### At Home In Parmer County

How do you spend your money? According to Doris Myers, Extension home management specialist at Texas A&M University, the U. S. Consumer's expenditures are broken down like this: food and tobacco -- 23.2%; housing -- 14.4%; household operation -- 14.1%; transportation -- 13.5%; clothing and accessories -- 10.3%; medical care expenses -- 7.2%; recreation -- 6.3%; personal business -- 5.5%; personal care -- 1.7%; religion and charity -- 1.5%; other -- 0.7%.

Some of you have recently been concerned about termites in your house.

Termites do have expensive diets, because they eat wood and other materials such as plaster, cement wall boards, books, leather, plastic and rubber insulation.

To check your house for these

destructive insects, here are some suggestions from Extension housing and home furnishings specialist.

\*Inspect the inside of the foundation wall and each supporting pier.

\*Look for small tunnels about the size of a kitchen match stem which the termites have built from the ground level up the inside of the foundation wall.

\*Pay particular attention to concrete porches, garages, patio, steps and any wooden sills or beams in contact with the ground. These are ideal places for termites.

\*Use an ice pick or screwdriver to test the soundness of the wood. These tools can be forced easily through wood damaged by termites.

\*A flashlight or an electric bulb in a cage with 100 foot extension cord will provide adequate light for the inspection.

plane and flew into the base of Susitna mountain. Susitna means "sleeping lady" which is what the mountain looks like from Anchorage. There they went salmon fishing and caught about 150 pounds one day.

Eklutna village was another stop for the Lockhart family. Eklutna is a native Eskimo village in the Chugach Mountains. Here there was a Russian Orthodox cemetery. The Russian Orthodox Church is the main church in Alaska. In the cemetery there are brightly colored, ornately carved small houses on top of the graves.

They visited the Portage glacier which had a funny blue tint to it. This caused a weird mountain of ice.

According to Kathy, "Flowers grew everywhere up there. The entire downtown area of Anchorage is planted in flowers and all of the homes, too."

While in the forty-ninth state, Kathy enjoyed Russian food, particularly borsch.

## Club Member Writes Of 4-H Activities

(Editor's note: The following article was written by a member of the Farwell 4-H Club in conjunction with activities taking place last week during National 4-H Club Week.)

I have been in 4-H for four years and have taken several projects.

One of the projects that I have enjoyed most is Foods and Nutrition. I have learned a lot in this project. I have learned about the nutritional value of foods, how to prepare and serve them, the four food groups, and how to preserve them.

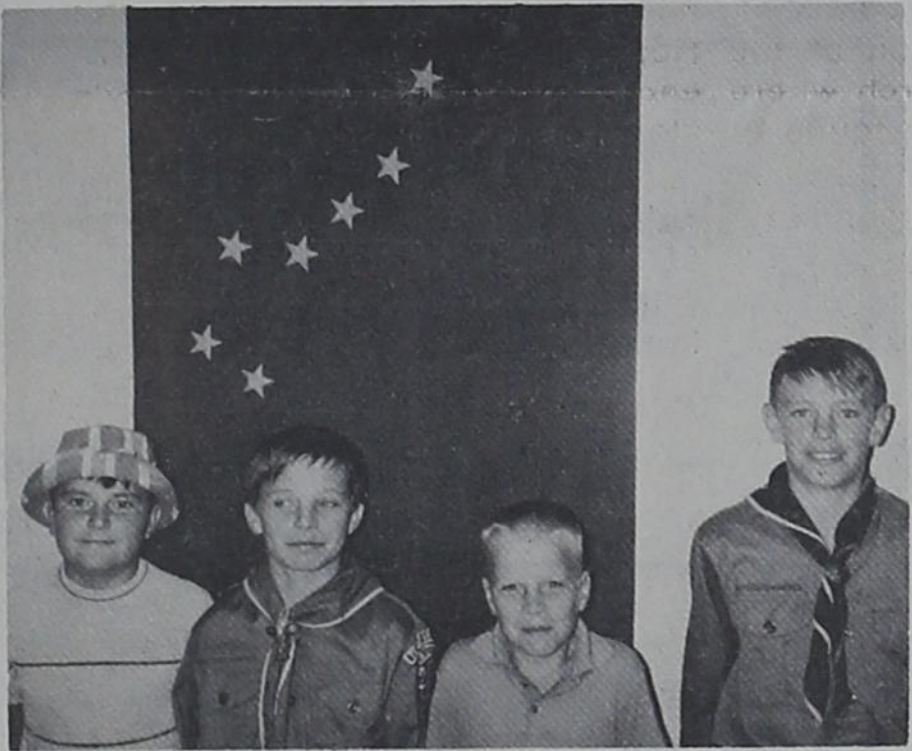
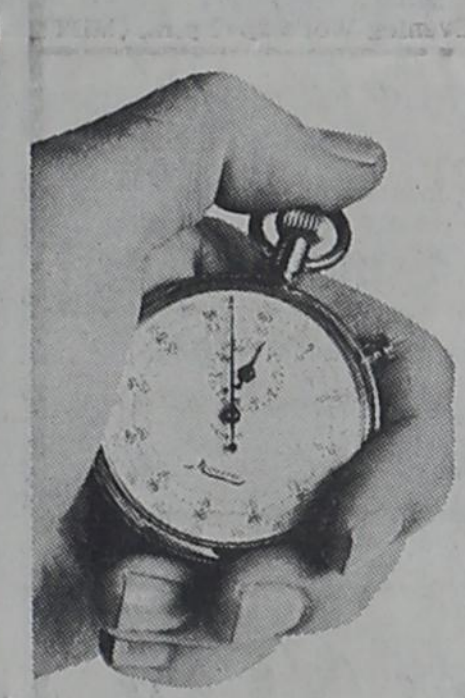
Farwell's Volunteer Fire Department made a run to the haystack on the Dub Howard farm Wednesday morning in its only action up to press time this week.

