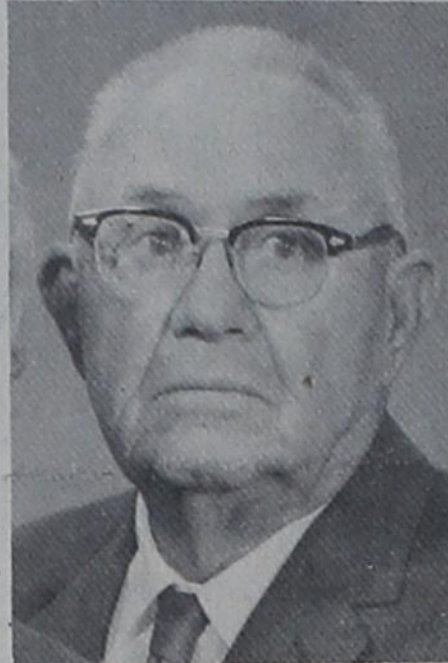
Portraying characters in this portrait will be Debbie Hancock, Sheree Rundell, Kirt Martin, Donna Deel, Randy

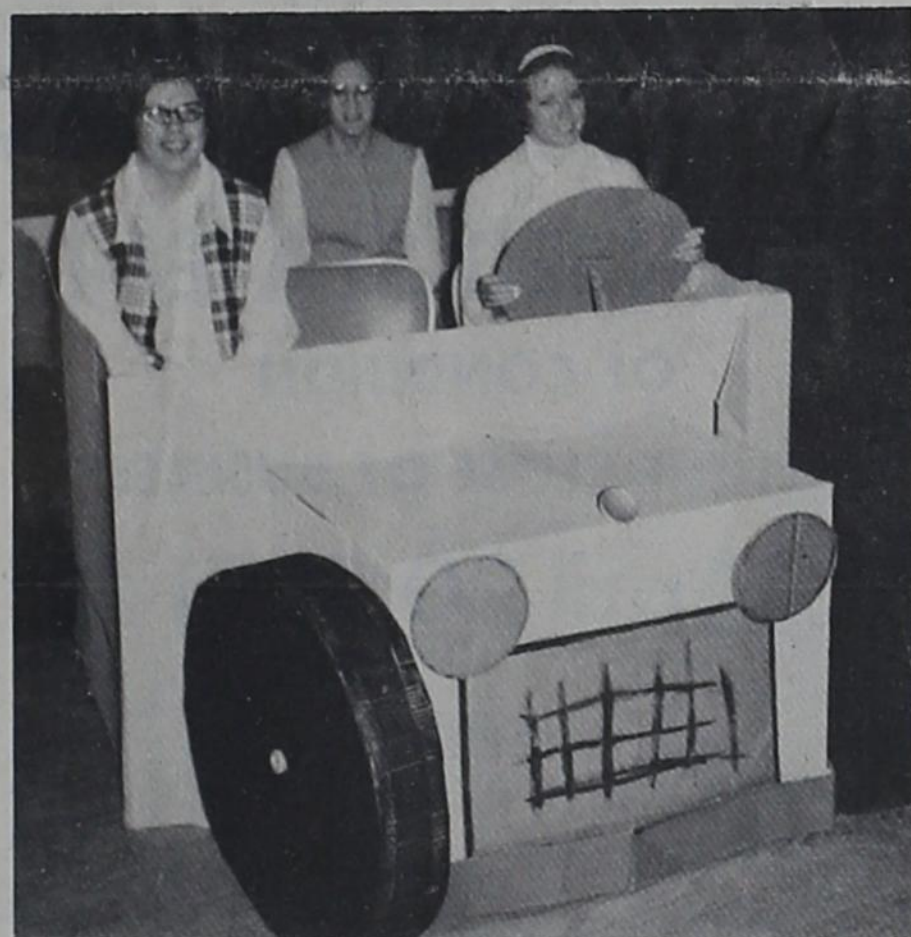

Wheat Referendum, Producer Board Election Scheduled

John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture, recently certified the Texas Wheat Producers Association to conduct a referendum and producer board election in 34 Texas counties under provisions of the Agricultural Commodity Act of 1969, according to Bill Nelson, TWPA Executive Vice President of Amarillo.

The certification authorizes the association to sponsor and conduct a referendum whereby producers of wheat in the designated area vote on a proposition of self assessment not to exceed five mills per bushel for research, market development, disease and insect control and more efficient production and marketing practices for wheat.

Such a referendum has been set by the Association for Tuesday, May 11, according to Leo Witkowski of Hereford, TWPA farmer-elected president.

