## Lazbuddie-Throckmorton Play Regional Game

Lazbuddie and Throckmorton will meet for the second year in a row in the Class B regional football playoff tonight (Friday) Dec. 5 at 7:30 in Crosbyton. Last year Throckmorton was the victor with a 27-6 score.

Lazbuddie won its way to the regional game with a 14-0 win over Groom last weekend. However, Throckmorton drew a bye to the regional playoff.

This was the second straight year that a Lazbuddie team had downed an undefeated Groom team in bi-district play.

In taking the bi-district win, Lazbuddie drove for scores in the first and second stanzas and then held off Groom to trip the unbeaten Tigers for the bi-district title.

Derrell Matthews was the star for the Lazbuddie Longhorns as he rushed for 128 yards on 23 carries and gathered in both Lazbuddie's completed tosses for an additional 51 yards.

Already the leading scorer in the South Plains, Matthews added another TD to his record and then doubled as quarterback to pass for the two-point conversion after the second TD. He also had another tally called back on a penalty.

Matthews capped a 50-yard Lazbuddie drive deep in the opening period on a 15-yard scamper to paydirt to put Lazbuddie on top.

Deep in the second quarter, the Longhorns shoved across the final tally of the night. Matthews raced 15 yards to cap an

85-yard drive, but the TD was called back on a five-yard illegal motion penalty. On the next play from scrimmage Larry Hodges took a pitchout and swept around left end for 20 yards and the score. Matthews then passed to Charles Lee for the two-point conversion and Lazbuddie led 14-0 at half-time.

Groom's only serious threat came in the final stanza when the Tigers marched to the Longhorn 20 before running out of steam.

Groom was able to control the ball most of the third stanza, but failed to cross the double stripes to paydirt. Lazbuddie used eight minutes of the last stanza on its final drive of the night, but was unable to score.

The Horns moved to the Groom one in the fading minutes of the game before failing to cash in on the opportunity.

# Hargrove, Porter Award Winners

A total of 400 persons entered in the annual merchant's football contest this season. This is a record number of entries for any year since the event was initiated 11 years ago.

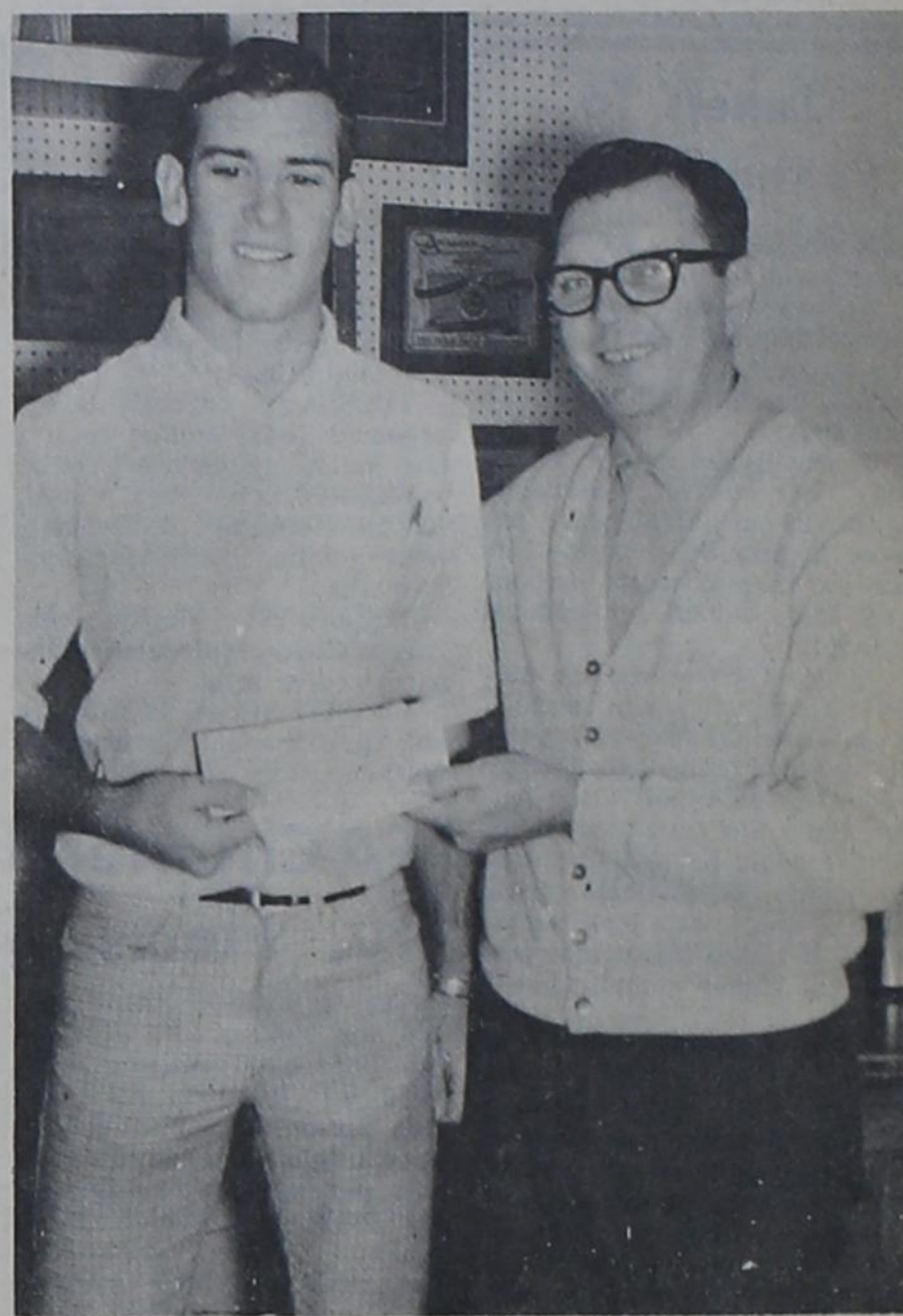
Winner of the grand prize, two tickets to the Cotton Bowl game and \$50 expense money for the trip, is Greg Hargrove. Second place winner, two tickets to the Sun Bowl and \$25 expense money for the trip, is Champ Porter. Hargrove and Porter each called a total of 91 games correctly during the 12-week contest; however, Hargrove was closer on the tiebreaker scores during the event than was Porter.

