

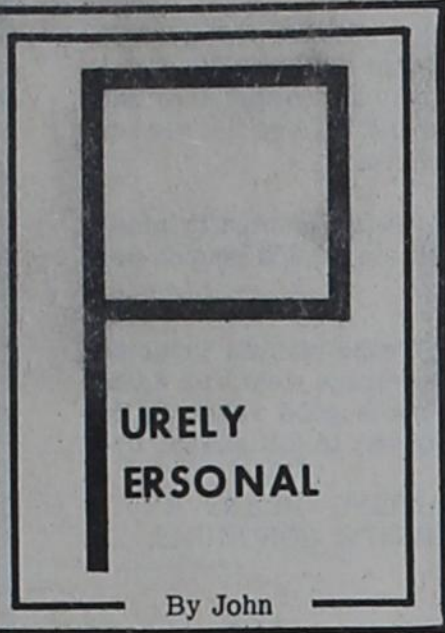

The end of an era for the Twin Cities and the Panhandle is today, Friday, April 30, 1971. Unless a court injunction becomes effective, Amtrack, the governmental agency taking over rail passenger transportation, will begin operation tomorrow. This will terminate the Santa Fe passenger service on the southern route, the one that passes through Texico and Farwell. So, as predicted sometime ago by this writer, "Uncle John" has taken the first available opportunity to cut off passenger rail service. This was not unexpected, but the date was moved up quite a bit over our original estimation.

We wonder why the northern section of the Santa Fe was chosen as the route over which to run the government-sponsored passenger trains. After all, our observation has been that the southern route has been the route favored by Santa Fe in their maintenance operations. It is our belief that this section has been the section modernized with all the electronic train controlling equipment, the section with the best kept road bed and the section with the best and newest in long welded rails. In short, our observations have led us to believe that this is the favored route. It would be logical to assume that this new, modern and well maintained section would be the one that they would want to operate the passenger trains upon. Ah well, in the fields of high finance and politics we have discovered that many a strange decision is reached, strange to the unwashed, un-informed and uneducated. Newspaper publishers seem to fall within that category.

Another passing strange bit of legislation has been okayed by our omniscient legislators in Austin. This is a shift in the philosophy of claims damage awards in automobile insurance. Heretofore, a person who contributed towards his own accident was barred from receiving a damage award. The new legislation modifies this approach to one of comparative negligence and also changes a jury verdict from unanimous to only a 10-2 basis. Our thinking leads us to believe that this will greatly increase the opportunities for damage awards and therefore increase the willingness of plaintiff lawyers filing suits on a contingent fee basis.

Now it has been established that the automobile insurance industry is about to go broke or raise rates even higher than they are at present. This will put automobile insurance out of many folks' reach and be a severe economic strain on those who carry the protection. This dilemma has caused a new approach to be taken in regard to car insurance in some states and has led to a limited trial of "no fault" type insurance. One big reason for the "no fault" insurance was the revelation that lawyer fees was taking 40 cents out of every premium dollar. A method of reducing the long, time consuming, expensive and generally unsatisfactory legal battles over accident responsibility has to be found and the "no fault" system is being tried out in some states.

Yet in Texas, already suffering from high auto insurance rates, the legislature passes a law that looks to us like it will greatly encourage litigation and promote extensive settlements.

As another well-known columnist might say, it is passing strange that the majority of our legislative representatives are also members of the bar.

### Running Water Draw Easements Secured

The big news in conservation circles is the Running Water Draw watershed.

All land rights instruments have been cleared by the Sponsoring Local organization. This means that the Parmer County Commissioners court and the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District have secured all easements necessary for construction.

Construction money will have to come from congress.

The watershed was started about ten years ago when the local people decided that the Running Water Draw needed to be controlled and they made application to the Soil Conser-

vation Service for assistance. The assistance came in the form of a special watershed planning party. This party of specialists studied the watershed to see what structural measures were necessary for control of the draw. This plan was presented to the local organization and they accepted the plan.