Texico Fire Department answered a call to a truck fire on October 10 and also made a run to Far-Tex Feed Yards south of town on October 12.

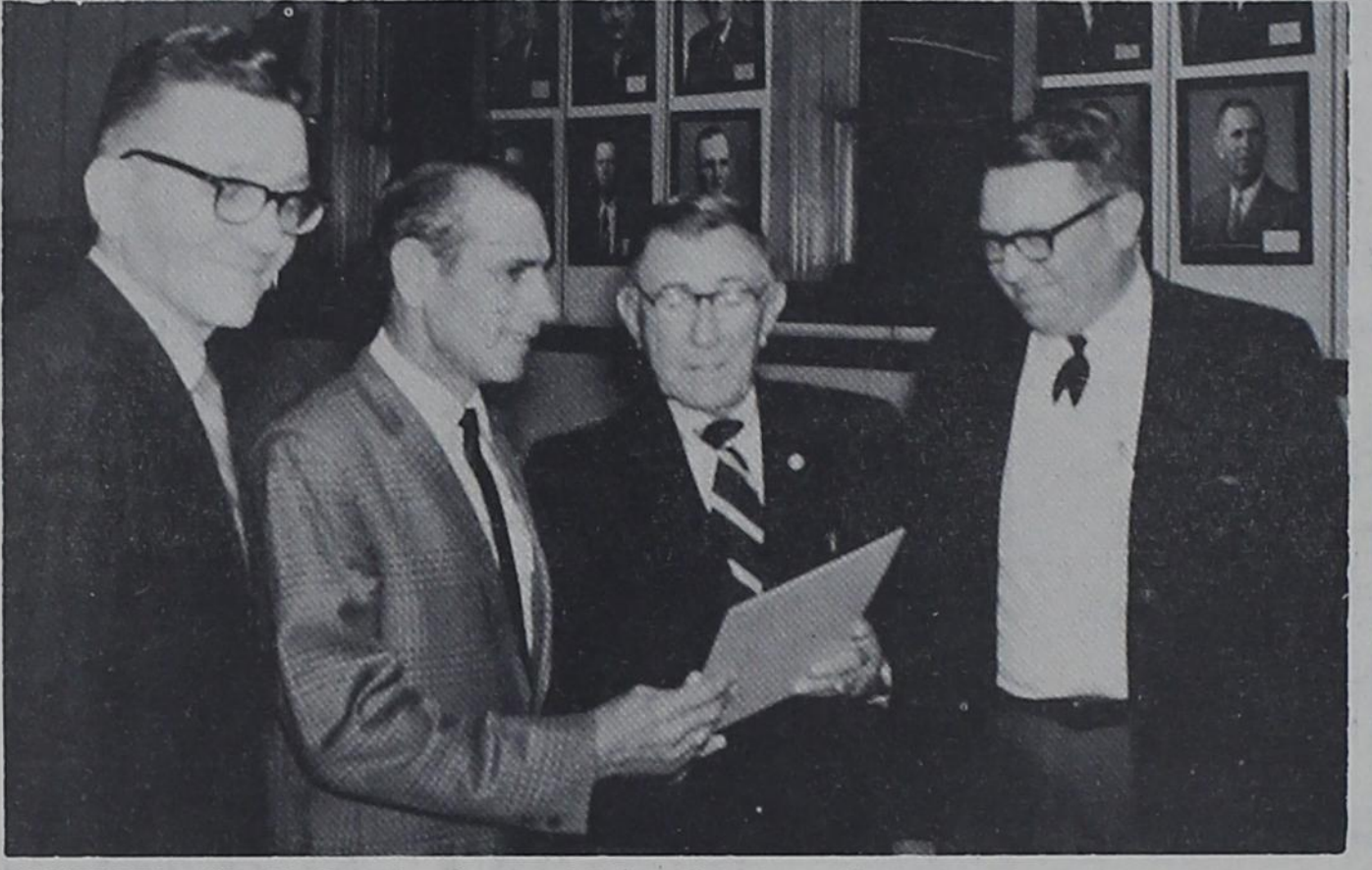
