



The other day we were reading the Amarillo Globe News and were struck by views of society as expressed by a syndicated columnist and the Governor of Texas. We will give you quotes from both these worthies.

First, a portion of the column by Patrick J. Buchanan in which he discusses the adverse effects of the Great Society on the American Family.

Says Buchanan: To make such a case, it seems to me, one need demonstrate not only that the Great Society failed to slow the breakup of poor families, black and white, but that the Great Society causes, accelerates, such breakups.

Does it not? Hearken to the siren song the Great Society social engineers sing to the 17- or 18-year old girl living with her brothers and sisters in a crowded and fatherless family.

"If you get pregnant, and have a child, not to worry. You don't have to marry the bum; the government will provide you everything he possibly could and then some.

"All you need do is leave home and get an apartment. The federal government will provide you with rent supplements and housing assistance. We will give you an independent income you never had, Medicaid for you and the child, food stamps, free education, and child care if you take a job, but there's no need to do that. For the first time in your life you will be free and independent of momma; you can enjoy the night life, and play the field."

What the state tells the mother of the child is that anything the father can provide the kid, the state can provide better - without having the bum around. What it tells the father is that he is unnecessary, irrelevant. Get lost!

Next, in that same issue, we read of the remarks of Governor Mark White at the 105th annual conference of the Sheriff's Association of Texas, speaking to the sheriffs about kids in school.

Said White: "They need discipline every day in the classrooms in Texas. Let them know they'll obey the rules in school and they'll know they have to obey the rules of society."

So far so good. We agree that discipline is necessary. But then White opined, "We have to pay teachers higher salaries."

Well, we were at a loss to find a thread between enforcing discipline in schools and higher teacher pay. The reason discipline is lax is because of the ultra permissive society we have today.

Imagine, with me, a teacher about to inflict punishment upon a classroom delinquent. As the teacher's hand is raised to smite the malfactor, the teacher doesn't lower the rod because the teacher's mind says: Whoa now, you aren't getting paid enough. The teacher is much more apt to say: Whoa now, don't get your pants sued off by an irate parent or the ACLU. This is a much more basic reason for anarchy in the classroom than insufficient pay.

Now back to Buchanan's comments. When he ends his column, he says, speaking of the Great Society, "What it tells the father is that he is unnecessary, Get lost!"

What it, the Great Society, tells students is that education is as unnecessary as a father, Get lost! The Great Society will provide all life's necessities for you without your having to struggle for an education.

Until we as a society reinstate the plain benefits and even necessity for an education, raising teacher's salaries is whistling in the dark. Mark White misses the educational boat and substitutes demagoguery for wisdom.

If teachers need a pay raise based upon actual need, compensation for long years in school, because private industry pays more for comparable work and training, let him say so. There are plenty of cogent arguments for increased teachers pay. Why doesn't he try a few? They may work, whereas windbaggy fools no one.

Superintendent Jim Pierce says that an in-service meeting for faculty and staff will be August 15 at 8:30 a.m.

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## Border Town Days - -

# Largest Crowd Ever Attends Celebration

The 17th annual Border Town Days was one of the "best ever" and many believe the Twin Cities celebration had the largest crowd in attendance. Estimates are between 1500 and 1600 persons gathered in the Farwell City Park and on the courthouse lawn to participate in the many festivities Saturday afternoon.

The weather was beautiful with the high temperatures of the previous week subsiding some, and the cool breezes and partly cloudy skies helping to allow the large crowd to enjoy the fun, relaxation, and memorable moments of the day.

Kicking off the BTM funfest on Saturday morning was the big parade, with the most entrants ever registered. A record number of spectators lined the "main street" of Texico and Farwell and along Fifth Street in Farwell. Parade entrants said they were "amazed" at the many spectators, more than they had ever seen except in a large city. They commented that there wasn't a space along the parade route without spectators.

The traditional parade featured riding groups, decorated bicycles, floats, antique cars, beauty queens, BTM contestants, CAFB Honor Guard and Drill Team, Clovis Cycle Corps and Drum Corps, Texico School band, drill team, and flag corps, and many others.

Special attractions in the parade included Miss New Mexico Mai Shanley of Alamogordo, 1982 BTM Queen Jennifer Williams, Texas Tech Red Raider Jennifer Aull of Lubbock and the horse Happy VI-II, and the West Texas State University Mascot, Thunder, and the Buffalo Herdsmen, and the MacKenzie Gunfighters of Lubbock.