In October 1968 they started securing the necessary easements. This week after about two and a half years of work the local sponsors can say "complete". It is hoped that in the 1972 fiscal year that some part of the construction can be started.

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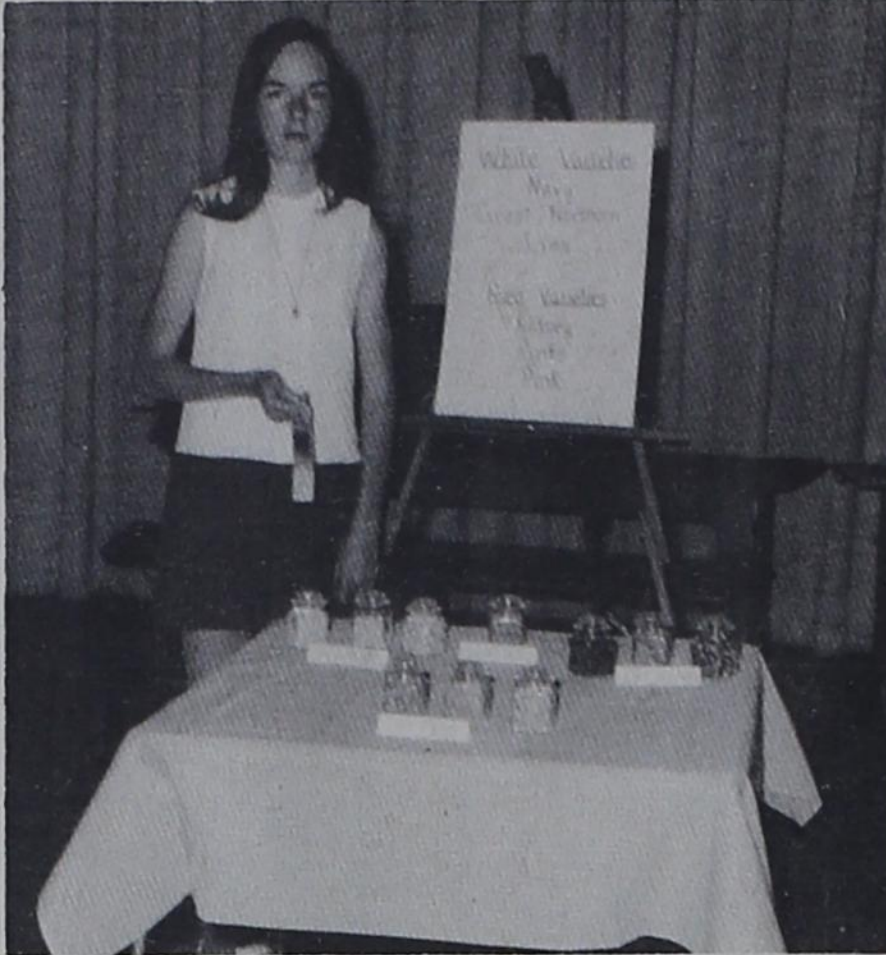

