

Greenbugs Infesting Some Grain In County

of reproducing rapidly, producers should keep a close check on seedling grain sorghum. Small grain sorghum up to about six inches in height is much more susceptible to grain sorghum should be taken

Greenbugs do not increase as rapidly during May and June as they do later in the summer. During the past few years, early infestations usually phased out without causing much dam-

Since early infestations are very spotted, plants should be inspected at several locations within the field. Producers should be sure that greenbugs are present in damaging numbers before starting a spray program.

Most of the cotton in the county is up to a stand. Several producers have stated that they have had less trouble this year