Float winners were Farwell Study Club, first place, winning \$75; Texico-Farwell Senior Citizens, second place and \$50; and Oklahoma Lane Baptist Church, third place and \$30. Farwell Chamber of Commerce and the BTM Committee furnished the monetary prizes.

The winning riding club was the Cattle Capitol Cowbells Mounted Group, and the second place went to the Oklahoma Lane 4-H Riding Club. Trophies were presented by the Farwell C of C.

All float winners were judged on a point system, as were the riding groups. Judges for the floats and riding groups were

Roy Chambliss, Wendol Cox, and Perry Mills, all of Clovis.

Winners in the old car category were Monty Rucker of Clovis with his 1928 Model A, first place; Keith Terry of Portales with his 1946 Hudson pickup, second place; and Jack Carr of Portales with his 1922 Model T, third place. Texico Chamber of Commerce furnished the old car trophies.

In the Kids Decorated Bike contest, winners were as follows: Category I, best costumed rider: Robin Ray, first; Carol Servatius, second; and Laura Vidana, third. Category II, decorated bikes, age six and under: Jackie Sides, first; Justin Mahaney, second; and Timmy Ford, third. Category III, age seven to 12: Clint Cole, first; Michael Arce, second; and Corey Horner, third.

The Clovis Shriners Cycle Corps won the trophy for the

best motorized unit, and the Clovis Drum Corps was presented the trophy for the best marching unit.

Following the parade, BTM attendants made their way to the Farwell City Park where approximately 1300 persons were served a barbecue meal sponsored by the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club. Walter Hughes and his Cook Shack Crew prepared the meal, which was served by the Rotarians.

Throughout the afternoon, attendants enjoyed themselves by browsing about the courthouse lawn viewing the many arts and crafts displays. In charge of the Arts and Crafts Show were Janie Bowery and Sharen Menning.

In the park, local clubs and organizations had concession booths offering cool drinks and everything from homemade ice

Persons wishing to contribute to this fund may see Jerri Herrington at the bank in Texico.


At press time Wednesday Mrs. Doshier remained in critical condition in intensive care at a Lubbock hospital where she has been receiving treatment since last Tuesday.





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# Australian Visitor Notes Difference In Countries

In many respects, Australia is the world's most unique land mass. Comparable in size to the United States (excluding Alaska), its population is only about that of Texas. It is composed of six states and two territories. One territory is the Australian Capitol Territory of Canberra which is comparable to Washington, D.C.

Alele Waller is a visitor to this country from Sydney, Australia. She is a guest of Brenda Sims of Texico who recently spent 18 months in Australia with a ministry team from the Church of Christ. Adele and Brenda had lots to say about the differences and similarities they found in the two countries.

One of the first were the irrigation systems. Australia consists mostly of dryland farming, although there are a few rice fields that are irrigated from the six rivers that run through Australia.

The economy of Australia depends largely on sheep ranches, wool industry, and mining of precious stones and minerals. However, Australia is also known for its beaches, mountains, and sports activities.

Their measurement system is metric and their money is also different from that of the United States. Their coins are the 1, 2, 5, 10, 20, and 50 cent pieces. Their notes (bills) are

based on the same numbers, and each bill increases in size a bit as it increases in value. They are also different colors.

Queen Elizabeth's picture is on the money, symbolizing that Australia is still part of the British Commonwealth. However, their government is totally independent. They have a parliament and a Prime Minister as the head of the government. Each state has a Premier in charge of it.

The first inhabitants of Australia were the aborigines. Similar to the American Indian, the aborigines now live in the western and central parts of Australia. At first, a reservation type system was put in effect, but the natives were not happy with the ways in which the government was trying to help them so in time, the government has come to just leave them alone and just do what the aborigines ask of it. Although there are not many of the natives left, they still throw spears and boomerangs in pursuit of kangaroos, wallabies, and lizards. Some of them have become expert artists and sell their wares in the cities, while many have "moved to civilization" and become athletes, soldiers, or urban wage earners.

