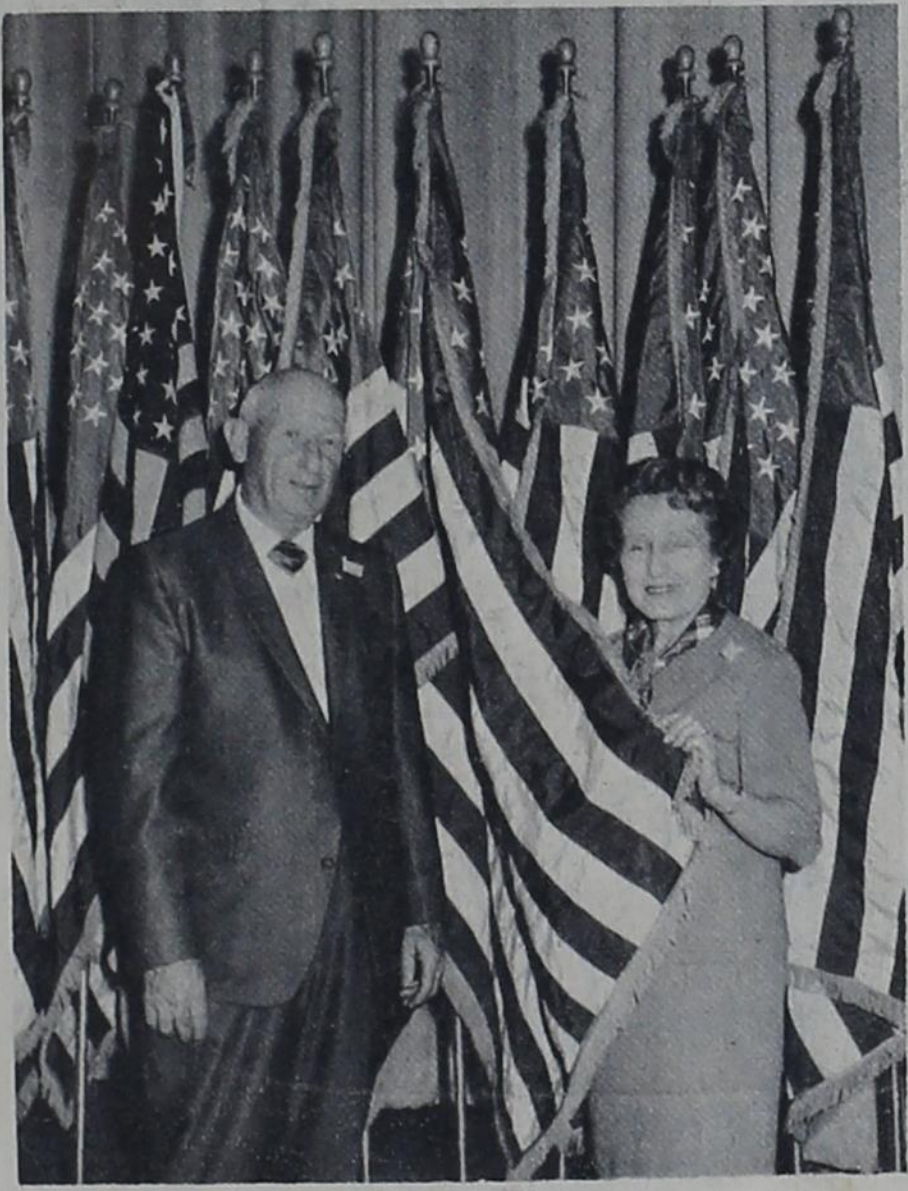
Also on the agenda will be films of at least two old Steer football games, and short talks by ex-students. The entire program will be provided by ex-students.

The Farwell Steers jumped to a 20-0 lead and then held off a determined herd of Bovina Mustangs Friday night to gain a 23-19 victory and extend their unsmeared district mark to 4-0. The win marked the 16th straight for Farwell over their Bulltown rivals. Gary Erwin again paced the Steer infantry with an effort of 122 yards. Dean Stovall led the pass receivers with seven receptions for a total of 118 yards. Stuart McMeans had quite a night as he ripped the Steer defense for 226 yards and two touchdowns, as well as intercepting a pass and netting 33 yards on a reception from Ramirez. The loss dropped the Mustangs to 4-5 for the year and winless in four conference starts.

