The troop will pick up and deliver your car if you wish. They advise that it will take from 30-45 minutes to complete a car after it has been picked up.

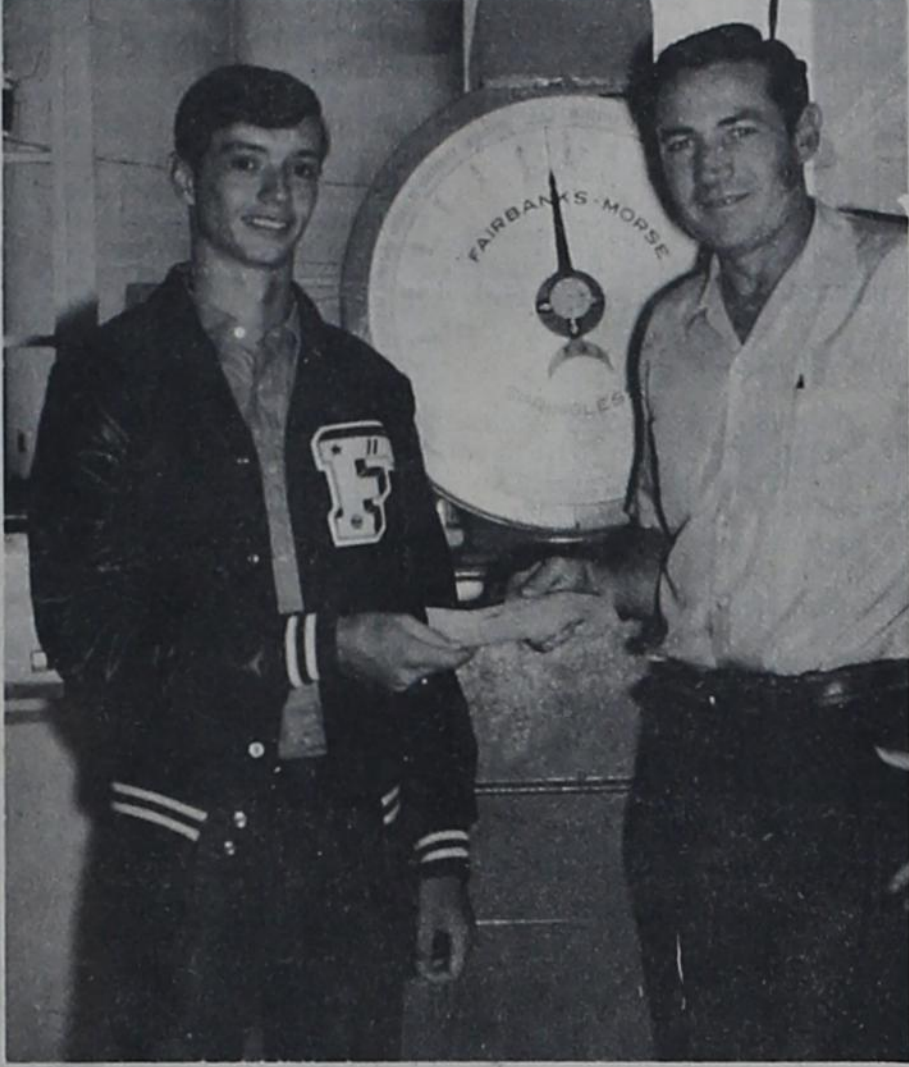
Money raised from the car wash will be used for scout activities of the troop. Ernest Foreman is scoutmaster.

