Three local young businessmen have been selected for inclusion in the 1970 edition of "Outstanding Young Men of America," it was announced this week by the Farwell Chamber of Commerce.

Selected to the coveted list were Lee Hutchins, Joe Hughes and Charles Aycock.

Hutchins is an electrician and operates his own business, Lee's Electric, in Farwell. He is an active member of civic organizations, is assistant chief of the Farwell Volunteer Fire Department, likes to hunt, and is an avid sports enthusiast. He and his wife, Gloria, have three children, Geretta, Carl and Daniel. The Hutchinses are members of Hamlin

Memorial United Methodist Church in Farwell.

A relative new-comer to the Farwell area, Charles Aycock is a lawyer with the Aldridge, Harding and Aycock firm, and is also active in civic activities. He and his wife, Margaret, also belong to the local United Methodist Church, and are dedicated workers in the newly-organized Fine Arts Committee of Farmer and Bailey Counties.

Joe Hughes, who graduated from Farwell High School, returned to Farwell some four and one-half years ago to take over Hughes Auto Supply, a business previously operated by his father, B. V. Hughes. Joe taught school in Borger before returning to Farwell to

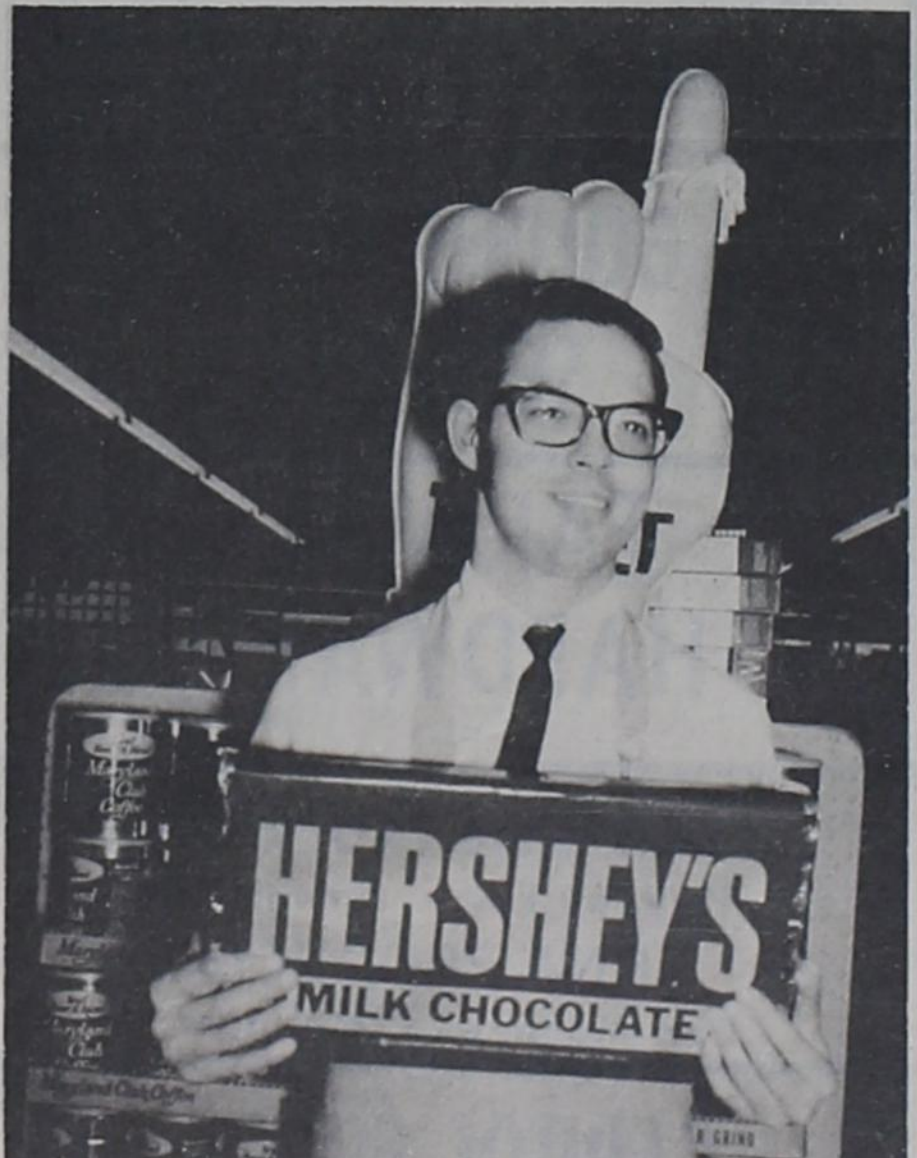

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County 4-H Members Enjoy Busy Year

National 4-H Week is being observed throughout the nation during October 4-10, as a tribute to the strength and success of the 4-H program. During this time the highlights of the previous year are reviewed

and plans are made for the coming year. The overall 4-H program today is varied and more complex than it was ten years ago. It is designed for urban as well as rural youth in an attempt to reach as many of the nation's youth as possible. Even though the 4-H program is primarily rural in Parmer County, several youngsters participate in various projects such as photography, entomology, wildlife and leadership. The 4-H enrollment in Parmer County is approximately 130 members. Most of the boys carry projects in field crops, beef cattle, sheep and swine. The girls participate in these same projects as well as clothing, foods and home improvement.

