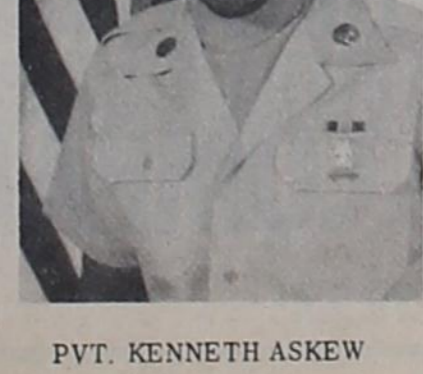

Askew Rites Set Today

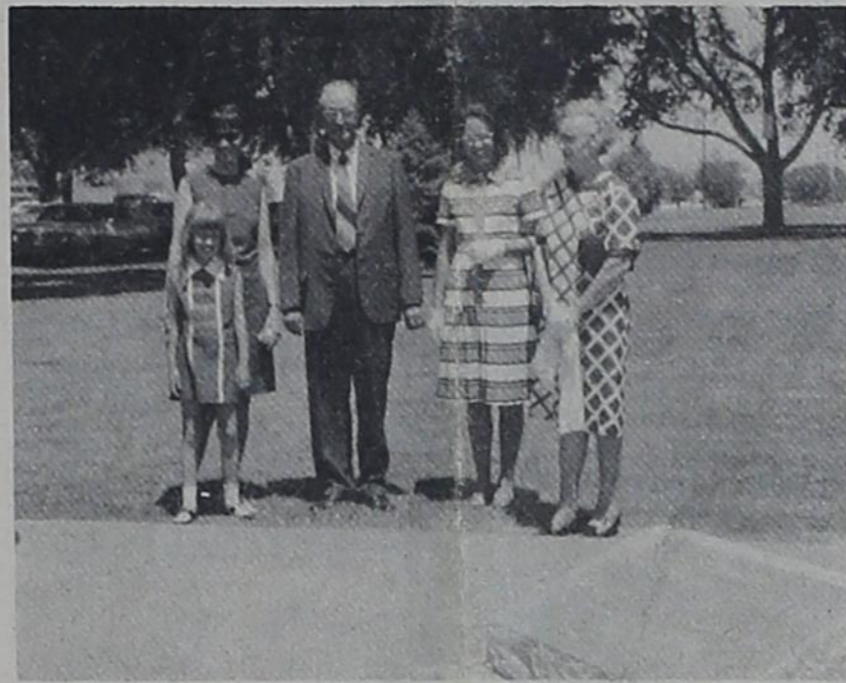

All of the employees of the county ASCS office have served in their present capacity for

