Trustees Salaries Approved

Texico Mayor Perry Winkles and town trustees passed an ordinance recently that will provide salaries for the group.

Ordinance 176 which was approved, established a \$10 salary for the mayor and \$5 each for the trustees for every meeting they attend. This ordinance marks the first time in Texico city government history that the city officials have set themselves salaries.

Another ordinance passed by the trustees, Ordinance 175, calls for an increase in the rate for a one-inch water meter hookup from \$85 to \$125.

Rip Snodgrass Rites Scheduled Friday

Funeral services for Rip Snodgrass, 70, a familiar figure to Twin City residents for many years, will be Friday afternoon, May 28, at 3 o'clock (CDT) in the 21st Street Church of Christ with the minister, Mardell Lynch, officiating. Burial will be in the Texico Cemetery with Steed-Todd of Clovis in charge.

Mr. Snodgrass, who had owned and operated a shoe repair and western wear store (Rip's Western Wear) in Texico since 1943, died early Wednesday morning in Clovis Memorial Hospital following a lengthy illness. Although he had been in ill health for quite some time, he had not been recently hospitalized until late Tuesday afternoon. He had made his home in Clovis for several years but still continued to make appearances at his Texico store almost daily although he had been

inactive in the operation of the business.

Born in Floydada, Tex., on November 21, 1900, he grew up in that area. He and his wife, Thelma, were married on July 9, 1934. For a period of time they were engaged in ranching near Ft. Sumner, then moved to Wellington where they purchased the Electric Shoe Shop which they moved to Texico. Their original business was housed in the middle portion of the building they now occupy and through the years as the business expanded, the firm moved into the quarters which previously housed a drug store and the Texico Post Office.

The business grew from the shoe repair shop into the large retail sales firm it is now with all types of western wear featured. Assisting Mr. and Mrs. Snodgrass in the business during the past several years have been a son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Harvey Snodgrass.

Pioneer Resident Succumbs

N. R. Harding, 81, passed away Saturday, May 22, at 8:25 a.m. enroute to Parmer County Community Hospital at Friona. He had been in ill health for a number of years prior to his death. "Nath", as he was known, was born December 5, 1889, to David Louis and Mary Elizabeth Harding, in Comanche County, Tex. He was predeceased by eight brothers and sisters and his mother and father. He leaves surviving his wife, Ethel, of Farwell, and four sons, J. D. of Levelland, Warren G. of San Antonio, Nathan, Jr., of Odessa, and Hurshel of Farwell; nine grandchildren; four great-grandchildren; and also two surviving sisters.

Mr. Harding had retired from farming about 15 years ago and had lived six miles south of Farwell from 1931 until 1968, when he moved to Farwell.

He was married to Ethel McQuatters January 2, 1912, at Hubbard City, Tex. In his early years he had operated a tailor shop, worked in the coal mines at Como, Tex., and had been a cashier in the Gustine State Bank, Gustine, Tex. For one year, in 1947, he was a partner in Harding & Seale, an implement company in Farwell. He started farming as a permanent occupation in 1919, six miles south of Texico, eventually moving to Texas in Bailey County, south of Farwell, in 1931, where he continued farming until moving to Farwell.

Nath was an early pioneer, having first come to this area in early 1909 with his parents, coming to Bovina, from Comanche County and proceeding to Farwell by wagon, since at that time no railroad ran to Farwell. He lived with his parents south of Texico in the northeast corner of Roosevelt County until approximately 1911, when he returned to Comanche County and thereafter returned to this area in 1919 and remained here the rest of his lifetime.