Witkowski said that at the same time of the assessment referendum, an election will be held to elect a nine-member producer board to administer the program and direct the use of funds generated.

Ruth Class Meets With Mrs. Guess

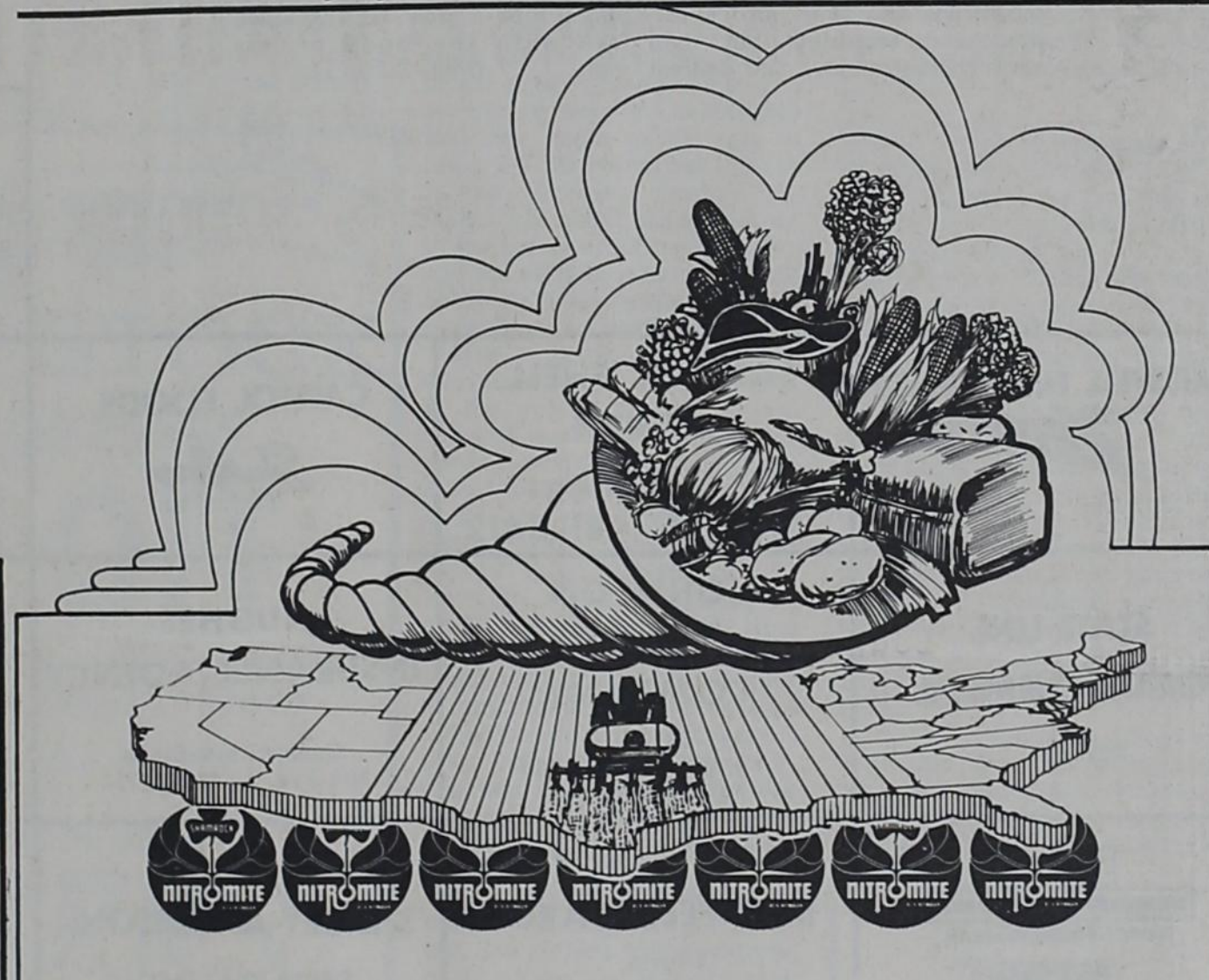

THE CHRISTIAN'S PROSPECT

Those of us who trust in Christ for salvation have a glorious prospect. For the present, until we go to be with Him, "we have redemption, through His blood, the forgiveness of sins, according to the riches of His grace" (Eph. 1:7). In infinite love God has made us to be "accepted in the Beloved" (Eph. 1:6) and has pronounced us "complete in Him" (Col. 2:10).

Our position is now a blessed and exalted one, for God has "made us sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus" (Eph. 2:6) and has "blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ" (Eph. 1:3).