Another big difference between the countries is transportation. There is a very good public transportation system in Australia. In addition to buses,

there are hydrofoils to carry persons across the harbor, and the latest mode of sea travel are the aquatic taxis. If people do drive, they have smaller cars. They also drive on the left side of the road and sit on the right side of the car.

The road signs are also somewhat different from the ones here. Their footpath means sidewalk, kerb means curb, and a "giveaway" sign means to yield. Many of their words still contain the "Old English" u, such as colour and harbour.

As their wildlife differs from that here, they have kangaroo crossing signs and turtle crossing signs. "No, you don't have to stop for the tiny turtles found in this part of the country, but for huge 200-pound sea turtles there, it's a good idea," the girls say.

When one enters a store, a salesperson may ask, "Are you right?" This means "May I help you?" Brenda remembers that for a long time she couldn't get anyone to wait on her, because she would reply, "just fine" to their initial question.

Because Australia is located in the Southern Hemisphere, the seasons are opposite from the U.S. They celebrate Christmas in the middle of summer! There is also an 18-hour time difference, making travelers lose a day when going to Australia, or gain a day when traveling to the U.S.

Another custom different from that in the United States, is a four-week vacation. In addition to being a paid vacation, employees receive what is called 17 percent loading. This means that they receive 17 percent more pay to take on their vacations.

Australians eat with a knife in their right hand and hold the fork upside down in their left hand.

They also love their "afternoon tea." Tea is not iced tea as West Texans know it, but hot tea served with a meal in the afternoon and with a snack in the morning. Their biscuits are America's cookies. So when Brenda wanted "biscuits and gravy" for breakfast, Adele almost got sick just from the thought. In Australia, this treat would be breadrolls and white sauce!

Lamb is the mainstay of the Australian's diet. It is eaten as our beef would be, for almost every meal. In addition, they eat lots of fresh fruits and vegetables the year around. There is not as much fried food, but probably more baked food.

Some persons consider Australia the world's most active sports land. To Australians, sports are more than entertainment or recreation, they are a way of life. The major spectator sports are horse racing, Australian rules football, and cricket.

In addition, there are all kinds of water sports, including surfing, skiing, and scuba diving.

Tennis is also big. There are courts which are playable year round. One of the more unusual sports found in Australia is bowling on the green. Every Saturday one can watch white-clad members of lawn bowling teams rolling their black balls down immaculately kept greens toward a white "kitty" or "jack," the target.

Australia has preserved its natural landscape much more than has been done here in

America. Small communities have grown up within big cities because of the natural barriers such as hills. Very few trees are cut down, and when they are, permission must be gained and there must be a good reason.

There are also no neon signs or billboards to clutter the scenery.

The most abundant tree is the eucalyptus tree or the gum tree. This is the only tree the Koala can eat, and that is why the cute little animals are found only in Australia. Contrary to popular belief, Koalas are not really bears, and their fur is not soft and cuddly, but wiry and coarse.

The other animal most readily identifiable with Australia is the kangaroo. As funny as Americans may picture them, they are really quite a menace to farmers, Adele says.

Some of the more interesting tourist attractions in Australia are the Harbour Bridge and Opera House in Sydney. The Opera House, one of the most talked about buildings in the world, is surrounded on three sides by Sydney Harbour. Its roof structure was designed to look like a cluster of billowing sails, and it took almost 17 years to complete its construction at a cost of over \$125 million. Inside there is a concert hall seating 2700 persons, an opera hall accommodating 1,530, a theatre for 600, and smaller halls for music recitals and receptions.

Another popular attraction is the Penguin Parade on Phillip Island when hundreds of penguins come ashore at sundown every night. Adele reports that it is quite a sight with all of them looking prim and proper in their "tuxedos."

Although separated by miles and differences, Australians and Americans are on good terms. Australians are very warm and open to Americans who visit their country, reports Brenda. In turn, Adele says she has very much enjoyed her visit to the United States.

touch their faces. However, in the wild, the animals shy away from human contact.

including this mother kangaroo and her baby. "The baby is called a Joey and it is almost as large as its mother,"

reported Brenda. "Despite its size, it is able to get inside her pouch. It is really remarkable to see," she added.

# Calf Scramble Winners Now Busy With Projects

Local winners in the 1983 Houston Calf Scramble, Leonard Hillock, Tyson Carpenter, and Carl Hutchins, are each working diligently to comply with the rules of the scramble, such as keeping detailed records of their animal's progress

and growth during the year.