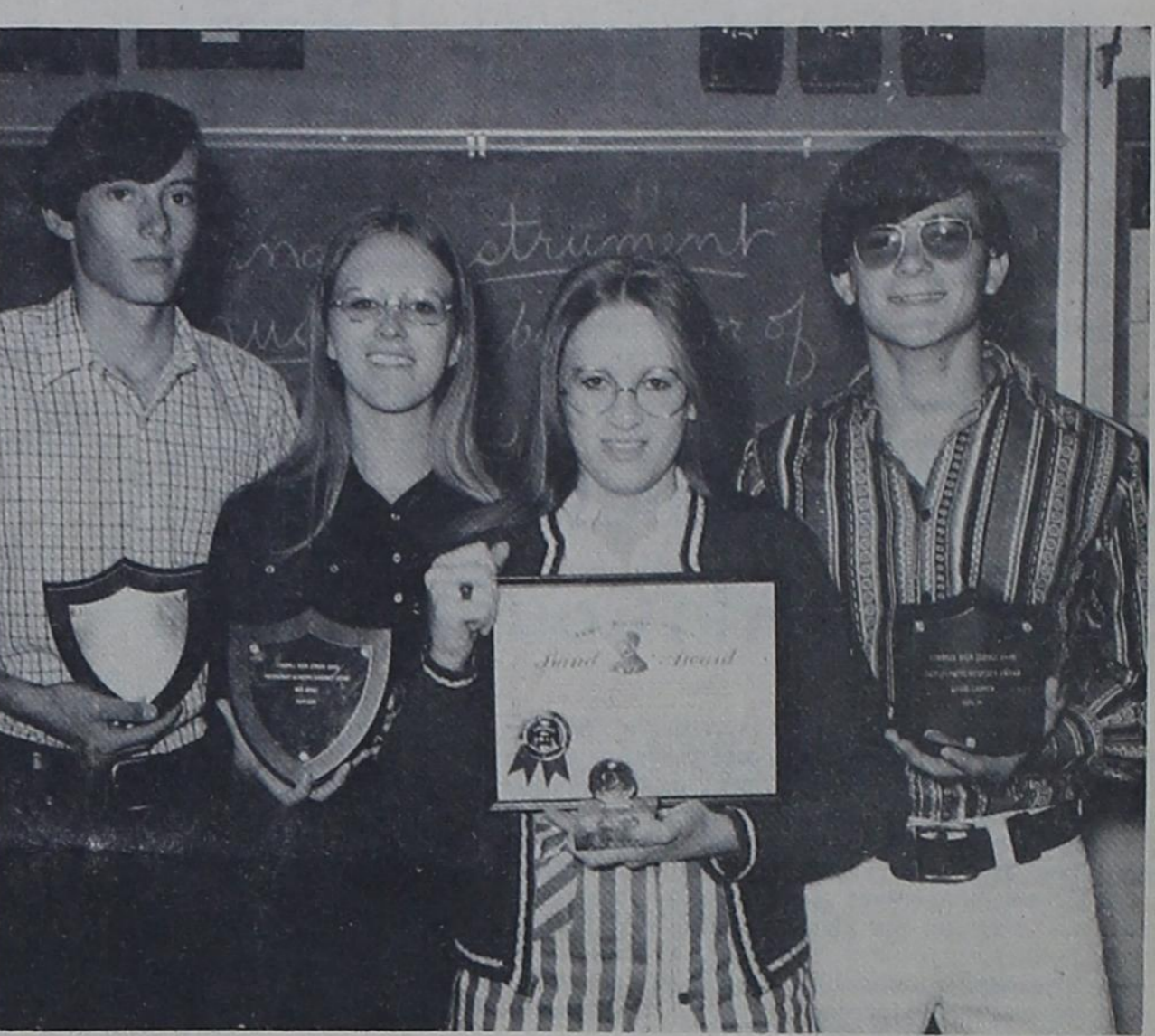
He had been a member of the Baptist Church since he was a very young man and was also a member of the Masonic Lodge for a period of more than 50 years.

Tribune Sets Rate Increase

It is with regret that the State Line Tribune announces a raise in subscription rates, effective May 1, 1971. The new rates will be \$4.50 and out-of-area subscription rates will be \$6.00. The raise in subscription rates reflects the higher postal charges assessed second class matter since the re-organization of the Postal Department.

On a local basis postage was increased moderately; while a larger and increasing amount is now being charged for second class matter going greater distances. Also, as the future rates to be charged for newspapers are not clear at this time, we are limiting renewals to a one-year term. All those who have received renewal notices dated prior to this date can renew on a one-year basis at the old rate listed on the renewal notice card.

Even though many weekly newspapers have raised their single copy price to 15 cents, the Tribune single copy price will remain at 10 cents for the present time.

