Potato Harvest Near --

Wheat Harvest Complete

Harvest of wheat in Farmer County has been completed, according to Mack Heald, Farmer County Agricultural agent. Heald states that fewer acres (25,000) were harvested in the county than in any recent year. He attributes the lesser acres harvested to the lower price of wheat. Many farmers used the wheat as a range crop for cattle instead of harvesting the acres, he says. Yield per acre on the county wheat crops was good, with most fields yielding 50 bushels per acre or more. The wheat crop had been damaged little by the elements during the year, since little rain or hail have fallen on the area. Some wind damage was reported in the county earlier in the year. Heald states that the county vegetable crops are growing well. He also states that the 2600 acres of Irish potatoes are nearing the harvest stage. Harvesting of the potato crop usually gets underway in July, and this year's crop should be no exception, according to Heald. In addition to the potato crop, other vegetables growing in the county this year are cabbage, carrots, lettuce, onions, tomatoes and cantaloupes. A total of 6,000 acres have been planted to vegetables in the county.

The cotton, corn, sorghum grain and sugar beets are growing well, according to Heald. However, all of the crops are needing moisture since rainfall is well below average for this time of year. The vegetable crops are also growing well, he added.

In addition to wheat and veg-

etables, 34,000 acres of corn have been planted in the county along with 49,000 acres of cotton, 165,000 acres of milo, 11,000 acres of alfalfa, 8,000 acres of soybeans and 4,000 acres of sugar beets. Acres planted to corn, cotton and milo are up; however, the 4,000 acres of

sugar beets is less than in former years, says the county agent.

Livestock conditions in the county are good, according to Heald. Many farmers are in the process of watering their wheat land, getting ready for seeding the land in the fall.

Local, State Elections Open To 18-Year-Olds

All 18-year-olds who registered for national elections this year are now able to vote in state and local elections, according to Farmer County Clerk Bonnie Warren.

The 26th Amendment, effective as of July 1, 1971, states that all persons 18 years of age are eligible to vote in state and local elections and political subdivisions as well as national elections. Those persons who have already registered for this year are immediately eligible to vote in any state and local elections which may arise during

the remainder of the year. During the next registration period, persons 18 years of age may register to vote in upcoming national, state and local elections.

According to available information, 18-year-olds may serve on criminal juries, but must be 21 years of age to serve on civil juries.

The 26th Amendment overrules Article VI of the Texas Constitution which says that a qualified voter must be 21 years old. The new amendment was ratified recently when Ohio became the 38th state to place its approval on the amendment, thereby making it law.

Frank C. Hemke, 65, a resident of the Bovina area for the past 12 years, died about 5:50 a.m. Wednesday of last week at Farmer County Community Hospital in Friona.

Mr. Hemke was found about 8 p.m. Tuesday in the backyard of his home three miles west of Bovina, a gunshot wound in his head, Farmer County Deputy Sheriff Henry Minter said he was clutching a .22 caliber rifle.

According to Minter, the wound was apparently self-inflicted. No justice of the peace was summoned to conduct an inquest.

Graveside rites were held Friday morning in Bovina Cemetery with Cecil Bunch, minister of Bovina Church of Christ, officiating. Claborn Funeral Home of Friona was in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Hemke, a native of Murdock, Neb., came to Bovina in 1959. He farmed about nine miles west of Bovina in the Pleasant Hill Community. He was a member of the Lutheran Church in Murdock.

Survivors include his wife, Hazel; two sons, Jim Hemke of Ashland, Neb., and Charles Hemke of Clovis, N.M.; two brothers, Harold Hemke of Lincoln, Neb., and Raymond Hemke of Arlington; six grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Mr. Lockhart, a veteran of World War II, had retired last year from General Dynamics in Fort Worth. He had made his home in Paris since that time.