One of the main programs in Texas is training youngsters to participate in method demonstration contests. A method demonstration is composed of a single member or team of two. In the safety contest for instance, the youngsters demonstrate unsafe practices around the home or farm. This im-

proves a youngster's speech and allows him to speak before the public. There are many divisions that boys and girls can participate in. This year Darwin Green of Farwell won the single Farm and Ranch Management demonstration at State 4-H Roundup in June. He had previously won the district contest in Canyon, thereby qualifying him for state. Other 4-H'ers competing in the state contest were Kevin and Steven Kaltwasser in Beef Cattle Business and Deborah Harding in Food and Nutrition Educational Activity. The fastest growing program in Texas is the 4-H horse program. Started in 1963, it has grown to several thousand members in less than ten years.

Out of these members about 300 youngsters qualify and compete at the state show each year. They show at halter and compete in western pleasure, reining, pole bending and barrel racing. Laura Doshier of Farwell qualified for the state show this year by winning the pole bending contest at the district show, as well as placing in the barrel racing division.

Parmer County 4-H'ers will exhibit their livestock at several major stock shows this coming year. The starting show will be Odessa followed by Amarillo, El Paso, Parmer County and Houston. Parmer County youngsters will feed approximately 30 steers, 30 lambs and 40 barrows for the coming spring shows.

After the spring stock shows and the demonstration contests will come county 4-H camp and the other summer activities, which will make the coming year a busy one for the 4-H youngsters in Parmer County.

Three Farwell Lads Win Punt, Pass & Kick

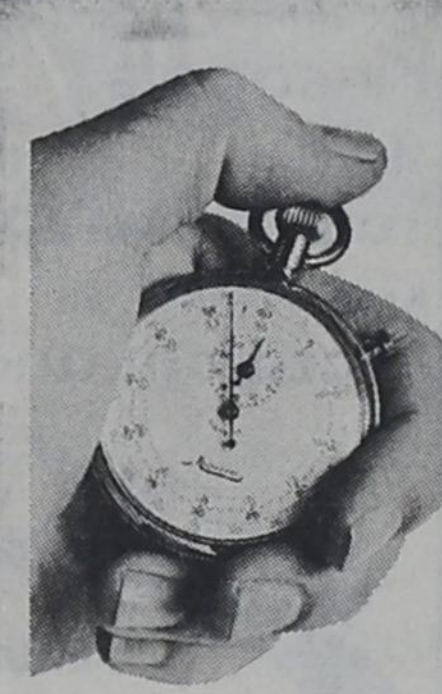

First District Game --

Steers Run Roughshod Over Hart Longhorns

The Farwell Steers brought a three-game losing streak to a rather dramatic end when they defeated the Hart Longhorns 80-7 here Friday night in a penalty-plagued game. The Steers seemed invincible to the large crowd of Farwell backers on hand for this, the homecoming game. The Steers in their first district game, gained an incredible total offense of 636 yards; 256 on the ground, 380 in the air. Farwell completed 16 of 35 passes to gain this rather sizable offense.