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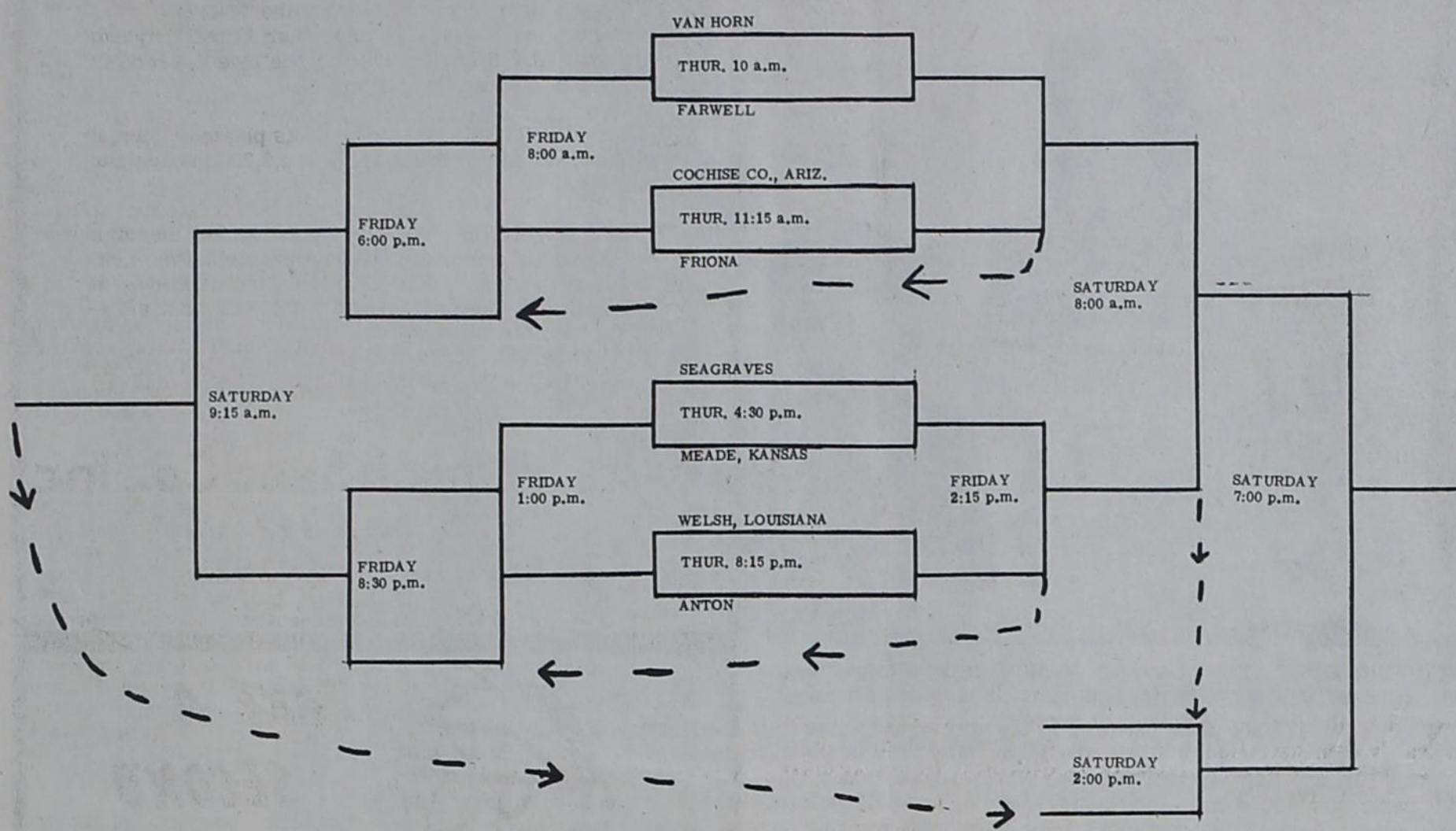

The two ladies joined some 700 other passengers aboard the M/S Song of Norway for the seven-day cruise. The group was composed of the Classroom Teachers of Dallas and their friends and families. Leaving Lubbock by plane on Saturday, April 3, the local women boarded a plane with other tour members in Dallas for the flight to Miami. Here they boarded the "Song of Nor-

way," ship of the 70's, for the cruise. The Royal Caribbean Line vessel's crew was composed of Norwegians and the captain was a 37-year-old Norwegian officer. Here they entered the United States National Caribbean Forest and saw much beautiful vegetation, viewing many coffee bean trees and ferns. Some of the ferns were as much as 30 feet tall. They also were able to see beautiful waterfalls falling through the lush vegetation and hillsides.