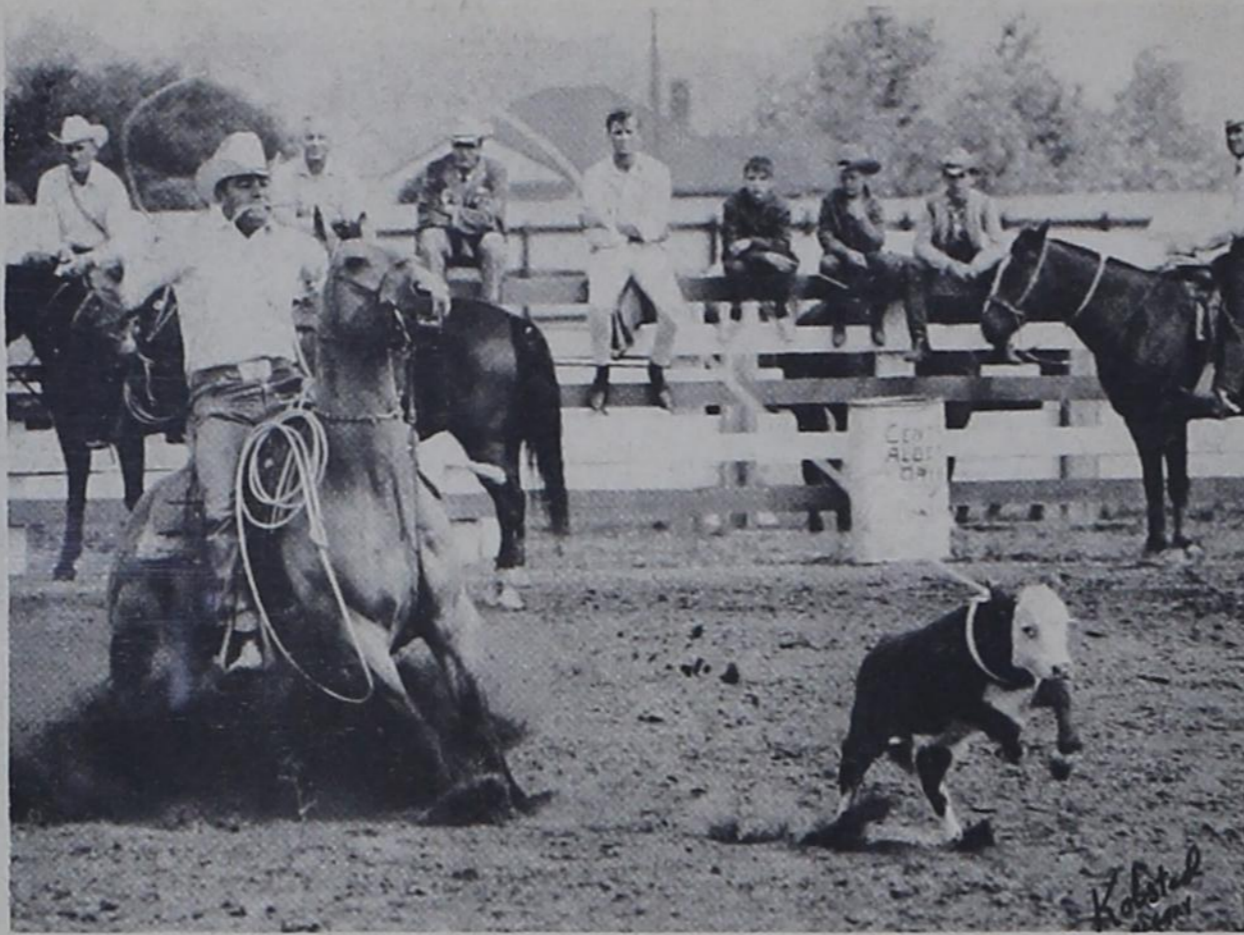
Survivors include three sisters and three brothers, including John of Texico; and numerous nieces and nephews.

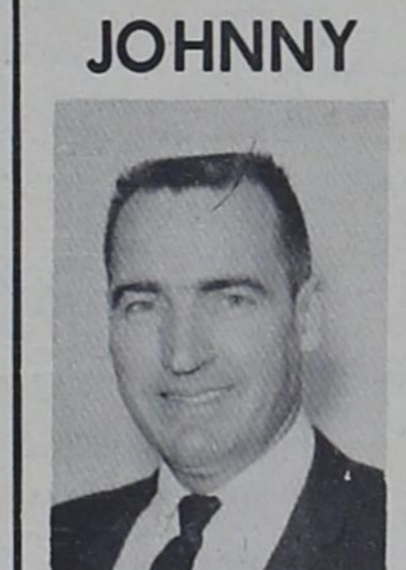

Two companions of Leos were allegedly asleep in the car and did not know their companion had left the vehicle. Leos was an employee of Missouri Beef Packing Co. at Friona and lived in Bovina with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Rafael Leos.