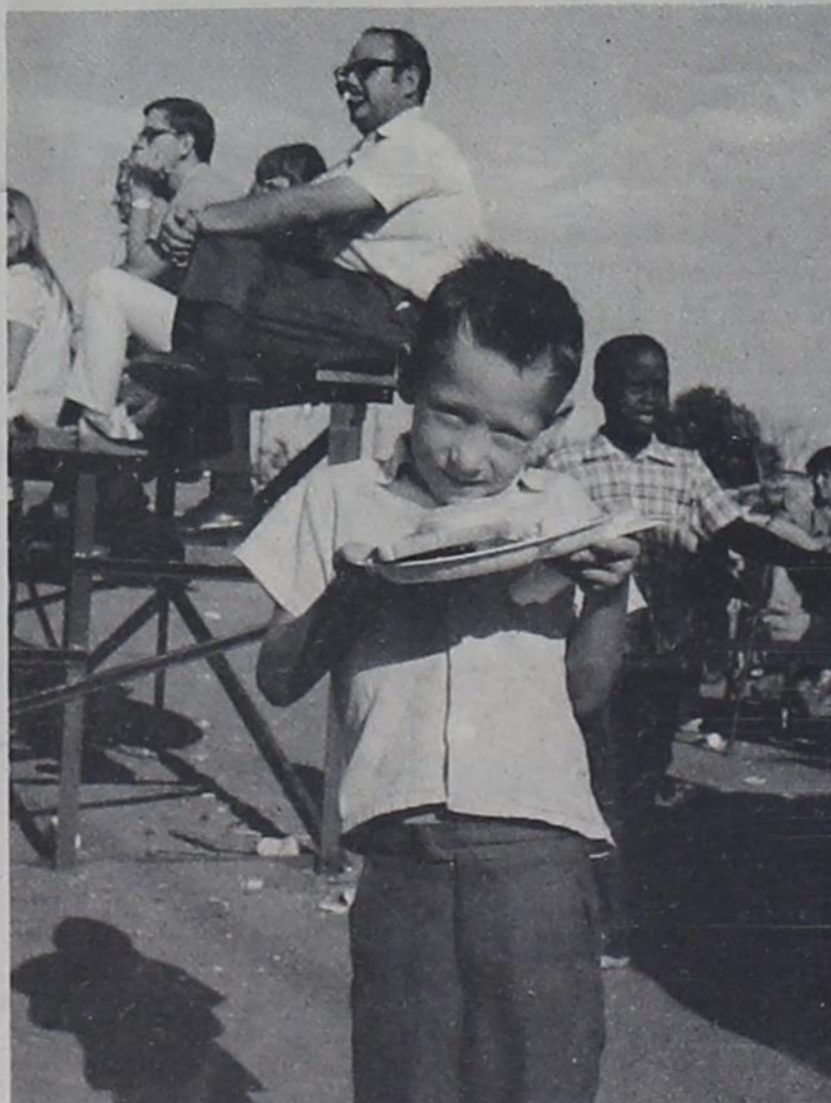

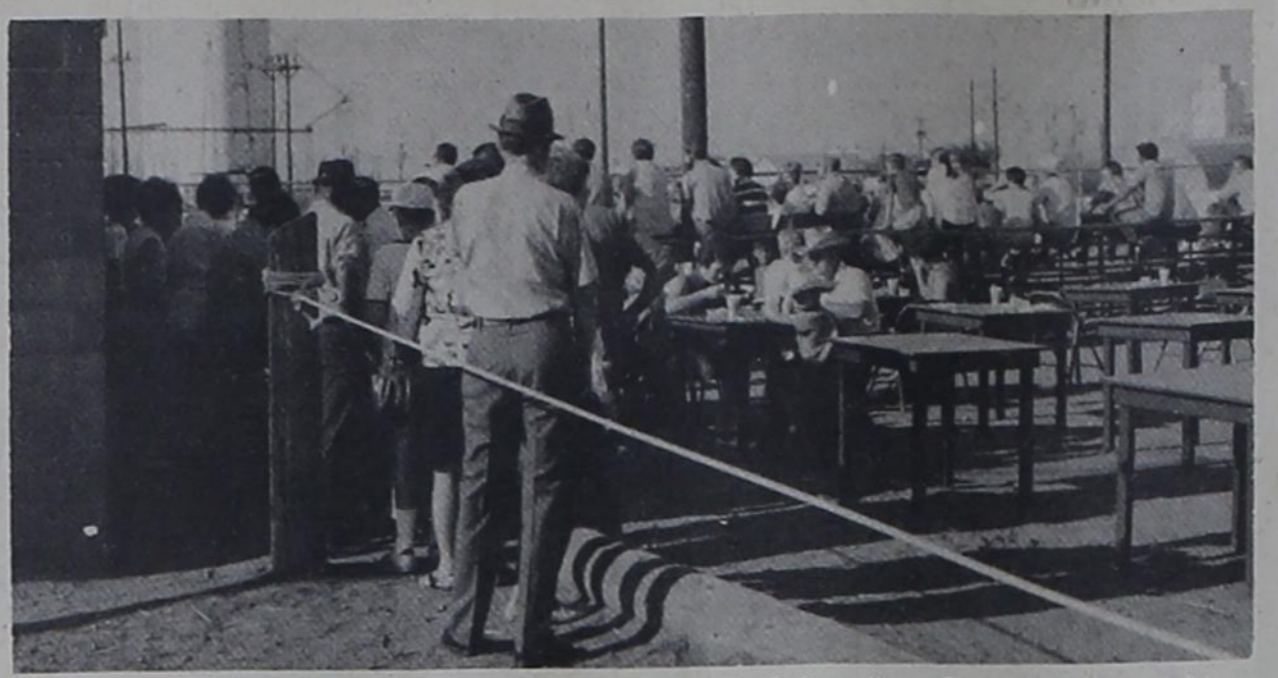

Grape-Banana Upside Down Cake

1 package (3 oz.) lemon-flavored gelatin
 1 cup boiling grape juice
 3/4 cup chilled grape juice

1 1/2 cups sliced banana rounds
 1 baked 8-inch white cake layer
 Whipped Cream, if desired

Dissolve gelatin in boiling grape juice. Add chilled grape juice to gelatin. Chill until slightly thickened. Place banana slices in an 8-inch layer pan. Cover with about 1/4 cups gelatin. Place cake layer on gelatin; top side up. Spread remaining gelatin over cake. Chill until firm. Unmold and garnish with whipped cream, if desired. Makes 6 servings.

