Seniors To Hear Minister

Commencement for 64 Twin City seniors is set for next week when the high schools of Texico and Farwell have their graduation programs at their respective auditoriums. Texico seniors will graduate in ceremonies Thursday night, May 27, at 8 p.m. (CDT) in the high school auditorium; and the Farwell commencement will be Friday night, May 28, at 8 p.m. (CDT) in the school auditorium.

Baccalaureate services for both graduating classes is Sunday night, May 23, at 8 p.m. (CDT). Texico seniors will have their service at the First Baptist Church of Texico, while Farwell will have its program at the school auditorium.

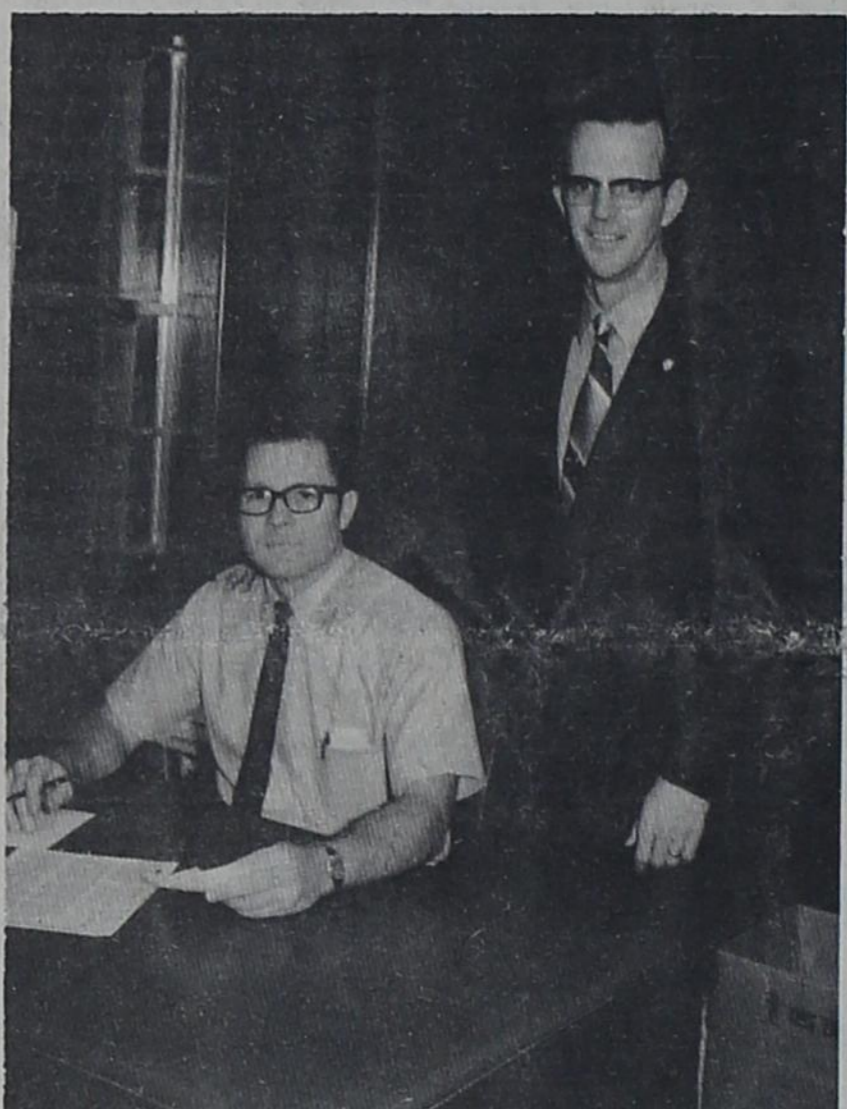
Graduate escorts are Diane Kelley and Connie Autrey, and ushers are Randy Skaggs and Loren Gibbs.

Coffee and doughnuts will be served to all visitors to the business on First Street on the two days and specials will be noted on many items throughout the store, including some paint and paneling.