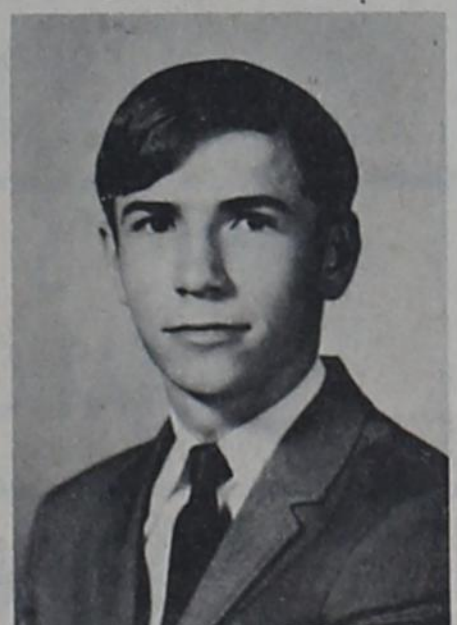

7-0 --

Morton Edges Farwell

The Farwell Steers were edged by Morton Friday night as the Indians captured a 7-0 decision for their second upset victory in as many weeks. The Steers were held to a season low of 228 yards while Morton ground out every inch of their 309 yards on the ground. Mistakes, however, proved to be the deciding factor as the Steers gave up the ball five times on three fumbles and two intercepted passes. Gary Erwin again led the Steers Infantry with 66 yards, Dean Stovall and Danny Prince each hauled in four of Greg Hargrove's tosses for 50 and 49 yards, respectively. The Indians were paced by sophomore QB Keith Embry who scrambled for 124 yards, including a 40-yard

gallop for the one touchdown of the evening.

Ralph Soliz took the opening kickoff 23 yards to the Morton 29 and the action began from there. The Steers defensive squad foiled Keith Embry's plans and the Indians elected to let Mike Bryan boot them out of trouble on third and 15. Farwell took over on their 44 and promptly marched to the Indians' 14 in eight plays, but Ralph Soliz pounced on a Steer fumble to halt the drive. Morton moved back downfield to the Farwell 35 before the Steers could dig in and stop them. Bryan backed the Blue and White up against their own goal line as he laid his punt on the Steer three-yard line. Undaunted, the Steers began another drive, moving to their 44 in seven tries. On a second and short yardage situation, Greg Hargrove was hit hard as he released a pass and Larry McClintock snagged the wayward toss to give the Indians custody. On third and seven, Embry exhibited some fancy scrambling as he raced 40 yards for what turned out to be the winning margin. Bryan added the PAT to give Morton a 7-0 edge with 10:26 remaining in the half.

The Steers couldn't manage following the kickoff and Danny Prince was forced to punt. The Indians moved back to the Farwell 31 before being halted. The Steers picked up a first down on their 43, but again were plagued by bad luck as Monte Dewbre fell on a Farwell bobble. Morton drove to the Steer

12, but the stolid defense refused to relinquish another foot. The Steers began still another drive which was terminated on the Morton 26. The Indians took over, but time expired in the first half of play.

The third quarter consisted solely of exchanging punts as neither side could sustain a drive. Eddie Lewis was, however, denied a beautiful touchdown run for the Indians. He intercepted a pitchout on his own ten and raced 90 yards untouched, only to have the effort nullified on a personal foul penalty.

Going into the final period, the Indians mounted a drive starting on their own 20 and driving to the Steer 3. They were pushed back to the 12 and on fourth and goal attempted a field goal from the 25. The snap was bobbled and the play never matured.

Morton had another scoring opportunity with about two minutes remaining, but again the Steer defensive corps dug in and held on their two. Short of time, Hargrove was forced to go to the air, but only reached his 20 before Jerry Steed grabbed one of his passes to sew up the game.

The Indians now stand 3-1 for the year. Farwell, 2-2, will take on the Roughnecks from Sundown tonight (October 10) in a homecoming game before starting district play next week against Springlake.

The Rattlers again scored in the early moments of the second quarter but failed to convert. This gave the hosts a 14-0 bulge that stood for the rest of the evening.

Again in the same quarter Barnes found his receiver open and this time fired a 45-yard scoring bomb to Derrell Mathews and the scoring was completed for the first half. The Longhorns led 22-0.

In the third quarter Barnes completed an 80-yard scoring pass to Derrell Mathews and a seven-yard toss to Mike Casey. At the end of the third period of play the Longhorns had a 36-0 lead over the Antelopes.

The senior class is selling "Longhorn Bumper Stickers." They may be obtained by calling any senior. Price of the sticker is \$1.00.