McMeans returned the opening kickoff to the Bovina 32-yard line and the Mustangs went to the attack. Sophomore QB Roy Ramirez moved his club across the midfield stripe to the 46 before Larry Erwin alertly fell on a Mustang fumble to halt the drive. The Steers

went on the move, gaining the Bovina nine in eight plays. With 6:30 remaining in the first period of play, Mark Williams came out of his flanker-back position on a reverse and sailed across the goal line. Bob Wiman kicked the extra and the Steers had a 7-0 lead.

Mike Beauchamp returned Wiman's kick to the Farwell 41 and the Mustangs penetrated to the 27 before the Steers' defensive unit could halt them. The offense came on and quickly drove to the Bovina nine on the running of Erwin and a 20-yard pass, Hargrove to Stovall. Once again Mark Williams got the call and went around left end for the touchdown. Wiman added the extra to bring the score to 14-0 with 1:31 left in the initial period.

The defense again picked up where the offense left off to deny the sputtering Bovina offense as Stovall picked off a Ramirez pass on the 45 and returned it to the Mustang 29. Bovina's defense came to life to drop the Steers for two losses and set up a punting situa-

tion, fourth and 27 on the 47. Fifteen yards for roughing the kicker gave Farwell a fourth and 12 and the Steers elected to go for it. Erwin picked up more than enough as he scampared to the 15. Following a five-yard gain by Erwin, Barry Williams powered into the end zone from ten yards out. A high snap foiled the PAT attempt and left the score at 20-0.

McMeans ignited the Mustangs as they moved from their own 32 to the Steer 34 on his fine running. A holding penalty left Bovina faced with third and 21 from the 49. McMeans found daylight and went all the way to put Bovina on the scoreboard. Jimmy Harris kicked the point after to narrow the margin to 20-7.

The Steers utilized most of the remaining five minutes in a drive that moved to the Bovina six in nine tries with Erwin carrying over for the touchdown. A holding penalty nullified the effort and the Steers couldn't get it in again. (Continued on Page 7)

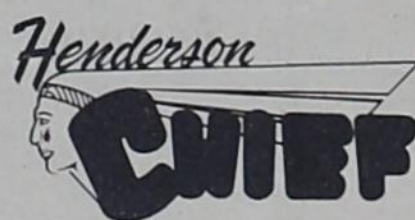

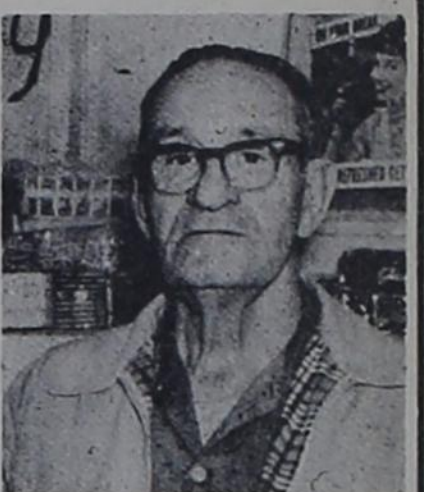

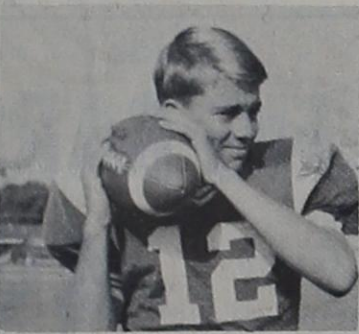

For Hard-Of-Hearing --

Specialized Training Available

A class for the deaf and hard-of-hearing has been organized at the Special Services Center in Clovis. The age range of the children in the class is three to five. However, children as young as 10 months of age are eligible for acceptance into the program. The class is a satellite program of the School for the Deaf in Santa Fe.

Children from Clovis and continuous counties are included in the class. It is now possible for deaf children to receive the same specialized training that they would have at the School for the Deaf in Santa Fe. The child must be 5 years of age before being eligible for classes in Santa Fe. However, training for the child at a younger age is most vital, therefore, a child as young as 10 months of age is accepted at the Special Services Center. The very latest acoustical equipment is used in the classroom. Individual therapy is provided in a special tutorial room located within the classroom.

A new class for the deaf is being organized for the next school year. The class will be

composed of intermediate age children. The class will have facilities, equipment and specialists similar to the pre-school class.

Parents who suspect that their child is deaf or hard-of-hearing should contact Gay Alford, Special Services Center,

Mrs. Watkins, mother of the groom, was attired in a navy and white linen suit with navy accessories. Her corsage was of white carnations.