Other persons completing the contest with a high percentage of games called correctly were Bill Prince, who called 90 games correctly, and Mrs. Elaine Wardlaw, who had called a total of 89 games correctly during the event. Prince had been in the lead in the contest for several weeks until last week, when he dropped to second place in a three-way tie with Porter and Mrs. Wardlaw. Hargrove had been in first place for the past two weeks.

Dean Stovall and Mrs. Jerald Goyer each finished the contest with 88 games called correctly.

Not only did Champ Porter complete the contest by winning a trip to the Sun Bowl, but he also won the first place weekly prize in the final week, calling seven games correctly and being closer to the tiebreaker score than the other persons calling seven games correctly. Winner of second prize for the week was Carlton Newell

of Muleshoe. He also called seven games correctly but missed the tiebreaker score too far to receive top prize. Winner of the third place weekly award was Mrs. Leroy Kitten. (Continued on Page 6)

## Pryor Reeves Services Held

Funeral services and burial were conducted in Houston Saturday afternoon for Pryor Reeves, 31, son of Mrs. Doris Reeves, who was killed in a plane crash the previous Wednesday.

Mr. Reeves and two other men were killed when the plane in which they were riding crashed in West Bay about one mile west of the Galveston Causeway. Just prior to the crash, the plane had been making practice instrument approaches at the Galveston city airport.

Mr. Reeves was employed by Superior Oil Co. of Houston and was flight engineer on a C-140 Jetstar belonging to the company. He was also a pilot but was not piloting the plane that crashed.

In addition to his mother, Mr. Reeves is survived by his widow, Becky; two sons, Richard and Danny of Houston; and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Guy Nickels of Muleshoe.

Mrs. Reeves was accompanied to Houston for the final rites by Mrs. Joyce Haseloff of Farwell and Mrs. Joan Gaston of Sudan.

## Pheasant Season Opens December 13

Hunters will have nine days again this year to bag a pheasant during season which will be December 13-21. The bag limit for pheasants this season is two cocks per day and a possession limit of four.

The Farmer County Game Association met in Bovina December 1 and decided to continue with the tail feather contests. Farwell, Bovina, and Friona are sponsoring these contests locally. First prize for the longest tail feather turned in at each of these locations will be \$15. Second prize is \$10 and third is \$5.