Hart had a total offense of 172 yards, all on the ground, as they could not connect on one of their 13 attempted passes. The Longhorns had 13 first downs as compared to 26 for the home team.

Hart's opening kick-off was taken on the 20 by Randy Chandler and returned to the 35. Sixteen plays later the Steers were on the Hart three yard line with a fourth and one. Randy Chandler plunged over for the first touchdown of the night from there. Larry Erwin booted the first of his six successful PAT attempts to make the score 7-0.

Stanley Dyer returned the Steer's resulting kickoff to the 34, but the visitors could make only nine yards and punted.

Farwell took the ball on their own 35. Two plays later, from the 43, Gary Erwin went around right end and charged the 57 yards to paydirt to make the score 13-0 when the PAT was missed.

Hart's next series was nipped in the bud when Brett Hargrove intercepted a pass on their first play from scrimmage. Starting from the 25, Gary Erwin and Barry Williams worked the ball down to within inches of the goal line. Barry Williams charged over to paydirt from there. Larry Erwin then added the extra point to make the score 20-0.

When the 'Horns fumbled on their next series, the Steers, starting from the 30, worked the ball down to the five where Barry Williams added another score. Before the second quarter began, the Steers led the Hart team 27-0 after the PAT.

To start the second quarter, Hart drove from their 37 to paydirt in 14 plays, Johnny Etherege plunging the last yard against the grudging Farwell defense. After a true extra point attempt, the visitors trailed 27-7.

The Steers started their next series from the 49, and drove to the three in five plays. Barry Williams got his third touchdown of the night, when he waltzed over the goal line from there. After the extra point was missed, the score stood 33-7.

When Hart punted after four

plays in the next series, Farwell took over on their own 38, only to have a pass intercepted three plays later on the 42. Hart lost the ball on downs on the 28 four plays later. Four plays later on the 40, Randy Chandler snagged a Gene Sheets pass and tip-toed through the tacklers for a TD. Larry Erwin added another point to bring the score to 40-7. The half ran out just a few seconds later.

The second half was much the same as the first, Hart never maintaining a drive of more than eight plays, Farwell scoring every time they had the ball except once. Farwell's first score of the second half came on a 15-yard scamper by Barry Williams. The Steers drove from their own 19 in nine plays for this score. After the PAT the score was 47-7.

The score stood 54-7 when Randy Chandler carried a Gene Sheets pass 37 yards for a touchdown. On the next series, however, the Steers found the Hart defense a bit more determined and had to punt on a fourth and 17 situation only 27 yards from another TD.

Hart took over on their four, drove out to the 18, when yet more disaster struck. Derek Garner fought through the offensive line, kidnapped a Hart lateral, and made off for the goal line, dragging two Longhorn tacklers the last seven yards to paydirt. A two-point conversion was missed and the Steers led 60-7.

Brett Hargrove took over the quarterbacking position on the Steers' next series. Starting from their own 34, the eager Steer offense drove to the three in six plays, where Randy Chandler walked in for the tenth Steer touchdown of the night. Chandler then plunged for another two points to bring the tally to 68-7.

The Steers picked up a Hart fumble only 41 yards from a touchdown, and, on the running abilities of Ray Norton, drove to the one where Brett Hargrove added another touchdown on a keeper. A two-point conversion was missed so the score came to 74-7.

The Steers took over the ball on their own 14 when the dangerous Steer defense forced another punt. They then worked to the Hart 22 where, with 14 seconds to go, Johnny Franse caught a Brett Hargrove pass for the 12th and last Steer score of the night. The two-point conversion was again missed and the clock ran out with the score 80-7.