Each of the Farwell freshman students received a \$600 calf purchase certificate for winning in the calf scramble. The scramble is a part of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo held in the Astrodome and is a favorite with audiences. Each participant must race to catch a calf, halter it, and drag it across the finish line.

Leonard and Tyson each participated as members of the Farwell FFA, and Carl participated as a member of the Farwell 4-H Club.

As winners, each boy used his purchase certificate toward the price of a heifer to be raised, bred, and prepared to be shown at next year's Houston Livestock Show.

Each performance of the rodeo included a calf scramble in which 12 wild calves were released in the arena to be chased by 24 participants. Hutchins won his certificate March 5, catching a calf and gaining Kyle Goodson of the Granite Springs Ranch as a sponsor.

Carl purchased his calf from the A.L. Grau Charolais Ranch in Grady April 9, adding an approximate \$400 to the purchase certificate. She was one year old April 22 and weighed an estimated 850 pounds at that time.

In compliance with the rules of the Houston Rodeo Association, the calf was registered with them, certifying that all conditions and standards of the purchasing rules were met.

As part of the agreement, Carl sends reports to his sponsor, County Agent Seth Ralston, the District Agent Kathleen Crawford, and to the Houston Calf Scramble office.

In each report, he gives the expenses incurred during the month for feeding, equipment expenses, etc., as well as a letter explaining the progress of the heifer in preparing her for show and her growth record.

"I'll have to halter train her and I plan to have her bred later this month," says Carl. He will have to show the calf at the next Houston Livestock Show to complete the requirements of the calf scramble, however, the heifer and all her calves are his to keep.

"I plan to keep her and let her

have a few calves," says Carl.

Both Tyson and Leonard won their purchase certificates February 26.

Tyson's sponsor is Longhorn Machine Works, Inc., Mr. and Mrs. Robbie Robertson. His calf, a black Angus, was purchased from Leslie Robbins of San Jon. He added \$200 to the purchase certificate to buy his calf. The calf weighed 700 pounds at the time of the purchase, and was bred before he brought her home.

"I have her halter broken, and I've gotten her to leading," says Tyson. He plans to show the calf at the Curry County Fair and also at the Parmar County Stock Show. "I want to get her used to being shown, and used to people," explains Tyson.

"She's working out really well and has tamed down a lot since I got her," says Tyson.

Both Tyson and Leonard send reports to their individual sponsors, the District Advisor, the Houston Calf Scramble office, and to Richard Montgomery, Farwell FFA advisor.

Leonard also purchased his black Angus calf from James Robbins of San Jon for \$200 over the \$600 purchase certificate.

She was approximately 15 months old at the time of her purchase and was bred before Leonard brought her home. "She weighed about 780 pounds when I got her, and she's grown a lot," says Leonard.

Leonard's sponsor, C.H. Kaiser of Port City Bank, is among those he must send reports and letters to as well as pictures

showing her growth during the year.

He plans to show the heifer at both the Curry County Fair and the Parmar County Stock Show to prepare her for the Houston show next year.

"I plan to keep her, at least for awhile," says Leonard.

Each of the winners takes great pride in his calf and has plans of keeping them for breeding stock as well as showing them in other shows.

As part of the Calf Scramble followup program, the winners are eligible for scholarships through 4-H and FFA. The person sending in the best reports during the year will be the recipient of a grand prize. Last year a pickup was awarded, but this year's prize has not been announced as yet.





## Leonard's Top Prize

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
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## Texico Group Discontinues Paper Drive

### POWER PERFECTED IN WEAKNESS

To Paul was committed the greatest revelation of all time. He was divinely commissioned to proclaim the glorious all-sufficiency of Christ's redemptive work, God's offer of salvation by free grace to all who trust in Christ and their heavenly position, blessings and prospect.

Lest he should become puffed up by the glory of these great truths, God gave him what he calls "a thorn in the flesh," an aggravating physical infirmity of some sort. "For this thing," he says, "I besought the Lord thrice, that it might depart from me" (II Cor. 12:8). But the Lord knew better than Paul what was best for him:

"And He said unto me, My grace is sufficient for thee; for My strength is made perfect in weakness" (Ver. 9).
