And so back to work late Monday afternoon. After a long and very enjoyable Thanksgiving Holiday, the Publisher and his wife face the task of again getting the "Weekly" before the public on schedule. We do not know if many people gave thanks for their Tribune last week, but we do know that those of us fortunate enough to live up on these baldies have a lot to be thankful about. After one of our infrequent trips to the Baghdad on the Bayou, otherwise known as Houston, we always return home thankful that we can call this barren part of the world home.

I will admit that some of my thoughts turn out to be near-sighted at times. We in this area of low density of population have a difficult, if not impossible, time in understanding the problems of the really big cities. For example, we had a rather harrowing experience last Saturday. Our family decided to go from Houston to Galveston Saturday afternoon and view the beautiful gulf shore and partake of some fresh and exotic seafood, and if time permitted, to visit Tommy and Janice Williams who live there. In a flash of brilliance, we decided not to buck the heavy Saturday traffic on the Gulf Freeway but to go by State Route 6 through mostly open country. This was a good idea except that we got caught in a Santa Claus parade in one of the small towns and were halted for a flat half hour while the natives welcomed the Jolly Old Gent on a truck -- no sleigh in sight. This set back our time schedule somewhat, but not too seriously. Then it began to happen -- about four or five miles from Galveston the fog began to come in and by the time we got to the Gulf Shore there wasn't any. We settled for Hill's Sea Food emporium and could not see across the street. Then we began to be uneasy about the return trip, so elected to begin the journey back immediately after eating. This time via the Freeway. It seems that when you go wrong once it just naturally follows that everything else will follow suit. Up the Gulf Freeway socked in with fog, four lanes wide and going 70 miles per hour and barely keeping from being run over at that. Then it happened. The Freeway was under repairs and they put all four lanes on a two-lane access road. Brrrrr, twice as many cars on half the space, still fogged in and going 70 miles per hour. It is hairy looking two cars up front, one car back and one to the side going at that speed. Not a darn fool was offering to slow down either. Well, obviously we lived through it, but next time we go to Houston, we do not plan on getting any farther away from home than the nearest hot dog shop. Even if the sun is shining. This is why I am convinced that citizens of rural communities just cannot understand the traffic needs of a city the size of Houston. In a battle that went right down to the wire, T. J. Kittrell edged out James Hobbs for the top prize in the Annual Merchant's Football Contest and took home two tickets to the Cotton Bowl plus \$50 expense money for his efforts. Hobbs was the recipient of two tickets to the Sun Bowl in El Paso plus \$25 expense money.

Kittrell, a top contender all season, won the first place award by virtue of having been off fewer points on the tie-breaking scores than was Hobbs. Kittrell missed the tie-breakers by 298 points during the entire season while Hobbs was off 329 points.

Going into last week's match, Kittrell had 71 points along with his son, Lynn, to lead the entire pack. Hobbs was tied for third place with 69 points along

with Harold Travis and Eugene Beavers. In second place with 70 points were Jerry Mathis and Dickie Chandler.

Kittrell picked seven games correctly in the final contest while Hobbs managed a whopping score of nine to put him into the tie and making the scoring of the season's tie-breakers necessary to determine the winner.

First place winner of the weekly prize was Travis "Butch" Everett who called nine games right and was seven points off on the tie-breaker score. James Hobbs and Lonnie McFarland each had nine games right and were 24 points off on the tie-breaker to make a tie for second and third place weekly money.