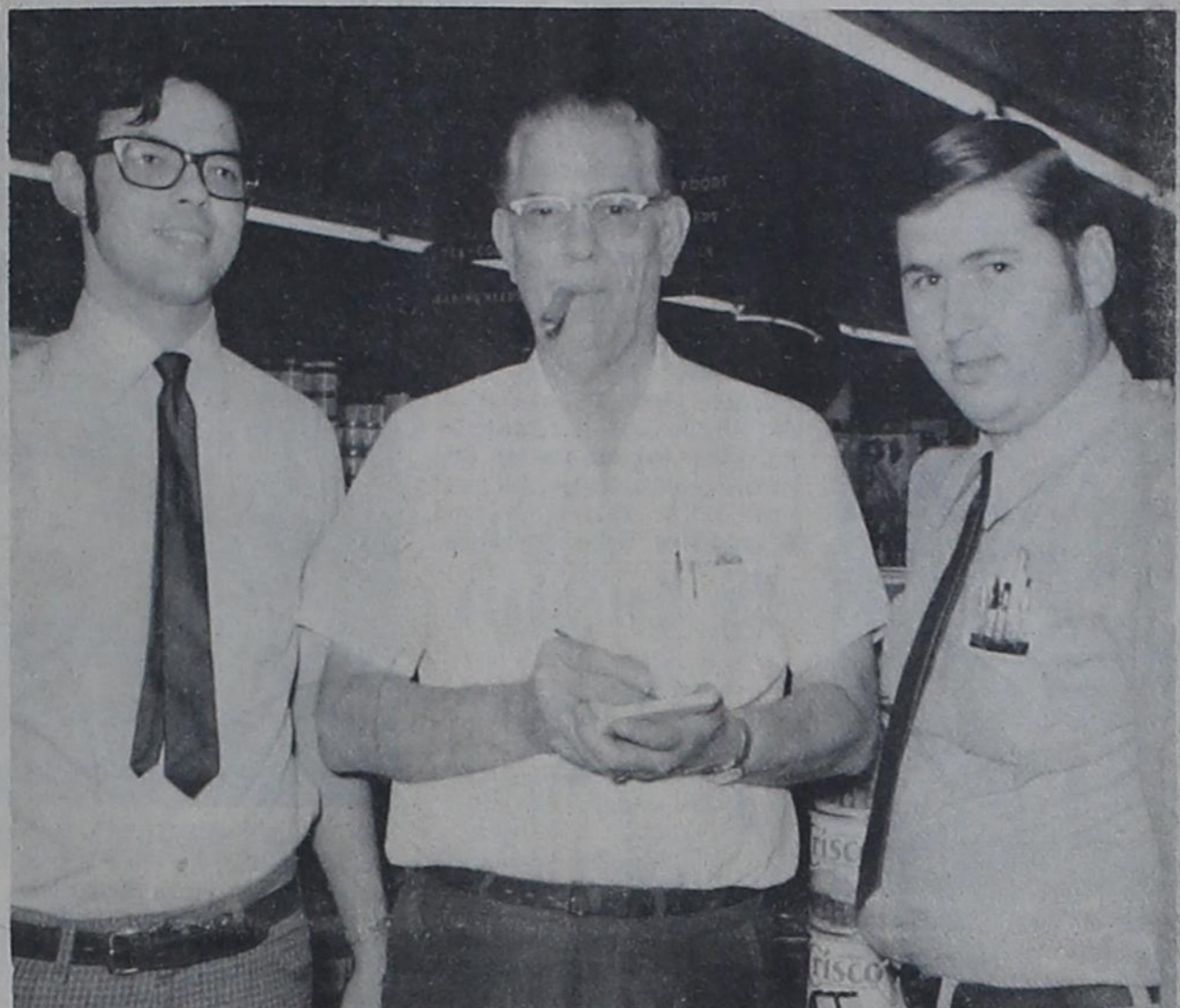
Williams Named Outstanding

Davis' Piggly Wiggly In Twentieth Year

What is the secret for staying in the grocery business 20 years? Carl G. Davis seems to think his family has something to do with it.

Davis this week is celebrating his 20th year as a Piggly Wiggly supermarket owner. Davis made the switch to Piggly Wiggly in March, 1951, after a nine-year stint with C. G. Davis Mercantile.

Davis' son, Carl Glenn Davis II, was born into the business, says his father, Carl Glenn returned to help his father in the grocery business in 1968 after attending ENMU. Carl Glenn's previous experience at grocery business was when he was in high school. He helped his father then, too.

Elva Ruth, Davis' wife, has helped him in the business since the time he owned C. G. Davis Mercantile.

Lately, Elva Ruth has been ill since suffering a stroke and is unable to assist her husband.

Davis' daughter, Glenna Ruth, aided her father until she got married and moved to Skokie, Ill., where she lives with her husband and three children.

Carl Glenn and his wife have two children. The closeness

which keeps the family working together shows up even in the names of Carl Glenn's children. They are Karla Sue, four years old, and Tyson Glenn, one year of age.