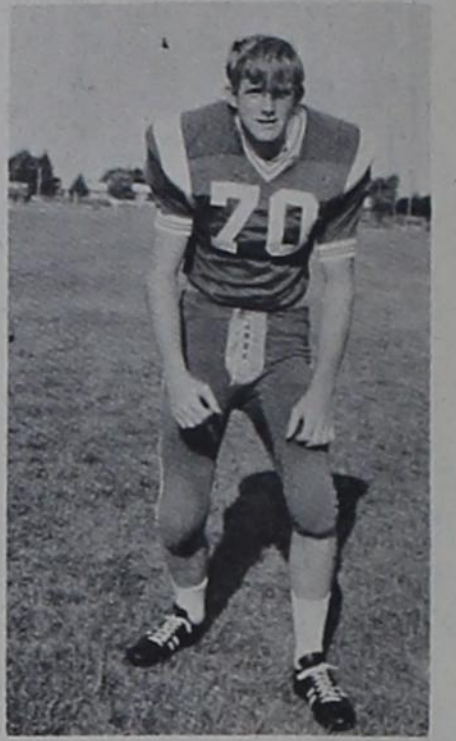

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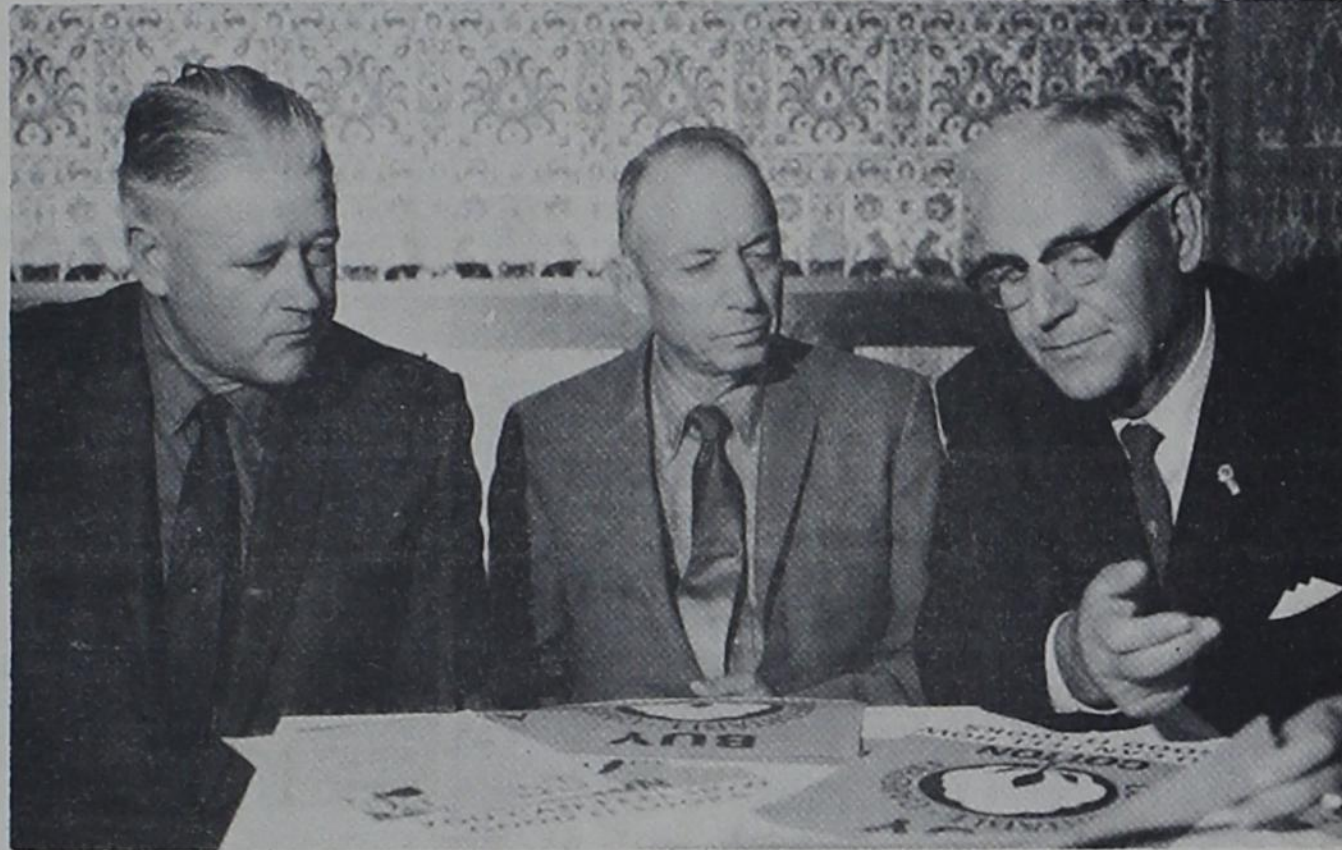

