

The first rule in selecting the freshest tree is to shop early. To determine how fresh a tree is, first check the needles. They should be resilient and

Shake or bounce the tree on the ground lightly to see if the needles are firmly attached. Trees on the lot always appear smaller than they actually are. Since Christmas trees are sold according to height, it is economically unwise to buy one several feet taller than the ceiling at home.

Look for a tree with uniform traingular taper. Check to see that it is free of weak, broken or unduly long branches. Also, it should have a well filled-out look.

Once home, make a diagonal cut at the base of the tree, removing one to two inches of the base. Stand the tree in water and keep the base immersed. The tree should be stored in a cool, shady spot, indoors or outdoors, until time for decorating.

A Christmas tree with its base immersed in water will remain safe from ignition from a point source, such as a match flame, for at least three weeks, if installed reasonably fresh. Add water to the base con-

tainer daily to replace amounts absorbed by the tree. A five or six foot tree may use as much as a gallon of water a day. Low humidity found in most heated homes increases the difficulty of keeping the foliage fresh.

Locate the tree so that it is not in the air stream of heating vents or near other sources of heat. Use a fire screen before a fireplace to contain flying sparks.

Keep the Christmas tree lighting system in good order. Inspect and discard wires with frayed insulation, broken sockets and loose connections. Don't buy strings of lights unless they Marriage licenses issued rehave the UL label.

On The Farm In Parmer County

By R. MACK HEALD County Agent

CORN BLIGHT POSSIBLE ON HIGH PLAINS IN 1971

Southern corn leaf blight which plagued corn producers throughout the Corn Belt this year will be back in 1971. Although the epidemic did not penetrate the Texas High Plains where corn is becoming an increasingly important cash crop, corn blight was identified in late September in Bailey and Deaf Smith counties. So, producers should be on the lookout when the new crop season rolls around.

"High Plains producers can do two things to protect against losses from the disease," points out Dr. Robert Berry, area plant pathologist with the Ruth SS Class Service. "First of all, stubble Texas Agriculture Extension management is important. Stubble should be turned under so that it will not be brought back up by land preparation or cultivation. Secondly, producers should plant as early as possible."

EARLY PLANTING IS IMPORTANT

Early planted corn seemed to sustain less damage throughout infected areas this past season, explains the plant pathologist. If the crop matures before large numbers of spores are produced by the diseasecausing fungus, losses can be

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good that the infection will only be slight. The disease will have to enter a field from spores carried by the wind from infected areas. Also, warm, wet weather hastens infection and those conditions are usually rare on the High Plains, Weexpect most disease to develop late in the season due to rainy weather in September." DISEASE SYMPTOMS CITED

In describing the symptoms of the disease, the plant pathologist explains that oblong lesions with tan centers and dark brown, reddish borders will appear on the plant leaves. A yellow halo often forms just outside the border. Leaf spots are one-half to three-fourths inch long and about one-fourth inch wide. Similar spots also occur on

husks, leaf sheaths and stalks. Infections may penetrate husk layers until the fungus reaches the kernals, thus destroying the quality of the grain. Ear shanks may also become infected and weakened so that ears fall from the plant. When this occurs, penetration continues up through the cob. Infected cobs become limp and break into several parts when squeezed or dropped. This complicates harvesting. Stalk rots also occur when the

fungus penetrates the surface. Under severe conditions, stalks may break and create a lodging problem. FUNGICIDES AVAILABLE

"Several fungicides are cleared for use on corn which serve as protectants from the disease," points out Berry. "However, treatment costs are high, from three to four dollars per acre, and several applications are required to give satisfactory control. So, fungicide control should be considered only as a last resort on fields with high yield potentials when a damaging disease is occuring in the area."

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
