There is no cure....

The other week when I was reminiscing about music, I forgot to mention one of my favorite types: the Broadway musical.

That's understandable since the musical just isn't what it used to be. There aren't as many big hits as there once was. Bring back Rodgers and Hammerstein! And Jerome Kern. And Leonard Bernstein.

Probably the biggest hit of recent vintage was "Hair." And that goes back to the early 1970s. That had a lot of great music in it. But that's been more than a decade ago.

There have been other musicals that have been called "hits" but I just don't put them in the same class as the biggies of the 1940s and 1950s. Nowadays, it seems, the big musicals may have a song or two worth remembering, but that's it.

Now, let's take a look at "Oklahoma!" for example. I'll bet just about every reader of this column can start humming a bar or two from one of the many hit songs from the musical giant. Poor Jud may be gone but he's not forgotten.

Then there was "South Pacific." I've always wanted to try a betel nut, but have never had the opportunity. On the other hand, I've had an "enchanted evening," so I guess that's a wash.

And remember "West Side Story"? So many great songs. And "Camelot." And "King and I." And "Sound of Music"? The list could go on and on. I'm sure you have your favorites. Quick, this is your chance: get out the old albums and put them on the Victrola! Show the kids what music was like in the good, old days.

One musical that I really enjoyed listening to was "The Pajama Game." It wasn't a big hit but I thought it had some great lyrical tunes. Ever hear of "There Once Was A Man"? or "7½ Cents" or the song bearing the musical's title?

My favorite musical came out in the early 1960s but never made it to the "hit" status. Interestingly, it became a big hit as a movie, starring Jack Lemmon and Shirley MacLaine: "Irma La Douce." However, the movie dropped almost all the songs from the musical so it didn't appeal much to me. But as a comedy, the movie went over the top.

Whenever I think of "Irma La Douce," I always recall one haunting melody from it. The song was entitled "There Is No Cure for L'Amour on the Bridge of Coulaicourt." Coulaicourt is pronounced "cah-lin-coor."

Here's a story you might enjoy: When I had just turned 18, I found myself alone wandering through the back streets of Paris. I had just passed through Montmartre, with its festive atmosphere, and was heading into the northwest quadrant of the city.

Lo and behold, what do I spy? A street sign saying "Coulaicourt." Immediately, my mind raced to the song from "Irma La Douce."

I looked to the left, then to the right. In the distance I could make out a bridge. I shook my head, realizing that, perhaps, I had stumbled upon the bridge from the song.

So I headed toward the bridge, a few hundred yards distant, all the time humming the melody from the song. There is no cure for l'amour on the Bridge of Coulaicourt.

As I got to the bridge, I stopped in my tracks. The bridge was over a cemetery. In the old days due to lack of room in the over-crowded French capital, foot bridges were built over their cemeteries.

It was a real downer. I always had trouble singing that song ever since without recalling the atmosphere surrounding it.

As I write this column, we have completed seven weeks of the football contest. Just as it did last year, it amazes me to see the widespread participation in this annual fun event.

And involvement is growing! Last year, after all 12 weeks were completed, a total of 502 participants were listed. So far this year, with almost half the contest left, we've already reached 541.

Pleasant Hill Fire Department moving ahead

The Pleasant Hill Fire Department was started in June 1983. It had been discussed for several years and finally had enough interested persons to get it off the ground.

Before becoming a fire district, approvals were needed from county, the state fire marshal, insurance firm and landowners.

They acquired 144 square miles northeast of Clovis.

After they got the approval they had to operate one year without state funding. But they got support of the people of Pleasant Hill for donations to get equipment.

After the first year, they raised \$11,625 to house equipment. They sold first aid kits, fire extinguishers and conducted a Pheasant Hunt.

This year, the department acquired 30,000 acres for the pheasant hunt, said Richard Kelley, fire chief. All the land has been posted legally.

They have limited the permits to be sold to 500. About 90 percent of the hunters are from out of town or state. Hunters come from Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

Kelley hopes the pheasant hunt will be an annual event.

All proceeds will go for equipment - paying for trucks from Clovis - a tank pump and engine.

Last year, they sold 300 tickets at \$3 each for a lawnmower. The funds went for radios for each man. Plus, they received a grant for \$1,000

from the state forester.

The department's membership averages 10 at the present time.