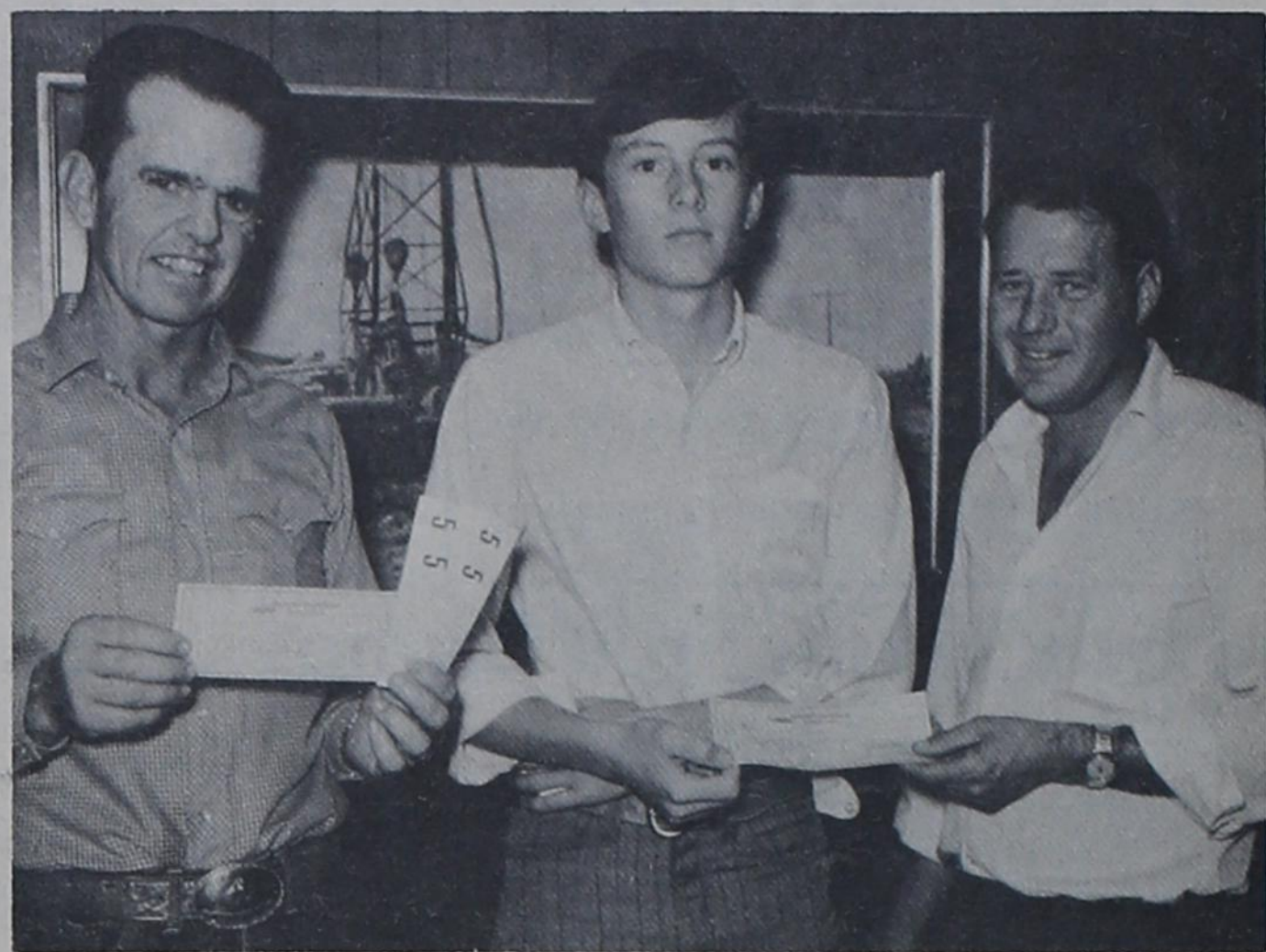
Winding up the season with 77 correct calls was Jerry Ma-