*Banana slices keep better if dipped in lemon juice before placed in pan.

Lone Star Farmer Degree To Be Awarded Green

Darwin Green will receive his Lone Star Farmer Degree at the State Future Farmers of America convention to be held in Houston July 14-16. This is the highest degree awarded on the state level.

In order to receive this degree, Darwin had to complete two years of instruction in vocational agriculture, be able to lead a group discussion for 40 minutes, earn \$500 from his supervised farming program, be outstanding in FFA chapter leadership and cooperation, and hold a chapter farmer degree in the Farwell FFA chapter.

Tuna Dish for Busy Day

There was a time when the foods necessary for making oriental dishes were not easy to come by. Today, though, almost every grocery is well stocked with a wide variety of these specialties, canned or frozen, and they lend themselves easily to the making of quick dishes with interesting oriental accents.

Canned chop suey vegetables and water chestnuts, for example, can be used to create such quick dishes with leftover meats or poultry or with canned fish.

On any busy day, try turning a quick trick with a can of tuna fish. Add soy sauce for flavor and thicken lightly with corn starch after the manner of Chinese cooks. Oriental Tuna requires just 5 minutes of cooking time.

Oriental Tuna

- 1 (1-pound) can chop suey vegetables
- 1 1/2 tablespoons corn starch
- 1/2 cup dark corn syrup
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons soy sauce
- 1 (6 1/2 to 7-ounce) can tuna, broken into chunks
- 1 (5-ounce) can water chestnuts, drained and sliced

Drain vegetables, reserving 1/4 cup liquid. With a spoon, blend liquid and corn starch in medium saucepan. Add vegetables, corn syrup, lemon juice, soy sauce, tuna and water chestnuts. Bring to boil, stirring constantly. Simmer 5 minutes. Makes 3 to 4 servings.