Members are: Kelley, Assistant Chief Gary Singleterry, Capt. Paul D. Barnes, Lt. Ted Richardson, and James Berford, Bill Servantis, Don Gustin, Opie Kelley, Gary Berggren and Allen Brockmeier.

According to Kelley, "The Texico, Clovis and Farwell fire departments have been a big help to them. They have helped us with our training."

Clovis loaned a 1946 American LeMans truck. Just recently, they got a 1958 Class A pumper from Clovis, too.

Pleasant Hill's Fire Department is classed as a 10 fire service. Soon, they will change the rate to Class 9. With it, comes a raise. The yearly fire fund will go from \$13,950 to \$21,000.

"In the future, I hope to add a 40x40 addition for a meeting room and kitchen," Kelley said. "We will make it something for the whole community can be able to use."

The goals Kelley sees for the department "are to be proficient in what we do. In the future, add an ambulance. Also, we could use additional members for our district."

"Doc Stewart has done a lot to help us. Doc encourages us to be involved actively and support the community," Kelley, who is employed at the auto dealership, said.

Kelley also said that help and ideas for this year's Farwell Athletic Banquet are needed. "Please come to the meeting and give us

your views on the banquet," he added.

The club voted to place new wall pads under both basketball goals in the new gym. The old pads will be installed in the old gym.

"We're trying to do things to help boy and girl athletes in all sports," Kelley said. "Last year, we carpeted the weightlifting room. We want to keep working to help our athletes but need more support to do so. We hope more folks come to our meetings each Tuesday and help out."

The Farwell Public Schools will hold a Texas Independence Day program in the High School auditorium.

On April 21, Farwell Junior High will honor San Jacinto Day with an art exhibit of local artists and speakers. The cafeteria will feature barbecue and beans.

City of Farwell will conduct a cleanup drive July 14-19.

The JCCA will sponsor the High Plains Junior Rodeo July 25-26.

On July 26, is Bordertown Days, a parade, park fun and craft fair. The Farwell Study Club will host the TFWC Fall board convention Oct. 11.

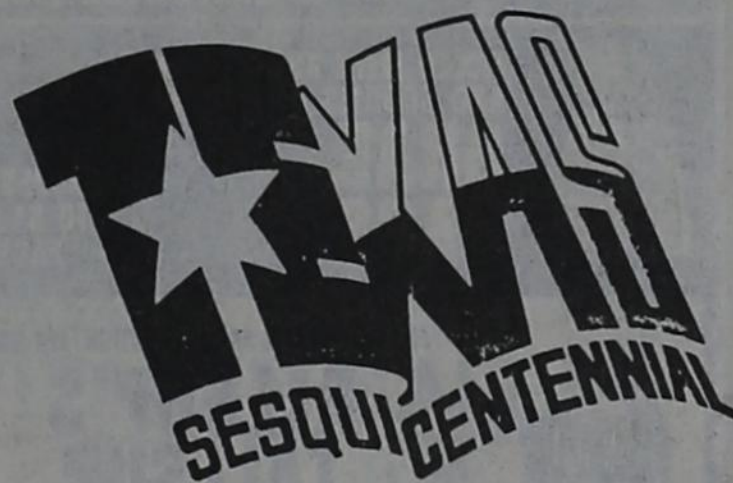
A Brotherhood service by the local churches will be held Nov. 27.

President Washington comes

Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Williams of Farwell have something they can really be proud of: an original issue of a newspaper from days gone by. Mrs. Williams stopped by the Tribune office last week to show their copy of "The Massachusetts Sentinel" (which was spelled in those days - The Maffachufetts Centinel) from Oct. 28, 1789. That's right, 1789.

On Page 1 was the "Latest Foreign Intelligence." It was a letter that the National Assembly of France, still in the throes of the French Revolution, received from England. The letter said, in effect, that England wanted cordial relations with the new government.

Also on Page 1 was the itinerary that President Washington had during a tour of several states. In a procession honoring him were merchants and traders, bakers, blacksmiths, blockmakers, boat builders, cabinet and chairmakers, card makers, carvers, chaise and coach-makers and clock and watch-makers.

Then came the coopers, cord-wainers, distillers, duck manufacturers, goldsmiths and jewellers, hairdressers, hatters, house carpenters, leather dressers, lemon dealers, limners and painters, masons, mastmakers, math instru-

ment makers, paper stainers, pewterers, printers and bookbinders, riggers, rope makers, saddlers, sail makers, shipjoiners, sugar bottlers, tallow candler, etc., etc.