At the Elyunque Rain Forest managed by the Forest Service they saw mahogany, teak and asubia trees growing. On their return trip to the ship they stopped at Laquillo Beach which was studded with coconut and palm trees. That evening they enjoyed a tour of the nightclub scene seeing very impressive performers at shows in the Americano Hotel.

- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup corn starch

- 1 cup chopped walnuts
- 2 tablespoons corn oil
- 1 egg
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 cup boiling water

Grease 1 (9x5x3-inch) loaf pan. Sift flour, sugar, corn starch and salt together. Stir in walnuts and dates until dates are separated and coated. Beat corn oil and egg until blended; stir into dry ingredients. Dissolve baking soda in water; stir into flour mixture. Beat well. Pour into prepared pan. Set in warm place free from draft 10 minutes to rise slightly. Bake in 350 F. (moderate) oven about 1 hour or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean.

Watering newly sown seeds, whether indoors or outdoors, is extremely important. Although drainage must be good, especially indoors, the seedbeds must never be allowed to dry out. Dryness would be fatal to the sprouting seeds.

Rutabagas or Swedish turnips take longer to mature than regular turnips so seeds should be planted earlier — mid-June to early July.

Annual sunflowers are excellent as backgrounds for other flowers. Be certain to select a tall-growing kind as there now are dwarf varieties.

If you like radishes and object to paying high prices for them in the market during winter, grow Round Black Spanish, a winter radish.

Seeds are sown as late as August for winter use and roots are stored in moist sand. They keep all winter.

What is a garden without mignonette? Flowers are not showy in any way but they are delightfully fragrant, with a scent that is different from any other flower.



### Green Thumb Tips

Among many dwarf marigolds, the 6-inch-tall Petites are most useful. Yellow, gold and orange-flowered varieties are listed and a bicolor, Petite Harmony, has blossoms with mahogany guard petals surrounding a gold-crested center.

Would you believe! There's a pumpkin especially selected for easy carving — for jack o' lanterns, of course.

Named Spookie, it is a cross between the varieties Early Sugar Pie and Jack O'Lantern.

With small fruits, about 6 inches deep and the same in diameter, weighing about 6 pounds, it can be used for pies as well as carving.

Sometimes gardeners complain about the number of seeds in a packet — there are either too few or too many.

This misunderstanding comes about because gardeners don't realize the great difference in seed sizes.

For instance, there are about 115 seeds of beans, either bush or pole, to the ounce while the same weight of turnip seeds would total 15,200.

Iceland poppies, although perennials, will bloom the first year if seeds are sown at the earliest possible date.

**TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE**

**THE TWELVE APOSTLES AND PAUL**  
In comparing the ministry of the twelve apostles with that of the Apostle Paul, we must observe carefully:  
1. The twelve were chosen by Christ ON EARTH (Luke 6:13) while Paul was later chosen by Christ IN HEAVEN (Acts 9:3-5; 26:16).  
2. Prior to Paul's conversion the twelve had known Christ only ON EARTH (1 John 1:1). Even at His ascension to heaven "a cloud received Him OUT OF THEIR SIGHT" (Acts 1:9). But Paul knew only Christ IN HEAVEN, having never seen Him on earth (Acts 26:16; 1 Cor. 15:8).  
3. The twelve represented their own nation. The number twelve has no connection with the "one body" of Christ. As we know, Jacob of old "begat twelve patriarchs" (Acts 7:8). From these sprang the twelve tribes of Israel. These twelve tribes had twelve princes over them (Numbers 1:16). Even when Israel was ruled by kings there were still to be twelve

princes - one over each tribe (1 Chronicles 27:22). Thus, as He went forth proclaiming "the gospel of the kingdom" our Lord chose twelve princes for the twelve thrones in the kingdom to come (Matthew 19:28).  
4. The twelve were sent to proclaim Christ's kingdom "at hand" (Matthew 10:7) and later to effect its establishment on earth (Acts 3:19-26). But Paul was sent to proclaim "the gospel of the grace of God" (Acts 20:24) while the kingdom is held in abeyance.  
5. The ministry of the twelve was based on covenant promises (Isaiah 60:1-3; Luke 1:70-75; Acts 3:22-26). Paul's ministry was not based on covenant promises, but wholly on the grace of God through Christ (Romans 3:21-28; 5:20,21; Ephesians 1:6,7; 2:7; etc.).