When Davis first opened the Mercantile, he sold appliances, dry goods and some groceries. Davis said, "At this point, we had \$800 worth of merchandise and \$1200 in debts. After he moved down the street one block and started the Piggly Wiggly Store, he phased out most of the appliances and dry goods and expanded his supply of groceries.

Talking about the grocery business, Davis says, "I would be lost without it." According to Davis, the grocery business is never the same. "I know less about it now than when I started. It has changed so much," he said.

Last week Davis and his son found a State Line Tribune advertisement from 1954 and noted that prices on groceries are just about the same. Believe it or not, some of the prices are lower now. Coffee in 1954 sold for \$1.15 a pound. It now sells for 89 cents a pound. Bacon (Continued on Page 2)

Plastic Firm To Open, New Jobs Available

More than 100 persons are expected to be employed by American Western Plastics Co., Inc., a firm from Denver, Colo., that is relocating in Texico.

The new plastics firm, to be located in the old Thunderbird Manufacturing Co. building in Texico, will manufacture several items including plastic bags and toys. The building was obtained from New Mexico Mill and Elevator Co.

According to Lee Guthrie, president of First National Bank in Clovis, new personnel will be hired as soon as the Denver plant is closed. Only supervisory personnel will come from the previous operation.

The building, which the company obtained with the help of

the First National Bank of Clovis, will house both the executive offices and manufacturing plant of the plastics firm.

Audie Murphy, war hero and movie star, and Gordon Cooper, astronaut, are investors in a conglomerate that owns American Western as well as similar plants in other parts of the country.

Some \$2 million in sales has been projected for the new firm by Guthrie, who was instrumental in securing the industry for this area.

Michael Fitzgerald, president of American Western, and Terri Mcanally, vice-president, are expected to come here to organize the start of production.

Although machinery and equipment is expected to be moved into the building in the next two or three weeks, it will be some time before the actual hiring of employees takes place, Guthrie said.

The new firm, which will use three plastic manufacturing processes, will use the extrusion process for making plastic pipe, the injection mold process for making plastic bottles and boys, and a third process for manufacturing plastic bags.

position she had held for many years.

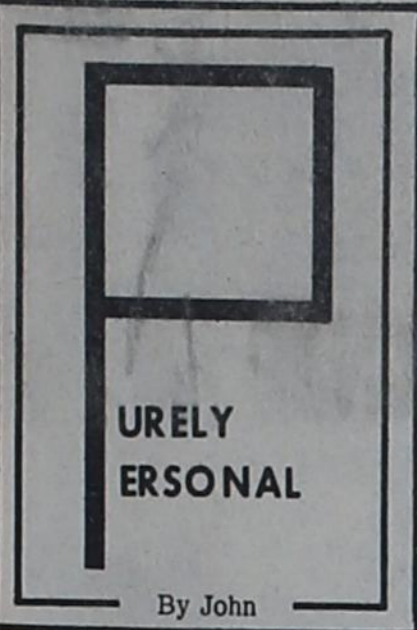

Next week the Twin Cities graduates another class of its best young people. A large majority of them will probably go on to some kind of higher education. Others will strive for an immediate place in the world of agriculture and commerce. Whatever the future may hold for them, we believe that they will be the better for it by having been reared in this area of the great and good U.S.A. We believe that overwhelmingly, the young men and women who come from this area will have better character, a higher morality and a better inspiration to tackle the future.

The pity of it is that few of these people, if they follow the pattern of their predecessors, will ultimately return to Texico or to Farwell for permanent residence or employment. We export the finest grain sorghum in the world, and gladly and cheerfully do so. We also export the finest young men and women, but somewhat reluctantly and sorrowfully. Such export of youth and talent is the biggest drain on the future of smaller communities. Had we been able to retain the fruits of our loins in our area, we would be a community several times as large as we are at present. We would be a community richer in youth, richer in vital ideas, and richer in family friendships. The paradox of it is that as the young people migrate toward the big cities for their future, it is the cities themselves that are strangling on their masses of humanity and the small towns from whence the young people come are dying because of the lack of new citizens.

It looks like the answer to much of our social and economic ills could be found in a program designed to return much small business and manufacturing concerns to the rural area and provide the jobs and the opportunities that the young seek.

No toot, no hoot. On Tuesday morning the Twin Cities seems strangely quiet. How we miss John Santa Fe's lonesome walls as he hits the border crossing. Just think, a relatively small handful of avaricious men have idled a good portion of the country this morning. Yes, as incredible as it seems, only 13,500 men seem to have effectively halted not only the long suffering railroads but most of the major industries in the country as well.