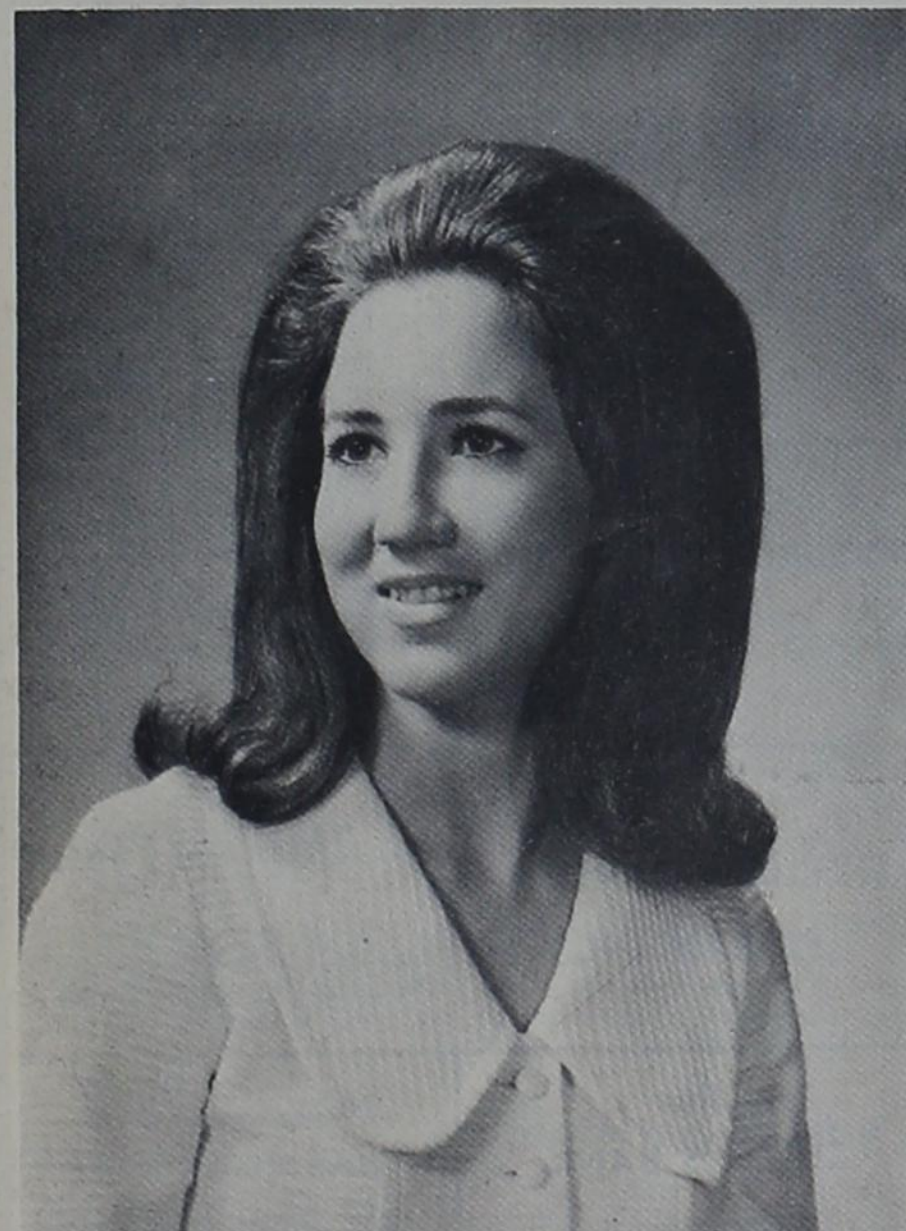

Patricia Smith, FHA president, was master of ceremonies

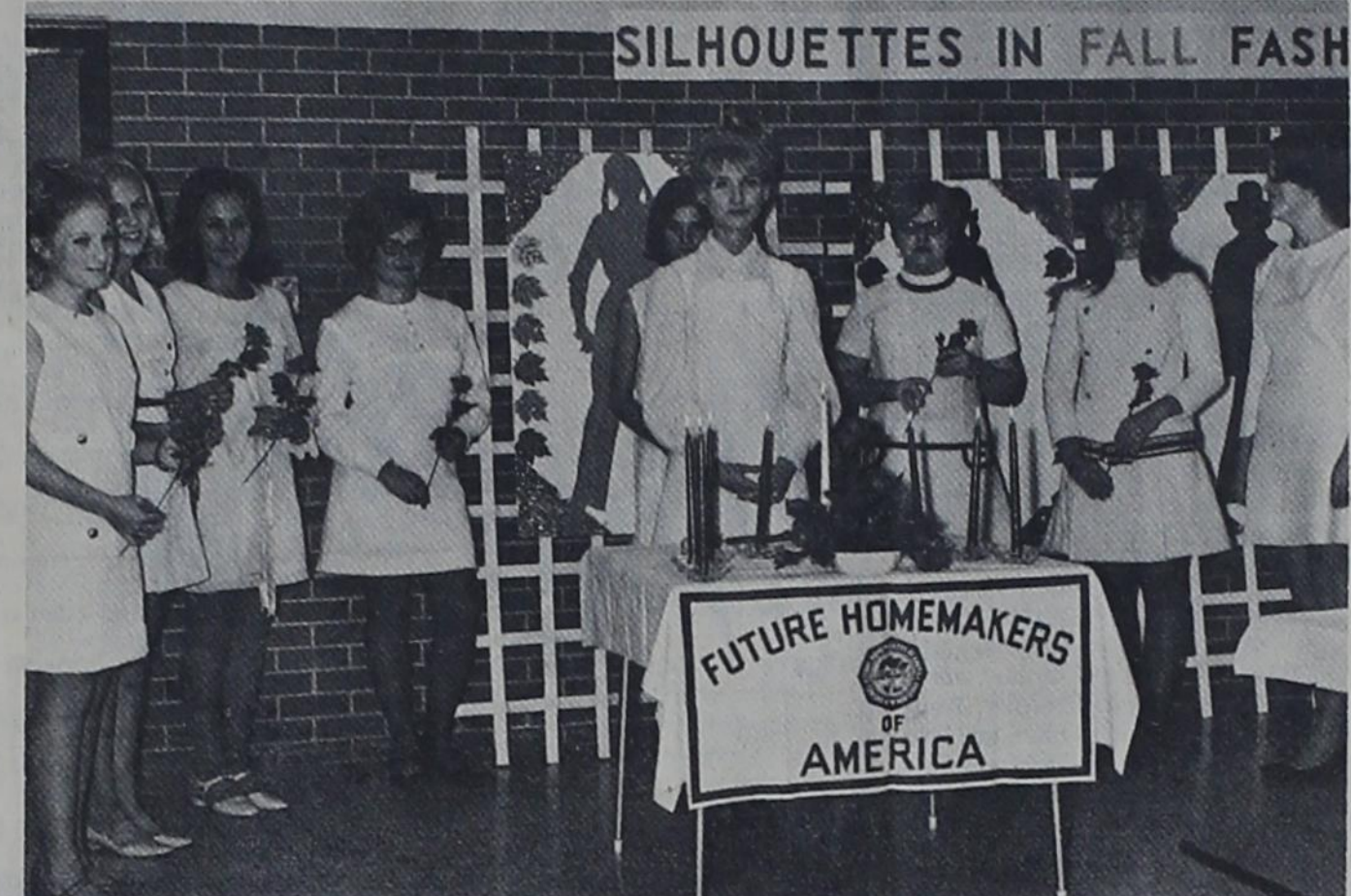

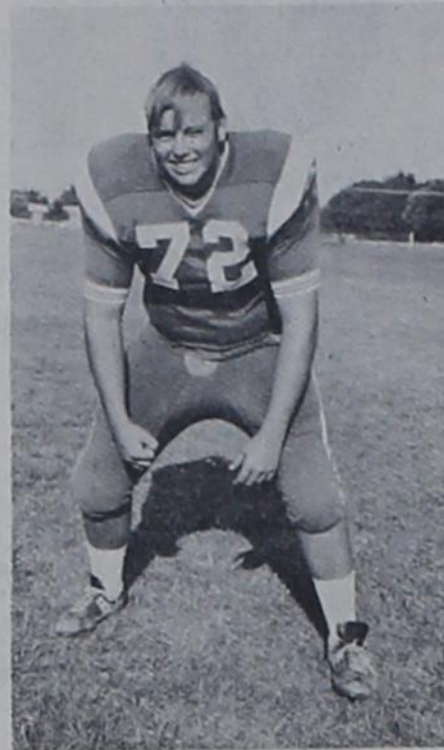

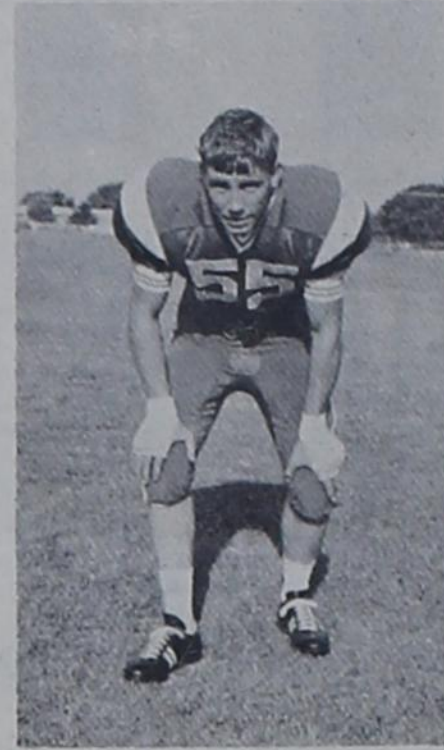

ASCS Office Lists 1970 Farm Program Facts

Louis Welch, chairman of the Farmer County ASC Committee, reminds all farm operators that they should "keep-up" with the provisions of the farm programs in which they participate. Items of interest (and importance) at the present time are as follows:

- Sugarbeets come under proportionate shares in 1970 and November 21, 1969 is the final date for applying for a 1970 sugarbeet share.
