Okla. Lane Gets New Pastor

Last Week's Rain Spotted

The area south of Texico-Farwell seemed to be the chosen country last week as reports of two to three inches of rain came in.

Ted Horner, southwest of Texico, received three inches of rainfall and Ted Magness, southeast of Farwell, reported a shower of over two inches Friday night.

Mrs. Bert Williams reports a 2.80 inch rain for Orle Jones' farm southeast of Farwell. Other reports in that area include two to three inch rains. Mrs. Bob Blair, near West Camp, said they received approximately 2.75 inches of rain.

People in the north were not so lucky last week. Leon Langford, north of Texico, reported a trace of rain. B. A. Rogers who lives in Texico, reported .1 inch of rain, while Sherry Anderson-Pitman men reported the same. At least the rain gave the Twin Cities equal amounts of moisture.

Bill Stone, north of Texico, reported no measurable amounts of rainfall. A 1.25 inch rain was reported Thursday at the Sherry-Anderson-Pitman elevator near Lariat.

Authorization has been received which permits emergency haying and grazing on farm program set-aside acres until November 1 in Parmer County, according to Prentice Mills, Parmer County ASCS Office Manager.

Mills states that any farmer who is interested in grazing or haying his set-aside acres should contact the ASCS office for full information as it relates to his farm. Before a farmer begins grazing or haying his acres, he must secure approval of the county ASCS committee and agree to the provisions of the haying and grazing agreement. Permission to hay or graze set-aside acres is not automatic, stresses Mills. There are certain rules (not overly restrictive) which must be observed and a fee for such grazing or haying is applicable, Mills says.

According to Mills, generally speaking, this is the way the program works: Let us assume that a farmer has 50 acres set-aside land under one or more of the 1971 programs and he would like to plant it in a sudan-cross for a forage or hay crop. Now assume that he would like to begin grazing 20 acres of the crop in July and would like to harvest the remaining 30 acres for hay in August. The fee for grazing during July and August (first two months of the period) on the 20 acres would probably be \$3.00 per acre per month for a total of \$6.00. As \$6.00 is

the maximum which may be charged per acre for the entire grazing season, his cost for grazing from now until November 1 would be \$6.00 per acre. The fee for harvesting sudan-cross types of hay are usually cut only one time. The total fee for cutting hay would be the \$6.00 charged for the month in which it was harvested. If the farmer wanted to graze the acreage from which he cut the hay, after the hay has been removed, the fee will be 50¢ per acre, according to Mills.

If a farmer has alfalfa on the set-aside acres for haying, it would work about the same as for sudan-cross, says Mills. However, if a farmer has grazing or hay which is to be utilized by his own cattle then nothing more is involved than securing approval and paying his fee.

Mills states that if a farmer has grazing which he re-lets to someone else for grazing, he cannot charge this person more than 150 per cent of the fee charged him or \$1.00 per acre whichever is smaller. For example: The ASCS committee charges a farmer \$3.00 per acre; then he could not charge someone else more than \$4.00 per acre if he re-let it to them. If a farmer has hay which he sells to someone else, he cannot charge more than \$30.00 per ton for the hay harvested from set-aside acres.

In reference to the grazing fees mentioned by Mills, they can vary depending upon the quality of the crop involved. For example: dryland as compared to irrigated, etc.

Mills says, "There is no question that this program is going to be a real boon to livestock producers and of some benefit to all of us in Parmer County, either directly or indirectly. He again stresses that all farmers interested in grazing or haying their set-aside acres are urged to visit the ASCS office in Farwell and get the particulars as they relate to the individual farm.

Dedication Ceremony For Parmerton Marker

Dedication ceremonies for the Official Texas Historical Marker for Site of Parmerton

will be held Sunday at 3:30 p.m., according to Hugh Moseley of Farwell, chairman of the Parmer County Historical Survey Committee. The Parmer County committee will be in charge of the ceremony.

Guest speaker for the dedication ceremonies will be Henry Teubel of Tulsa, veterans service officer for Swisher and Briscoe Counties.

The ceremony will also commemorate the 64th anniversary of the organization of Parmer County, and will highlight the local observance of "County History Appreciation Week," which has been proclaimed for June 6-12 by Governor Preston Smith.

Moseley, who will serve as master of ceremonies, will recognize out-of-county guests and special recognition will be given to county pioneers.