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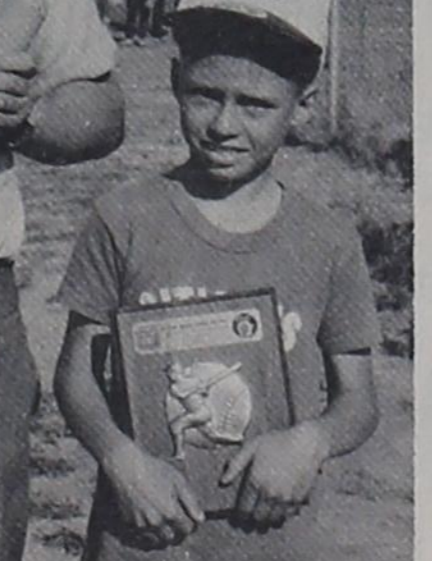

Greenbugs Infesting Some Grain In County

Light greenbug infestations have been detected in several fields of seedling grain sorghum in Parmer County, says Mack Heald, county agent. Most infestations are light and scattered but counts averaged almost one greenbug per plant in one field.

Since greenbugs are capable of reproducing rapidly, producers should keep a close check on seedling grain sorghum. Small grain sorghum up to about six inches in height is much more susceptible to greenbug injury than the larger plants. Control on seedling grain sorghum should be taken if damage is visible or if greenbug colonies build up on the plants.

Greenbugs do not increase as rapidly during May and June as they do later in the summer. During the past few years, early infestations usually phased out without causing much damage.

Since early infestations are very spotted, plants should be inspected at several locations within the field. Producers should be sure that greenbugs are present in damaging numbers before starting a spray program.

Most of the cotton in the county is up to a stand. Several producers have stated that they have had less trouble this year

in getting a good stand than in past years, says Heald. However, many producers seem to be having a problem with poor grain sorghum stands. Dr. Robert Metzger, areas agronomist, Lubbock, states that the slow, erratic germination of grain sorghum may be due to the extremely low seed moisture content at harvest last fall. Although these seeds showed a high germination per cent in laboratory tests, studies have shown that seed moisture reduced to unusually low levels of six to eight per cent may result in dormancy. Poor stands have been most prevalent in cool soil with limited planting moisture. The same seed planted in a warm moist seedbed gave good, healthy stands. Metzger stated that increasing the moisture content of these dormant seeds to 12 to 13 per cent prior to planting will help reduce this germination problem.

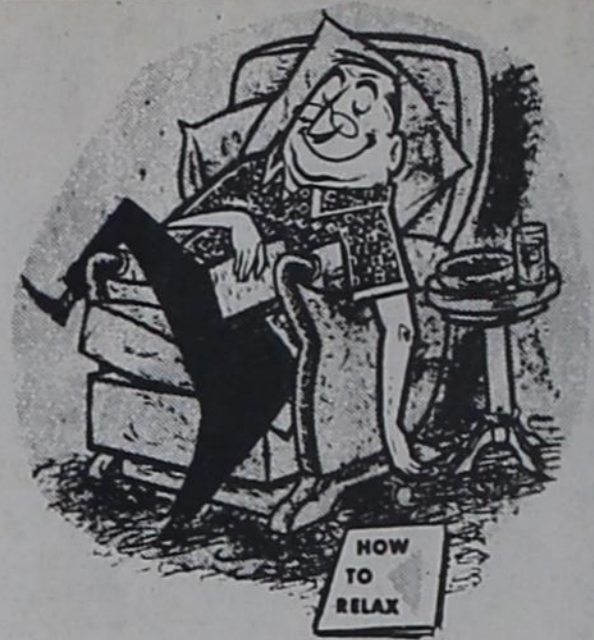

ALL FOR US

Have you ever thought how much God has done FOR US in Christ?

In Rom. 8:32 we read that to save us from sin, God "spared not His own Son, but delivered Him up FOR US all." In Titus 2:14 we are told that Christ "gave Himself FOR US, that He might redeem us from all iniquity..." In Rom. 5:8 the apostle declares that "while we were yet sinners, Christ died FOR US." Gal. 3:13 says that Christ was "made a curse FOR US."