- Cotton producers who plan to transfer 1970 cotton allotments should keep in mind that an application for such transfer must be filed by no later than December 31, 1969.
- The County ASC Office will accept applications for cost-sharing of conservation practices under the 1970 ACP during the month of December 1969. Applications filed in December will be for practices to be carried

out during the first seven months of 1970. Being considered as feed grains, Welch explained, means that Triticale and Winter-graze may not be grown for harvest on acres which farmers agree to divert from crop production. These crops may be planted on diverted acres for grazing during the grazing period, provided the crops are disposed of by the final disposition date. This date is May 1. Not being covered by the feed grain program means Triticale

and Wheat-graze will not count as part of a farm's feed grain base. Neither would these crops be eligible for price-support, nor for the substitution provision of the wheat-feed grain programs.

Welch urges all farmers to contact their ASCS office for answers to their farm program questions. He states, with a grin, that the "coffee shop experts" are not always right.

The Mustangs held following the kick and then threatened again as they moved to the Farwell 30. The Steers defensive corps came through as they held

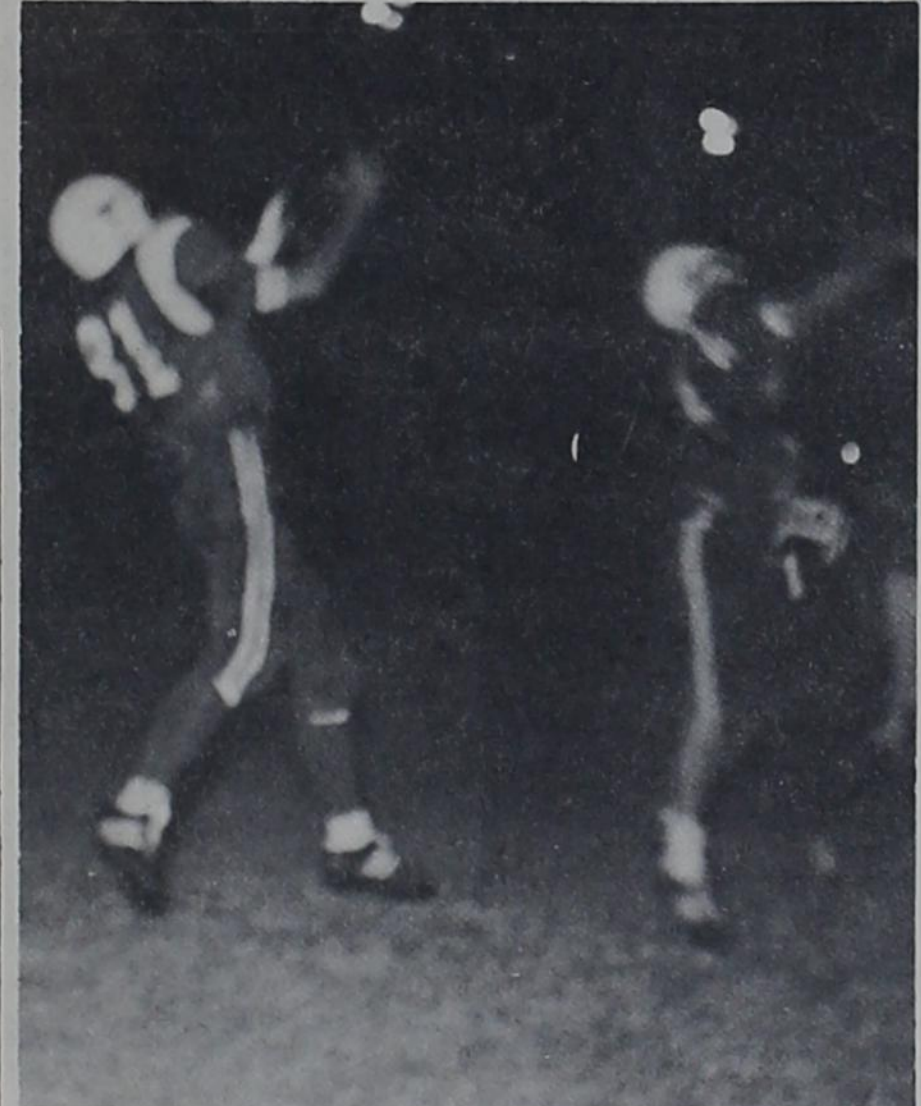
on fourth down to insure the victory.