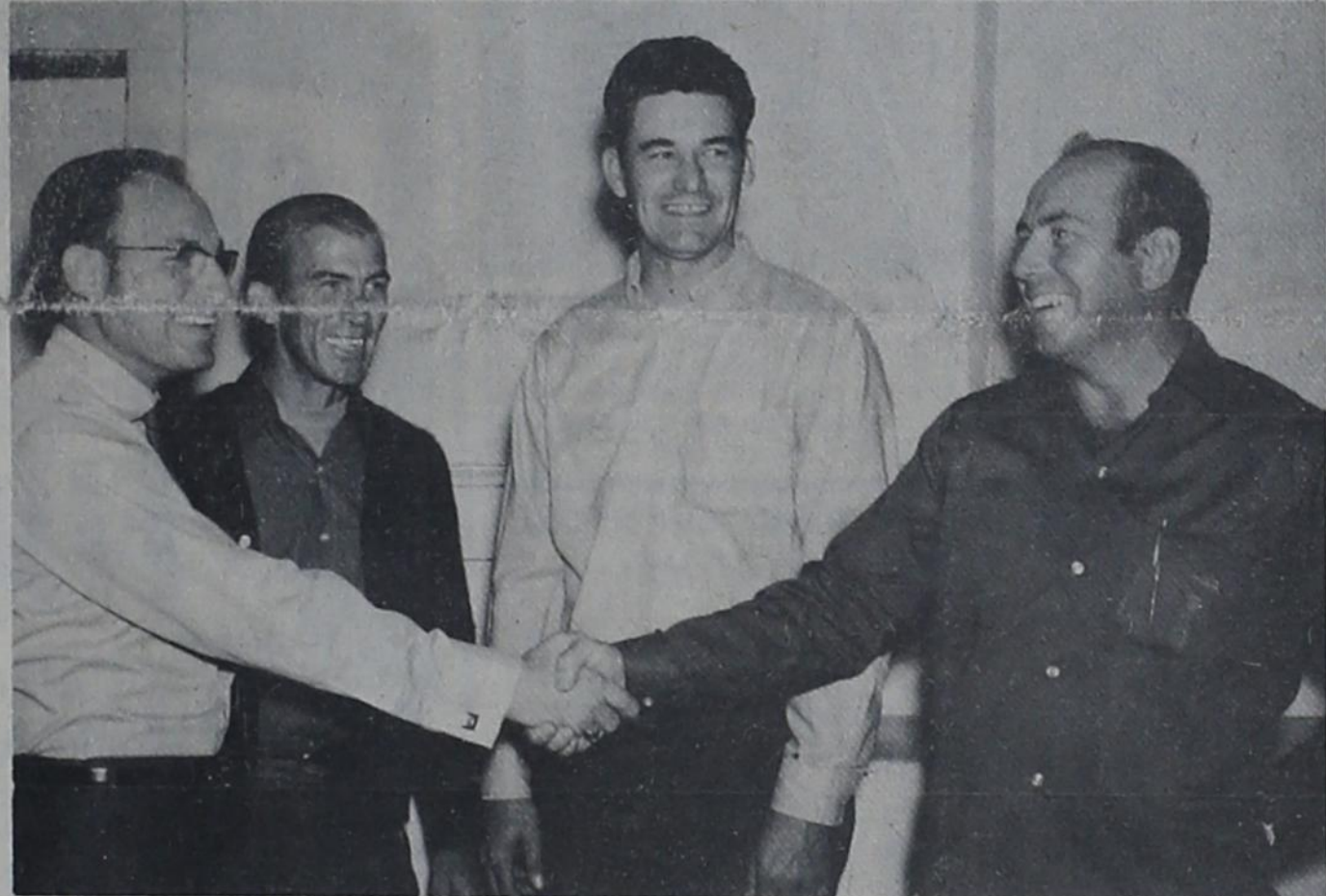

Workers May Testify At Rate Hearings

One of a series of public hearings on wage rates and prices for 1971 crop sugarbeets will be held at San Antonio, Tex., at John F. Kennedy High School Auditorium on December 14, 1970, beginning at 9 a.m., according to Louis Welch, chairman Farmer County ASCS.

Any person who wishes may present his views on sugarbeet wages and prices for the 1971 crop, Welch said. "This definitely includes farm workers, as well as producers, processors, and any other interested persons," he added.

To be heard on the matters under consideration, a person need only appear at the time the hearing opens and say that he wants to testify.

The law requires the U. S. Department of Agriculture to determine fair and reasonable wage rates for sugarbeet workers after a public hearing and investigation. A total of six hearings will be held around the country, and will, for the record, be regarded as one hearing. All testimony presented at each hearing will constitute part of the record. Persons may present testimony at any of the designated places.

In addition to the hearing in San Antonio, other hearings will be held in Denver, Colo., at U. S. Post Office, Room 269, 1823 Stout St., on December 16, 1970.

Voters Say Yes To Texico Bond Issue

Voters of Texico Municipal School District No. 2 passed the proposed \$350,000 bond issue by a 133-27 count in last Tuesday's balloting.

Slightly less than 50 per cent of the District's eligible voters turned out for the election. Of the property owners voting, 108 voted yes and 25 voted no. All 25 non-property owners who voted said yes to the proposed issuance of bonds.

It is hoped that the tax deductible bonds will be sold in June 1971 and that bids for construction of the new facilities will begin late that month so that they will be ready for use by the fall of 1972.

Present plans as detailed in a brochure made available to all area residents will stand as announced.

Included in the new building program will be an auditorium-gymnasium complex with dressing rooms for both boys and girls along with offices for the coaches. A basketball court as well as a stage will be featured in the complex and a portable bleacher system will allow patrons to view both basketball games as well as productions which require the use of a stage.

Proposed increase in local taxation will only amount to 69 cents per \$1,000 assessed valuation, meaning that on a house with an actual value of \$15,000, the added taxes will just be \$3.45 per year over the present payments.

Say Pheasant Crop Here 'Good As Ever'

The pheasant crop in Parmer County is "as good as ever" and possibly better. That was the consensus of members of Parmer County Game Management Association who met Monday night in Bovina to discuss the forthcoming pheasant season which is scheduled for December 12-20 --- Saturday through Sunday --- for a nine-day period.

Tallfeather contests for hunters have been set up in Farwell, Bovina and Friona. A total of \$30 in prize money will be awarded at each of the three places. The longest tallfeather will earn \$15, \$10 will be given to the second place winner and \$5 will go to the third longest.