In commenting on the games, Coach C. B. Stockton said, "Both teams played well. The senior team probably played the best they have all season."

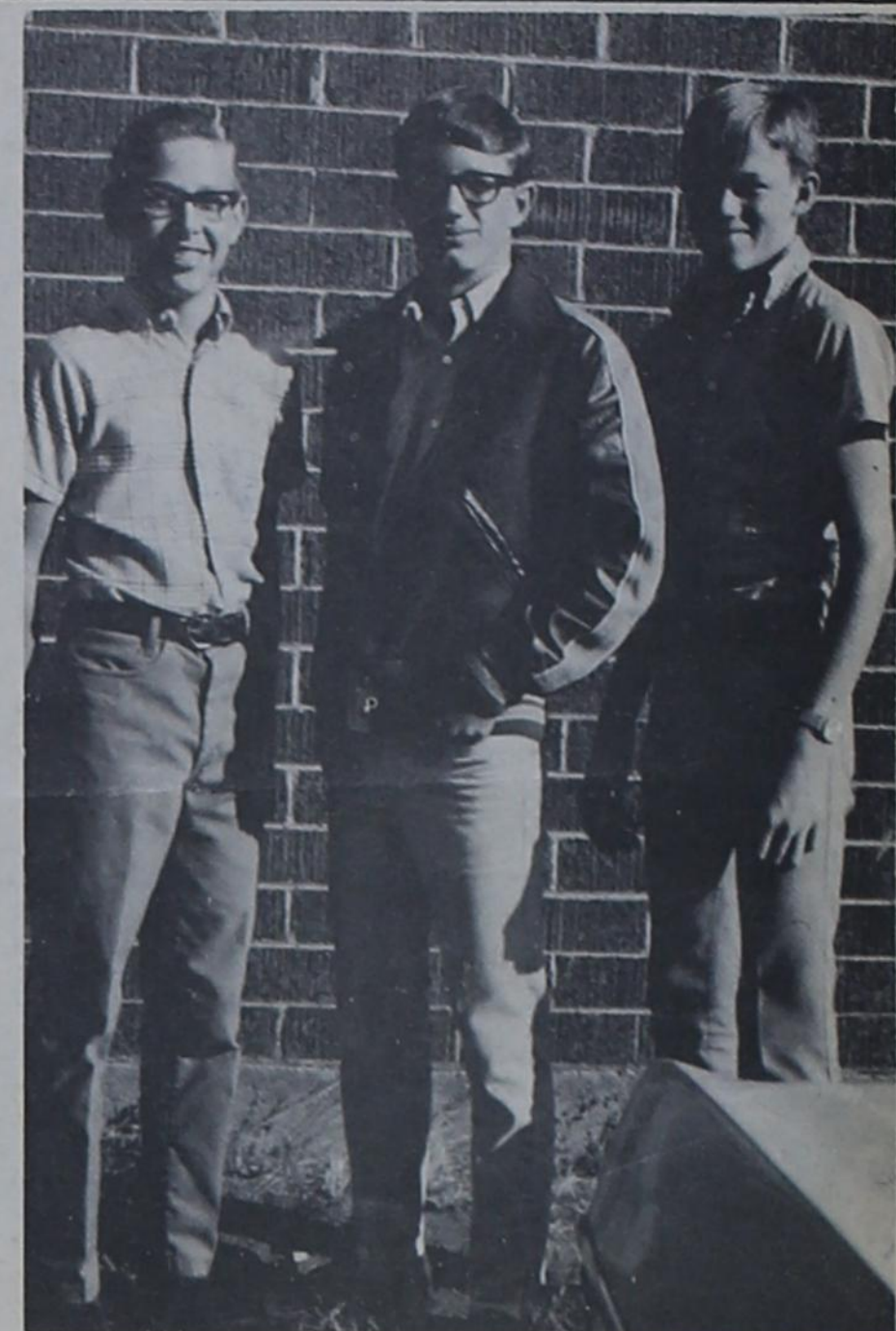

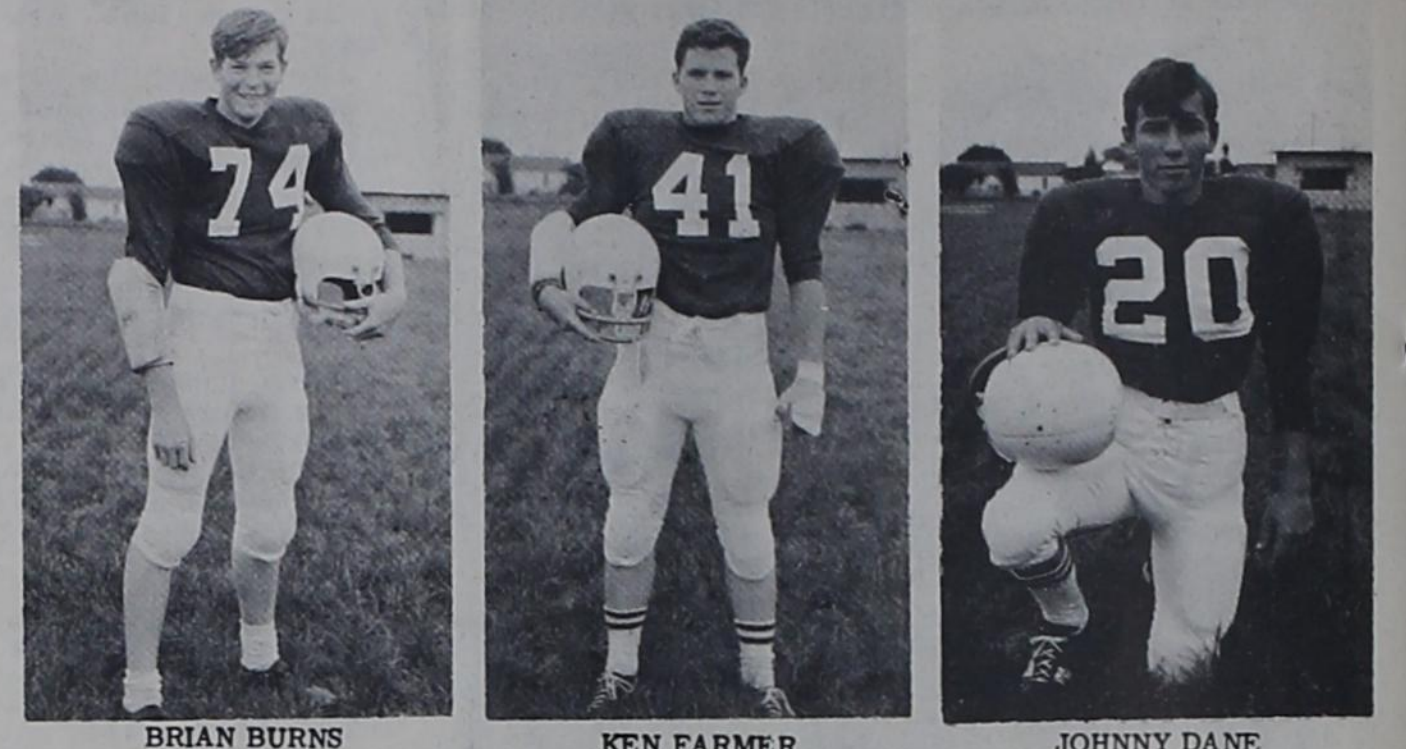

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On The Farm In Farmer County

NATIONAL 4-H CLUB WEEK
Involvement is a term heard a lot these days. Also demonstration. Many of today's headlines involve youths who demonstrate.

Well, this week -- October 5-11 -- more headlines will be highlighting stories of youths who are involved and who demonstrate for what they believe in: 4-H.