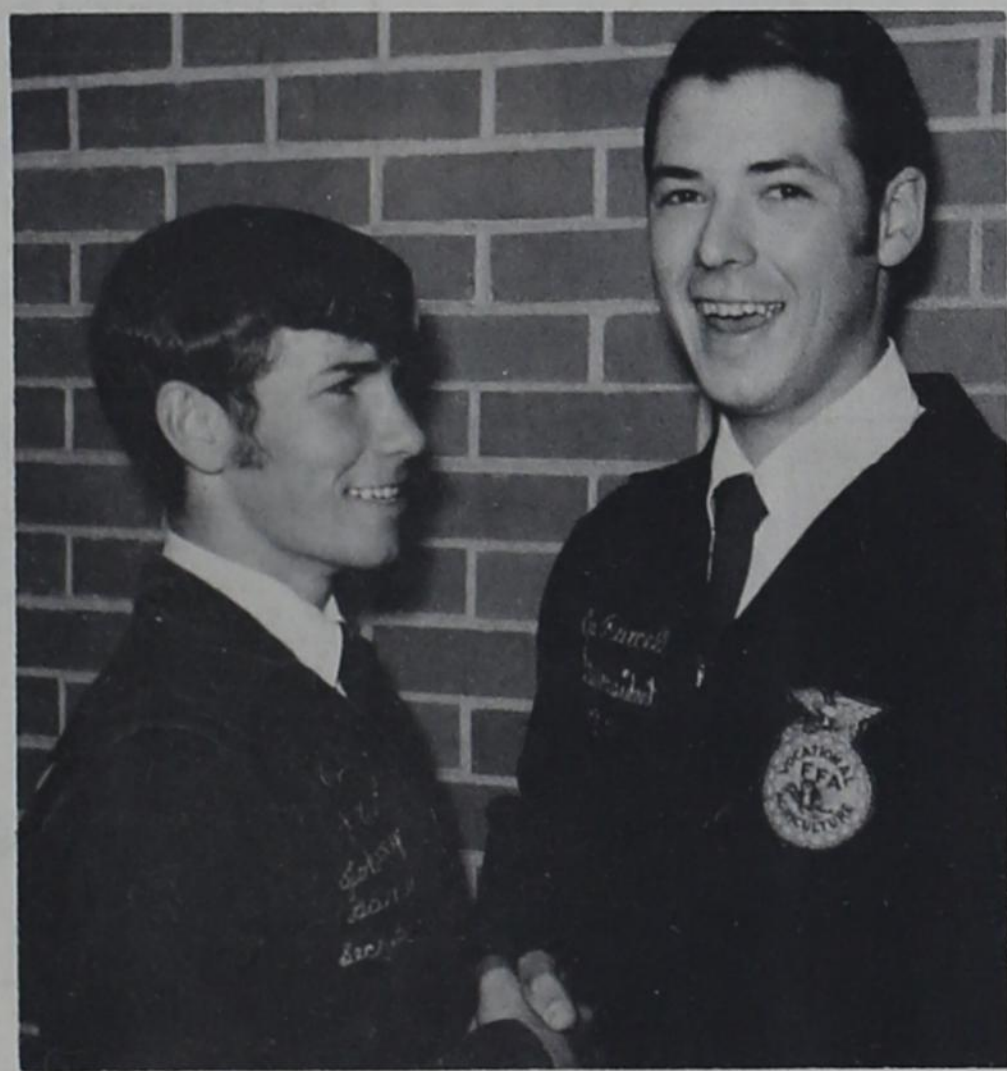