In Friona, tallfeathers will be turned into Friona Consumers. The prize money will be donated by Friona State Bank, Production Credit Association and Friona Consumers.

In Bovina, tallfeather entry headquarters will be Bovina Gin Co. The prize money will be provided by Hartzog Seed Farms, Bovina Blade and Kerby Welding Service.

At Farwell, Farwell Hardware will be the headquarters and the prize money will be given by that firm, Security State Bank and Sherley-Anderson-Pitman elevator.

Game laws were discussed at the meeting, with emphasis on the pheasant season, by Chuck Cosper, state game warden headquartered in Hereford. Jack Patterson, president of the association, presided at the meeting.

Association members agreed to encourage each farmer in the county to leave protective winter cover for the pheasant population.

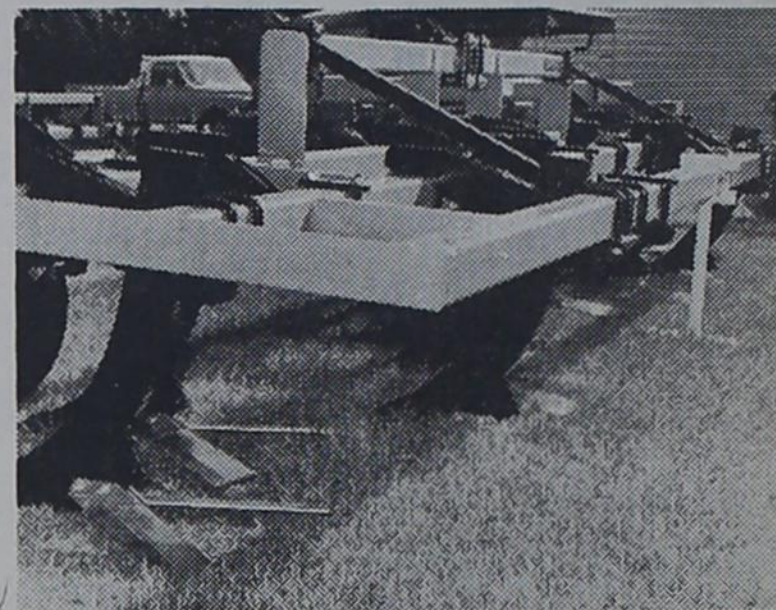

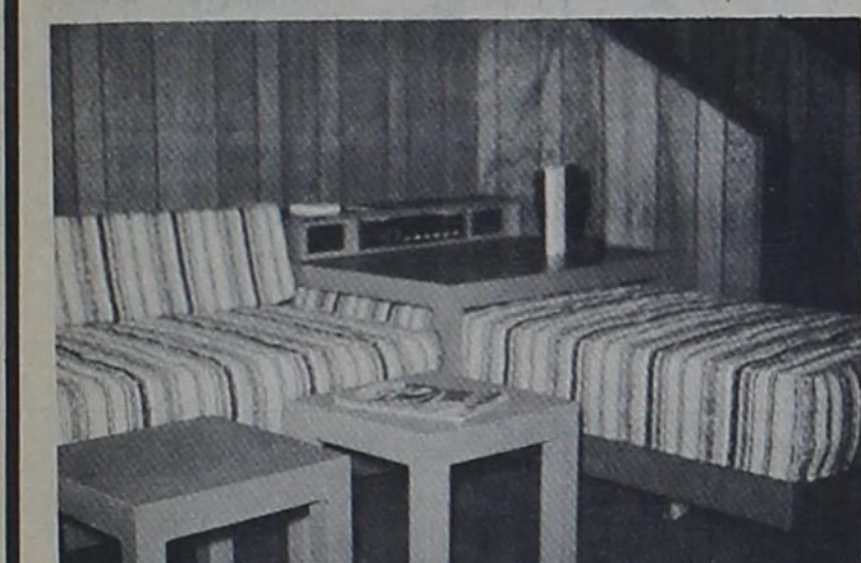

FAITH versus PRESUMPTION

The Word of God declares in Hebrews 11:6 that "Without faith it is impossible to please Him." There is nothing that will haunt a man like the fear that God may be displeased with him, nor any joy comparable to the assurance that He is pleased. It is foolish however, to suppose that we can please God with the things we think He desires. We must give Him what He says He desires. Thank God, it is not difficult to determine this, for He tells us again and again in His Word that it is *faith* He desires most of all. He wants us to trust Him, to take Him at His Word.