This is National 4-H Week. It is observed by more than 3-million boys and girls from 9 to 19 years of age, and some 26 million men and women who once were 4-H members.

These 3 million youth represent every state and county in the United States. When they "joined" 4-H they agreed to learn-by-doing the 4-H way. And they have.

Backstopping these future citizens and leaders of our country are several million parents, aunts, uncles, grandparents, volunteer leaders and the thousands of men and women employed by the Cooperative Extension Service who supervise and guide 4-H youth work.

Scores of private business enterprises have supported 4-H for half a century. And that's a sizable number of men, women and children to be "involved" in a group "demonstrating" the merits of 4-H.

To them and the 4-H boys and girls I extend my congratulations and sincere good wishes for their success in "learning by doing." We look forward to their continuing demonstration to show others how to prepare a better meal, grow better crops, raise better livestock, practice greater safety, and build a better way of life.

SUPPLEMENTAL FEEDING OF BEEF CATTLE
Urea, grain and or oilseed

meals are used many times as supplements for cattle.

Urea is a nitrogenous compound which through bacterial action in the rumen and in the presence of sufficient amounts of carbohydrate feed is converted into protein. The reason for using this nitrogenous material is to lower protein cost. It contains no energy. Either the feed grade or fertilizer grade (281 or 282) may be fed. Mixtures containing urea require thorough mechanical mixing with such feeds as molasses and ground grain. The grain to urea ratio should be no less than eight pounds of grain to one pound of urea. Combinations of the grains and/or oil seed meals may be fed. These type mixes may also be mixed with slat or feed grade gypsum (calcium sulfate) to control intake.

Mix with 25 per cent salt or limit consumption to about two pounds per head daily. Use one half as much gypsum as salt (12.5 per cent) to limit to about the same intake. Stocker cattle may be fed a mixture of 90 per cent concentrates and 10 per cent salt to control the intake to one per cent of body weight which permits growth gain on fair pasturage. Dusty ground grains may be controlled with five per cent molasses.

Cattle should be allowed an adjustment period when started on feeds containing urea. For instance, if four pounds of supplement is to be fed daily then feed two pounds daily for the first week and begin the four pounds at the beginning of second week. Toxic symptoms may occur when feeds containing urea are fed to starved animals having a staggering or wobbly gait. If such is observed, administer orally one half to one gallon of a five per cent acetic acid solution or household vinegar.

Dream Comes True For Beale Stewart

Most persons have a favorite dream, but too few ever see the dream become a reality. However, this has not been so in the life of Beale Stewart, a former Texico boy who now makes his home in Taos.

Back in 1963, Beale, who had gone to New York City to serve as director of the Roosevelt Foundation for the "dropouts"

from high schools in that area, began to dream of some day returning to New Mexico and establishing a country store, preferably in Taos. With this thought always uppermost in his mind, he worked hard at his chosen profession, instructing the dropouts in arts and crafts, during the fall and winter months. During the summers he took trips to the nearby

areas of Maine, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and other historic spots and began collecting various items, including antiques of all kinds, and props for his store.

He was successful in buying props, including cracker barrels, pickle barrels, soda and coffee tins, sugar barrels, coffee grinder, sleeve holders and men's garters, and round-front glass enclosed counters for the store. Most of the props were bought from a store which had been in business for 140 years.

Once he had the props for the store in hand, Beale began collecting such items as a 150-year old infant's cradle, a spinning wheel, 500 antique coffee pots, many old dolls, and a baby t. gy, which is well over a 100 years old. The coffee pots are displayed in the store in Taos, but are not for sale. However, all of the other items are on display and will be sold according to Mrs. Don Cross, sister of Stewart.

In the spring of 1969 the store was finally opened in Taos along with an art gallery. Co-owner of the store and art gallery is Julian Robles. The unique store is called the "B&J Olde Towne General Store." The store features such items as old military uniforms (such as were worn in the civil war era), capes, hats, clothing from the

early 1900's and late 1800 era, bottles of all designs, hand made bonnets, (supplied by Mrs. Dixie Stewart), homemade lye soap (also made by Mrs. Stewart), handmade jewelry, hand-rolled soap (which he obtains in Pennsylvania), candles, an assortment of hard stick candies and home canned fruits and vegetables. All of the home canned fruits and vegetables are prepared for the store by Mrs. Don Cross, Stewart's sister who lives in Texico.