In the Homecoming game win of 80-7 over Hart last Friday night in Steer Stadium, Farwell Coach Toby Booth said that he felt his boys "played a lot better offensively and were not making as many mistakes as

before. The defense played better. They moved a lot better and their game pursuit was much better.

"Our passing game was much improved as we completed 17 out of 34 passing attempts," commented Coach Booth, adding, "Our running game was considerably better and we hit

a lot harder than we have previously."

He continued to point out that "our two ends did an exceptional job catching the ball for us."

Saluted as "Steers of the Week" are Clint Deeds, offensive lineman and Barry Williams, back.

Texico Tops Buttons In Third Win Of Year

The Tucumcari B-team Buttons took a 28-6 trouncing at the hands of the Texico Wolverines Saturday night in Texico's fifth gridiron contest of the season. The Wolverines have now compiled a 3-2 record for the year.

Texico scored all their points in the first half and allowed the Tucumcari team to score in the third period of play.

Jerry Askew handled the kicking chores for Texico, including four for four PAT attempts.

Tucumcari received the opening kick and returned to their own 31. The Buttons could not move the ball and lost yardage on a tackle by Albert Steward. On fourth and 12, they attempted a punt which was blocked by Bill Servatius who fell on the ball giving the Wolverines possession on the visitors' 20. Steward then took the handoff and scampered for 20 yards and the first TD of the evening.

Texico again kicked to Tucumcari, but the rattled Buttons promptly fumbled, giving the ball back to Texico. Mitchell Turnbough recovered the ball to set the Wolverines in action on the 26. Three attempts failed to pick up a first down and Askew tried a field goal from the 25, but it fell short.

Tucumcari gained one first

down after Texico's punt, but were then stymied and punted from their own 15. Johnny Dane received the punt, picked up some blocking and showed his heels to the entire Tucumcari team, scoring the second Wolverine TD of the night. Askew boomed the PAT kick through the uprights giving Texico the point advantage 14-0.

Again Tucumcari took the kickoff back for short yardage and failed to pick up a first down, turning the ball over to the Green and White on their own 49. On second and six, halfback Monty Lambert broke through the Button line and went all the way for Texico's third TD. Askew put the ball through the posts for the PAT and Texico was ahead 21-0.