The marker, which was erected in January, is placed at Highway 60, 5.5 miles northeast of Bovina adjacent to the old Townsite of Parmerton. The high point from a standpoint of elevation in the entire county, and on Santa Fe's lines in West Texas, the site is commonly referred to by area residents now as "Parmerton Hill."

Made of cast aluminum with Swedish steel effects, the marker measures 18 by 28 inches and is sponsored by the Parmer County Historical Survey Committee. The inscription on the marker reads: "Site of Parmerton (Elevation 4,202 Feet)

In Support Of Buying Fire Truck --

Firemen Circulate Petitions

Late this week members of the Farwell Fire Department will begin circulating petitions among citizens of the township in support of their request for a new fire truck. City dads have indicated that the city has sufficient funds to buy the necessary truck without having to pass a bond issue. However, they are reluctant to spend the money unless the local citizenry okays the issue.

Members of the volunteer fire department feel that the purchase of a new truck is a "must" since if tests are made, the old 1951 Chevrolet with a 500-gallon tank and a 500-gallon per minute pump would be obsolete in another ten years but will still be usable for at least 20 years, stated Lee Hutchins, assistant fire chief. It will be much heavier and have a larger engine than those now in use.

en with heart attacks or other sudden illnesses.

Four members of the present fire department are charter members of the group. These men are Fire Chief George Magness, R. T. Langston, Smokey Gast and Fred Curtis. A total of 24 local men are members of the fire department at the present time.

A new Ford pumper with a 750-gallon capacity and a 1000-gallon per minute pump can be bought by the department for approximately \$25,000. If purchased, the 1971 truck will not be obsolete in another ten years but will still be usable for at least 20 years, stated Lee Hutchins, assistant fire chief. It will be much heavier and have a larger engine than those now in use.

If a new truck is bought, the department's fire fighting equipment will be in good condition since they plan to keep the 1956 Ford truck which has a 500-gallon tank and a 500-gallon per minute pump.

According to Hutchins, the department makes an average of eight to ten runs to fires in the area each week. In the past, the department has made as many as six runs in a 48-hour period. Included in the calls are runs to grass fires, homes and businesses. The department is also called to render assistance to persons in the area who have been strick-

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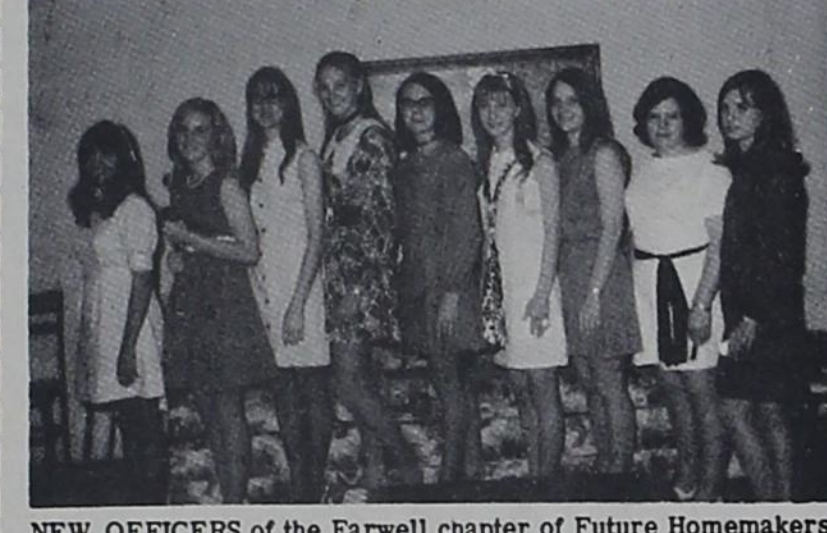

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TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

WHAT SHALL WE DO?

When John the Baptist appeared as Christ's forerunner, God's chosen people had lived under the Law of Moses for 1500 years but had not kept it. Hence John's call to repentance and baptism for the remission of sins (Mark 1:4).

John was in earnest, too, for when the thoughtless multitude came to him to be baptized, he sent them back, saying: "Bring forth fruits worthy of repentance" (Luke 3:7-8). Their lives were to be changed and they were to show it.