The fruits and vegetables are canned in antique jars, used in great-grandmother's day and which are only found in antique shops in this area. The jars, which were manufactured by Kerr and Ball, have a glass lid, and are sealed by inserting a rubber band between the jar and the lid, then pulling a wire bale over the top of the lid and locking it in the groove. Needless to say, the jars alone are quite expensive. However, Stewart finds that his customers are most happy to pay the price for such an antique jar filled with the delicious food.

The hand-rolled soaps come in a variety of flavors, including most fruits and also licorice (licorice sticks are 44 inches long). They are displayed in the old fashioned candy jars which were popular in days of yesteryear.

In many colors and scents, according to Mrs. Cross, who says they fill the closet with a delightful odor when placed in a net bag and hung in the closet.

In addition to the antique items and old fashioned clothing, the store also features items from the "mod" world.

In this part of the store one may find psychedelic colored shopping bags, pillows, banks, dolls, creamers, salt and pepper shakers, lamps of various designs, tea towels, household items, and poison rings (for use by the hippies).

Sterling Donaldson is in Clovis Memorial Hospital where he is under treatment for second degree burns and possibly some third degree burns from his waist down.

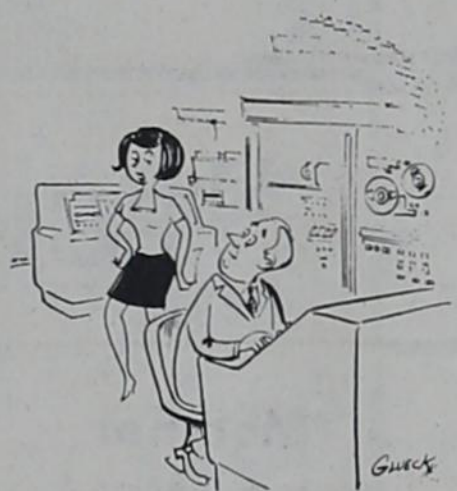

Salaries Up --

DPS Increases Manpower Ranks

Because of the rising traffic deaths and crime rate, the Texas Legislature has authorized an additional increase of manpower in the uniformed ranks of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

In carrying out this authorization a call has been issued by Major C. W. Bell, regional commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety in Lubbock, to young men to fill a 120-man training school beginning October 21, 1969.

Major Bell states that two inducements have been authorized by the Legislature to help fill the uniformed ranks of the Texas DPS. First, the salary during training has increased to \$525 per month; secondly, upon graduation the salary has increased to \$630 per month.

Applicants must be between the ages of 20 and 35, a height of not less than 68 inches, a weight of not less than two pounds per inch of height or more than three and one-half pounds per inch of height, and be in sound physical condition. They must have completed high school or the equivalent. They must be a citizen of the United States and be of good moral character.

Those selected will take their basic training at the Texas DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin. The training period is approximately four months in length. Upon graduation the patrolmen will be assigned to one of the four uniformed field services -- Highway Patrol, License and Weight, Motor Vehicle Inspection, and Drivers License.

Benefits include two weeks vacation annually, 12 or more holidays each year as provided by the Legislature, 12 days per year sick leave which may accumulate to a maximum of 36 days. \$10 per month will be added to salary at the end of each five years of service, to a maximum of 25 years. A modern liberal retirement system based on age and/or years of service is also allowed as well as social security benefits, traveling expenses when away from assigned station as prescribed by law, group hospitalization and life insurance plan available, uniforms and the necessary equipment to perform duties furnished.

Because of the short time remaining to test applicants, immediate inquiry is urged for young men to contact the nearest DPS office or patrolman.