On the back page of the Sentinel, which in its masthead noted "Uninfluenced by Party; we aim to be Just," were the advertisements that still continue to be a major part of a newspaper.

Graham's Comb Manufactory, on the north end of Boston, offered ivory combs of all kinds - "same quality and price as in London or Liverpool."

The Garden, near the head of Federal Street, had new garden seeds of the best quality (very suitable for the West Indies) to be sold, "cheap."

Charlie Miller's store, near the market, had a few barrels of choice pork available. Also, a few hogs-heads of the best sugar could be found there.

And there were ads for chewing tobacco, cloth, drugs and medicines ("Red Bark of the first quality"), and an apartment for rent.

Five dollars reward was offered for a runaway sailer named Petre Tira. And a newly-published book entitled "The Children's Friend" was for sale, along with the new

American law book.

On the two middle pages of the Sentinel were letters to and from President Washington. The letters were laudatory, in view of the recent victory over England, and Washington basically said "thank you." One letter was from Joseph Willard, president of Harvard; the other from the City of Boston.

One article told of the President's visit to Boston:

Yesterday, his Excellency the Governor and Council gave a sumptuous and elegant dinner at Faneuil Hall to The President of the United States. At which were also present the vice president, the lieutenant governor, council, honorable Mr. Bowdoin, judges of the Supreme Court, officers of the Most Christian Majesty's Squadron, foreign counsels, President of Harvard College, the clergy of this town, civil and military officers and gentlemen of distinction to the number of 150.

On this occasion, the hall was beautifully ornamented with several flags on display in the late

procession amounting to 48. We lament that the want of room will not permit us to go into particulars.

Owing to severe indisposition His Excellency the Governor could not attend the public dinner yesterday. Yesterday The President honored the Stone Chapel with his presence to hear the concert of Sacred music. But on account of the indisposition of several of the first performers, the music was postponed until Wednesday next. Several pieces were however given, which merited and received applause.

On the arrival of The President of the United States on Saturday last, the right Honorable Viscount de Ponteves Gien and the other officers of His Most Christian Majesty's Squadron conducted by the Honorable Counsel of France paid their respects to that illustrious character at his residence at Court Street.

On Sunday 1st, his Excellency the Governor visited The President at his residence in Court Street which the President returned on Monday "

Association advises Halloween precautions

As the October onslaught of ghastly ghosts, terrible trolls and startling skeletons approaches, Texas Safety Association suggests sensible precautions to keep Halloween happy and safe for your children and home.

"When in doubt, throw it out," advises George Gustafson, Executive Vice President of TSA, when discussing Halloween treats. "If a food or candy item has no wrapping, or the covering is loose or torn, discard it. Wash and slice fruit before allowing your child to eat it. Concerned and considerate treat-givers might help by providing non-food items, such as pennies or nickels, snack food coupons or bright decals for the children's school binders," he adds.

-Pre-planning the route, staying in familiar neighborhoods and only visiting homes that show the trick-or-treat signal of a lighted porch or yard.

-An older teenager or adult should accompany young children

on their journeys. Older children walking their route with friends need to thoroughly discuss safety rules with parents beforehand.

-Set time limits for their travels. Some communities designate Halloween treating hours. Also, take into account that Halloween falls on a week night this year, which means that the costumed imps and aliens turn back into students early the next morning.

-Costumes and masks should not restrict movement or eyesight, or trail on the ground. Face paint or normal make-up products can provide frightening effects while allowing freedom of sight. Use lots of light colors in costumes, or reflective tape, and pass out plenty of flashlights. Dark of night adds to the thrill of the celebration, but hides the dangers of curbs, stones and cracked sidewalks.

-Make certain your yard, driveway, porch and sidewalks are free of obstructions if you are handing out treats to the tiny revelers. If you're driving, take extra care to watch for small, ghostly pedestrians.