The Bible tells us at length how God loved us in spite of our sin and gave His blessed Son to die on Calvary's tree to clear our title to heaven, but alas, instead of taking Him at His Word, thousands turn away from His gracious offer, "going about to establish their own righteousness."

They do "good works" and make great sacrifices, thinking that a God of love will surely accept their efforts and overlook their sins. But this is presumption, not faith. How can a just God overlook sin? We should thank Him that in His matchless love He Himself paid for our sins so that we might be free and that salvation is "the gift of God," obtained by faith alone. Cain presumed that God would accept his attractive sacrifice instead of the prescribed one, but God refused both him and his offering. Pharaoh presumed that he could take his armies through the Red Sea as Moses had done, but he perished in the sea for presuming on God. Naaman the leper, refused God's way of cleansing, saying "I thought..." but the great general remained a leper until he took God at His Word. Will you take God at His Word and trust Christ as your Savior?

1 cup sugar

1/2 cup Crisco or 3/4 cup butter
3 eggs
1 cup prunes, cooked and diced
pinch of salt
1/2 cup sour cream
2 cups flour
2 tsp. cinnamon
1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. allspice
1 tsp. vanilla
Cream sugar and Crisco; add eggs, beaten whole, to this and add sour cream and soda alternately with flour, spices, prunes and vanilla. Cook in 350 degree oven until done.

TOPPING

2 eggs
1 cup sugar
1 cup diced prunes
1/2 cup sour cream
1 cup walnuts
1/2 tsp. vanilla
Beat eggs and add sugar, prunes and sour cream. Cook until thick; add walnuts and vanilla.

BLACK CHERRY SALAD
1 No. 2 can black cherries
1 pkg. orange gelatin
1 small bottle of stuffed olives
1/3 cup lemon juice
3/4 cup pecan meats

Drain cherries; add enough water to cherry juice and lemon juice to make two cups of liquid. Heat and pour over gelatin to dissolve. Chill until beginning to congeal, then add cherries, olives and pecans. For best results, use only Richelle brand black cherries.

ICE BOX CAKE
2 whole eggs, beaten
1 cup sugar, beat into eggs
1/4 cup melted butter
1/2 cup nuts
1 cup Grape Nuts, soaked in small can grated pineapple.

Mix all ingredients well. Pack with layers of vanilla wafers. Serve with or without whipped cream.

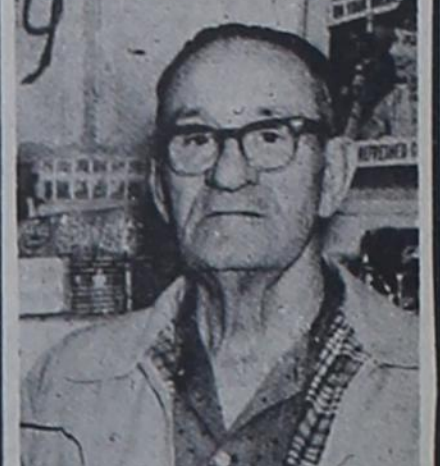

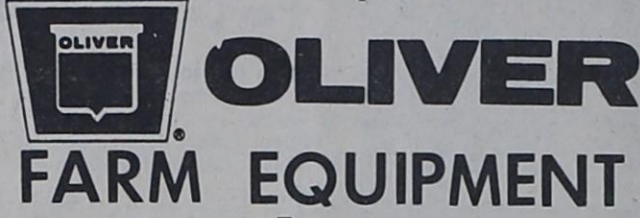

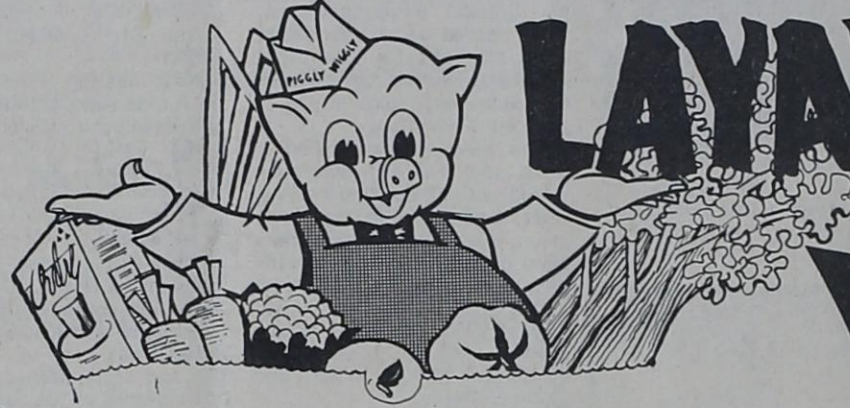