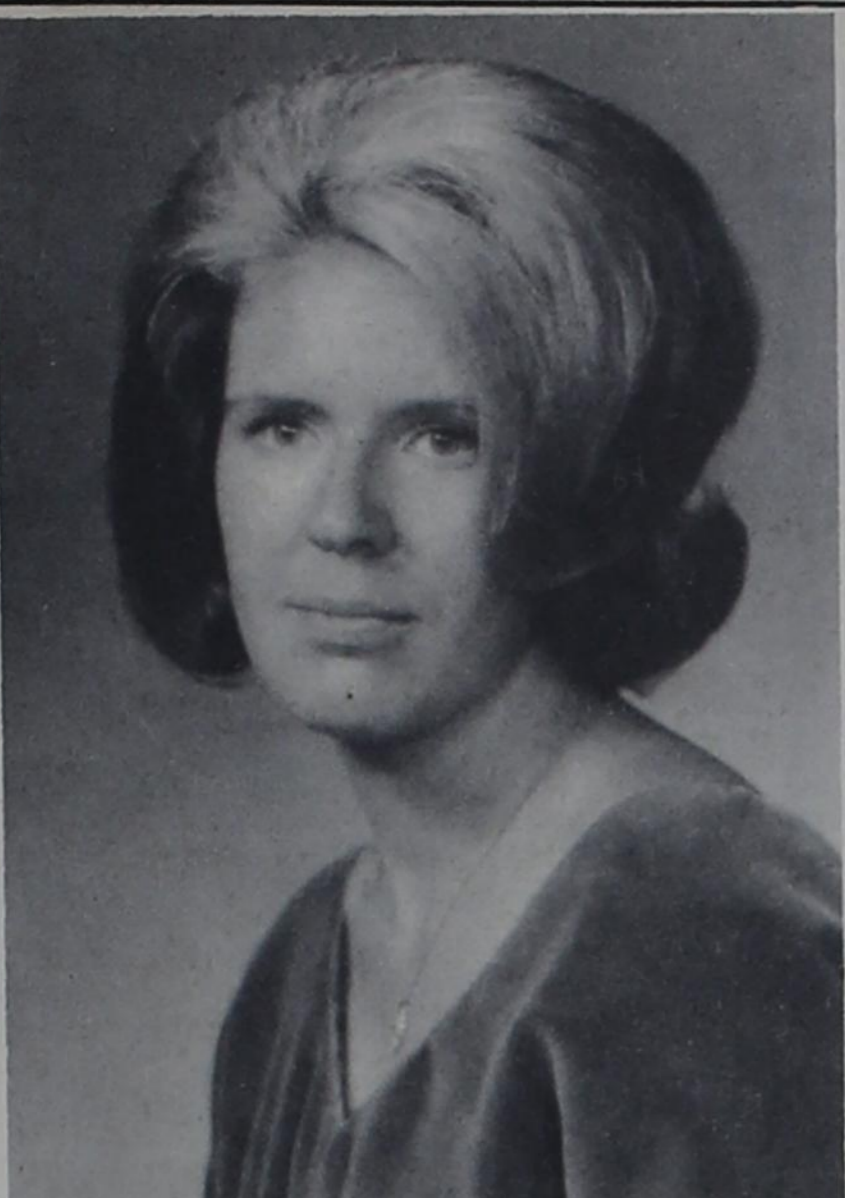

CHICKEN AND DUMPLINGS
1 chicken
1/2 cup hot water
1/2 cup cream or Half and Half
1/4 pound butter
1 teaspoon salt
3 cups flour

Boil chicken until tender. Season with salt and pepper. Take out chicken. Keep broth boiling.

Mix water, cream, salt and enough flour to make a stiff dough. Put remainder of flour on a board and knead dough. Roll dough out thin. Cut in 1 1/2 inch wide strips.

Fold strips and tear off small pieces of dough. Drop pieces in the chicken broth. Add butter. Lower heat to simmer. Cook approximately 45 minutes. Stir occasionally. Have plenty of broth. Water can always be added.

THREE-LAYER PINEAPPLE CAKE
3 1/2 cups flour
2 cups sugar
1 teaspoon salt
5 teaspoons baking powder
6 egg whites (unbeaten)
1 cup soft shortening
1 1/3 cup liquid (half pineapple juice, half milk)
2 teaspoons vanilla
Sift together flour, sugar, salt and baking powder. Add

shortening, pour in liquid and vanilla. Beat 2 minutes. Add egg whites. Beat 2 minutes. Pour into three prepared pans. Batter may appear curdled. Bake 25 to 30 minutes in a 350 degree oven.

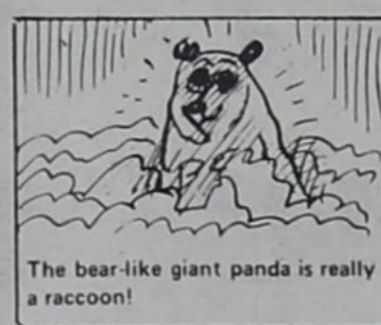

Food for Thought: It's summertime, and the outdoor eating is great -- picnics at the parks, barbecues in the backyard, or dinner on the porch. But refreshing as alfresco dining may be, it does call for extra care in food handling by homemakers.

Hot food must be kept hot and cold food cold to maintain flavor and wholesomeness. And if you are taking food any distance from home, you should plan on a menu that travels well. Eatables that can be heated upon arrival or kept icy cold en route are the safest.

For example, foods never to hold for over three hours at room temperatures include all creamed dishes, fish, ground meat, eggs and mayonnaise dressings. For storage of such perishable foods, a temperature of 42 degrees should be maintained. Cooked foods should not stand out after they have cooled, either. Cover them tightly and refrigerate or freeze immediately. When possible, divide a large quantity into small containers to hasten cooling. Store gravy and stuffing separately.

In spite of our vastly improv-

ed hygiene practices and sanitation procedures, hot weather is the time when food poisoning reaches its peak because people forget the proper handling of perishables.

It's essential to keep the kitchen immaculate, and to wash all poultry and vegetables carefully. After you prepare raw meat or poultry, be sure to sanitize the cutting board or surface before handling other foods. Washing hands often when preparing food is another good health practice.

Never use any food, home canned or commercially processed, that has a bulging cap or lid, that leaks, has a rancid odor, or foams or spurts when opened. Home economists also discourage freezing ground meat. The meat has already been exposed to possible contamination, and the higher the percentage of fat in the meat, the more rapidly bacteria grows. Then, if the meat is allowed to thaw on a kitchen counter rather than overnight in the refrigerator, it is still more susceptible to contamination.

ALL THROUGH THE HOUSE

Good decorating is a matter of inspiration plus know-how. The former is an illusive quality but the latter can be qualified as decorating know-how anyone can learn and apply. This know-how can be applied to every room in the house.