When the people asked: "What shall we do, then?" he told them to live for others rather than for self (Lk 3:10-11). When the tax collectors asked: "What shall we do?" he demanded that they stop cheating the tax payers and live honestly (vers. 12-13). When the soldiers asked: "What shall we do?" he told them to forgo violence, false accusation and bribery (ver. 14). Clearly, righteousness was demanded under John's message. His hearers were to repent, be baptized and bring forth the fruits of true repentance.

When our Lord appeared, He proclaimed the same message as John (Matt. 3:1-2; 4:17). A lawyer asked: "What shall I do to inherit eternal life?" and He replied: "What is written in the Law?" When the lawyer recited the basic commands of the law, our Lord answered: "This do and thou shalt live" (Luke 10:25-28). God was still demanding righteousness. They were all under the law. (See Gal. 4:4; Matt. 23:1,2; etc.)

Some suppose this was all changed after Calvary by the "Great Commission." This is not so. When, at Pentecost, Peter's hearers were convicted of their sins and asked "What shall we do?" Peter commanded them to "repent and be baptized...for the remission of sins" just as John had done (Acts 2:38). He did not tell them that Christ had died for their sins.

It was not until later that St. Paul was sent to proclaim the death of Christ as the payment for sin. He was the first to say: "But now the righteousness of God without the law is manifested...We declare His righteousness for the remission of sins" (Rom. 3:21-26). When the Gentile jailor fell on his knees and asked: "What must I do to be saved?" Paul replied: "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:30,31). This is God's message for sinners today. "For we have redemption through Christ's blood, the forgiveness of sins according to the riches of His grace" (Eph. 1:7). "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and THOU shalt be saved."

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Awards Assembly Climaxes Farwell School Year

Farwell's 1970-1971 school year ended Thursday, May 27, with three awards programs honoring the elementary, junior high and high school students.