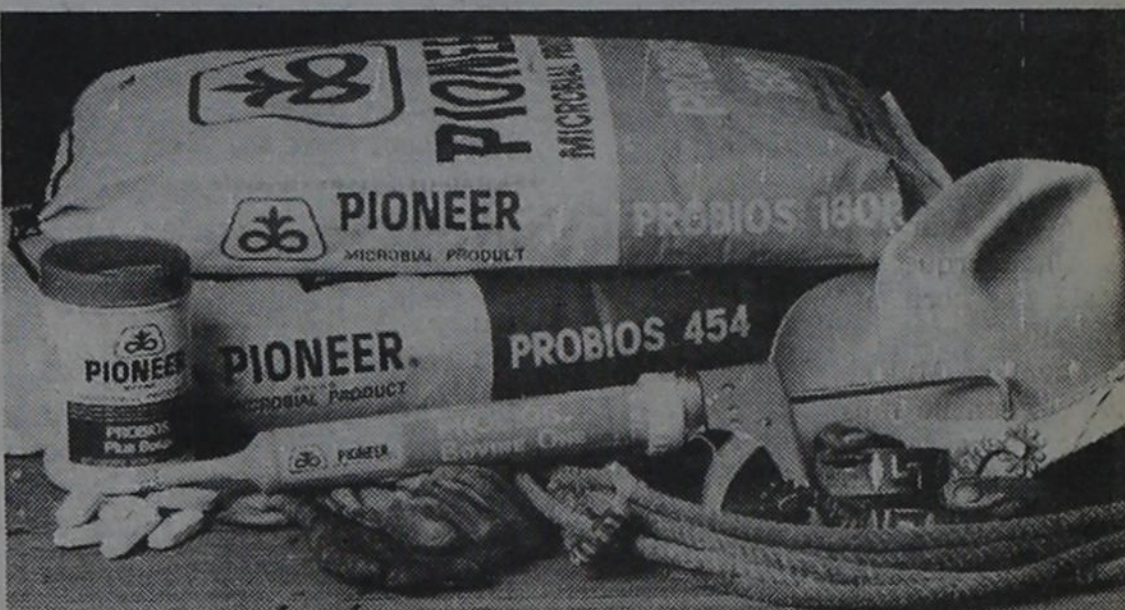

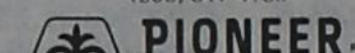

A Halloween to Remember

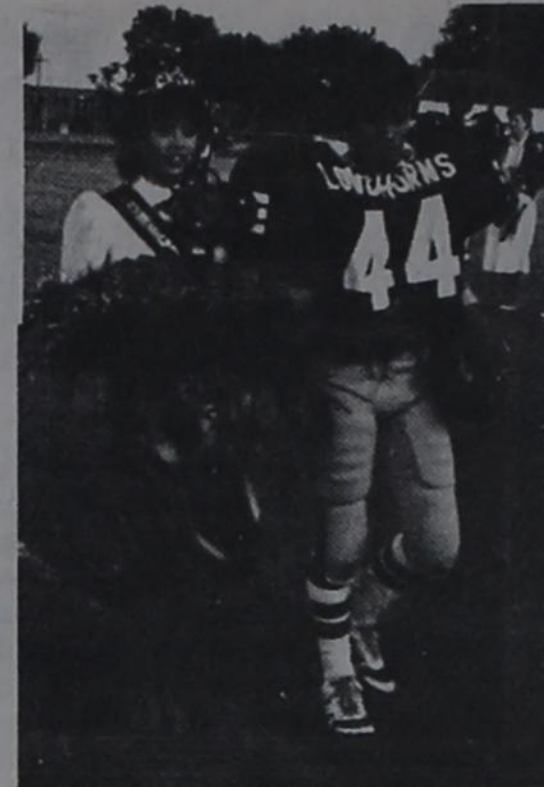

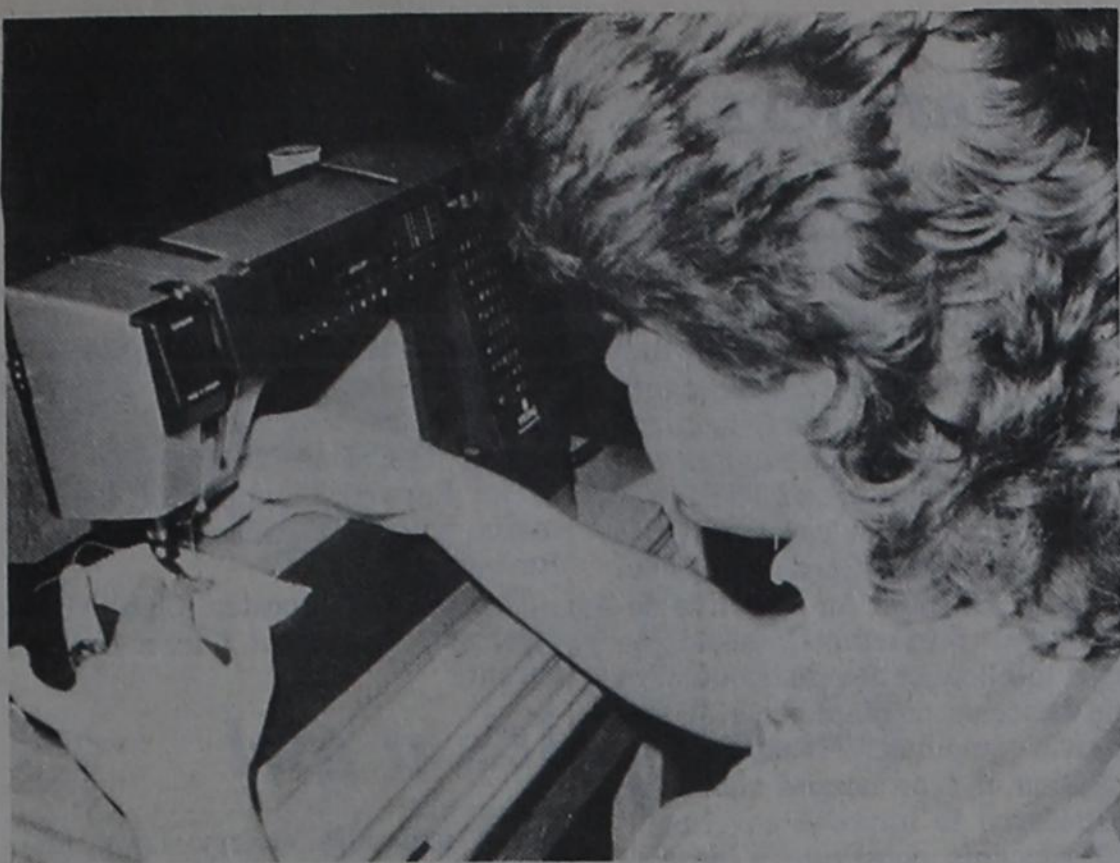

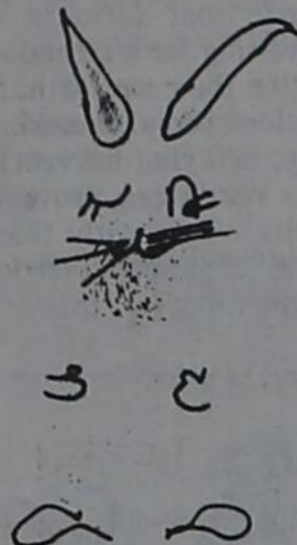

Harvest-aid decisions face cotton farmers

Recent cold, wet weather across the High Plains caused heavy damage to cotton leaf tissue and essentially eliminated prospects for further fiber development. As a result, cotton producers must decide whether to terminate the crop with harvest-aid chemicals or wait for a killing freeze to desiccate and condition the crop for harvesting, advises a cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Applying harvest-aid chemicals adds an expense that many producers would rather avoid, noted Dr. James Supak, the Extension specialist. However, it is quite possible that a killing freeze may not occur for another three to five weeks, he warned. "Additional exposure of open cotton to weather elements could result in weight and quality losses that would more than offset the savings incurred by not applying harvest-aid chemicals. A recent analysis by Dr. Jackie Smith, Extension economist and farm management specialist, indicates that yield and quality losses can easily result in losses of \$4-5 per bale each week," he noted.

Although the cotton plants were heavily damaged by the extreme weather conditions, the plants are still alive and capable of carrying out certain functions, Supak said. At this time, the most important of these involves the natural dehydration (hardening) of the bolls. This process will eliminate the possibil-

ity of extensive freeze damage (formation of ice crystals within the boll that eventually result in rotting of the boll) and enable the bolls to open normally, Supak said.

Desiccants will be needed to dry and condition plant materials for harvest. These chemicals can be applied once the boll hydration process is essentially completed, Supak said. He recommended that the use of desiccants be delayed until 75-80% or more of the bolls are open and the remaining bolls are essentially mature.

"Generally, bolls are mature when they are too hard to be dented when squeezed between thumb and fingers, too hard to be sliced with a sharp knife and when the seed coat becomes light brown in color," he explained.