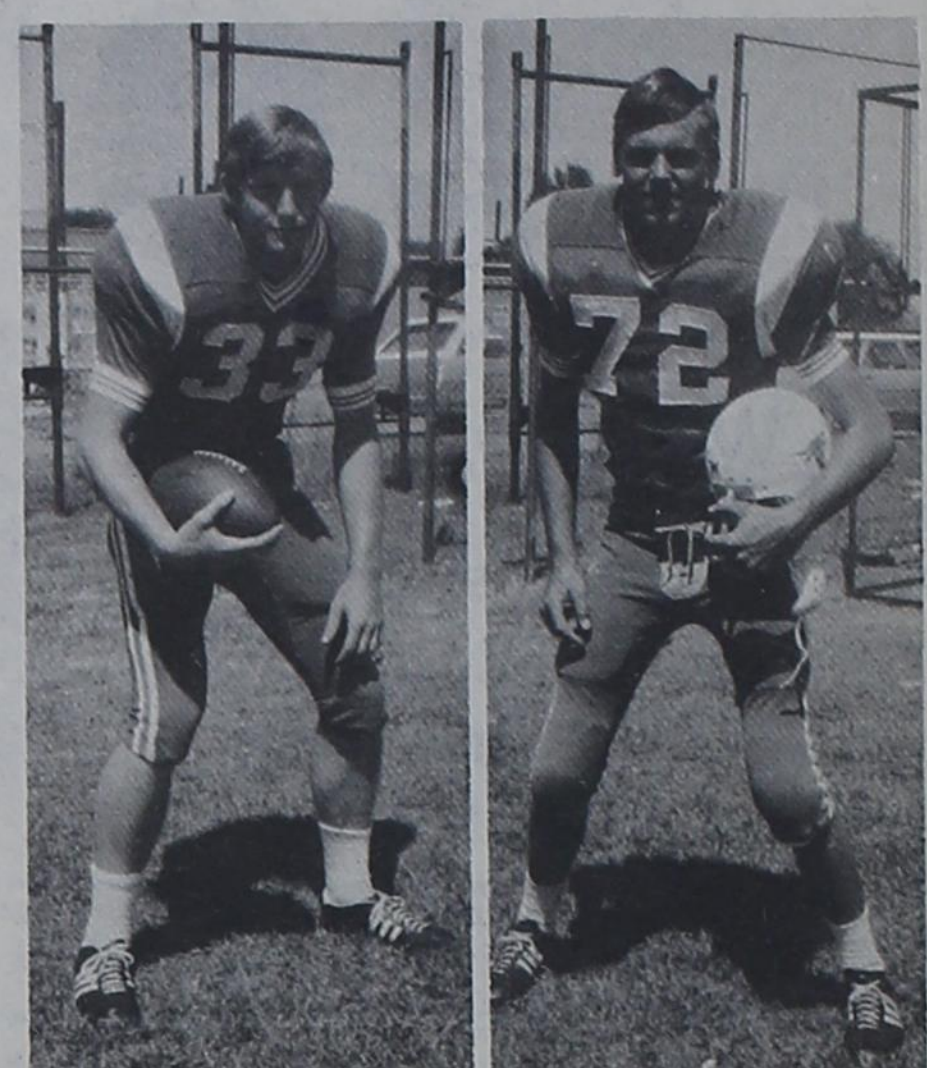
Once more the Wolves' defense held the Buttons without a first down, forcing a punt which Johnny Dane received and carried to the Texico 47. Terry Yell picked up one yard on first and 10, then threw an interception to the Buttons.

Tucumcari could not get moving and again punted on fourth and two. On third and five Albert Steward got the call and went through five yards of players with help from the line to score Texico's final TD. Askew kicked the PAT to put the Wolverines' score at 28. Tucumcari had one more try before the half to score, but failed, going in at the half 28 points behind.

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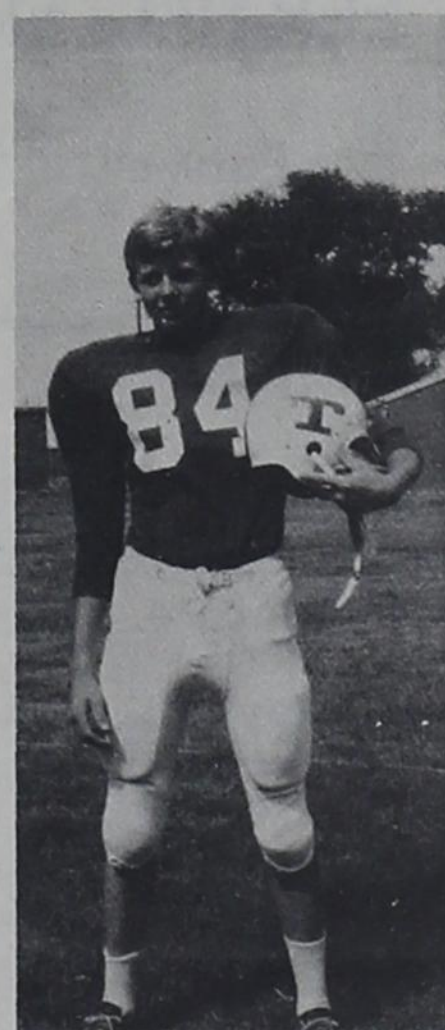

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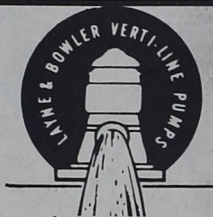


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