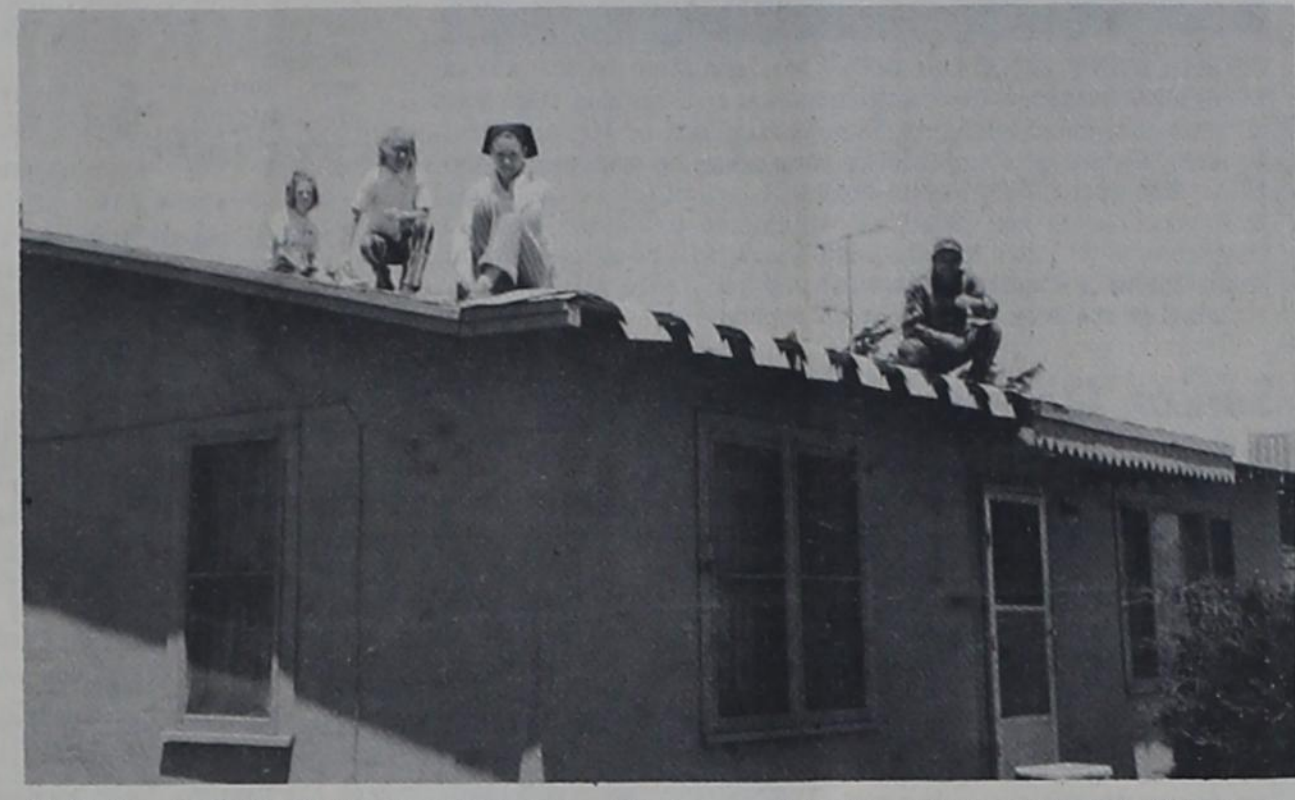

"Founded as Parmer Switch on Pecos & Northern Texas Railroad in 1898. In 1906 became site of a model farm, using Campbell Dry Farming method, run by Capitol Freehold Land & Investment Co.

"In 1907 Parmerton Townsite Co. bought 200 acres of the farm and laid out a town, which was designated first county seat that same year. A post office was soon established.

"When, in late 1907, Farwell was elected new county seat, Parmerton's citizens departed, taking homes and other buildings with them. Only the railroad switch marks the site today."

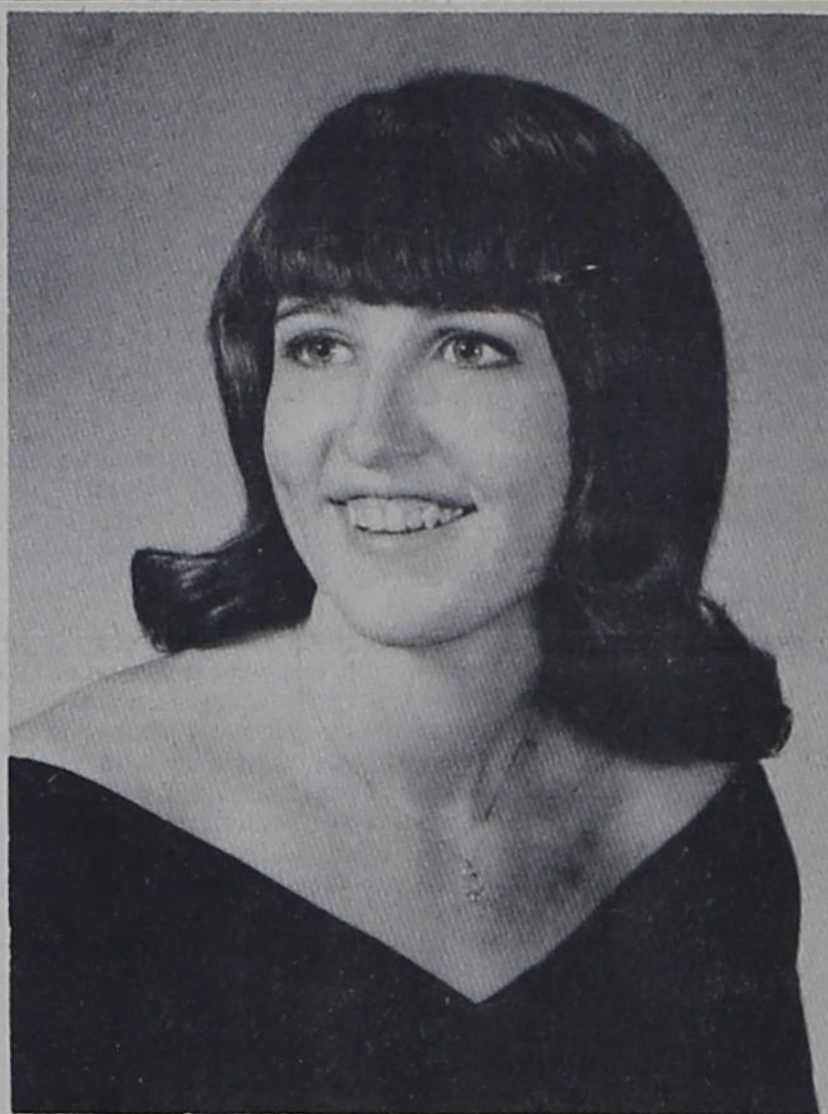
Marking of local historic sites and landmarks is part of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee's program of preservation activities.