Bovina is the headquarters for turning in feathers in the Bovina area. Sponsors of the cash awards at Bovina will be Hartzog Seed Farm and The Bovina Blade.

In Friona, tail feathers can be turned in to the Friona Consumers. Sponsors of prizes in this area are Friona Consumer, Production Credit Association and Friona State Bank.

Farwell Hardware is the headquarters in the Farwell area. Security State Bank, Shirley Anderson Pitman, Inc., and Farwell Hardware are the sponsors in the Farwell area.

A plaque will be presented by the Farmer County Game Association to the person turning in the longest tail feather in the county.

All tail feathers must be turned in by no later than 10 a.m. Monday, Dec. 22, at one of the headquarters.

According to Jack Patterson, president of the County Game Association, the number of pheasants this year vary from one part of the county to another. Generally, it appears from all reports that the number may be fewer compared to last year.

# Presentation To Williams Highlights Exes Reunion

Highlight of the bi-annual reunion of ex-students at Farwell School last Saturday night was a presentation made to Jack Williams by a former student who is now serving on the school board of education. The presentation of a paddle bearing the inscription, "Presented to

Jack Williams for 25 years service in the Farwell Schools -- sometimes the best board of education is a shingle!" was made by Harry Sheets.

Prior to the presentation of the shingle, Mrs. Mona Hartzog, another ex-student of Farwell School, paid a tribute to

Williams, saying, "There has been something going on in the Farwell School for the past 25 years which should be taken care of without further delay." She then added that Williams, who has served as teacher, coach, superintendent and principal during the past 25 years,

had been putting more hours into a school day than required, working as coach, sponsor, tutor, counselor, and advisor. She noted that he had also been guilty of stressing character and citizenship for all students under his guidance, and had finally been found guilty of practicing witchcraft at a recent pep rally at the school when he declared (in public) that with the spirit shown at the rally he was sure he could twirl better and kick higher than any cheerleader or twirler present.

As Williams accepted the award, two of his three sons, Dr. Thomas Williams of Galveston and Richard Dee Williams, a professor at Arizona State College, were present.

Williams' other son, Bert Williams of Houston, was unable to attend the gathering. Also present was Williams' wife, Ella Ruth.

It has been estimated that Williams has taught approximately 2,000 children since becoming a part of the Farwell School system.

The welcome to the banquet was extended by Billy Meeks, president of the Ex-Student Association. Invocation was given by Wesley Osborne of California, husband of a former Farwell student, Edith Berry Osborne. The Texico FFA Chapter is selling Christmas trees as a fund raising project again this year, according to information released early this week.