All the squabble we are not familiar with, but it seems to me that just asking for over a 50 per cent increase in wages in the next three years is plumb greedy and irresponsible, not to mention almost criminal. If everyone got a 50 per cent raise in wages in the next three years, inflation would completely ruin our economic and social system. Brother, just sit back and think how you would be if someone would guarantee you a 50 per cent increase in pay for the next three years. I can't even visualize a 50 per cent increase in earnings for the next decade, let alone three years.

Such thoughtlessness on the part of the average union man is going to lead to serious consequences in this country. If the trend of extraordinary wage raises for union members goes on unchecked, inflation will seriously endanger the old, poor, and those on relatively fixed incomes. After all, somebody HAS to pay for unproductive wage raises. If the trend of union rapaciousness is not voluntarily halted and it is left to violent means to end this irresponsibility, it can only mean class struggle and bitter hatred. We are currently plagued with enough class warfare without adding this unnecessary ingredient to the social stew. Would that reasonableness, understanding and patriotism might return to those in many positions of social and political power. It's long past time for us to have some men of character instead of men of greed in responsible positions.

Vote Light; No. 4 Passes

Farmer County voters went along with those across the rest of Texas in approving only one of the proposed four amendments to the constitution in Tuesday's election. In the very light turnout -- only 407 out of 3,233 registered voters cast ballots -- Farmer Countians passed Amendment No. 4 while turning down the other three.

Amendment No. 1 was defeated 257-149; Amendment No. 2 failed 279-125; and Amendment No. 3 was defeated 249-158.

Votes by precinct included: Precinct One, 20; Precinct Two, 160; Precinct Three, 80; Precinct Four, 66; Precinct Five, 38; Precinct Six, 21; Precinct Seven, 13; and Precinct Eight, nine.

The County Clerk's office reported that only one absentee ballot was cast in the election.

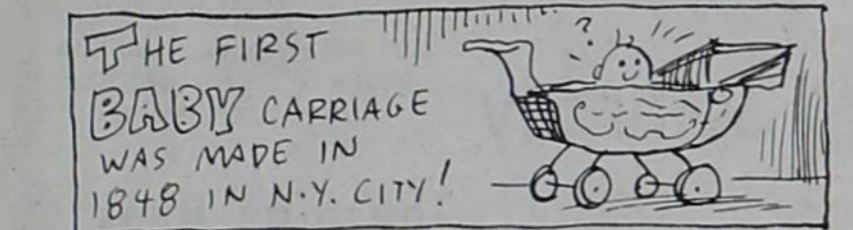

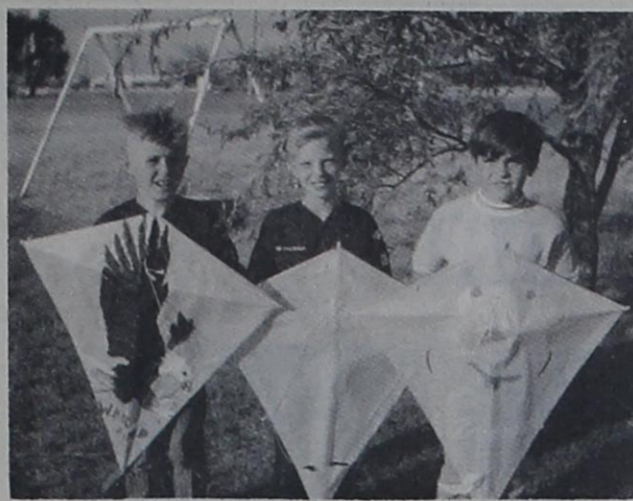

214 GOING DOWN

I heard something over the radio a few weeks ago, the like of which I've never heard before—and certainly never want to hear again. I heard the last words of the pilot on #214, the big jet plane that crashed to earth with 81 people aboard.

Because of the weather conditions the planes were "stacked" rather high around the Philadelphia airport, so the airport tower had just asked him: "Do you want to go on or do you want to hold?" The pilot had barely replied that he wanted to "hold," when he said something about his big Boeing 707 being on fire. Then came the awful words: "We're going down. Two fourteen is going down in flames." He said it calmly, and the Philadelphia tower answered back: "We have your message, two fourteen."

Just imagine, hearing the actual last words of the pilot while he and eighty others were being hurled more than 5,000 feet to their death amid the flaming parts of their stricken plane! Yet, one does not have to be in a plane to meet death suddenly. He can stumble off a curb and be killed or die suddenly in a hundred different ways.