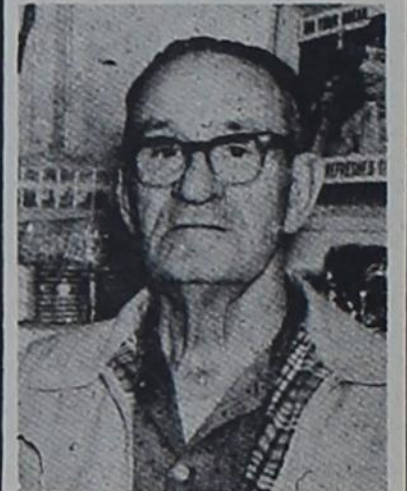

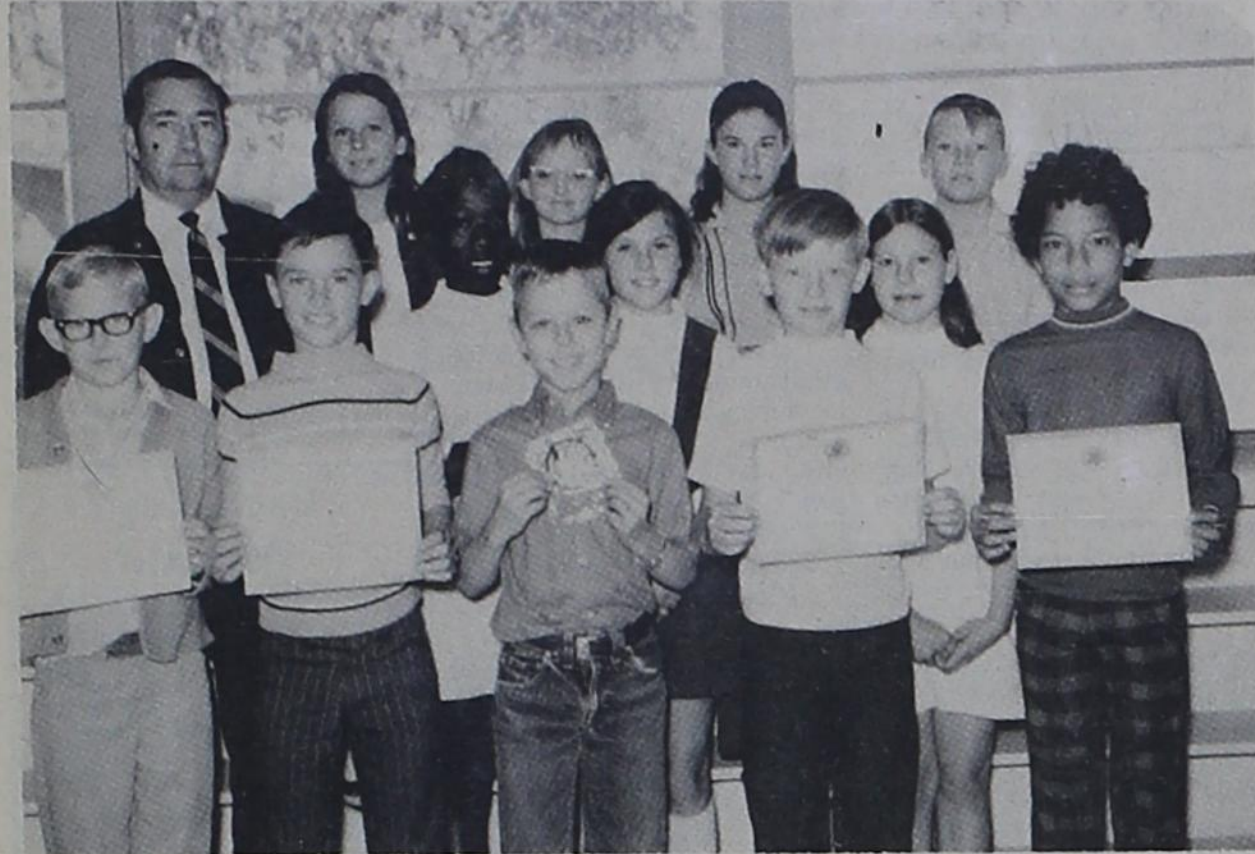
Prince and his teammate finished with 216. The Prince-Larkovic team won the first flight in the play-off on a bridge on the first hole.