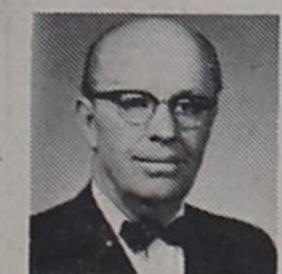

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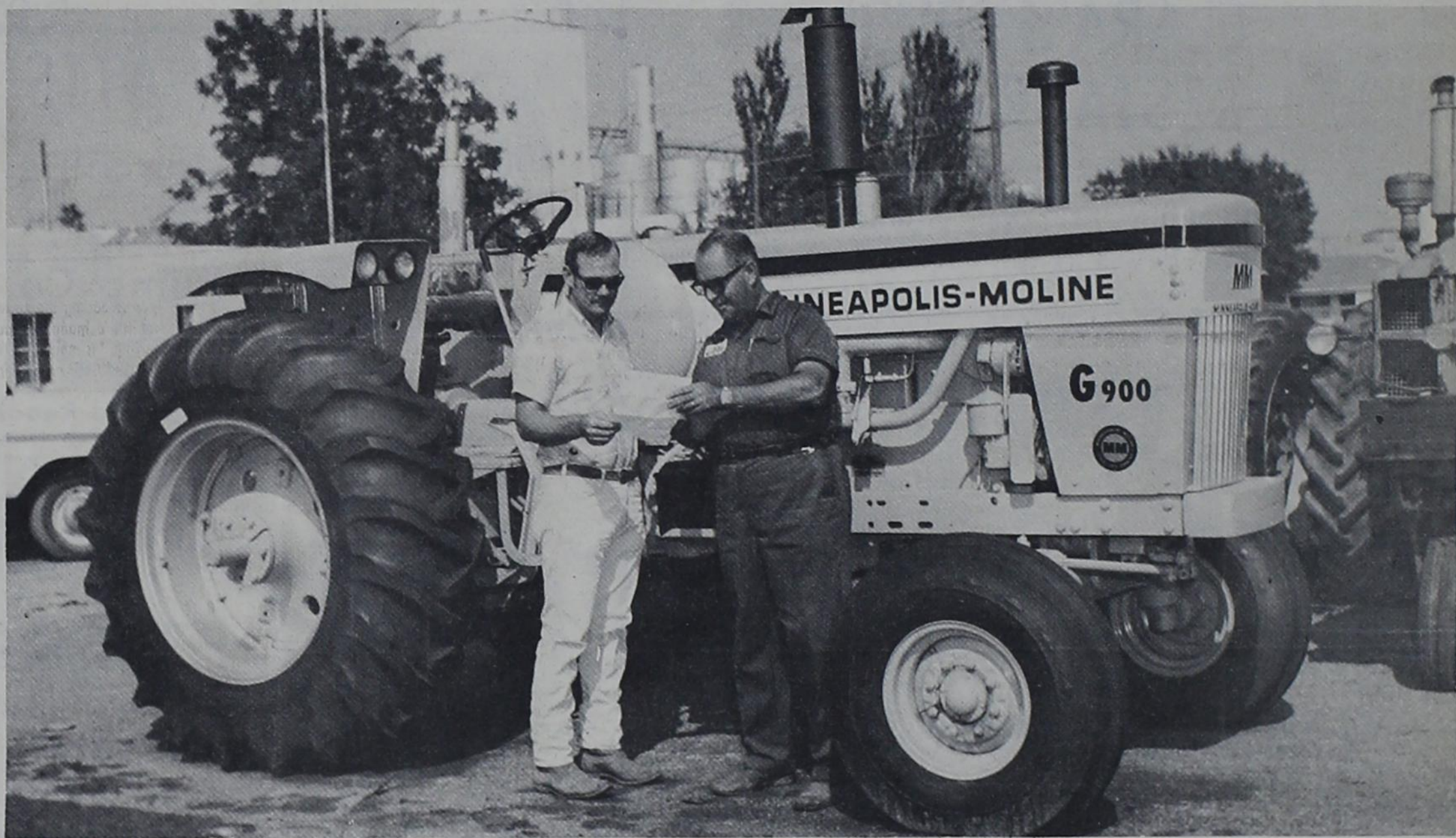

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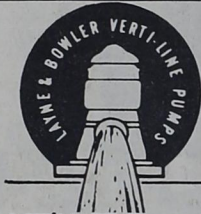