The important thing is to be ready. We do not wish to scare people into accepting Christ as Savior, but it is a fact that we ought to think more about the uncertainty of life. Prov. 22:3 says: "A wise man foreseeth the evil and hideth himself, but fools pass on and are punished."

No wonder Paul wrote in II Cor. 6:1,2: "We then as workers together with Him, beseech you also that ye receive not the grace of God in vain... Behold, now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation."

We cannot offer salvation yesterday, for yesterday is passed. Nor can we promise it for tomorrow, for the opportunity may be withdrawn by then. The best we can do is to tell you now: God loves you. Christ died for you. "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31).

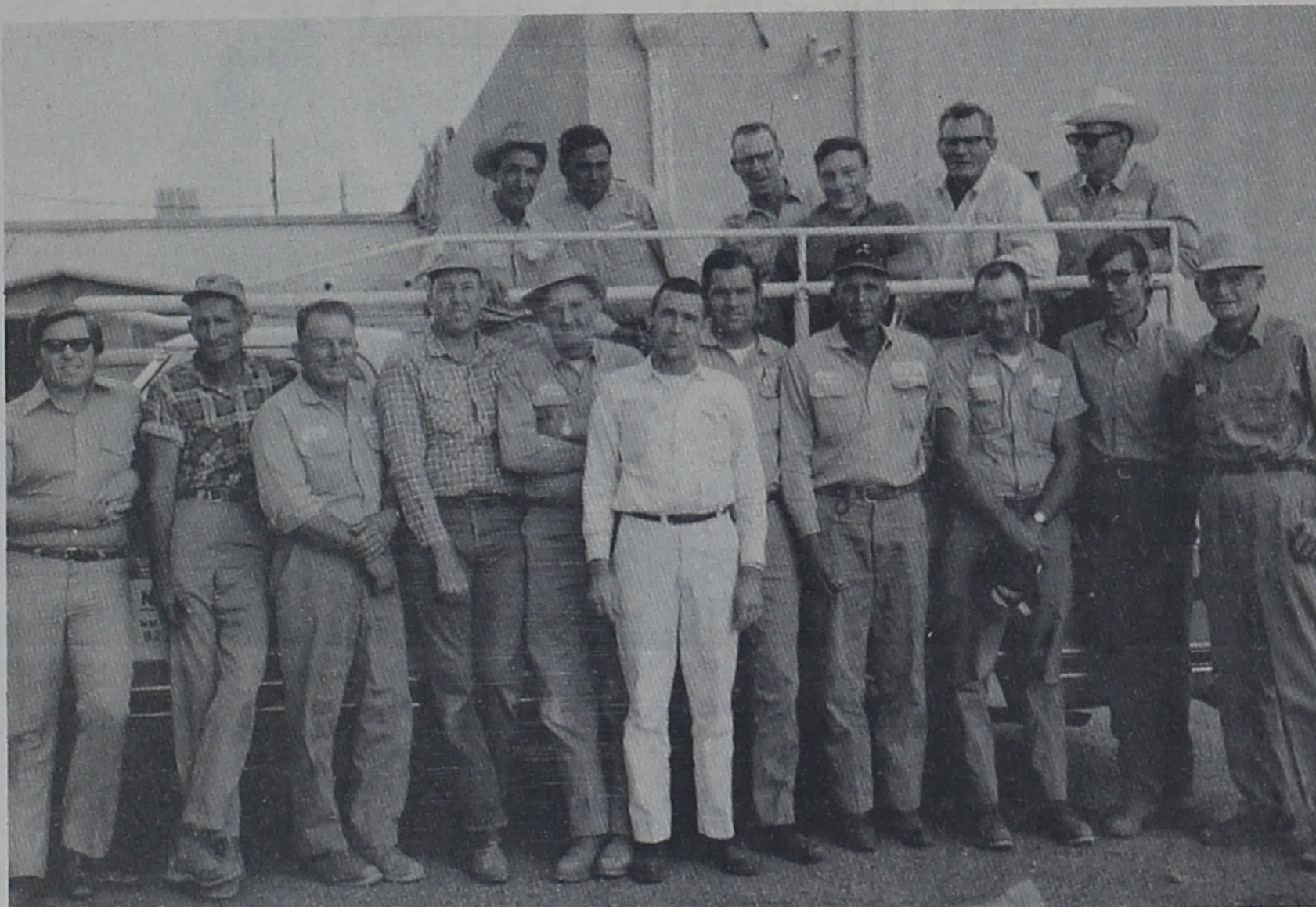