Desiccants which are approved for use on cotton are paraquat and arsenic acid. These can be used alone or can be tank mixed with Accelerate, the Extension specialist said. Recommended use rates for these chemicals are 1-2 pints paraquat per acre; 1-1.5 quarts arsenic acid per acre; tank mix of 1-2 pints paraquat plus 1-2 pints Accelerate per acre; and a tank mix of 1.5 pints arsenic acid plus 1.5 pints Accelerate per acre.

"In some instances, even lower than recommended rates may provide adequate desiccation," Supak said. "The optimum rates must be determined by trial and error and are likely to change with variations

in weather and plant conditions. With adequate soil moisture, some regrowth is likely upon the return of warmer, more open conditions. Arsenic acid is the more effective desiccant in controlling regrowth."

For best results, desiccants should be applied when winds are relatively calm, temperatures are in the 70's or higher, and 3-5 days of open, mild weather can be expected, Supak said. "Good spray coverage is essential for effective desiccation. Surfactants should be used to allow better distribution of the desiccant on plant parts. Where ground equipment is to be used, the addition of drop nozzles should be considered to improve coverage."

Desiccants constitute a production expense that farmers could avoid by waiting for a freeze to kill and condition the crop for harvest, the Extension specialist said. "Unfortunately, delaying harvest after the crop is ready can prove to be substantially more costly than the cost of the chemicals needed to prepare the crop for timely harvest."

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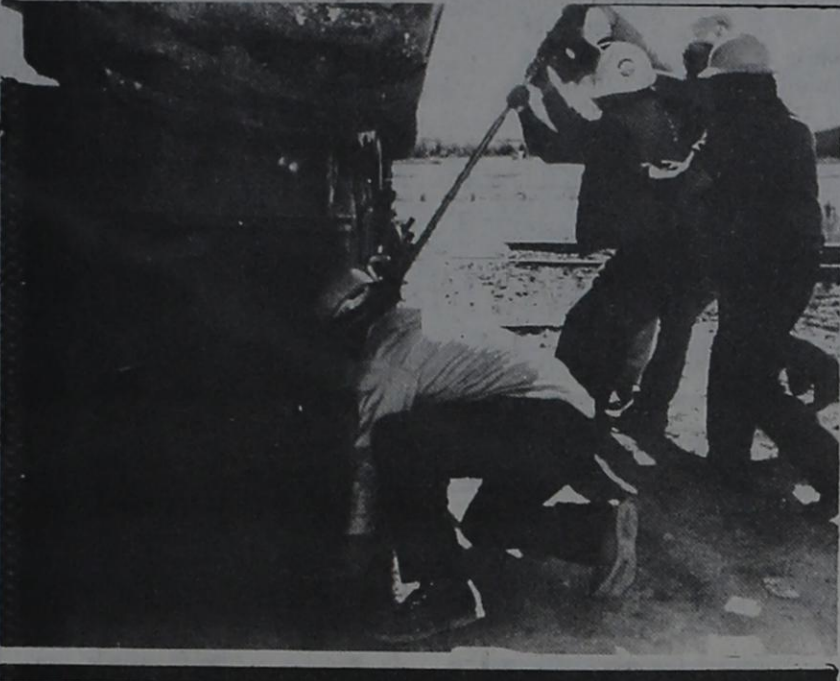

The Farwell Steers defeated the Lazbuddie Longhorns 22-7 last Friday night at Steer Stadium.

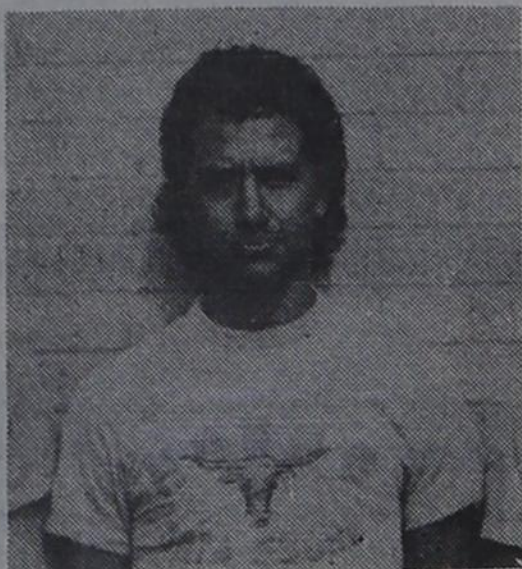
Both teams are now 1-1 in district play. Farwell plays Kress tonight while Lazbuddie hosts Nazareth.