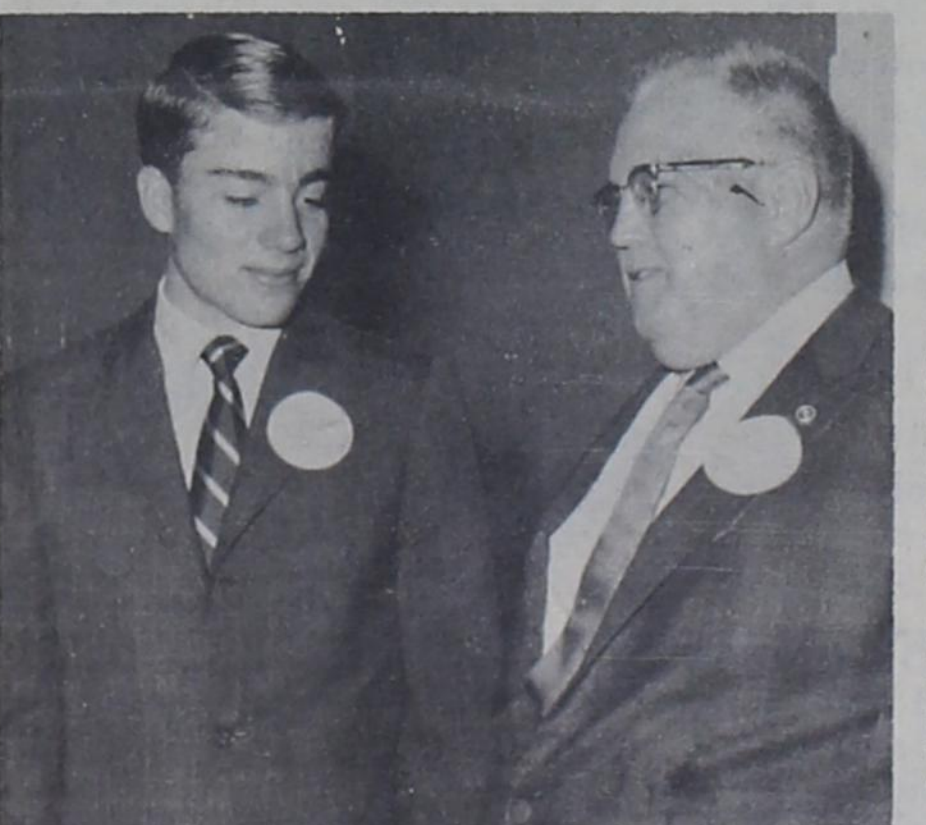

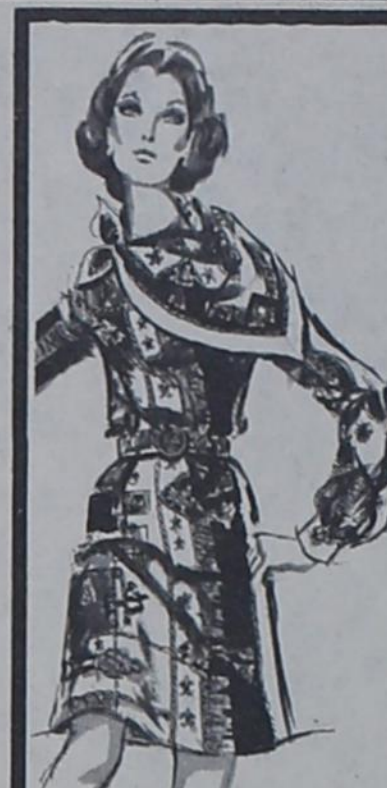

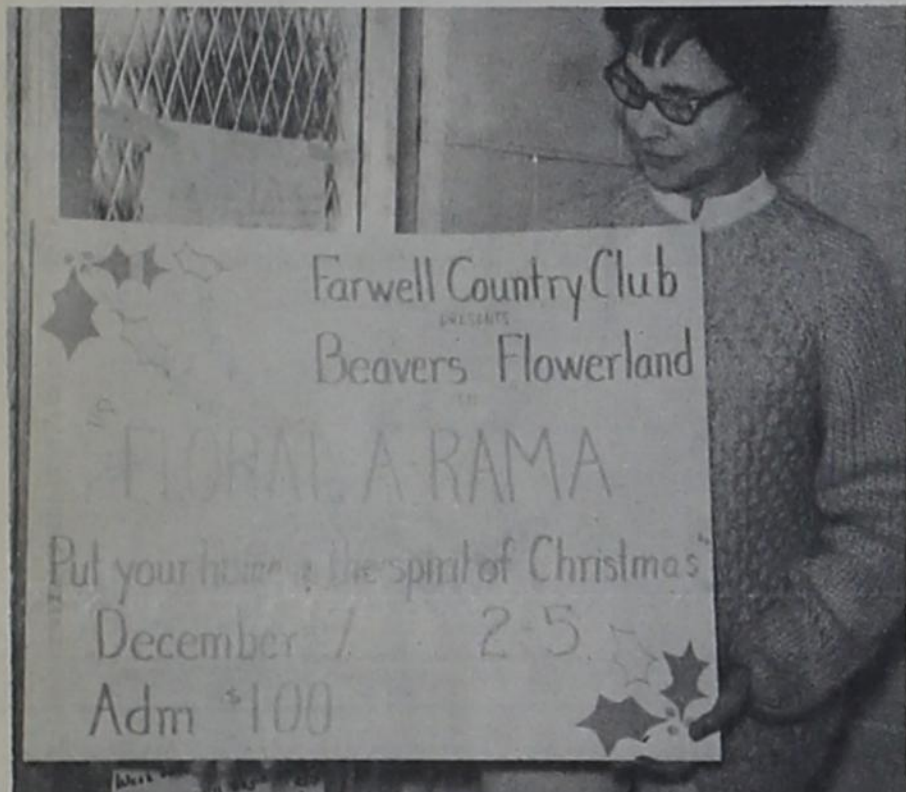