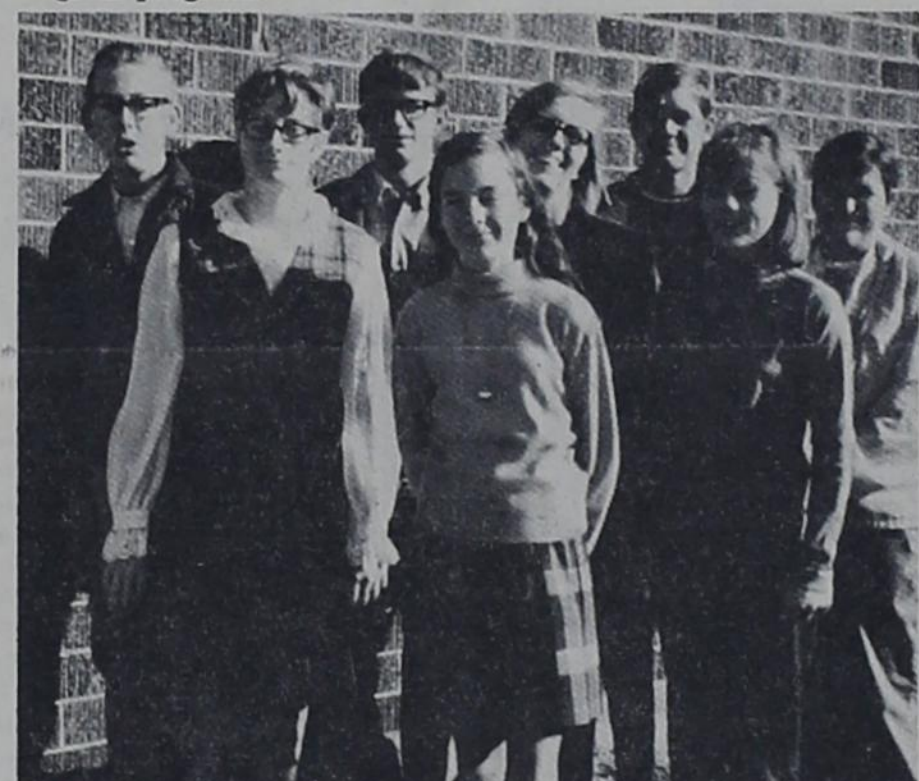

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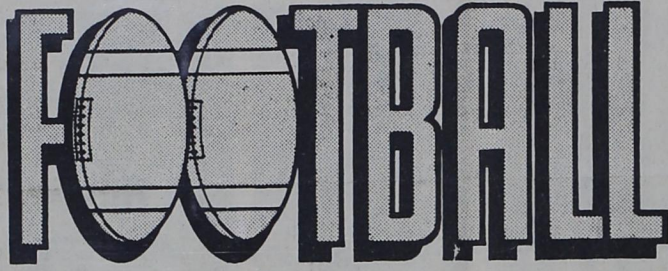