East Texas where they lived until 1934. She started school in Anna, Tex., and finished her high school education at Crossroads. On February 20, 1910, she was married to W. W. Johnson and they made their home in Hopkins until moving to Brownfield in 1934.

Johnson farmed near Meadow and Brownfield until his death. All of their five children were born in East Texas, three of whom survive. They are Mrs. Henson of Farwell, Mrs. Buena Brewer of Salinas, Calif., and Holland Johnson of Meadow. She has three living grandsons and five great-grandchildren. One grandson, Ronny Henson, was killed in an automobile accident.

The Johnsons reared their first grandchild until he was grown and Mrs. Johnson said it was just like having another child of her own. He is Joe Johnson who now lives in Lovington.

On her birthday Mrs. Johnson received telephone calls from all the grandsons and all of the great-grandchildren had to talk to her. She mentioned that she could hardly talk to them for the tears, but thought it was marvelous anyway. She comments about the greatness of the invention of the telephone and the television so that people hundreds of miles apart can talk to and see one another.

Mrs. Johnson became a Christian at the age of 12 and at the age of 16 was elected to teach the "Card Class" and since that time until she broke a hip some four years ago, she had taught some age group in Sunday School. She is a member of First Baptist Church, Farwell, and was teaching an adult ladies class at the time of her accident. She still attends church when the weather is dry and hardly ever misses a daytime service. For a while after her accident, Mrs. Johnson was in a wheel chair. She then graduated to a walker and now only uses a cane. She admits that she uses it only when she is away from home where the surroundings are not familiar. She suffers from cataracts on her eyes and says the cane helps steady her when she cannot see clearly. Because she cannot undergo an operation for the cataracts, she says, "I sup-

"Babe" Johnson, was accidentally killed January 26, 1955, when his tractor overturned on him while farming near Brownfield. In earlier days the Johnsons had lost a daughter, Marie, when she was three years of age, and in 1954 a son, Elmer, was killed in an industrial accident in Modesto, Calif.

Mrs. Johnson decided that she would like to move to Farwell to be near a daughter and family, Mr. and Mrs. Clay Henson, and they build her home where it now stands on First Street. At the time she moved here, the Hensons lived in the house next door. Mrs. Johnson remembers the day she moved her quite vividly, saying that it was the day a car was being given away by some merchant and that Mrs. Charlie Lovelace was recipient of the automobile. The date was January 27, 1956, she says.

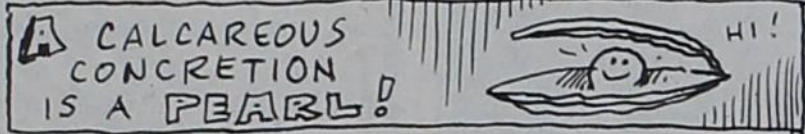


On The Farm In Parmer County

The Texas Wheat Producers Association is conducting a wheat referendum on Tuesday, May 11. The voting will be conducted from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the courthouse in Farwell. The purpose of the referendum is to vote on a proposal to assess each producer not more than five mills per bushel on all wheat and to select a nine-man producer board to administer the use of such funds in research and promotion programs.

wheat are eligible to vote. Ballots for absentee voting may be obtained from my office and returned prior to the voting date deadline. For the referendum to pass it will take a two-thirds majority of those who vote in the referendum. If it should pass, the assessment will begin with the 1971 crop.

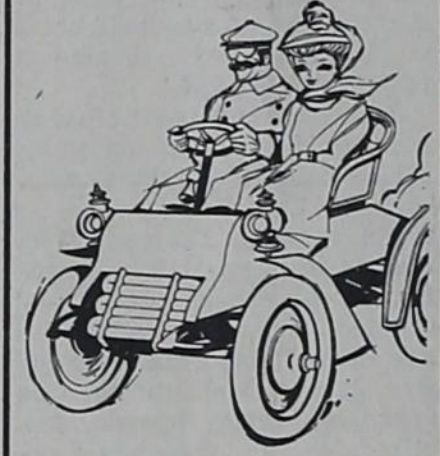

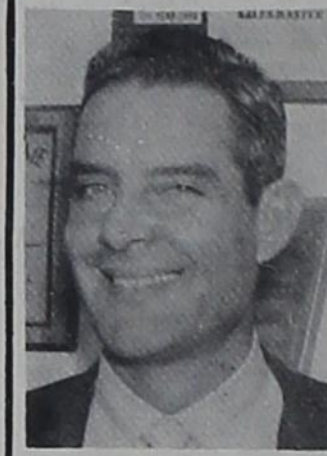