A burglary was reported at the Wayne Garth home north of Friona last Friday morning when a lock on a barn door was sawed off and thieves entered to take a tire and wheel and a duck gun valued at \$100. The duck gun is a weapon with a four-foot barrel attached to a three-gallon butane bottle triggered by a timer, causing it to blast at a specified time to scare away ducks from the ripening grain.

In other business from the sheriff's office, Sheriff Lovelace has filed charges of car theft against Clemente Gonzales, 42, who was arrested in Lubbock last week in a 1970 Ford Maverick which was allegedly stolen in Friona last May 10. The automobile was stolen from Bill Gipson, pastor of the Friona Church of Christ, from a parking place in front of the church. Gonzales was returned to Farwell on Monday.

Sheriff Charlie Lovelace reported Wednesday morning that Cecilio Quintero, Jr., 19, who was wanted in connection with the theft of Bill Gipson's automobile from the Friona Church of Christ in May, was apprehended in Lubbock on Tuesday. He will be returned to Farwell to face charges of theft of an automobile after facing similar charges in Lubbock.

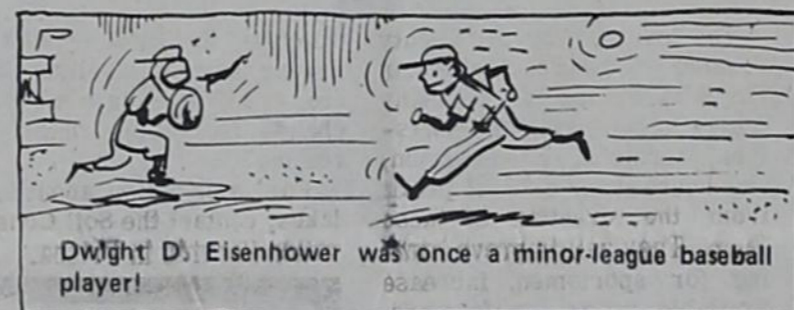

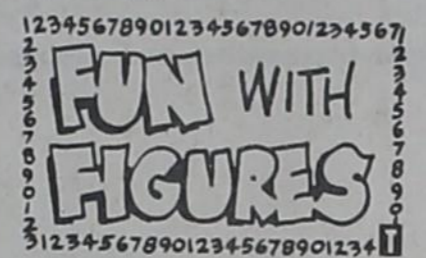

In every part of the county the insect population seems to be on the increase. Greenbugs and corn leaf aphids have been building up for the last 30 days. Although the greenbugs are not as thick as in past years, I have found several fields with large populations of the aphids. Corn leaf aphids are heavy enough in some fields to cause honey dew formation on the plants. Although very similar to the greenbug, the corn leaf aphid differs by not injecting toxins in the plant during feeding as does the greenbug. In many fields I have been in, there were sufficient numbers of predator insects to keep the corn leaf aphids under control. We are seeing their heaviest buildup now in the pre-boot stage, for they usually decline during the boot stage. Control for corn leaf aphids is difficult, as you well know, because of their living habits in the whorl of the plant. Most often, spraying for corn leaf aphids completely eliminates all beneficial insects. This only opens the door for more serious insects to move in.
 The most dangerous insect we may encounter this year in

grain sorghum and corn is the Banks Grass Mite. Damage to plants appears as discoloration, drying and premature death of the leaves. Lodging usually occurs during the later stages. These insects were observed in spots last year. Beneficial insects controlled them into August of last year before they had to be sprayed. These insects, however, have the ability to become resistant to all of the insecticides that we now use. This has already happened in the Trans-Pecos area and could very well happen on the High Plains. Farmers in the Trans-Pecos area have been forced to use sulfur dust to obtain a good control because of the mite's resistance to organic phosphate insecticides. Mite populations last year were heaviest where fields were sprayed more than once for corn leaf aphids and greenbugs.

With the exception of a few fields, the corn and milo is looking much better than at this time last year. Everything could use a good general rain to help these wells along, and take some of the hot weather stress off of the plants.