Heb. 9:12 states that "He entered... into the holy place [the presence of the Father] having obtained eternal redemption FOR US." And if we trust Him for this "eternal redemption" we may read further in Heb. 9:24 that "Christ is not entered into the holy places made with hands... but into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God FOR US." Mrs. Benderman Home From Spain

Mrs. Lillian Benderman returned to her home in Farwell Saturday, May 15, from a trip to Spain where she visited a daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Harlan.

Leaving Dallas on March 29, Mrs. Benderman arrived in Madrid, Spain, the following day. She was met there by her daughter and family and they spent two days sightseeing in the capital of Spain before returning to their home at Rota, Spain, a U. S. Naval Base.

Among the places of interest visited by the Farwell woman during her 43-day stay there were Granada where they saw one of the last strongholds of the Moorish kingdom; Arcos, a city built high up on a mountain top for military protection where the government has built the castles into modern hotels; Seville, where Christopher Columbus is entombed; Cadiz, the largest port in Spain; Cordova,

and many other interesting places.

Mrs. Benderman says that the entire country of Spain looks like a giant picture postcard with their fields and flowers a beautiful sight at all times. At Rota where her children live, the temperature never gets down to the freezing point and she says the flowers were all in bloom during her stay and that the fresh strawberries and grapes were abundant.

Agriculture on the rolling hills and plains features crops of cotton, sugar beets, olives, grapes and many other things. Fishing is a major industry for this country which is in a growing and building process with many new highways, apartments and other buildings under construction.

Mrs. Benderman says the people are lovely, she saw no beggars, most of the people were dressed nicely and the

children were clean and neat. She says the average monthly wage there is \$125 and the average size of a family is eight members, noting that it takes half as much to live there as it does in the United States. Many persons from the United States are moving there at retirement age, she says.

Attending church each Sunday that they were in Rota was a treat for the local lady who was awed at the riches built into the Catholic churches of the land. They attended church services at the Protestant church on the naval base several times and also attended the Catholic services at Rota. Mrs. Benderman says there are only approximately 26,000 Protestants in all of Spain.

After returning to New York, Mrs. Benderman visited two days with a granddaughter and family, Mr. and Mrs. Ed Farnone and Edmond, before returning to Dallas to visit her son and family, Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Benderman Jr. Benderman then drove his mother back to Farwell and went on to Albuquerque for a short visit before return to Dallas.

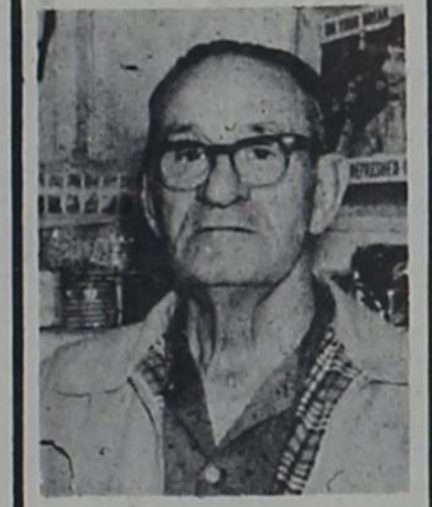

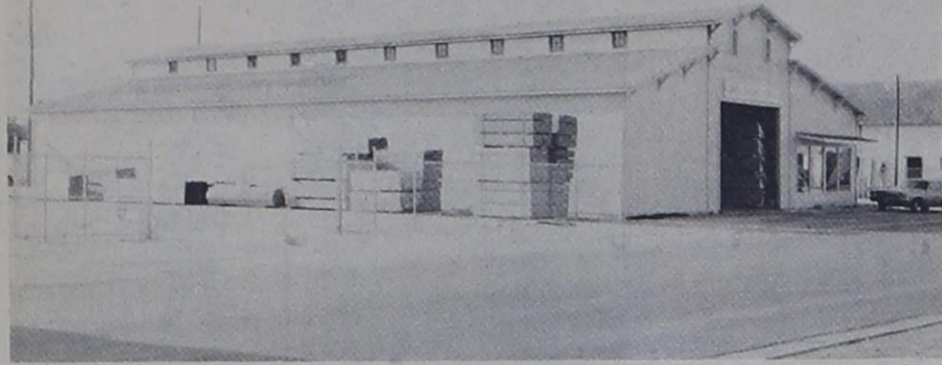
